



Bryce Bennett said the highway department will compile a list of 1964 projects approved by the board and release it for publication, probably next week. The board scheduled its next meeting Jan. 15-16 in Boise.

IDAHO FALLS, Dec. 19 4—Three civilian representatives of the U.S. army corps of engineers, along with several local officials, toured the upper Snake river valley Wednesday, looking for any possible spring flood threat. The three surveyed the danger spots along the Roberts-Ririe stretch of the Snake river and other possible flood points along the Snake river drainage basin. "The engineers and other flood people are merely keeping an eye, on the situation in case there should be any flood danger," said Russell Holm, chairman of Idaho flood control district No. 1. Holm said the snow depth in east Idaho is the deepest it has been in some places but only a few inches elsewhere. It's usually a combination of frozen soil, abundant moisture, warm weather and rain which cause the floods.

IDAHO FALLS, Dec. 19.69—Idaho shipped more potatoes than any other state for the week of Dec. 6-12, it was shown Wednesday in the federal-state market news report. The report showed Idaho shipped 587 carloads, followed by Maine with 484, the Red river valley of Minnesota and North Dakota with 446 and New York with 412. 


