

L.A. Mayor Asks Udall to Consider Idaho Water Grab

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 7 (UPI) — Mayor Samuel Yorty, Los Angeles, has asked Interior Secretary Stewart Udall to consider tapping Idaho surplus water for the Southwest as an alternative to the controversial Udall plan. The Los Angeles department of water and power (DWP) has proposed building a 519-mile aqueduct that could carry 2.4 million acre feet of water from the Snake river of Idaho to Lake Mead in southern Nevada.

to supplement the limited supply from the Colorado river. The Snake-Colorado project may well accomplish most of the water supply objectives of the interior department proposal and at lower cost, Yorty said. Udall's plan to solve the water shortage problem of the Southwest involved carrying surplus water from Northern California, where there are protests against the plan. When the DWP announced its plan last week, a storm of protest blew out of Idaho. Idaho Sen. Len B. Jordan, however, said he didn't take the plan seriously because there is not enough water in the Snake river to supply Los Angeles.

The 56-year-old Rockefeller, first avowed 1964 presidential contender, coupled his long-expected announcement with a challenge to Republican Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona to oppose him in state primaries.

Jet Crashes Into Muddy London Field

LONDON, Nov. 7 (AP) — A Trans-Canada jetliner with 97 persons aboard, trying to take off from foggy London airport on a non-stop flight to Montreal, skidded off the end of the runway Wednesday night and plowed into a cabbage patch. There were no serious injuries. The 89 passengers and eight crewmen stumbled out of the DC-8 jet and milled around in the muddy field for more than 30 minutes before ambulances and crash equipment could find the plane in the dense, swirling fog.

Dodd Stirs U.S. Senate Atmosphere

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7 (AP) — Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, D. Conn., has shattered the senate's clubby atmosphere with a blistering attack on his leader, Sen. Mike Mansfield, Montana.

For good measure, Dodd tossed a few darts at the senate's Republican chief, Sen. Everett M. Dirksen, Illinois.

Irked by the slow pace the senate is setting, Dodd took the floor Wednesday to declare "unless we have leadership we'll go on dribbling our way through this session."

Mansfield, said Dodd, is a gentle, kind, just and understanding man, but "I am concerned about his leadership."

As for Dirksen, Dodd said without mentioning the Illinoisan by name "the Republican opposition is so soft, so cozy, that it doesn't amount to much."

Dodd's particular complaint was the lack of night sessions to speed legislation.

"We are not sent here for a 9-10-5 job," he said. "We cut off these sessions as if we were clerks in an insurance company."

Mansfield was not present, but his assistant, Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, Minnesota, rose to praise the Montanan's leadership.

And Dirksen's assistant, Sen. Thomas H. Kuchel, California, said no apology for the GOP leadership was necessary.

World's Most Traveled Man To Speak at Rupert Friday

The world's most traveled man, he has gone around the world 15 times and represents TWA as its director of air world education in 26 countries. Being in constant demand on television, Furby appears with almost clocklike regularity on a variety of network programs and is scheduled for further appearances.

He was consultant for the Disney picture on aviation and its effect on the modern world. Presently he is writing a book, "The Global Concept Takes the Stage."

Wings May Reduce Flight Time to Mars

DENVER, Nov. 7 (AP)—Putting wings on a U.S. spaceship to Mars may reduce to 300 days a round trip which planners have expected to require 30 months.

Robert B. Demoret, program director for advanced Titan launch vehicles for the Martin-Marietta corporation, said in a speech Wednesday that astronauts using a wingless craft would have to wait 405 days on Mars until that planet is in proper orbiting relationship for the return to Earth.

By using wings to shorten its own orbiting time and distances, he said the craft could be "orbit hopping" and get home much faster.

No target date has been set for such a flight.

Fallout Peak Is Passed In America

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7 (AP)—Unless there is further nuclear testing in the air, the United States appears to have passed the peak of strontium 90 fallout, a public health service official said Wednesday.

Dr. John R. Chadwick, chief of the service's division of radiological health, gave that assessment on release of a report showing that the strontium 90 content of milk continued to decline in August in most of the nation.

Strontium 90 is one of the most feared elements of radioactive fallout, being a source of bone cancer.

Chadwick said it appears the peak was reached in June.

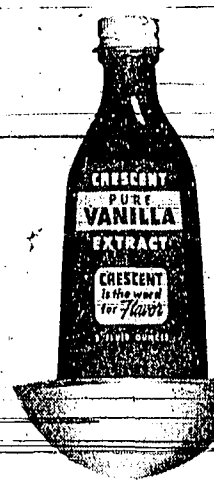

U. S. Faces

Anti-Missile Missile Job

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7 (AP)—The United States now has no foolproof anti-missile missile defense system. But, the army has spent more than 1.2 billion dollars on development of the Nike-Zeus anti-missile missile that it claims will be able to do the job.

Only a few days after Soviet Nikita Khrushchev's "fly in the sky" statement in June, 1962, the army successfully intercepted over the South Pacific the nose cone of an air force intercontinental ballistic missile with its 48-foot Nike Zeus. It has made several interceptions since then, but the system still has not been fully developed.

President Kennedy, at an August news conference this year, said "the problem of developing a defense against a missile is beyond us and beyond the Soviets technically."

However, Kennedy said that work would continue on the problem, "but I must say those who work the longest are not particularly optimistic that a scientific breakthrough can be made."

The basic problem is to develop an anti-missile missile which can differentiate between a nuclear missile and a decoy. The army maintains that the missile can detect the real thing because the size and weight of a nuclear warhead is different from a decoy.

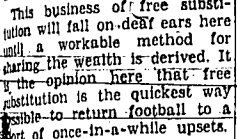

backstop drew 15 first-place votes and was named on all 20 ballots cast by a committee of the Baseball Writers' Association of America. Southpaw pitching ace Whitey Ford of the Yankees was third with 125 points, including three firsts. He was followed by Minnesota slugger Harmon Killebrew with 85 and the Boston pair of Carl Yastrzemski and Dick Radatz. Outfielder Yastrzemski was the batting champion and relief pitcher Radatz posted the lowest earned run average of 1.98. The vote was announced by BBWAA secretary Hy Hurwitz in Boston.

With his MVP predecessors, Mickey Mantle and Roger Maris, portions of the season, Howard led the league champions with a .287 batting average. The 6-foot, 2-inch, 205-pounder paced AL receivers with a .994 fielding average, hit 38 homers and was eighth in runs batted in with 85. "When something like this happens, it makes baseball worth while," said Howard from his Teaneck, N.J., home into which he has just moved. "This is the greatest. You know, I was offered 35 or 40 college scholarships when I was in high school. I'm not sorry about choosing baseball, now especially."

Howard is the eighth member of the Yankees in the last 10 years to be named MVP and the 18th man in a pin-stripe suit to be so honored. Yet he's only the third catcher. Detroit's Mickey Cochrane was named in 1934. Howard's new boss Yogi Berra and the man whose catching job he took away—won three times.

The son of a New Madrid, Mo., high school principal, the 33-year-old Howard was master of the big, timely hit throughout the season. Before the Los Angeles Dodgers swept the Yankees four straight in the world series, Howard vowed he'd hit National league most valuable player pitcher Sandy Koufax.

Howard, who led the Yankees at bat against the Dodgers, got four of his five hits off Koufax, spoiling Sandy's bid for a no-hitter in the opener, and fanned only once against the strikeout artist.

"I've been kind of on edge waiting to see what would happen in the voting," Howard admitted. "I had hoped I had a chance. I've had four great teachers—Bill Dickey, Ralph Houk, Jim Regan and Yogi. How could you go wrong with them? I want to thank Dickey most of all. He taught me all I know."

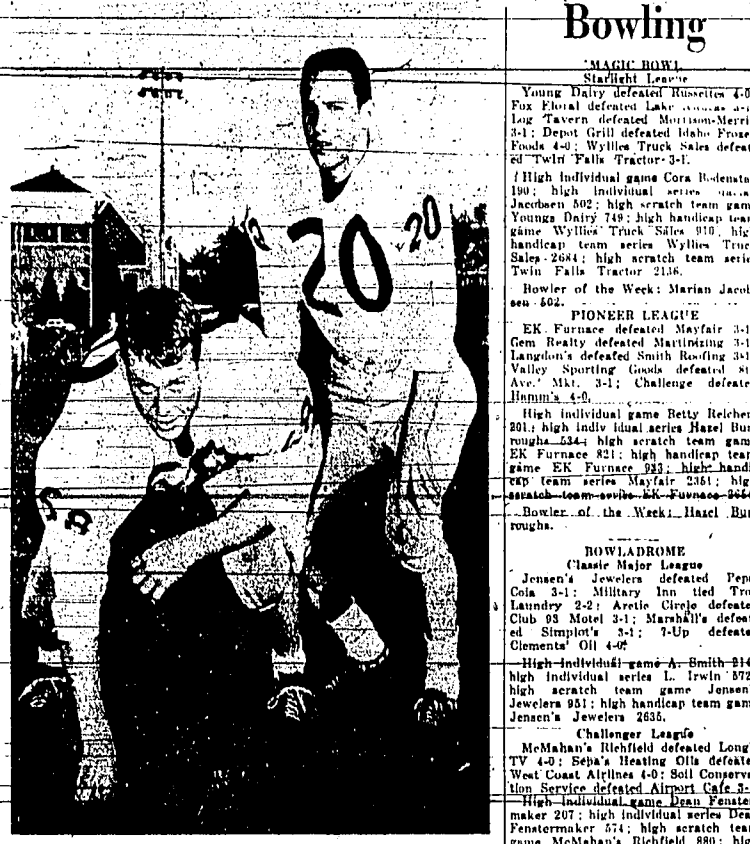

October Farm Prices Decline

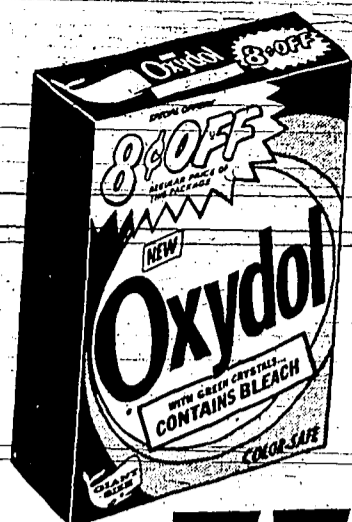
