

Frenchman Is Sentenced For Treason-

PARIS, Dec. 31 th-The French state security court has sentenced former Col. Antoine Argoud to prison for life, leaving it up to the French and West Gorman governments to settle their dis-

The court president, Andre Dechezelle, said Monday the court's decision would have no effect on any political decision by the two governments on Argoud's fate.

Argoud was convicted of trea son in connection with a short-lived revolt of French generals in Algeria and as a secret army organization leader.

Argoud, who has contended throughout, the four-day pro-ceedings that the trial was illegal, refused to attend the final ses-sion. His attorneys alleged that he was kidnaned in Munich, Ger many, and spirited into France by French secret police.

West German officials announced in Bonn that Germany had asked again for Argoud's return. The French government had politely ignored a previous suggestion to this effect. If Ar goud should be returned to Germany, it was assumed that he would be held there pending an
