

## U.S. Ship Strafed Near Isle

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22 (UPI)—The state department said today that an unidentified aircraft fired on an American-owned ship near the coast of Cuba early today. It said the plane was "presumed to be Cuban."

A U.S. spokesman called the incident an "unprovoked attack on a vessel navigating on the high seas," flagrantly violating the freedom of the seas. He said the American government was investigating to determine whether a formal protest should be made.

State Department Press Officer Robert J. McCloskey told the J. Louis, "a Cuban flag bulk oil carrier, was under gunfire attack from an unidentified aircraft, presumed to be Cuban early this morning, according to messages received from the ship by the coast guard."

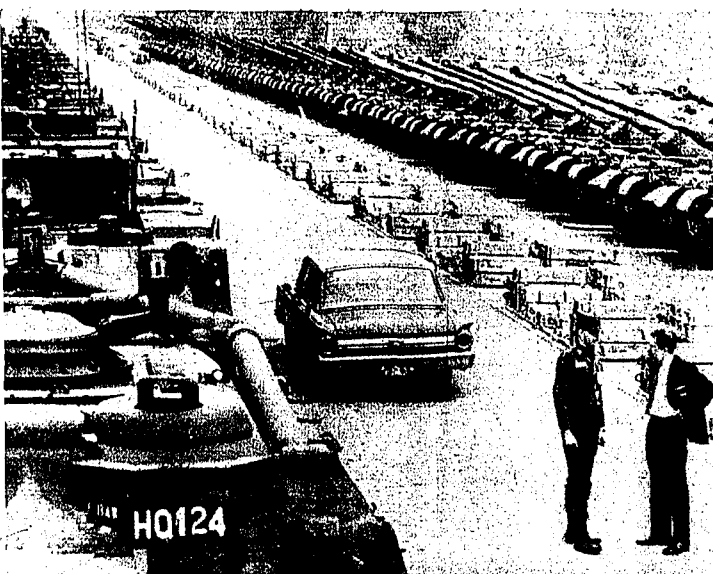
McCloskey said U.S. officials had said more than one aircraft was involved, but McCloskey said the attack was made by one plane.

McCloskey said U.S. jet fighters based in Key West, Fla., were scrambled when the first report was received. The plane was seen but "when they arrived, the activity had ceased," McCloskey said.

The ship reported that the attack hit was 13 miles south of Cape Corrientes, which is in the southwest tip of Cuba, according to McCloskey.

The ship was subjected to an aircraft attack between 12:40 a.m. and 1:41 a.m. EDT, McCloskey said. According to messages received from the ship, the attack consisted of gunfire, including no bombs or rockets.

The ship is owned by Universal Shipbuilding, Inc. Headquarters in New York had said earlier that the vessel was attacked by a plane presumed to be Cuban.

## Dog Leash Law Sparks Heated Discussion by Commissioners

## Road Work at Fairfield Is Progressing

FAIRFIELD, Oct. 22 — Construction work is under way on another portion of highway 68 between Fairfield and Mountain Home. Equipment of the Watkins Construction company and the Morrison-Knudsen company are working between the bottom of Cat creek grade and the Windy Gap grade near Dixie.

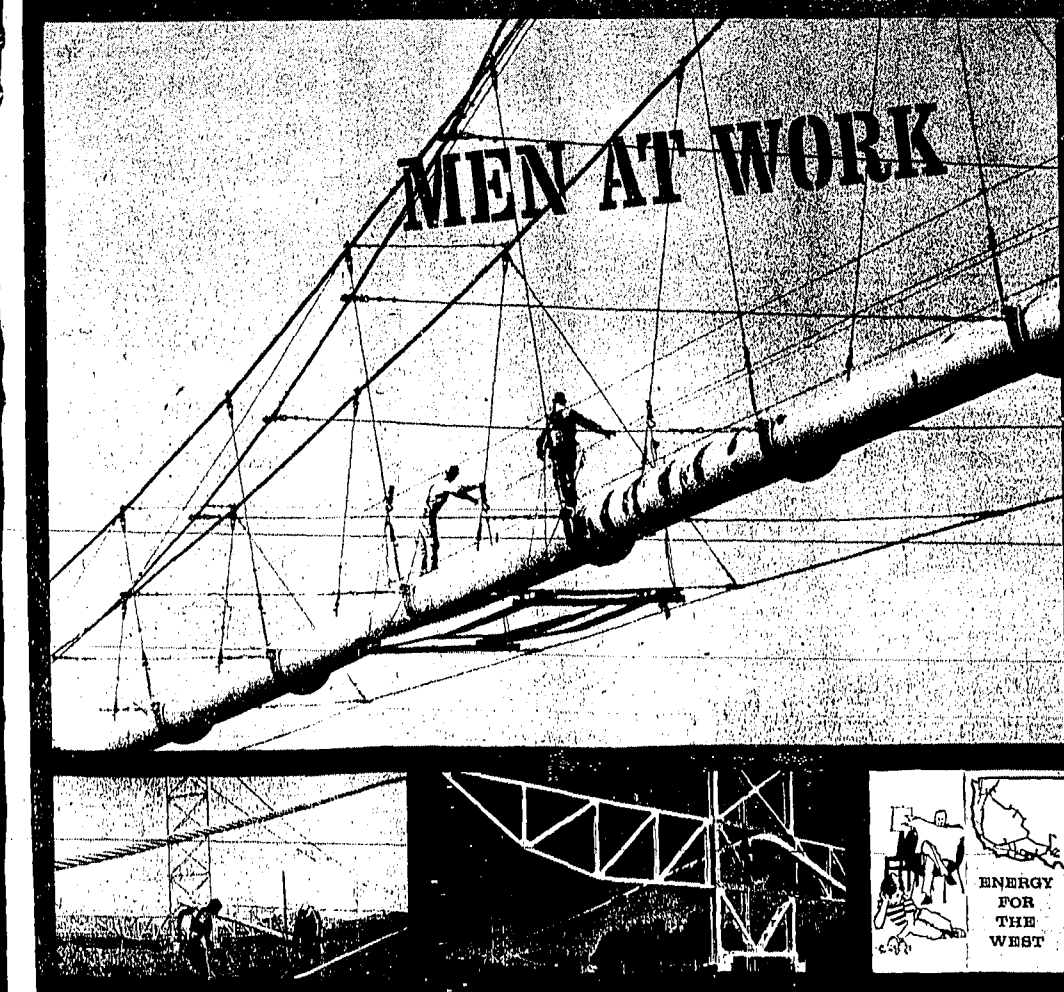

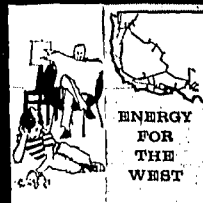

## Park Asked To Release Prisoners

SEOUL, Korea, Oct. 22 (AP)—Three major political parties urged President Park Chung Hee today to release political prisoners to create an atmosphere of freedom for the 1963 national assembly election.

They also demanded that Park lift a ban on political activities.

The statements were issued separately by spokesmen for the Civil Rule, Democratic and Liberal Democratic parties.

They said that Park, who won a narrow victory in last week's presidential election over former President Park Chung Hee, had promised during his campaign to release all political prisoners except for extreme terrorists if he was elected president.

There are about 300 former politicians who are barred from engaging in politics, although they are not in jail. They include ex-President Syngman Rhee, who now lives in Honolulu, and former President John Chung, who was ousted in a military coup d'état led by Park in 1961.

Political prisoners include ex-Premier Lee, Gen. Song Yo Chan, former junta member and ex-minister of construction Lee, Gen. Park In Hui, and other officials of ex-President Rhee's Liberal party.

## Rusk-Solons Tiff Fails To Develop

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22 (AP)—Secretary of State Dean Rusk had a face-to-face meeting Monday with the Senate Internal Security Subcommittee on the Senate's right to obtain information from state department files.

Although a clash had been expected over the department's plan to fire Olof P. Oleska, it apparently failed to materialize.

The department accused Oleska, its chief evaluator of personnel security risks, of violating regulations by slipping copies of some secret documents to the subcommittee.

"There was no row," said Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, D. Conn., the acting chairman, after the two-hour closed meeting.

## Patrols Ordered To Shoot Syrian Infiltrators

BEIRUT, Lebanon, Oct. 22 (AP)—Lebanese border patrol units were ordered today to shoot any Syrian infiltrators from neighboring Syria.

Four Lebanese soldiers were killed in a week-end border clash.

## News Around Idaho

POCAHELLO, Oct. 22 (AP)—The state Police president says a revised bill on national policies will probably be submitted to Idaho members who can take a stand on a bill now before congress. Mrs. L. L. Patten said she was asked by national Police president to ask Idaho members to support the national education facilities bill, which would provide funds for private and parochial schools. But she said rejection by the Idaho Police congress of the entire legislative program of the national congress would be impossible for her to ask Idaho members to oppose the bill. The national policies were rejected on grounds they were ambiguous, and contained presumptions of support of such things as federal aid to education, federal aid to the state convention where that federal education funds should not go for private and parochial schools. She said a committee will try to prepare a new bill and submit it to the national assembly in April.

BOISE, Oct. 22 (AP)—L. E. W. F. Derow has rejected a request from a Missouri man charged with murder to hear his argument for freedom. Charles E. Smith, 31, addressed a petition to Derow but the acting governor replied in a letter that he was not a Missouri man. Smith is charged with murdering his wife, Donna Jean, whose body was found in a lake near Kirkville, Mo. He was arrested here March 31 after a police officer, making a routine traffic violation check, remembered him from a wanted poster. Smith said Third District Court to free him on grounds he wasn't in Missouri at the time his wife was killed.

POCAHELLO, Oct. 22 (AP)—An Atlanta, Ga., firm has a 1 million dollar contract to build an ammonium phosphate plant as part of the expansion program here of the J. R. Simplot company's fertilizer complex. D. M. Weatherly, president of the company, said the plant will be completed next spring. The plant will have more than double the firm's 300 tons per day capacity for production of ammonium phosphate fertilizers. The new plant will have more modern engineering design than the present plant.

BOISE, Oct. 22 (AP)—Applications for federal funds for two projects will be considered by the Idaho hospital advisory council at its meeting Friday in Burley. Richard Adams, chief of the hospital facilities section of the state health department, said Monday. Applications seek \$200,000 to assist in financing a state laboratory in Boise and \$100,000 to aid in expanding the Boundary county hospital in Bonners Ferry.

BOISE, Oct. 22 (AP)—Idaho cities are invited to submit requests to host the 1964 Republican state pre-primary nominating convention next June 11-12. To qualify cities must have 500 rooms for delegates and a convention hall, and must be in the state's primary election year, choosing two or more nominees for the two congressional seats. The people will choose from among the convention selections in an August primary.

BOISE, Oct. 22 (AP)—Scholarships for the 1964-65 school year are available for students interested in wildlife conservation education. The Idaho Fish and Game department, under the Wildlife Federation, is offering the national wildlife federation and range up to \$1,000 for graduate students and \$500 for undergraduates who have completed at least one year of college.

BOISE, Oct. 22 (AP)—Plans to work for repeal of the pari-mutuel horse race betting law will be considered by the Idaho Allied Civic forces at the temperance organization's annual conference opening here Thursday. The agenda also includes speeches by Dr. William A. Schaffenberg, Washington, D. C., executive secretary of the International Commission of the Prevention of Alcoholism and the Rev. Keith Miller, pastor of First Methodist church of Nampa, a former ACP president. Some leaders have already pledged to work for repeal of the betting law, held constitutionally valid by the Idaho supreme court. The Idaho allied civic forces will decide today whether to approve a \$200,000 bond issue that would pay for a third high school in the capital city and a new junior high. School officials contend that the bond issue is needed because of overcrowding in the two existing high schools, and in other schools. In addition to the new schools it would pay for additions to five existing schools. Biggest item is the high school, which would cost 23 million dollars.

## Beet Growers May Ask for More Market

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22 (AP)—American sugar beet and cane growers will probably make a strong bid next year for congressional action to guarantee them a market share of the national sugar market.

The move is expected to come in an effort to amend the federal sugar act which divides the beet market into quota shares for domestic and foreign producers.

Administration and sugar industry sources here believe that when congress begins consideration of the foreign quota, it will also decide to reopen the question of the domestic share.

Under existing law, domestic beet producers and cane growers in Louisiana, Florida, Hawaii, and Puerto Rico are allotted 80 percent of the total 8.7 million tons of the annual total sugar quota, plus 65 percent of all quotas over the 8.7 million-ton level.

Robert H. Shields, president of the U.S. beet sugar association, said today that the beet industry is demonstrating a production potential which may outpace the market provided by the present sugar act.

Shields did not indicate what the industry may propose next year. But he said that congress would "consider favorably" both the industry's production potential and its record this year in "meeting supply problems and... resisting the upward price pressures caused by the higher levels of cane sugar prices."

Joshua Ferris, Jr., spokesman for the American Sugar Cane League representing producers in the Louisiana-Florida mainland cane area, said the government has asked farmers in that area to produce all the sugar they can. Now that production is running ahead of the marketing quota, he added, "The government will have to work out a way to market it."

nounced cases of the State university of New York, consultant to the Syracuse veterans hospital, board member of two professional psychiatric journals, and author of the new book, "Law, Liberty and Psychiatry."

Now, Dr. Szasz has no quarrel with psychiatry practiced on patients who come voluntarily for treatment.

"The danger today lies," he says, "in institutional and public psychiatry practiced in the law courts and on involuntary patients. Under the questionable standards of mental health and mental illness, authorities and so-called psychiatric experts are chipping away at the legal rights and liberties of the individuals in their charge."

Wills are broken daily in the law courts, Dr. Szasz says, because a psychiatrist sees in the

lives whose husbands wanted their freedom without the mess of a divorce; old folks whose children did not want to take care of them; young people being prevented from marrying or inheriting money.

In criminal cases, the cult of mindlessness and its high priests, Dr. Szasz points out, jeopardize most seriously the rights of the individuals.

"He has, in effect, been imprisoned without a trial, and whether or not he is receiving psychiatric treatment, he is still in jail, deprived of his liberty and his constitutional guarantees. And once you are in, it is not so easy to get out. You do not merely serve your time and go. You must wait for psychiatric approval."

"Psychiatrists and officials concerned with mental health," Dr. Szasz says, "are becoming today judge, jury, investigator, prosecutor and jailer."

By planning more and more crimes and criminals in the category of the mentally ill we are shirking our responsibility to them and at the same time giving up our rights and freedoms—even though we have a real definition of mental health.

"Psychiatry, the law and humanity know that if one man has murderous feelings toward another he is not necessarily insane. Nor is he insane if he acts on those feelings and plans and executes the murder. But if we call him mentally ill we can wash our hands of him and turn him over to the psychiatrists," Dr. Szasz says.

"We are escaping from the trouble of freedom by giving our freedom and ethical choices to the tyranny of therapy."

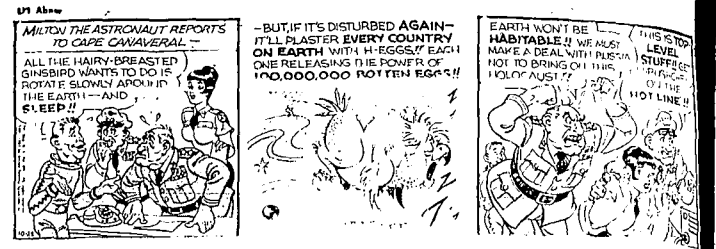
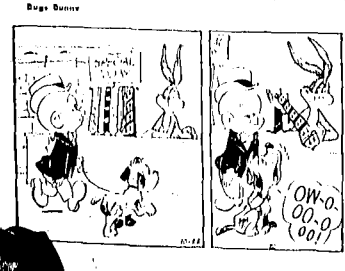
