

Tiny Shell Developed By U.S.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9 (UPI)—The defense department today announced development for battlefield use of a nuclear shell only six inches in diameter.

The shell, developed by the army and the atomic energy commission, is a new projectile will be fired from 155 millimeter howitzers and is believed to be the world's smallest nuclear weapon.

The range of the 155 howitzer is up to ten miles and the Pentagon said it would be the same for nuclear rounds as for conventional high explosives.

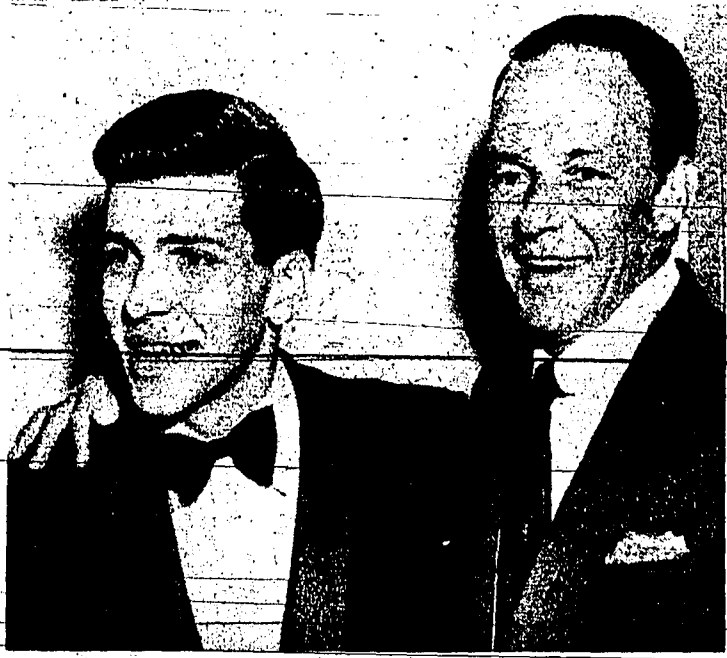
The smallest previously known nuclear weapons were the projectiles fired by eight-inch howitzers and Davy Crockett bazooka-like weapons, both in service in Europe and elsewhere.

The defense department said that the actual nuclear ammunition will be available in the near future for army and marine troops who already have received training in assembling and firing techniques.

There are normally 18 of the 155 millimeter in each of the five army divisions in Europe as well as other divisions. Some of the weapons also are assigned to the three armored cavalry regiments which patrol the Iron curtain and serve as a screening force for NATO armies.

The weapon is available to the army in two versions—self-propelled in armored divisions and towed in infantry divisions.

It appeared possible that the new projectile could become U. S. military's most widely used nuclear weapon.

STATELINE, Nev., Dec. 9 (UPI)—Frank Sinatra, jr., 19, was kidnaped at gunpoint from this Lake Tahoe gambling center last night and authorities believed he and his abductors were held up in the immediate area. Two men armed with a sawed-off shotgun and a .45 caliber pistol forced the son of the famous entertainer from his motel room shortly before he was to make a singing appearance at a gambling casino (Harrah's) at 10 o'clock. An all-points bulletin was issued for two young prison escapees who were reported to have been in the Lake Tahoe area earlier yesterday. They are sought for a previous kidnaping and two Southern California bank robberies, and were described by El Dorado county (Calif.) Sheriff Ernest Carlson as "very, very dangerous men."

Jet Airliner Explodes Over Maryland; All 81 Persons Aboard Killed

ELKTON, Md., Dec. 9 (AP)—A federal investigator said today he was convinced that a four-engine jet airliner exploded in the air before it plunged to earth killing all 81 persons aboard. Robert Allen, deputy director of safety for the civil aeronautics board, said, "We cannot at this time tell whether the Boeing 707 which crashed during a thunderstorm Sunday night was struck by lightning. Asked if there was any sign of a bombing of the Pan American World Airways plane, Allen told a news conference: "I would say not at this particular time but we have not ruled out any possibility."

The federal aviation agency also released today an unofficial and partial transcript of the final conversation between the crew and the control tower at Philadelphia's airport.

"Clipper 214 out of control. Here we go..." the plane crew told Paul Slesky in the tower. Then this exchange:

Alexy—"Clipper 214, did you call Philadelphia?"

214—"Clipper 214 is going down in flames."

Alexy—"Clipper 214, Roger. Message has been received."

Then silence.

Allen told newsmen the fact wreckage was scattered over an area of one square mile "certainly would indicate that an in-flight breakup occurred."

"Disintegration of this magnitude is hard to imagine," he said.

Saying he was "convinced that there was an explosion before it hit the ground," he added: "What type it was I don't know. It could be decompression of the hull or rupture of fuel cells."

CAB investigators received conflicting reports on whether lightning could have caused the crash. They also learned another plane had been in trouble in the same general area at about the same time because of turbulence.

This report indicated that rough weather, rather than lightning, was a major factor.

As investigators began their work, police searched for victims in a muddy cornfield where the plane dropped in fiery fragments from 5,000 feet.

Witnesses said it was struck by lightning.

"Lightning could cause it," said B. R. Allen of the civil aeronautics board, one of two federal officials heading the investigation.

"We really can't tell until we look at the wreckage."

The plane, en route from Puerto Rico to Philadelphia with 73 passengers—two of them infants—and a crew of eight, came down in a stubbled cornfield about 15 miles southwest of Wilmington, Del., near U. S. 40 and the Maryland-Delaware line.

By good chance, about 65 persons had stepped safely off the plane during a stop in Baltimore only a few minutes earlier.

"It was a funny noise, a sound I had never heard before, unbelievable," said Mrs. Dean Wilmore, who lives in the village of Meadow View near Elkton.

"We knew there would be no survivors out of it, because it was just a ball of fire."

The plane disintegrated in the air, Sheriff Edgar Startt said bits of wreckage fell over an area of (See AIRLINER, Page 2)

Oil Policy Is Given to Department

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9 (AP)—President Johnson told Secretary of the Interior Udall today that he wants the interior department—not the White House—to set national oil policy.

It seemed apparent that Johnson, coming from a major oil-producing state, wanted to free himself in advance of any suggestion that his Texas ties were influencing national oil policy.

Udall also reported, after a meeting with Johnson, that his department's budget, going to congress next month, will provide for "some new starts" on water projects—always a major concern in the western states.

The secretary said the interior budget has been pretty well fixed and can be described as a "hold-the-line budget, which is pretty good in a growing country."

In giving Udall's department primary responsibility for drafting oil policy, Johnson broke with the pattern followed by President Kennedy. Under Kennedy, the White House was the center of policy-making in this area.

Progress on School Aid Is Reported

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9 (AP)—House-senate conferees negotiated today a bill to boost federal help for vocational schools and expand the government's student loan program.

The measure—one of two education bills expected to be passed this session—would increase the present \$8 million dollar aid program for vocational schools by four or five times. The compromise also was expected to continue the present national defense education act for student loans and extend the 400 million dollar "impacted areas" program for schools crowded by children of servicemen and government workers.

The conferees planned to complete work on the legislation tomorrow.

The compromise would cut the extension of the student loan and impacted areas programs from three to two years. In turn, the house negotiators agreed to a senate formula for allocating the education school aid.

Idaho Expenses Expected to Rise

BOISE, Dec. 9 (AP)—Delegates to the annual meeting of the Associated Taxpayers of Idaho were told today that the next legislature will have to find 12.5 to 15 million dollars in new revenue to meet demands for state services.

Executive Manager Max Yost predicted a 120 million dollar state budget for the 1965-67 biennium, compared to the present 101.9 million dollar budget. He described his estimate as "very conservative."

Miners Give Government Ultimatum

LA PAZ, Bolivia, Dec. 9 (AP)—Rebellious tin miners holding nine foreigners, including four Americans, as hostages for the release of three communist labor leaders today gave the government 24 hours to submit to their demands "or face the consequences."

The "consequences" appeared to be continued retention of the hostages and the start of a series of nation-wide general strikes in the key tin mining industry aimed at bringing down the government.

East Idaho Reels Under Heavy Snow

After a week under biting winds and freezing temperatures, east Idaho Monday reeled under a massive snowstorm which swept through the area Sunday night.

Up to noon Monday between four and six inches of new snow had fallen in east Idaho and adjacent sections of southwest Montana and northwest Wyoming.

The state highway department office at Rigby said 38 snowplows and five sanders were keeping all highways open.

Drifting conditions were reported on highway 91 between Dubois and on roads near Arco. Idaho Falls also wheeled out snowplows to clear the snow.

The heaviest snowfall was the six inches measured at Island Park which now has 23 inches. Four inches fell at Lost Trail pass north of Salmon.

In Idaho Falls there was almost eight inches of snow on the ground and it was still coming down heavily at mid-day.

Petition Gets 109 Signatures

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9 (AP)—A discharge petition to spring the civil rights bill from the Southern-led house rules committee was formally introduced today and drew 109 signers within an hour.

Liberal house Democrats—joined by a handful of Republicans—stood in line to sign the demand that the bill be brought immediately to the house floor for action. However a total of 218 signers are needed for the parliamentary device to work and the prospects were not considered good.

Studebaker To Close U. S. Auto Plants

DETROIT, Dec. 9 (AP)—Studebaker corporation will shut down its U. S. automotive assembly lines tomorrow, ending more than 61 years as a major automotive producer, it was learned today.

However, there were indications Studebaker would continue car production in Canada and market the cars in the United States.

The company is not dead. Studebaker recently has lost money on its automotive operation but 12 other divisions are operating at a profit, company sources said. They will continue.

The entire automotive facility in the U. S. is located in South Bend, Ind. The corporation's administrative, engineering and manufacturing facilities are concentrated in more than six million square feet of floor space and nearby is an 800-acre proving ground. Employment in the automotive division during "normal production" totals about 7,500 persons.

Studebaker of Canada, Ltd., operates an automotive plant in Hamilton, Ont. It has a workforce of about 725 employees and Studebaker distributes its cars through a network of some 300 dealers. The dealers also handle Mercedes-Benz and Auto Union-DKW cars as they do in this country.

More than 130,000 Studebaker cars have been assembled in the Canadian plant since it started operations in 1948.

Other Studebaker divisions include Trans International Airlines, Franklin Appliance division, Clarke-Floor Machine division, Gravelly Tractor division and the 6TP General Compound division.

Weather, Temperatures

FIVE-DAY FORECAST
The mean pressure pattern for the next five days shows high pressure at the surface to the north in Canada with the southern portion extending into the northern intermountain region. In the upper levels of the atmosphere lower pressure is forecast in the southwestern states extending northeastward into the central Rocky mountains.

Temperatures under these conditions are expected to average from 5 to 10 degrees below normal through Saturday over the agricultural valleys of southern Idaho. Below normal high temperatures and near normal low temperatures will continue into the middle of the week. Only slight warming of daytime temperatures will occur after Wednesday and nighttime temperatures will lower to below normal around the middle of the week. Some normal temperatures for this period are Gooding, 37 and 22; Twin Falls, 40 and 22; and Burley, 40 and 22.

Final precipitation will occur as snow or snow flurries and will amount mostly the first portion of the week. It is indicated around Wednesday with little or no precipitation expected during the remainder of the week. Total precipitation amounts will range from 10 to 20 of an inch during this five-day period. Sunshine will average from 70 to 45 per cent of possible with daytime cloudiness averaging near seven-tenths of the sky covered. Northerly winds will be diminishing in speed and gustiness into the middle of the week becoming generally southerly winds at that time. Winds will average from 10 to 14 miles per hour during the next five days.

SYNOPSIS
The immediate weather outlook shows the low pressure system responsible for the snow that has fallen—and in some areas is still falling—in southern Idaho and has moved to the south in eastern Nevada and western Utah. Snowfall amounts have ranged from one inch to as much as four inches over valleys during the past 24 hours. Fairfield reported 12 inches of snow on the ground and the weather station at the AEC site near Arco reported five inches of snow on the ground.

A combination of the low pressure center at the surface and a low pressure center aloft now to the west of this area and moving to the south is expected to keep periods of snow and snow flurries in the valleys for today and Tuesday. The heaviest concentration of the storm will move more to the south of area valleys. Some areas of partly cloudy skies are possible in the southwestern and southern valleys of Idaho on Tuesday. However, any general clearing trend is not expected before Wednesday.

Temperatures are expected to continue below normal for the next two or three days with maximum readings in the mid-20 to mid-30 degree range over these agricultural valleys today and Tuesday. Minimum temperatures tonight will lower into the upper teens and low 20s except in the extreme upper Snake river and Camas prairie areas where readings from 10 to 15 degrees will occur. Northerly winds in some of the southeastern valleys possibly will produce some drifting of the snow this afternoon and tonight.

Reports of good amounts of new snow in the higher elevations are quite promising for excellent skiing conditions as more ski slopes open this week-end. Duck hunters will find weather favorable.

Wills Cites Qualification For Meetings

He said that in Raton, N. M., the community worked hard to develop itself as a pleasant place to live. "A delegate from the Chicago area to a Raton convention was so impressed with the community's living conditions and accomplishments that he decided to locate a 16,000 square foot electronics plant with a payroll of 200 employees in that area," Lidstrom said.

"Twin Falls residents have that same opportunity, by inviting more and more out-of-town guests to examine the community. This is done by having an adequate up-to-date convention center," Lidstrom added.

Search Made for Missing C46 Plane

LONG MOUNT, Colo., Dec. 9 (AP)—Military and civil air patrol planes from Utah and Colorado took off at dawn today to retrace the search for a missing C-46 with three men aboard. The searchers will fan out along the eastern face of the coniferous divide and concentrate their search in the Moffat tunnel, the Echo Springs and Rollingsville areas of the rugged mountain country.

Aboard the missing Logair transport were the pilot, Capt. Joe Halsey, based in Ontario, Calif., the first officer, Kurt Huelshuber, also of Ontario, and a passenger, Capt. Arthur Fehr, Layton, Utah.

The twin-engine plane, owned by the Zantap company, of Ontario, was on a flight from Lowry air force base in Denver to Hill air force base in Utah. The plane was a commercial carrier under contract to transport freight for the air force.

A Lowry spokesman said the aircraft disappeared after leaving the field at 6:59 p.m. Saturday with six hours of fuel. The plane, a type that flew the famed hump route in China during World War II, was assigned an altitude of 12,500 feet for the two-hour, 40 minute flight to Hill.

The weather report indicated moderate to severe turbulence along the route for the flight. Lowry said it received a report at 1:35 a.m. Sunday that the aircraft had not reported in and an aerial search was mounted at dawn over sections of Colorado, Wyoming and Utah.

A spokesman said the plane was following visual flight rules—as opposed to flying on instruments—and could have taken three or four possible routes from Lowry to Hill. Captain Halsey would not indicate which route he thought the plane was on under VFR conditions.

Fire Takes Life of Girl

SALT LAKE CITY, Dec. 9 (AP)—A 16-year-old Salt Lake county girl perished last night when a fire swept through her home. Joan Lowder, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Lowder, Hunter, apparently died of asphyxiation when the blaze sent heavy smoke throughout the house. She was found lying in the hallway near her upstairs bedroom, by firemen and was pronounced dead on arrival minutes later at Valley West hospital.

Four other Lowder children were in the house when the fire broke out, apparently from a fireplace. They all escaped unhurt. Salt Lake county firemen estimated damage to the home at \$8,000.

"We knew we had a copy of the diary; we didn't know that it was the original," says Bruce LeRoy, society director. He presented the manuscript to the board of curators. The diary is that of Narcissa Whitman, who helped her missionary husband, Dr. Marcus Whitman, establish the Walla Walla mission near Walla Walla in 1836. She wrote the diary while journeying from Wyoming to Vancouver, Wash. Subsequently, she made two copies of her writings. They are at Whitman college at Walla Walla and the Bancroft library at Berkeley, Calif. Handwriting checks and other comparisons established the museum document as the original. The Whitmans were killed by Indians in 1847.

Railroad Control Decision Is Upheld by Court

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9 (AP)—The supreme court affirmed today a decision upholding acquisition by the Chesapeake and Ohio railway of control of the Baltimore and Ohio railroad.

The decision was given by a special three-judge U. S. district court in Detroit. It was appealed to the high tribunal by five unions. The supreme court, in a nine-word order, affirmed the special court's decision. The high tribunal made no comment about the case, merely noting that the lower court ruling was upheld.

Searchers Quit Schooner Hunt

MIAMI, Dec. 9 (AP)—The coast guard yesterday abandoned the search for a sailing schooner missing since Thanksgiving on a trip to the Bahamas with two men and three boys aboard.

Aboard were the owner, Harvey Brion, 40-year-old employe of the

missile tracking station at Eleuthera Island, his twin brother, Harold, a Miami elementary school teacher, and three of Harold's sons, Paul, 14, Jeffrey, 13 and Leslie, 11.

The 47-year-old boat left Miami bound for Eleuthera on Thanksgiving day. The coast guard said that high seas and winds whipped the Bahamas area the next day.

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Five Men Die As Car Turns Upside Down

SEBASTOPOLE, Calif., Dec. 9 (AP)—A speeding car, attempting to pass another on a country lane near here, plunged upside down into a gully yesterday, killing all five men inside.

The accident was described by Coroner Andrew Johansen as the worst one-car traffic accident in Sonoma county history.

Johansen said the driver, Hugh A. McBurnie, 21, Navato, apparently lost control of the two-door sedan when he cut out to pass another car. McBurnie's car screamed into a low bank, bounced over and landed upside down in a deep gully.

The California highway patrol said the impact was so great that it took acetylene torch welders a half hour to free the bodies from the gnarled metal.

The highway patrol said two teen-agers reported being passed earlier by an erratically driven automobile west of Santa Rosa.

The dead were identified as McBurnie; Dwight V. Boyd, 35, Novato; Gary C. Booth, 21, Burlingame; David J. Willette, 23, and Richard W. Pfeiffer, 21, both of the USS Coral Sea, Alameda naval air station.

The men were all dead on arrival at Palm Drive hospital here.

Importance of West Seen as Increasing

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif., Dec. 9 (AP)—Sen. Hubert Humphrey, D. Minn., today predicted the West and urban areas would play an increasingly important role in the congress within the next two decades.

He noted that with a projected population of 280 million Americans by 1980 and that the trend toward urbanization, "we still have a culture with a small-town orientation."

Humphrey spoke before an audience of 1,400 in a symposium on "Prospects for Democracy in the 1960's," sponsored by the Center for the Study of Democratic Institutions at the Beverly Hilton hotel.

"Toddlers of today will be represented in a congress with the balance of power shifted to the West and to urban centers," he said.

But Humphrey said a lack of preparation for the increased population of the future represented a "built-in pattern for the destruction of democracy."

"Without adequate planning, cities are already strangling themselves," he said, referring to housing, transportation and racial discrimination.

By 1980, the Pacific Coast would increase its congressional delegation by 20 per cent, Humphrey predicted, while the South will lose 10 per cent and the border states and New England 15 per cent.

The Democratic senator added that other western states and Texas would gain a 15 per cent increase in the house of representatives.

He said one serious aspect of the current lack of planning was in the field of defense spending and the impact of a major arms reduction on the civilian economy.

He said the "whole economy would be in a panic," if the government abruptly reduced its spending on arms and space development by 25 billion dollars."

Cancer Virus Is Reported Crystallized

WALTHAM, Mass., Dec. 9 (AP)—A potent cancer virus has been crystallized and its chemical contents determined by a Brandeis university scientist, the American Cancer society said today.

Dr. William T. Murakami, a Los Angeles-born biochemist, succeeded in crystallizing the virus polyoma, a Greek-derived term meaning "many tumors."

The virus produces more than a score of different kinds of cancer in mice, rats, hamsters and guinea pigs and appears to have infected laboratory animals handlers—without, however, producing human cancers, the cancer society said.

The society said this was the first instance in which a cancer virus has been crystallized.

While the achievement has no direct application to the problem of human cancer, it adds an important dimension—to science's ability to study the activity of "a naked and uncomplicated" cancer virus in animals, the society said.

"At this time, science can only guess at the process by which a cancer virus gains entry into one cell, is rejected by another and what it does once it is inside the cell. Pure virus crystals may help dispel these mysteries."

The society said virus purification should enable scientists to determine the precise chemical nature of the particle and trace the chemical processes by which it infects, injures and destroys cells.

It is a major step in the direction of development of vaccines and antisera for the prevention and treatment of the virus causes, the society said.

Dr. Murakami, an assistant professor in the university's graduate department of biochemistry, accomplished his experiments with the support of the U. S. public health service and the American Cancer society.

A graduate of the University of California at Los Angeles, Murakami holds a PH.D. degree from the University of Southern California. He was a postdoctoral fellow at Brandeis from 1958-60 and studied at the Pasteur Institute in Paris in 1960-61.

Gem Holiday Parties May Be Illegal

BOISE, Dec. 9 (AP)—Idahoans were warned today that holiday parties conducted on public premises such as dance halls or cafes that don't have a liquor license may run afoul of the law.

Warner Mills, director of liquor law enforcement, said it is illegal for an establishment without a license to permit individuals or groups to bring liquor on the premises for consumption.

Mills explained that the law is often violated during the holiday season by groups that go to public places and provide their own liquor.

"All officers are instructed to take appropriate action wherever a violation of the law occurs," said Mills.

He explained that it does not rule out dispensing liquor in a person's home.

Mills quoted the law as declaring it illegal to "maintain any rooms or premises . . . to which liquor is brought for consumption on the premises by members of the public, or by any club, individual, corporation or association, unless such person and the premises are licensed under this act."

U.S. Strikes Idle 160,000 Workers

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9 (AP)—Approximately 160,000 workers were idled in October because of strikes, according to the labor department.

The department's bureau of labor statistics said yesterday that 290 strikes putting 95,000 persons out of work began in October. Another 210 strikes that carried over from September accounted for the rest.

Strikes at factories owned by U. S. Rubber company, Armour and company, General Telephone company and the Shop-Rite, Foodtown, and Good Deal supermarkets accounted for about a fifth of the October idleness, the bureau said.

BIRMINGHAM, England, Dec. 9 (AP)—Mrs. Henry Smith was peppered in the posterior with bird shot yesterday when a die-hard pheasant fired her husband's shotgun.

The bird, presumed dead, had been hung over her husband's shotgun stock when his accident happened, Smith said it apparently lashed the trigger in giving a death twitch.

A hospital official said Mrs. Smith was "fairly comfortable. Her thick sheepskin jacket probably saved her life."

Hanson Asks More Idaho Legion Posts

BOISE, Dec. 9 (AP)—Idaho's state American Legion commander Sunday urged establishment of more Legion posts throughout the state and expansion of the organization's Americanism program.

Max Hanson, Boise, told Legion district commanders at concluding sessions of a two-day achievement conference that he believes there is a need for 15 to 20 more Legion posts in the state. There are now 96 posts in Idaho.

Corwin Johnson, Indianapolis, national Legion representative, said the national organization is attempting to establish posts in every community where there is a high school.

He said the Legion has stepped up its Americanism program "to give young Americans a better understanding of their nation in view of the communist propaganda being spread throughout the world."

Hanson said Legion state committee chairmen are planning intensified Americanism programs and will present them to local posts some time next year.

Hanson said the programs will include education in United States history and American government. He said they are designed for children of all ages.

JERUSALEM, Israel Sector, Dec. 9 (AP)—Leonard Bernstein, musical director of the New York Philharmonic, says he has dedicated his Third Symphony, "Kaddish," to the memory of the late President Kennedy.

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Pope Getting Ready for Pilgrimage

VATICAN CITY, Dec. 9 (AP)—Pope Paul VI today received the Franciscan "Custodian of the Holy Land" to prepare for his historic pilgrimage to Palestine next month.

Custodian Father Lino Cappello, OFM, called on the pontiff, apparently to report on arrangements being made with Jordanian and Israeli authorities for the visit.

The custodian of the Holy Land is a friar elected by the Franciscan order to guard holy places on Mount Zion. His residence is in the Monastery of the Holy Savior in the Jordan sector of Jerusalem.

The custody of the holy land was established in 1217 as the principal foreign mission of the Franciscans. It was revived in 1929 after a persecution in which all Franciscan monasteries in the Holy Land were destroyed and many friars were killed.

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SOUTH OF THE BORDER

Cuban Held On President Threat Count

NEW YORK, Dec. 9 (AP)—A 19-year-old Cuban, who allegedly said he wanted to shoot President Johnson, was held in \$25,000 bail yesterday.

The youth, Omar Padilla, said in court that he had been "joking" about the threat. He was not charged with threatening the life of a President, which is a federal crime.

Padilla was charged with illegal possession of a firearm and discharging a firearm in the city. His co-workers at an engraving plant had told authorities of the alleged threat and that Padilla had been practicing with a rifle during lunch hours, using a building loft as a rifle range.

He was arrested Saturday at his home and arraigned yesterday, shortly before Johnson arrived for a brief visit here.

Though no federal charges were brought against Padilla, federal Judge Louis A. Cloff took the alleged threat into consideration in setting high bail. Padilla was held for a hearing tomorrow.

In the Cuban's home authorities found a newly purchased .22 caliber rifle, 20 rounds of ammunition and a number of hand-drawn bullethead targets. Padilla, they said, admitted firing 40 practice shots with the rifle.

But he denied wanting to kill the President. His co-workers had quoted him as saying that "asked for" his assassination. But Padilla said he had meant by this only that Kennedy was lax about his own safety.

Padilla came to the city from Cuba in 1955.

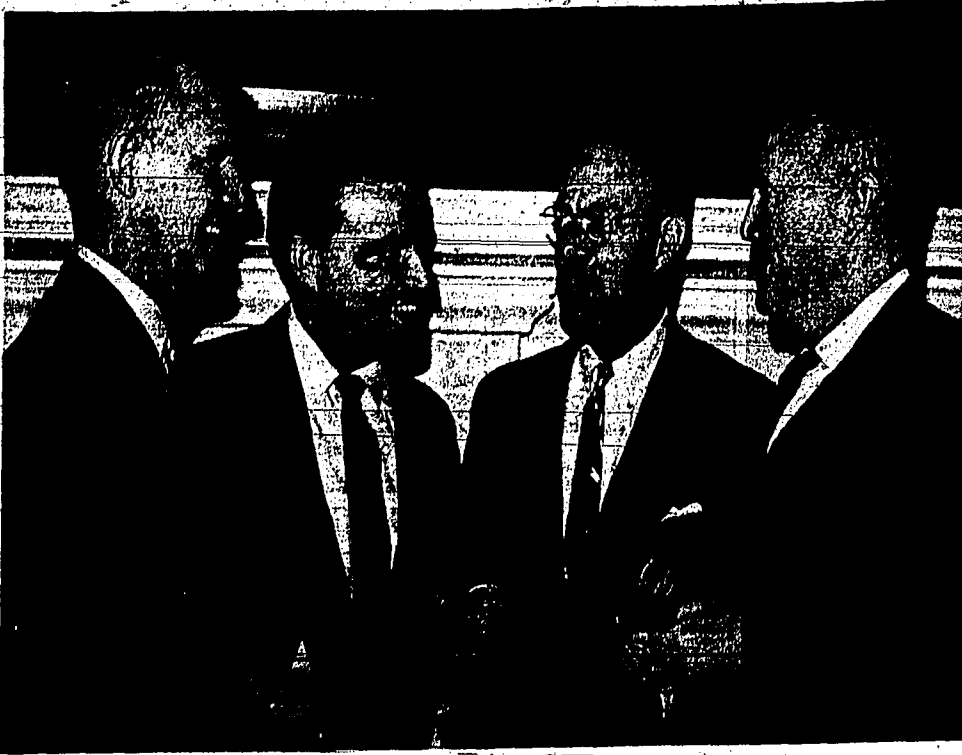

Island Nation Is Granted Freedom

ZANZIBAR, Dec. 9 (AP)—Two Indian ocean islands will join the British commonwealth as the independent nation of Zanzibar at midnight tonight, marking the end of 73 years of British protectorate status.

Prince Philip, husband of Queen Elizabeth, and Undersecretary of State G. Mennen Williams are representing Britain and the United States at the ceremonies.

Williams assured Africans yesterday that present U. S. policy of helping new nations with aid and advice would continue. There is no Kennedy policy or Johnson policy, he said.

Williams spoke to newsmen in neighboring Dar Es Salaam, Tanganyika, after a meeting with the President, Dr. Julius Nyerere.

Zanzibar is made up of two clove-scented islands, Zanzibar and Pemba, and is ruled by a 34-year old sultan and a coalition government of Arabs and Asians.

The majority of the population is African, the descendants of slaves brought here by the Arab rulers who drove out the Portuguese in the 17th century.

Although there are 230,000 Africans on the two islands, the governments since 1957 have been dominated by the 80,000 Arabs and Asians, and the sovereign is an Arab, Sultan Sir Bin Khalifa.

The Africans have no chance of changing this political balance, until the next election in three years' time. But racial friction has brought clashes in the past, the most serious in 1961, when 66 persons were killed.

The clove-dominated Zanzibar's economy, accounting for 85 per cent of its exports. It has a place on the new flag, which shows two golden cloves in a green circle.

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 9 (AP)—Deleespe S. Morrison and John J. McKeithen today indicated they would collide primarily in their degree of conservatism in battling the runoff primary for Louisiana governor next month.

Both men told interviewers today after their runoff roles were assured they would stand for reforms in state government and for development of Louisiana's economy and public institutions.

But McKeithen pinpointed the major difference between them as their views on federal intervention and their willingness to support the presidential nominee for the national Democratic party.

"I feel the people of this state will demand from the candi-

dates," McKeithen said, "what the Democratic nominee for president no matter who it was and no matter what the platform said." He added "under the circumstances" would he commit himself to back the national party nominee.

Morrison said he has consistently pledged himself to home rule and preferred to stick to his first primary strategy of emphasizing "a constructive program for Louisiana."

McKeithen said he understood Morrison "was going to support

BOISE, Dec. 9 (AP)—The fish and game department reports that a new steelhead trout fishing permit will replace the punch card system now in use effective Jan. 1.

The new regulation requires fishermen to enter the date and name of the stream where the sea-run trout is caught on the permit card.

Under current regulations, anglers are required to punch the permits in the space provided and to enter the date and name of the stream where the fish is caught.

The department said all persons fishing for steelhead are required to have a valid punch card in the possession until Dec. 31, and the new permit thereafter. The cards and permits are available at no charge at license vendors throughout the state.

James C. Simpson, chief of fisheries management, said possession limit for steelhead is two fish over 20 inches in length. The season limit is 30 fish per calendar year.

Detroit Ices Win With 24 Points In Second Period

DETROIT, Dec. 9 (AP)—The Detroit Lions continued their mastery over Cleveland Sunday when they scored 24 points in the second quarter and posted a lopsided 38-10 National Football league victory over the Browns. The victory, first for the Lions since Nov. 3, seriously dimmed the Browns' title hopes. Cleveland had entered the game tied with New York for the Eastern conference lead.

Kansas City Defense Team Beats Denver

KANSAS CITY, Dec. 9 (AP)—Kansas City's defensive team scored one touchdown and set up three others with blocked punts and interceptions as the Chiefs lashed Denver 52-21 Sunday for their first American Football league victory in two months. Len Dawson fired three touchdown passes for Kansas City, two to flanker Frank Jackson, and Jackson got a third touchdown on a 22-yard reverse. The first of Kansas City's three blocked punts was by Dave Grayson in the first period. Duncane Wood picked up the ball at the 18 and ran for a touchdown, giving the Chiefs a 14-0 lead. Sherill Hendrick, Kansas City linebacker, blocked two punts in the third quarter, and the Chiefs moved 27 and 11 yards for two touchdowns. Bobby Hunt, chief safety, stopped one Denver scoring drive with an interception, and set up a touchdown by running 65 yards to the Bronco's one with another stolen pass.

Rare Goose Depicted on Duck Stamp

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9 (AP)—The Nene goose, one of the rarest species of waterfowl in the world and Hawaii's official bird, will be depicted on the 1964-65 federal duck stamp. A water color drawing by Stanley Stearns, Stevensville, Md., showing a pair of Nene geese on the volcanic slopes of Hawaii, was selected today. The winning design is from among 150 entries in the 15th annual duck stamp design competition. Stearns also drew the design for the 1955-56 stamp. Leslie C. Kouba, Minneapolis, was winner of second and third honors, with drawings of old squaw ducks and emperor geese. The winning artists receive no remuneration. Revenue from the sale of the \$3 stamps is used in development of migratory bird refuges and habitats.

Steelhead Not Commercial, Sportsmen Say

SPOKANE, Dec. 9 (AP)—The Washington State Sportsmen's council approved a resolution yesterday urging Oregon to quit classifying steelhead as commercial fish. State Sen. Karl V. Hermann, D. Spokane, said Washington and Idaho classify steelhead as game fish. "An imaginary line exists down the middle of the Columbia river," Hermann said, "Commercial fishermen fish for steelhead on the Oregon side." He said the Oregon ruling puts Washington at a disadvantage because Washington law forbids competition by Washington fishermen.

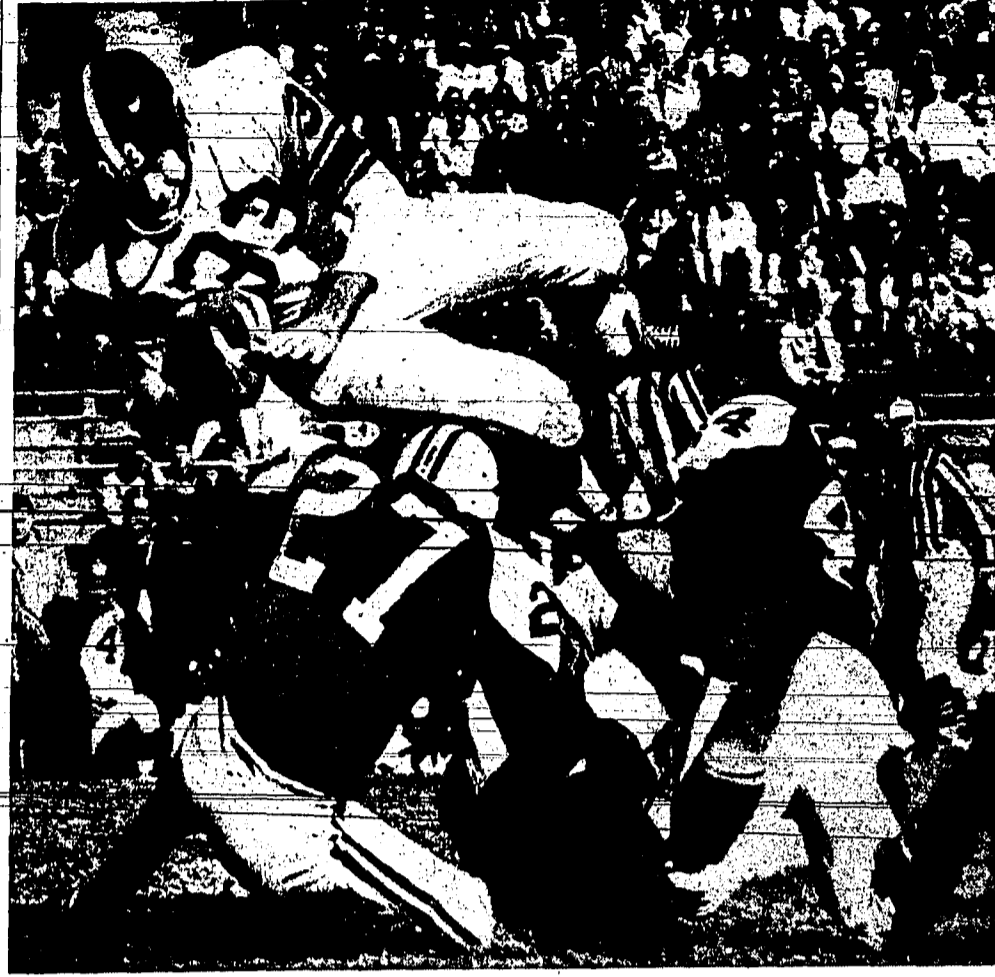

George Blanda completed 12 consecutive passes in packing Houston to a 14-10 lead early in the first half, but the Boston defense then threw Blanda and understudy Jackie Lee for losses totaling 100 yards while trying to pass. After the Houston go-ahead score, Parilli was charged with grounding the ball intentionally. This forced Boston to punt from its 20 but a roughing-the-kicker penalty gave the Patriots new life and Yewcic promptly ran 25 yards to the Houston 27. Five plays later Parilli passed three yards to Jim Coelough for a 17-14 lead.
