New Home Front Fad Couples Soap With Art

NEW YORK, Oct. 31—The newest craze bubbling on the home front couples soap with art.

Housewives, career women, and teen-agers are joining in turning cases of soap into decorative objects either for use as couple gifts, for bride or party favors, and for sale for the benefit of assorted community projects.

Just about any household odd or end can be used for decorating—be it felt, buttons, sequins, net, ribbon and decal. Many manufacturers whose soap bars are being turned into objects have said samples of decorative bars have been arriving at its offices by tens of thousands. At first, they were sent in voluntarily. Then the firm decided to make a promotional use of the samples and gathered more.

From the collection, the company chose 300 examples which it put on exhibit in New York last week and later will display in banks or other institutional and office buildings in the south, the Midwest and on the west coast. Just how the fad started, or where, the sponsors of the exhibit haven't determined.

This one owner of the market in St. Paul, Minn., said, "It seems like all the housewives get the same idea—the same idea for do-it-yourself home gifts. You use everything—soap, macaroni, plastic bleach bottles—and we always find out," said owner Jack Talen.

"Two years ago it was toothpicks for building Christmas trees," said Dave Colt, manager of a Minneapolis market. "You couldn't find a toothpick in the store the week before Christmas. Last year, I was ready to throw them, but instead they cleaned me out of soap. I sold only 10 boxes of toothpicks. I've enough toothpicks left to build a highway."

The sponsors of the soap art were doing well and what became of the results.

They found Mrs. Theresa Handley, Chicago, teaching her church youth group to carve soap figures (fish) are a favorite design) to be used as gifts for parents and teachers for Christmas.

Housewives in Detroit said they would create colorful soap fish and sell them at church bazaars.

A fellow Chicago club in 19, Paul discovered her own ideas when craft to sell to supplement retirement income. A group of women in Nekoma, Wis., sold through decorated soap bars to purchase extra equipment for the school lunchroom.

Experts Suggest Culinary Check Of Future Mate

NEW YORK, Oct. 31—How times do change. Once, it was considered a matter of course to cook. Now, a bunch of experts claim that the bride should know how to suggest that the girl check out the culinary ability of her mate. If he can cook, here's the stable sort.

A sponsor of a men's cooking contest reached this conclusion from talks with 200 psychologists, 3,412 wives and 3,102 men, married and single.

The psychologists pretty well agreed that in families where the husband helps with the cooking, there is greater happiness between husband and wife, less chance of a separation or divorce, and a closer relationship because of the husband's better understanding of home functions and problems.

These are a few of the interesting findings brought to light through researchers for the men's national cooking championship, an event now in its sixth year. The next champion will be named at a cookoff in Miami Feb. 11.

Researchers wanted to find how many men cook and why, how it benefits them and their families.

Home-makers reported that in a household where the man cooks, the children are more cooperative in washing the dishes and helping with other chores. They also tend to be more respectful of their parents.

Researchers found that two in five husbands do more in their four husbands do cooking, ranging from just making breakfast to preparing the full evening meal.

This represents a 600 per cent increase over 1958, the year the men's championship contest began when one husband in 12 shared the family cooking chores.

The study showed also that men are taking a greater interest in shopping for home needs, with 54 per cent of them doing it.

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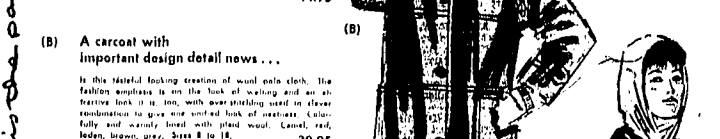
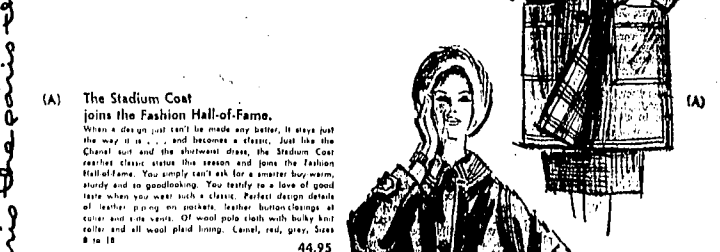

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Dodgers' Sandy Koufax Named National Loop's "Most Valuable Player"

BOSTON, Oct. 31 (AP)—Los Angeles left-hander Sandy Koufax—the comeback Dodger who made the difference—was named the National League's most valuable player for 1963 Wednesday.

The 27-year-old strikeout king decisively beat Dick Groat, the St. Louis Cardinals' spunky ace, 247 votes to 190. Results of the annual poll of a 20-man committee of the Baseball Writers' Association of America were announced by BBWAA secretary Hy Hurlwitz. Koufax was named on all but one ballot. Koufax, recovered from a serious injury which kept him out of his left hand when he pitched in July 1962, pitched the Dodgers to the pennant they couldn't quite pull off without him the latter half of '62.

The Brooklyn-born bachelorette pitched a National League record 306 strikeouts, 47 runs to a 25-4 mark and a brilliant 1.88 earned run average. He pitched the second major league no-hitter early in the season against San Francisco and personally accounted for two victories in the four-game world series sweep of the New York Yankees.

Previously chosen the Cy Young Award winner as the season's finest pitcher, Koufax completed his double by capturing 14 first place votes. Shortstop Groat was named first by four voters while Milwaukee outfielder Hank Aaron and Los Angeles infielder Jim Gilliam split the other two.

Groat was MVP for the world champion Pittsburgh Pirates and Aaron, third with 135 points to 130 for Dodger leader Ron Fenzler. Groat also won in 1957, Groat and Aaron were the only players listed on the list. Willie Mays of San Francisco was fifth.

Los Angeles pitched four men in the first eight with batting champion Tommy Davis eighth. Koufax was MVP last year, finished in the MVP race by Willie McCovey of San Francisco.

Koufax is the first pitcher to be voted the National League's top prize since Brooklyn Dodger Don Newcombe in 1956 and only the seventh in 32 years.

Koufax made the jump directly to the university of Cincinnati where he pitched for the Reds but had to labor to cure wildness in his early days. Sandy had 14 no-hitters in 1956 and only one during his last four years.

Sandy came back this season after a year in the hospital and a year on a staff manager. Walter Alton called "the best I've ever seen pitch."

If there had been any doubts about Koufax they were erased Saturday night May 11 when he crushed through a pair of Giants and didn't allow a man to reach base until the eighth.

The 6-foot, 2-inch 200 pounder who owns a pair of record-tying 18-strikeout performances, far outdistanced the other pitchers of this season and his career total is 31 three shy of the major league mark started by Bob Feller and held by Walter Johnson.

Koufax had 11 shutouts in 20 games, most ever by a southpaw. He has won the MVP award in 1956 and 1963. Koufax is the third pitcher in the batting race with Aaron at 218. He was the driving force in the Dodgers' pennant win.

Aron led the league in runs batted in with 129 and tied for first with 121 and hit 44 homers.
