Frenchman Is Sentenced For Treason

PARIS, Dec. 31—The French state security court has sentenced former Col. Antoine Argoud to prison for life, leaving it up to the French and West German governments to settle their dispute over his custody.

The court president, Andre Dechezelle, said Monday the court's decision would have no effect on any political decision by the two governments on Argoud's fate.

Argoud was convicted of treason in connection with a short-lived revolt of French generals in Algeria and as a secret army organization leader.

Argoud, who has contended throughout the four-day proceedings that the trial was illegal, refused to attend the final session. His attorneys alleged that he was kidnaped in Munich, Germany, and spirited into France by French secret police.

West German officials announced in Bonn that Germany had asked again for Argoud's return. The French government had politely ignored a previous suggestion to this effect. If Argoud should be returned to Germany, it was assumed that he would be held there pending an extradition hearing.

Medical Mirror

MORNING GAGGING
Q. What causes morning gagging?
A. Mouth breathing probably causes much of the morning gagger's troubles. Mouth breathing during sleep can be due to blockage of the nasal passages because of infection, allergies, or some physical derangement. Mouth breathing tends to dry the normally moist, "slippery" throat tissues. Swallowing causes the parched, "scratchy" surfaces to rub together, thus stimulating the gag reflex. Treatment, as prescribed by a physician, might start with measures directed toward establishing and maintaining normal nasal breathing.

FEVER IN CHILDREN
Q. Is sponge bathing recommended for reducing fever in children? Should water or alcohol be used?
A. There is probably no better way to reduce fever than to sponge the child with slightly warm (never cold) water or alcohol and promote evaporation by gentle fanning.
