Smylie Blasts State-Owned Land Sales

BOISE, Dec. 4 (AP)—Plans to sell 2,000 summer homesites on state-owned land scattered throughout the state drew sharp criticism Tuesday from the two Republican members of the state land board.

Gov. Robert E. Smylie said the proposal was "short sighted in the extreme" and Atty. Gen. Alvin G. Shepard said he believed leasing, rather than selling, would bring the state more money in the long run.

Controversy over leasing or selling state-owned lands has marked land board activity ever since Democrats gained majority membership as a result of the 1958 election. Smylie was the only Republican member of the board for four years but the 1962 election cut the margin to 3-2. Democratic members are Secretary of State Arnold Williams, State Auditor Joe R. Williams and D. F. Engelking, state superintendent of public instruction. The Democrats contend it is good business to sell state land when prices are favorable, asserting that earnings from the increased endowment funds bring more revenue than rentals from the land. Principal received in the sales cannot be spent; it must go into the endowment funds.

Twenty-two homesites in a state-owned subdivision in Stanley basin brought nearly \$50,000 in a public sale last month and State Land Commissioner O. J. Buxton said that as a result about 2,000 additional lots will be offered for sale in subdivisions around the state.

He estimated the income from them at two million dollars.

Smylie said he approves the development of the subdivisions but believes the state should retain title, leasing the land for construction of summer homes. Only by doing so, he said, can the state assure development of attractive homes and prevent the growing up of slums.

"The majority members' announced policy," the governor said, "may make a showy result in the dollar increment in endowment funds, but from a conservation standpoint it is shortsighted in the extreme."

"The greatest problem we will have in these areas 25 years from now is sanitation. Without retaining control, the land board will find it impossible to assure maintenance of sanitation standards and control of construction in what are essentially new towns and villages."

He said many counties, particularly those in remote areas, lack the facilities to draft and enforce building restrictions. Democratic members of the board, Smylie said, "are thinking about next year instead of the next generation."

Shepard said he believes value of the state land never will be less than it is now and added: "To the extent we sell lands now, the state is losing money it otherwise would make in 10 or 20 years."

He said, too, he is opposed to a broad policy of selling, rather than leasing.

"All kinds of things are involved in this," he said, "and they require that decisions be made on a case by case basis, rather than the formation of a broad policy to dispose of all state land which is salable."

Shepard and Smylie both noted that one of the arguments for sale is that the land is then put on the county tax rolls. Shepard said in most cases any one county is affected only slightly. Smylie said that the amount of tax revenue received on the land itself is slight. He said that are subject to the same local taxation whether or not the land is bought or leased.

Wants to Sell

BOISE, Dec. 4 (AP)—Secretary of State Arnold Williams said today the remaining state-owned cottage sites in Stanley basin should be sold this winter or next spring.

Williams, a member of the state land board, said the prices received for the first 22 lots two weeks ago indicate the market is good.

News Around Idaho

Dog Lover Wins Review Of His Case

RICHMOND, Va., Dec. 4 (AP)—A dedicated dog lover on Tuesday won a Virginia supreme court review of his conviction handed down when he refused to "hold his beloved Ricky for execution on a sheep-killing charge."
Jim Laing, Pearisburg, successfully sought a review of the \$1,000 fine and four-month jail term handed him in a lower court on a contempt of court charge when he balked at giving up Ricky, a purebred German shepherd.
The case of Ricky, surely one of the most lengthy of all dogdom, stretches back to 1961 when he was found guilty of sheep-killing and ordered destroyed.
Laing, from mountainous southwest Virginia, declared his dog was innocent and that Ricky was only sleeping protectively over the sheep or he had been taught.
Gov. Albertis B. Harrison, Jr., declined to interfere despite the pleas of dog lovers from across the country. The U. S. supreme court refused to review the case.

RUPERT, Dec. 4—A nationally known speaker has been scheduled for the annual Minidoka county Farm Bureau banquet which will be held Saturday at the St. Nicholas Catholic parish hall, according to Prayne Shouse, local president.
Shouse announced that Cy Radcliffe, Boise, who is well known across the nation as an after dinner speaker, will be featured speaker.
Radcliffe, who is employed with a stock exchange firm in Boise, is well-versed on the world situation and has made several world tours, Shouse said. He holds degrees in economics, history and government from the Iowa State university.
The speaker spent four and a half years as a journalist, three years with the eighth air force in World War II, 11 years as owner-operator of his own small business and 11 years on the Knife and Fork club lecture circuit.
Shouse stressed all county Farm Bureau members are urged to attend the dinner and said it will also be open to the public. Tickets for Farm Bureau members are \$1 and \$2 for non-members.

PARIS, Dec. 4 (AP)—President Johnson plans a meeting with French President Charles de Gaulle sometime in 1964, according to a message released by De Gaulle's office Tuesday. Johnson's message left open the place for such a meeting.

BOISE, Dec. 4 (AP)—A state advisory committee Tuesday modified proposed regulations designed to provide safeguards for the use of radiation in Idaho. Labor Commissioner William L. Robison, chairman of the governor's committee on the use of atomic energy, said it spelled out more specifically some of the proposed restrictions. The regulations will cover the storage, transportation, use and disposal of radioactive material. They are primarily concerned with medical use of X-ray equipment, and with radiation used in industry. The regulations were submitted to the state health department. Robison said he expects another public hearing will be conducted before the state board of health decides whether to put them in effect.

BOISE, Dec. 4 (AP)—Idaho's public school enrollment is up 3,488 over a year ago with 170,148 students in classes, the state department of education reported Tuesday. The figures show that colleges can expect a wave of higher enrollments. Eleventh grade enrollment was up 2,309 and grade twelve, 559. The next highest was grade six with a gain of 485 over a year ago. The increase was a little more than two per cent over the 166,600 on the same Sept. 15 date a year ago. Total enrollment for grades one through six was 92,316 and for seven through twelve, 77,832.

BOISE, Dec. 4 (AP)—The arraignment of a Boise woman charged with embezzling was continued Tuesday to Dec. 16 at the request of her attorney, Mrs. Alice H. Sholly, 50, charged with taking money from the Boise store of Lermer Sjoms of Tutor, has not indicated whether she will ask a preliminary hearing. She is free on her own recognizance.

BOISE, Dec. 4 (AP)—Idaho finished November \$11,365,075 in the red, a joint report from the state auditor and state treasurer's offices showed Tuesday. That compares to a deficit of \$7,919,188 at this time a year ago and \$3,339,000 a year ago. The deficit corresponding time in the fiscal biennium, Treasurer Marjorie R. Moon said it included \$9,750,000 in tax anticipation notes outstanding. She listed a treasurer's balance of \$35,489,958 in the red, outstanding warrants of \$1,349,553 and an auditor's balance of \$1,898,511 in the red.

BOISE, Dec. 4 (AP)—Idaho school districts are being notified that they must get rid of uncertified teachers if they want state funds, but Public Instruction Superintendent D. F. Englekirk said few will have any problem. He said few districts, if any, will fail to qualify under the new policy, based on the attorney general's interpretation of the law for distributing funds to schools. Finance Director Garth O. Reid said there are probably no more than eight or 10 uncertified teachers in the state. He said he expects all will have been replaced by the time the next fund allocation is made in January. The state has about 7,000 teachers.

IDAHO FALLS, Dec. 4 (AP)—School districts in the Idaho Falls area will not be affected by a recent announcement from the state department of public education withdrawing aid to districts employing noncertified teachers. State Superintendent D. F. Englekirk made the policy public Monday in conjunction with an announcement that a report on educational qualifications in the state's 105 districts would be completed next month. Non-certified teachers are those whose backgrounds are such that the state does not consider them qualified educators. Jay Casper, director of secondary education for Idaho Falls school district No. 91, said Tuesday that all teachers in the district are either certified or are new teachers in the process of gaining certification.

GEORGETOWN, Dec. 4 (AP)—Support for the calling of a special session of the Idaho legislature to authorize state-financed water projects was voiced Tuesday by the Bear River Protective committee. Gov. Robert E. Smylie said recently it may be necessary to call such a session to facilitate state development as a means of protecting Idaho's water resources against efforts by other states to appropriate them. Smylie has suggested issuance of revenue bonds to finance the projects, with the state to be reimbursed by earnings from the projects. Amendment of Idaho's constitution would be required to permit use of such a method.

POCAHELLO, Dec. 4 (AP)—Bannock county taxes have been raised to compensate for a shortage of state school funds. Revenue from taxes enacted by the 1963 legislature has fallen below the expected level, and cutbacks in state spending have been ordered by Gov. Robert E. Smylie with approval of the state board of examiners. Locally, the result is a \$82,232 shortage of school funds during the current fiscal year. However, state law provides that if the state fails to provide its allotted share, the counties must make up the difference. Bannock county was notified early in September of the anticipated shortage of state funds and the county was required to adjust its taxes accordingly to raise the money at the local level. The county was directed to and did, raise its taxes on behalf of the schools by \$2.38 per hundred dollars of assessed valuation. Assessed valuation in Bannock county is roughly one-seventh of actual value.

IDAHO FALLS, Dec. 4 (AP)—The state highway department will open bids for two highway projects this month in east Idaho. Dale Harding, assistant highway engineer, said Tuesday. The major project involves construction of a two-lane section of Interstate 155 between Dubois and China Point in Clark county at a cost of well over a million dollars. Bids will be opened Dec. 17. The other involves a culvert change on U. S. 26 between Granite and Clark Hills in Bonneville county, with bid opening set for Dec. 10.

IDAHO FALLS, Dec. 4 (AP)—Eighty-five pastors and their wives from 55 Nazarene churches in the Idaho-Oregon district gathered for the annual preacher's conference in Idaho Falls. The meeting concluded Tuesday night. Dr. Samuel Young, Kansas City, Mo., chairman of the board of general superintendents, opened the party Monday night with a discussion of "The work of the holy Spirit in our lives." Dr. Joseph Mayfield, Nampa, vice president of the Northwest Nazarene college, reported that 877 students are enrolled in the school and that six faculty members have completed work for their doctorates during the past year.

Cambodia Bans U. S. Magazines

PHNOM PENH, Cambodia, Dec. 4 (AP)—The Cambodian government banned the American news magazines Time and Newsweek today, charging they had committed "critical acts of injury against the Cambodian government."
The announcement did not specify which stories in the two magazines were considered objectionable.

Medic Grade Methods Are Questioned

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4 (AP)—A Utah research team has concluded that there is practically no relationship between the grades a student receives in medical school and future success in medical practice.
The results of the study also prompted the leader of the team, Dr. Philip B. Price, dean emeritus of the College of Medicine at the University of Utah, to raise numerous questions about traditional medical education practices.
"The first step was to develop a method aimed at identifying reliable predictors of post-graduate achievement of medical students," Price said. "Our study clearly demonstrates that performance in education, as measured by grade-point averages, comes out as a factor almost completely independent of all the factors having to do with performance as a physician."
Price is a somewhat shocking finding to a medical educator like himself, who has spent his professional life selecting applicants for admission to medical school. It is true that a strong suspicion that grades have been weighed much too heavily in predicting performances both in medical school and after graduation from medical school is what led to the initiation of this whole study in the first instance. "But to have that suspicion so fully confirmed has led me to question the adequacy of our traditional admission policies," as well as the soundness of the nature of our present grades as a measure of progress of the student, or as the sole criterion for promotion, or as a dependable predictor of future success in practice.
"It has also compelled me to re-examine my own concepts of the basic objectives of medical education."
Price said the investigators will now attempt to develop predictors of "success" in medical practice, based on the criterion measures they have developed.

RANGOON, Burma, Dec. 4 (AP)—Burma's military government has ordered a third university closed because of the spread of student rioting.
Mandalay university was shut down Tuesday. Moulmein university Monday night and Rangoon university Saturday. More than 10,000 students have been affected and 114 have been arrested.

RUPERT, Dec. 4—William R. Baker, 58, Rupert, was cited for driving without a driver's license after a two-car accident at 12:15 p. m. Tuesday one-eighth mile west of Rupert on highway 25.
Baker, driving a 1957 Chevrolet pickup truck, was making a left turn when his vehicle was struck from behind by a 1961 Comet driven by Libba Van Ryper, 45, Rupert. She told State Patrolman Roy Thomas she did not see any signal from the truck.
There were no injuries reported and estimated damage to the Comet was \$300 with no damage to the truck.

Russ Likes Johnson's Promises

MOSCOW, Dec. 4 (AP)—Soviet Premier Khrushchev expressed satisfaction Tuesday night with President Johnson's promises to work for peace and better relations with the Soviet Union.
"We note with satisfaction," said Khrushchev, "that Lyndon Johnson, the new President of the United States, speaking of his intentions to continue President Kennedy's policy, emphasized he would strive for a peaceful solution of international relations and for better relations between the Soviet Union and all countries."
"As regards the Soviet Union, it will not relax its efforts in search of a solution to major international problems and will press for the further consolidation of relations with other countries."

Yule Greetings Designed by Mrs. Kennedy

NEW YORK, Dec. 4 (UPI)—Not long before an assassin's bullets killed President Kennedy, his wife had dipped into paints and brushes to create two Christmas cards for cards wishing "Merry Christmas and Happy New Year."

She did it for culture.

President Kennedy and his wife, Jacqueline, aimed to make culture as popular as hot dogs along Main street, U.S.A.

Proceeds from the cards will benefit the National Cultural Center. They are being sold in stores across the country, and sales are reported to be brisk.

Placards in store windows spoke this message:

"For the benefit of the national cultural center, Washington, D.C., send Christmas cards painted by Mrs. John F. Kennedy."

For \$4 you get 25 of the cards. For \$8 you get 50 cards — two scenes, each Mrs. Kennedy's rendition of Christmas.

So far as is known, the cards are the only Christmas greetings ever designed by a member of the nation's first family, although President Eisenhower distributed as personal Christmas gifts several reproductions of his paintings while he was in office.

Mrs. Kennedy's two designs, are water colors which she contributed to the National Cultural Center earlier this year.

One is entitled "The Journey of the Magi" and depicts the three wise men on their way to Bethlehem.

The other, named "Glad Tidings," portrays an angel heralding the birth of Christ. Mrs. Kennedy with bronze chrysanthemums, was centered with a three-tiered wedding cake topped with a single satin bell. The cake was decorated with pearls, white tulle and lilies of the valley. Mrs. Owen Barton and Mrs. Earl Moynaux served the wedding cake.

Mrs. William Pratt, aunt of the bride, and Mrs. Karl Freeman presided at the punch table covered with a floor-length orange cloth. Gold colored fall leaves and large bronze dahlias surrounded the milk glass punch bowl.

The National Cultural Center, long a dream of the Kennedys, will rise on the banks of the Potomac in the nation's capital as a forum for the performing arts.

Under one roof there will be a symphony hall, a theater and an opera house. Here, the best professional artists from all Main streets, U.S.A., will be presented. Also—imported gifted performers will be featured.

During the Eisenhower administration, an act of congress established the center and the late President Kennedy continued the project and gave it his wholehearted approval.

Mrs. John F. Kennedy and Mrs. Dwight Eisenhower are honorary chairmen.

While congress initiated the project, which will cost 30-million dollars, it is traditional in America that such an enterprise be supported by contributions from the American public—either as individuals or groups.

"Your purchase of these special Christmas cards, painted by Mrs. John F. Kennedy, will help make the center an actuality," states the blurb with the cards.

The angel on "Glad Tidings" is garbed in a flowing white gown contrasted with a grained turquoise background bordered in gold.

On the other card, the three wise men are depicted dressed in multi-colored gowns trimmed in gold and seated astride black camels.

There are golden flecks in the red tapestried background.

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Business Mirror

BY SAM DAWSON: NEW YORK, Dec. 4 (UPI)—A big part in productivity is being given much of the credit for the longer than average life of the present business upswing.

But the three-year better than usual rise in productivity is being both damned and praised. It is being tied to jobs and unemployment and to wages and labor.

Productivity thus means different things to different people. Its basic definition is how many units can be turned out in a manhour of labor.

To management this means the more units the lower the costs. This new equipment can be translated into lower prices, or maintained price margins, in competition with rivals at home or abroad.

For government the rise in production has of late become a guideline for what is permissible in the public interest, in the way of rising prices and wages.

It is also a key factor in the drive for a greater rate of economic growth.

For the money managers the rise in productivity in the United States has been one of the chief helps in keeping American goods competitive in world markets.

In 1961 productivity gained by 3.9 per cent and in 1962 by 3.9 per cent. The rate this year is believed even higher.

New equipment now being planned or tested promises still further gains in the unit output per manhour of labor—to the delight of some, to the dread of others.

There have been marked ups and downs in the rate of increase since World War II, but the average has been three per cent. This compares with the average of 2 1/2 per cent from 1919 to 1947.

The Daily Investor

By WILLIAM A. DOYLE: Q. A number of us would like to know about the process through which a company can retire its non-callable preferred stock.

Naturally, to get stockholder approval for the retirement the company had to come up with a good plan. Under that plan the owners of the preferred stock were given the opportunity to take for each share of preferred either \$75 in cash or \$100 of a new debenture, plus \$75 in cash.

The retirement plan was approved by stockholders at a meeting Oct. 17. Of the preferred stock, 81 per cent voted yes, three per cent voted no and the rest didn't vote.

So, American Smelting was able to retire the entire issue of preferred stock. Q. Can you explain why there are such big variations in the prices and yields in the cumulative preferred stocks of different companies?

A. The current yields (annual dividends divided by the market prices) of preferred stocks of companies of equal quality usually are quite similar.

The dividend on a company's preferred stock, normally must be paid before any dividend can be paid on that company's common stock.

And the cumulative provisions (through which a company must make up all or some of any skipped dividends on its preferred stock) often are very different in different companies.

These and many other things can have big effects on the investment appeal of any individual preferred stock.

But let's assume there are three companies, all of which have outstanding \$100 par, 4 1/2 per cent preferred stock. So, the dividend rate on each of these preferred stocks would be \$4.50 a share a year.

Let's assume that all three companies have been making the dividend payments on their preferred stocks and have also been paying dividends on their common stocks.

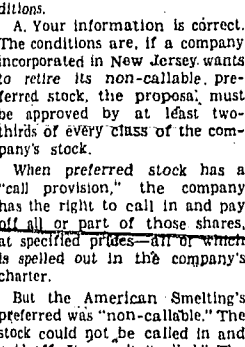
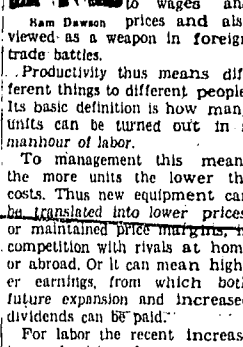

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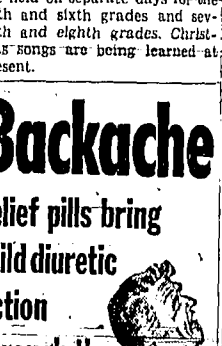

Army Brings Troops Home From Berlin

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4 (AP)—The United States has brought home about 1,000 soldiers who were sent to strengthen the army in West Germany during the Berlin crisis two years ago, it was announced today.

This represents about 75 per cent of the 41,000 troops, mostly rear echelon elements shipped overseas during late 1961 when the Russians were threatening to push the allies out of West Berlin.

The remaining 10,000 reinforcements probably will stay with the U. S. seventh army for some time.

This places the seventh army's current strength at about 242,000 men whose fighting power is concentrated in five divisions and a number of miscellaneous combat units adding up to a sixth division.

Georgetown Home Has Much Warmth

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4 (AP)—A home with a history and a warmth filled with the art she loves will greet Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy when she walks into her beloved Georgetown residence Friday.

The new address for the former first lady—3038 N street—is a three-story red brick dwelling with plenty of room. Undersecretary of state and Mrs. W. Averell Harriman, who own the house, have turned it over to the former first lady and her children and have moved into a hotel.

From the entrance hallway, with etchings by Picasso and Matisse in the stairwell, to the picturesque domed third floor bedrooms, it is furnished for elegant and comfortable living.

The dining room seats up to 18 comfortably.

There are fireplaces in all but one room and the house contains a collection of French, English and Chinese lacquer furniture and Lovestoff china. And the art collection would be the pride of a museum.

In the rear is a spacious, block-long walled and terraced garden, with boxwood and magnificent magnolia trees and a swimming pool.

As she walks over the two Iranian rugs (gift of the Shah) in the entrance hallway, past a Louis XV console with a big carved mirror of the same period of France's grandeur, Mrs. Kennedy will be in an atmosphere not unlike what she created in the White House.

The history books of Georgetown indicate this house dates back to the same period as the mansion at 1600 Pennsylvania avenue which Mrs. Kennedy is vacating after almost three years.

It is said to have been built in 1800, the same year President John Adams moved into the unfinished White House.

It was announced Tuesday that Mrs. Kennedy will move in Friday. There is no indication when President Johnson and his family will take occupancy of the White House, but probably soon.

The Harrimans, who once occupied the governor's mansion in Albany, N. Y., bought the Georgetown home last spring. Its prior owner was William Scranton, now governor of Pennsylvania.

Princess Grace Visits Graveside

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4 (AP)—Princess Grace of Monaco went to see the grave of the late President Kennedy in Arlington National cemetery Tuesday and then went to the White House.

She did not get to see Mrs. Kennedy as she said she wanted to.

A White House spokesman said she signed a visitors' book which has been set out for those paying sympathy calls.

Kennedy Murder May Draft Ike Into GOP Nominee Hunt

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4 (AP)—The political upheaval caused by the assassination of President Kennedy may project former President Eisenhower actively into the search for a 1964 GOP presidential nominee.

Eisenhower has disclaimed any desire to become a kingmaker. But associates who have talked to him since Kennedy's death say the former president recognizes that the Republican situation has changed so rapidly as to invite efforts to get the kind of moderate candidate he believes can win.

Eisenhower has opposed public discussion of political matters at this time. He was reported to have suggested it might be well for Republicans to preserve an air of bipartisanship longer into the new year than they had planned by postponing a series of scheduled Jan. 29 closed-circuit television fund-raising dinners.

With his treasury bare, however, national chairman William E. Miller ruled that the dinners will go on as scheduled. Eisenhower, Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York, Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona and former Vice President Richard M. Nixon are to be among the speakers.

Before Kennedy's death, the Republican nomination scramble was developing rapidly into a two-man contest between Goldwater and Rockefeller. It was a poorly kept secret that Eisenhower didn't view this prospect with any enthusiasm, but there wasn't much he could do about it.

The death of Kennedy and the elevation of Lyndon B. Johnson to the presidency changed things. Goldwater supporters had figured their man had a chance of beating Kennedy by carrying the South and some of the more conservative states in the Midwest and West. Now he would be facing a Texas resident with an image more conservative than Kennedy's.

If Goldwater decides to get into the race—and there now is some doubt that he will—it probably would take him time to work up the same head of steam against Johnson that he maintained in flitting away at Kennedy's policies.

The substitution of Johnson for Kennedy weakened Goldwater's position in the South, where he was strongest. Ordinarily the Democratic change would have been expected to help Rockefeller, promising Republicans a better chance of carrying New York.

But even some of the governor's supporters concede privately that his political fortunes do not seem to be recovering from his divorce and remarriage.

In such a situation there is a feeling that if Eisenhower and his friends of the National Republican Citizens committee can find a suitable candidate in the next couple of months the way would be open for the type of buildup that made Wendell T. Willkie the nominee in 1940.

Nixon, of course, remains in the forefront of possible contenders. While he has praised Nixon as well qualified, the impression remains that Eisenhower would rather turn to another for the 1964 race.

TO HONOR KENNEDY
WASHINGTON, Dec. 4 (AP)—The government of President Tito of Yugoslavia has informed the U. S. embassy in Belgrade that it will name two streets in the two largest cities in the country after the late President Kennedy. The two cities are Belgrade, Yugoslavia's capital, and Zagreb, capital city of Croatia.

Important Events of Rome Church Council Summarized

VATICAN CITY, Dec. 4 (AP)—This is a summary of important events of the second session of the ecumenical council, the world gathering of Catholic hierarchy to renew their church:

Sept. 21—In a pre-council speech, Pope Paul VI calls for a reform and internationalization of the Roman curia, the Vatican administrative body.

Sept. 24—Pope Paul orders easing of secrecy rules on council debates.

Sept. 26—Pope Paul changes council regulations to speed up work, appoints moderators to guide debate and gives permission for Catholic lay "auditors" to attend sessions.

Sept. 29—Pope Paul opens the second session promising to follow path of the late Pope John XXIII and asking bishops to "build a bridge toward the contemporary world."

Sept. 30—The 2,500 ecumenical council fathers begin discussion of a document "De Ecclesia" which outlines the nature of the church.

Oct. 29—In an extremely close vote, bishops decide to treat the blessed Virgin Mary in the document about the church rather than dedicate a separate document to her.

Oct. 30—In historic voting the next day, the bishops accept Pope Paul's invitation to share in governing the church, declare that authority along with the pope is theirs "by divine right," and accept the principle of a new priestly order of deacons, possibly married, in the church.

Nov. 5—After cutting off debate on the church document and sending it back to commission for amendments, the council moves on to discuss a proposed decree on bishops and the government of dioceses which envisions a decentralization of authority in the church.

Nov. 8—Secretariat for promoting Christian unity introduces a statement against anti-Semitism at the council which says Jews should not be made scapegoats for the crucifixion of Christ. On the same day, Joseph Cardinal Frings of Cologne, Germany, openly accuses the holy office of unjust, starchamber practices.

Nov. 18—The council moves on to a proposed decree on ecumenism which stands as a historic milestone in the Christian unity movement.

Nov. 19—A statement on religious freedom which reverses Catholic tradition in this field and proclaims the right of all men to believe and worship according to their consciences is introduced for council consideration.

Nov. 22—The council overwhelmingly approves a liturgy constitution designed to reform and renew the mass and other forms of Catholic worship and which permits the substitution of modern languages for Latin in the mass and sacraments.

Nov. 25—The council approves a decree on communications which backs qualified freedom of information and which many bishops admit was ill-prepared and ambiguous about censorship.

Nov. 28—Liberal council fathers elect new members to key council commission posts especially created by Pope Paul to speed up work and better reflect the will of the majority.

Dec. 4—Pope Paul closes the council with the promulgation of the liturgy constitution and communications document.

The bishops are scheduled to resume work next year in a third session in St. Peter's basilica from Sept. 14 to Nov. 29.

Moscow 4-H Lad Wins Scholarship

CHICAGO, Dec. 4 (AP)—Frank Burlison, 17, Moscow, was named today the winner of a \$400 forestry scholarship at the National 4-H congress.

His father, Vern Burlison, is extension forester at the University of Idaho. He developed special projects for his son on a 160-acre woodlot.

They included the line plot method of timber cruising, estimating tree growth and thinning an acre of Douglas fir.

Burlison is one of three Idaho 4-H winners. Gary Etchelberg, Gooding, and Neil Peterson, Post Falls, won \$500 scholarships.

Death Record Set During October

CHICAGO, Dec. 4 (AP)—Deaths on the nation's highways set a record in October, the National Safety council reported Tuesday.

The month's total of 4,000 traffic deaths exceeded the previous October high of 3,985 in 1959, and was three per cent higher than the 3,880 deaths in October 1962.

Navy Shoots For National Scoring Title

Emil Griffith Is Selected Boxer of Year

NEW YORK, Dec. 4—Emil Griffith, the first boxer ever to win the welterweight title three times, was named winner Tuesday of the Edward J. Neil memorial plaque as the boxer of the year.

The trophy is awarded annually by the Boxing Writers' association in memory of the former Associated Press boxing writer who was killed while covering the Spanish Civil war in 1938.

Griffith, 24, has fought two title bouts this year. He lost the crown on a controversial 15-round decision to Luis Rodriguez of Cuba at Los Angeles last March 23 and regained the title by outpointing his conqueror in another 15-rounder at New York on June 8.

The Virgin Islands native, who came to New York when he was eight, starting boxing professionally in 1958. He won the welterweight title for the first time by knocking out Benny (Kid) Parret in the 13th round on April 1, 1961.

He lost it back to Parret on a 15-round decision on Sept. 30, 1961. In a third bout at New York on March 3, 1962, Griffith knocked out Parret in the 12th round. The ill-fated Cuban never recovered consciousness and died 10 days later.

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Rule Limiting Optioning Of One-Year Players Is Relaxed for Four Clubs

SAN DIEGO, Dec. 4 (AP)—For the first time since they acquired major league franchises, the four expansion clubs—Washington, Houston, New York Mets and Los Angeles Angels—will be given a break Wednesday. The minors note at a behind closed door meeting Tuesday to permit each of the four to farm out four first year men in 1964 in addition to their one "designated" player. The vote will be made into legislation at the closing session of the annual winter baseball meetings Wednesday and is expected to be ratified by the major league clubs at their meeting in Los Angeles later this week.

Under existing rules, a club may option only one first year player as the designated player against the 25-man limit throughout the season. Last season, for example, the Mets were forced to keep five first year men for fear of losing them at the special \$8,000 waiver price.

Next year only the four new clubs will be permitted to option more than one first year player without having them count on the 25-man limit.

The decision was accepted with enthusiasm by the clubs.

"This will be a great help to the clubs," said Johnny Murphy, administrative assistant to Mets President George Weiss, "Judge Holtzman (president of the Houston Astros) made an eloquent plea for the passage of this amendment."

The amendment was one of the proposals by Colt general manager Paul Richards. The other clubs received little or no consideration.

Short Pilots Place Success on Juniors

GLENN'S FERRY, Dec. 4—Without a senior on the team and leading scorer Leo McGhee sidelined indefinitely, the basketball outlook of the Glenn's Ferry Pilots is considerably darker than it appeared to be at the conclusion of the 1962-63 campaign. CHICAGO, Dec. 4—Like a gang of New Year's eve revelers with a big headache at the dawn's early light, National Football league officials vowed "never again" Tuesday after a turtle-pace player draft lasting almost 22 hours.

Commissioner Pete Rozelle, who has to keep all 14 club owners reasonably happy, cautiously hinted at possible legislation to avert any such future pick-and-wait marathon.

"Something has to be done at our league meeting in Miami next month," Rozelle said. "To place a time limit might cause the serious result of taking away a team's draft choice which would be unfair, especially in the early rounds. It might be possible though, to pass up a team and let it make a selection later. We'll have to see what can be done."

Two Share Lineman of Week Award

The giant Negro is rated one of the best interior linemen ever to come out of college football. He was drafted by the Minnesota Vikings and immediately signed by that National Football league team.

Eller proved a titan of defensive strength in the Minnesota-Wisconsin game. He was the principal figure in a Minnesota goal-line stand that smacked down three Wisconsin rushes from the one near the end of the first half.

Bailey, 32, hit .263 for the Giants last year with 21 homers. He hit left-handed.

Brown ran for 179 yards in the big Cleveland victory over St. Louis, and made his season total 1,677, with two games left. He set the old record, 1,527 yards in 1958.

Brown also scored twice to take over the scoring lead with 90 points on 15 touchdowns.

Bobby Joe Conrad of St. Louis remained the leading pass receiver with 60 for 763 yards. Bobby Mitchell of Washington has the most yardage, 1,130 and Terry Barr of Detroit leads in touchdown passes with 11.

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Navy Chief Outlines His Plans

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4 (AP)—Paul H. Nitze, new secretary of the navy, is optimistic about convincing Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara that the attack carrier force shouldn't be reduced below its current strength of 15 during this decade. Nitze said so in his first conference with newsmen, at which he also:

Came out publicly for more nuclear-powered carriers, but not for the next year or so.

Made it clear he goes along with McNamara's decision against putting atomic propulsion into the carrier for which congress already has authorized conventional power. After that, he said, "the next carrier should be nuclear."

Said that further study must be made to determine whether any or what proportion of future navy combatant surface ships of 8,000 tons or more should have nuclear power.

Confirmed that no request for another carrier is contained in the fiscal 1965 budget proposal submitted by the navy.

Thought the next navy budget would be comparable in size to the current 14.1 million dollars.

Said he couldn't foresee any substantial change in the navy's manpower requirements—now about 669,000 for the navy, slightly under 90,000 for the Marine Corps—because the tasks of the sea service are growing instead of diminishing. He mentioned as an example the expanding fleet of Polaris missile submarines.

Declared the punch of the carrier strike force—units added to the carriers, such as cruisers, destroyers and other support—is greater today than three years ago and will be even more powerful 10 years from now.

Sawtelle Mountain Radar Station to Guide Planes in Intermountain Area

IDAHO FALLS, Dec. 4 (AP)—The Sawtelle mountain radar station near the Montana border in eastern Idaho is expected to become part of a federal aviation agency nationwide network of radar sites today.

Word was received Tuesday by the Idaho Falls FAA officials that as soon as technical kinks can be ironed out the system will be "go." They said the signal should come today.

Minor problems delayed official certification twice, but these difficulties have been resolved.

But despite the delay, for the six workers at the station the procedure of transmitting the vital traffic patterns has already become routine. According to FAA Area Coordinator Frank Coll, the new station has been sending signals to Salt Lake City's traffic control center via microwave for several weeks.

But the Sawtelle pattern can't be incorporated into the national hookup until all the technical aspects of the site have been thoroughly checked by a board of review.

The procedure of examining the six-man operation has been going on in Los Angeles since last

month, but the tedious process by its very nature is painstakingly slow.

While the station must conform to the rest of the soon-to-be-completed 86-site network, the icy "fingers" of winter hold the Sawtelle in their grasp for several months, necessitating special measures to protect the crew from the rigors of cold weather.

Strong winds and heavy snows frequently bring temperatures to well below zero, and the FAA, ready for any eventualty, designed the facility to withstand temperatures down to 80 degrees below zero.

This requires not one but two separate heating systems—one oil and one electrical. They are designed to work separately or, in extreme temperatures, together.

Snow presents another problem. Even in early November it is not uncommon for drifts to pile up to the windows.

With rugged weather on the mountain top, members of the six-man crew live in Ashton and commute to the top of the hill. This means a road, which cost \$10,000 to build, must be kept clear of obstacles.

The men work in three-day shifts, splitting up each day into eight-hour periods. One man keeps watch over the equipment at all times while the other two at the site rest. Thus their life is spent, three days "up top" and three days in Ashton with their families.

All the men must be prepared for any eventualty, including survival in the cold without protection. For this reason each man has undergone special Arctic training by the air force.

In case the men run into trouble in their trips up and down the precipitous peak, an emergency shelter stands ready half way up the road, where they can find food and warmth should the unexpected strike.

Water is another problem. It has proved cheaper to haul water up and down the hill than to pipe it in. So every few days a truck rumbles to the top of the mountain with a fresh supply.

FAA planners worked to make life on top of the mountain as pleasant as possible. Housing comes complete with television, and buildings are connected by tunnels to keep the men out of the cold as much as possible.

Coll says the men already are braced for a long cold winter, one that began several weeks ago.

So when final certification comes, little will be changed in their scheme of life.

NEW YORK, Dec. 4 (AP)—The government's anti-trust price-fixing case against Westinghouse Electric corporation must go to a jury, a federal judge ruled today.

Judge John M. Cashin, who had reserved decision on a Westinghouse motion for a directed verdict of acquittal, made his denial after the defense had rested.

The government indicted Westinghouse and others in December, 1961, on charges of having conspired to fix prices on the brazing alloys used for welding in the manufacture of radios, refrigerators, and jet engines.

The other defendants named in the indictment have pleaded guilty or no contest. Westinghouse elected to go to trial.

The company's defense before an 11-man, one-woman jury was that they never engaged in price-fixing with anyone or anything.

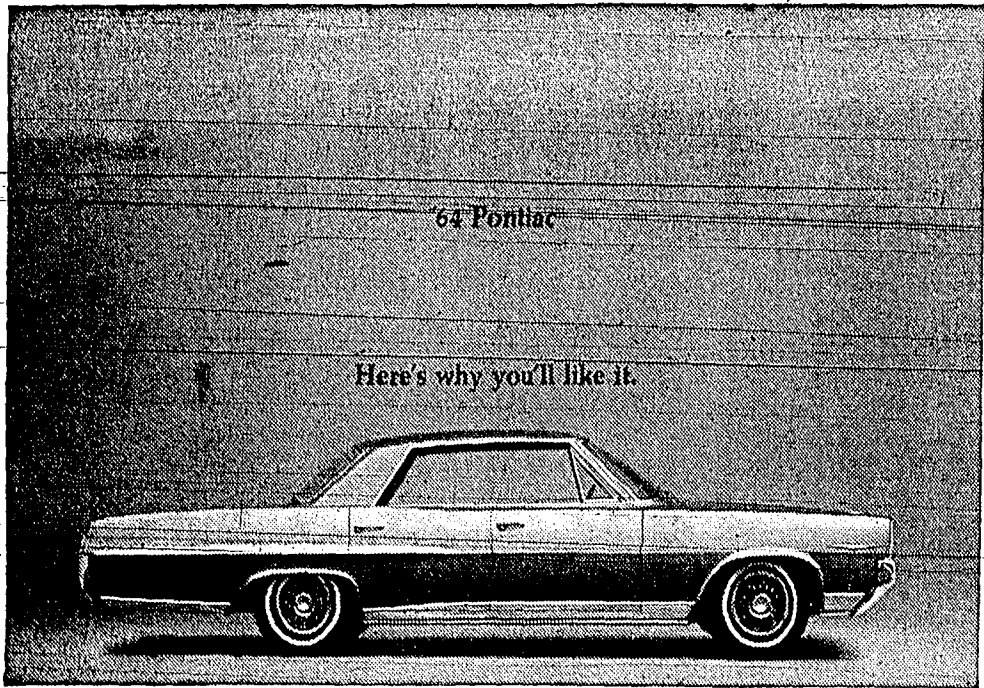

Out-of-State Teachers Are Increasing

BOISE, Dec. 4 (AP)—A dramatic increase in the number of out-of-state teaching certificates approved for use in Idaho was reported Tuesday by the state education department.

Donovan Douglas, head of the teacher certification division, said the state board of education had approved 82 to date and that more were pending.

This figure compares with 13 in 1958-59, four in 1959-60, eight in 1960-61 and six in 1961-62, Douglas said.

This provision extends to five years from the previous one-year period for which an out-of-state teaching certificate may be approved or endorsed for use in Idaho schools.

While the privilege is not extended to instructors holding certificates for which the requirements are lower than Idaho, it does make it easier for incoming teachers to go to work right away.

And at a time when teacher turnover has been high in Idaho schools, the imports have been welcomed.

Because of the much-discussed pay scales for Idaho teachers, Douglas is not inclined to attribute the increase in out-of-school teachers to money. He said that Idaho doesn't pay enough to lure away instructors from its sister states.

Greater ease in recognition of their credentials, he believes, is the reason.

This, of course, raises a question about the capability of the imported teachers and whether they are ones other states have certified but would rather not have.

Douglas said the question of whether they are "rejects" from other states is a difficult one to measure but that he feels many older teachers retired elsewhere or teachers whose husbands are transferred into Idaho by employers doing business here.

"Frankly," he said, "Idaho has been getting for several years a number of older teachers who have been retired elsewhere . . . where there is compulsory retirement age of 65. Idaho's retirement age is 70."

The new provision, he added, makes it easy for such teachers to teach another five years in Idaho without having to seek Idaho certification.

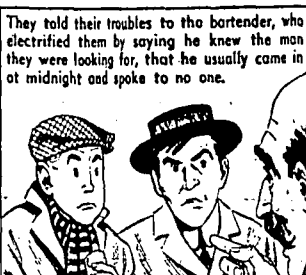

Red Bloc Is in Trouble, and Czechs Have Solution—Promote Tourism

VIENNA, Dec. 4 (AP)—Communism's European satellites are slowly being forced to reconcile political expediency with economic necessity.

Step by step, economic pressures are forcing them to seek compensation in the West.

And inch by inch, the iron curtain is being raised by the need for economic survival, on which ultimately rests communist political survival.

Nowhere is the attempt to reconcile politics with economics more obvious just now than in Czechoslovakia, in that country's current drive to promote East-West tourist traffic.

On Nov. 15 it was made known in Rude Bravo, the Czech government party daily, that a "committee for tourism" was being created to promote and confirm Czech tourism. It is to be headed by Domestic Trade Minister Jindrich Uher, and will have under it the two Czech tourist agencies "Cedok" and "Tourista" plus a number of selected hotels.

A clue to how the Czechs feel about it could be found in the issue of Rude Pravo less than a month earlier. On Oct. 21 it noted that "little Austria" was getting 10 times as many tourists as Czechoslovakia and in 1962 had earned 68 million dollars from tourism.

It is accommodation for tourists that offers the greatest challenge to the Czechs. In 1960 there were only about 220,000 beds in suitable hotels, hostels and inns, plus another 60,000 in tented camps. But of these, only one-third were available for traveling guests. The other two-thirds were reserved for state use as trade union rest centers, factory homes, recuperation centers and other uses. Accommodation is so distributed that many places in Czechoslovakia cannot cope with travelers, while others use only 25 to 27 per cent of available beds.

As a start toward remedying the situation, 99 hotels with 12,500 beds have been selected throughout the country for conversion into first-class accommodations exclusively for foreign guests. So have 57 camping sites now used for pre-military training.

By the end of 1964, five first-class hotels and 20 camping sites are to be ready for the tourist trade. Further projected steps include a new hotel now being built at Brno, new hotels and motels scheduled for the outskirts of Prague, and the adaptation and restoration of castles.

In the field of rail travel, another factor discourages many prospective visitors. The chief of passenger services of the Czech national railways was reported in the Prague paper "Young Front" on Nov. 13 as specifying these scheduled improvements: All international trains to have restaurants or buffet cars, or these trains only the best cars will be used, and they will be cleaned en route, more sleeping cars are to

be introduced, tri-lingual conductors employed and train timetables will be revised to insure that trains will run on schedule. Inducements to visitors in other fields being planned include better money-changing facilities at border points and in hotels, more automobile service stations, better service in shops and restaurants and speedier visa formalities.

FDA Says Cancer Drug Contained Only Mineral Oil

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4 (AP)—The government says it has been unable to find anything but mineral oil in capsules of the so-called cancer drug Krebiozen sold before 1960.

The food and drug administration (FDA) made the charge Monday in an affidavit filed in the federal district court in Chicago.

The affidavit was in support of the FDA's motion to dismiss a request for an injunction which would halt government investigation of the manufacture and distribution of Krebiozen. The injunction is being sought by Dr. Stevan Durovic, the prime promoter of the drug.

Book Planned on Kennedy Murder

NEW YORK, Dec. 4 (AP)—United Press International and the American Heritage publishing company have announced that they will collaborate in the publication of a book on the assassination of President Kennedy.

Mims Thomason, president of UPI, and James Parton, president of American Heritage, said the book would be an elaborately illustrated documentary account of the events in Dallas and Washington during the four fateful days in late November.

The title of the book will be announced later.

Workers in Paradise Eye Hard Winter

VIENNA, Dec. 4 (AP)—The communists are warning the peoples of the "workers paradi- ses" in Eastern Europe that they face another hard winter of food and power shortages.

Much of the Soviet bloc suffered heavily last winter, one of the worst in years. Pessimistic voices could be heard even in the summer of tough time ahead because of shortages of meat, grain, milk and power.

The Hungarian and Polish regimes are having serious agricultural troubles. Czechoslovakia faces a critical shortage of electric power.

Last Friday, Deputy Premier Gyula Kalló admitted that Hungary could not fulfill its farm plan. He told the Hungarian People's Front that the especially hard winter last year created great losses in industry, construction, transport and in agriculture.

But he said, except for agriculture, the goals of the regime's economic plan for 1963 would be met. The important task now is to complete the deep plowing and fertilizing for the next crops.

A few days earlier, a food ministry official quoted by Radio Budapest, warned that pork, eggs and fruits might become even scarcer during the winter. He said that as a result of im- port, however, there would be enough bread and flour.

No mention was made of the recent deal for grain from United States surplus stocks.

Catholic Bishops Get More Powers

VATICAN CITY, Dec. 4 (AP)—Pope Paul VI reduced the dependence of Roman Catholic bishops on the Vatican Curia today, extending them certain limited powers on a permanent basis.

The Roman Catholic pontiff, appearing in person before the Vatican ecumenical council on Tuesday, promulgated a decree which apparently put him on the side of progressive bishops of collegiality—the concept that the bishops as a whole share with the pope in authority over the church.

The main power granted by the pope was the right for the bishops to exercise on their own 40 faculties, or powers, they previously could use only on application to the Curia.

Pope Paul also granted eight privileges, or concessions. One is entirely new for bishops. It is the privilege, previously possessed only by cardinals, to preach and hear confession anywhere in the world, and not in their own dioceses alone.

The other seven privileges—like the faculties—were previously allowed on application.

One of the most important grants is the right of bishops to decide marriage cases involving the Pauline privilege, without consulting the Vatican.

These are marriages involving two unbaptized persons, one of whom decides after marriage to become a Catholic. If the other objects, "The Pauline privilege" allows their marriage to be dissolved after the one is converted.

The converted Catholic is free to marry again. The privilege is named after St. Paul, because the concept is derived from his letter to the Corinthians.

Another faculty permits bishops to allow illegitimate youths to enter the priesthood.

Bishops are also allowed to grant permission to Catholics to read books on the index of reading matter forbidden by the church when the books are used for research or study purposes.

Most of the powers, including the one concerning the index, previously were obtained by bishops for 5- and 10-year periods on application to the Vatican. The applications usually were approved and renewed as a matter of course.

Pope Paul's decree means the bishops will have the powers on a permanent basis, eliminating even the formality of Vatican administrative control.

His decree included permission to bishops to:

Allow a priest to say Mass twice on a weekday.

Allow a priest to say Mass outside of a church in special circumstances.

Permit a sick priest to say Mass in his residence and, if necessary, sitting down.

Grant the privilege to priests of saying Mass at any time of the day.

SALMON, Dec. 4 — Landing strips along the middle fork of the Salmon river all are open.

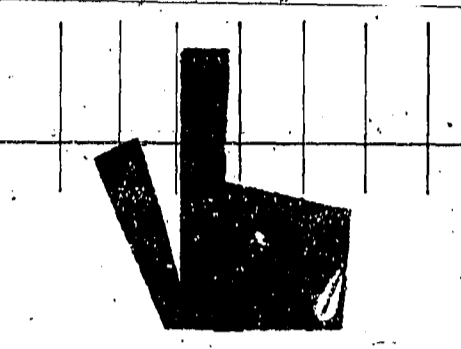
