## Astronauts Are Planning Their Estates

HOUSTON, Tex., Jan. 2 (UPI) — The two men who make up the second group of astronauts will divide their children in a Houston bank.

"They named the First City National Bank Tuesday as a co-trustee of the shares of the \$3-million dollar contract for their personal stories. Under the contract with Time, Inc., and Fawcett Publications, the children will receive several thousand dollars for the publishing rights to their stories as members of an international family.

The bank will handle the estate for the youngsters and has filed in Harris county probate court an application for a guardianship of the space adventure to the two publishing firms.

The application was approved by Probate Court Judge Jack L. Smith.

## Gross Rakes Johnson Over Hot Coals

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2 (UPI) — H. R. Gross, R., 14, who has been there since he was a child, is starting off the new year with some unkind words about President Johnson.

Gross said in a statement yesterday that he had "already had it shown that he takes out of both sides of his mouth" and is "well-educated in the art of political science."

He added that Johnson, noted for his one-man-stands against proposals of the previous administration, reached the boiling point again yesterday in his role as the "tough old hillbilly."

He said that Johnson had demonstrated "tough and ruthless arm-twisting and ruffians" if ever a need arose for him to give "situation credit" guarantees for wheat sales to Russia.

Gross was among backers of an amendment to prohibit use of the national defense funds for the commodity sales. Johnson finally got congress to allow such guarantees if the President considered them in the national interest.

## Canada Installs First Shipment Of Missiles

NORTH BAY, Ont., Jan. 2 (UPI) — Canada opened its first year by installing its first shipment of nuclear missiles at the Canadian Forces' "Washheads" for North American defense.



## Trade Stamps Dumped by Gas Stations

BALTIMORE CITY, Jan. 2 (UPI)—About 200 service stations in the Baltimore City area stopped giving trading stamps to customers Wednesday.

"The move was necessitated to cut down the high costs of operation," said Mel Larsen, chairman of the stamp committee of the Utah Retail Petroleum Association.

"For station operators, it is a matter of cutting down expenses or going under," Larsen said.

"For the consumer, it costs between \$300 and \$400 a month to buy stamps."

Larsen said the 200 stations represent about 75 per cent of the present retail outlets in the metropolitan area.

## Russ Ignores Britain's Parley Plan

LONDON, Jan. 2 (UPI)—Russia has failed to answer a joint statement of British and American foreign ministers, who took on the foreign-ministers-level authoritative sources said today.

Early last month, in a message to Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko, Foreign Secretary R. A. Butler suggested they meet in Geneva when the 17 nation disarmament conference resumes Jan. 15.

But the sources said that so far there has not been even an indirect response from the Kremlin.

The British reminder was contained in a new year's message from Prime Minister Sir Alec Douglas-Hume to Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev yesterday.

Replying to a good will cable from Khrushchev, Douglas-Hume pointedly expressed the hope that Britain would "take further steps to build confidence and strengthen peace." He also added that he hoped for "the broadening of contacts between our two peoples" in 1964.

Russia's prolonged silence on the British approach for a Gromyko-Butler meeting has set off diplomatic alarm bells that the Kremlin may be fencing.

Originally Britain proposed to raise the level of the Geneva disarmament conference to a summit level, but appears expecting a chance for new initiatives toward easing East-West tensions.

Douglas-Hume made an announcement to that effect in parliament, which subsequently was retracted by his spokesman. But since then the prime minister has said that the British would like to have Geneva sometime.

The British retraction followed notification from Washington that U.S. Secretary of State Robert McNamara planned to go to Geneva for a meeting of foreign ministers. Ruskin confirmed this in Paris last month.

But American officials have indicated that Washington has no objections to a possible meeting between Gromyko and Butler so long as the USSR would merely probe communists' intentions and not demand the West as a spokesman for the allies.

## Tarry Goo Disappearing From Ocean

HUNTINGTON BEACH, Calif., Jan. 2 (UPI)—A mile-long sheet of tarry goo which floated for two days off the Southern California coast threatening to gulf up beaches, was reported Wednesday to be dissipating.

A coast guard pilot said after a morning flight over the ocean a thin floating layer of oil film broke up overnight and hardly a trace could be seen.

Forty thousand gallons of oil slicks of various thicknesses were floated to the surface and concealed. Tuesday it formed a blanket seven miles long, three-quarters of a mile wide and two inches thick.

Authorities feared the wind might blow it onto mainland bathing beaches or onto the scenic shore of Catalina Island.

The coast guard said it is possible fragments of the stuff may remain before any serious damage is done.

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## New Rush of East Berlin Visits Eyed

BERLIN, Jan. 2 (UPI)—A new rush of West Berliners crossing the border to East Berlin for more days remaining on the agreement allowing visits to East Berlin.





## Fish Season

### To Be Set in Jan. 29 Meet

BOISE, Jan. 2—The Idaho fish and game commission will meet in Boise Saturday to discuss the 20th annual state quarterly auction to establish opening dates for certain game hunting seasons for 1964, and to consider other business which may come up, it was announced today.

New fishing regulations for this year already have been set, and those will be adopted, and these are effective for the full calendar year for the first time. Previously, fishing regulations ran from April 1 through Sept. 30.

A commission regulation adopted in the fall of 1963 stipulates that big game openings shall be established at least once a year. It is expected that opening dates will be similar to those of last year. Details other than opening dates will be determined by the commission as in previous years.

The commission will hold a public hearing between the hours of 1:30 p.m. and 3 p.m. Jan. 29 at the state office building in Boise to receive testimony and consider evidence with respect to opening dates of the hunting season, and for related matters, which should be brought up at that time.

## Kankkonen Is First in Ski Jumping

GARMISCH-PARTENKIRCHEN, Germany, Jan. 2 (UPI)—Velko Kankkonen, Finland, came from behind to win the gold medal in the New Year's ski jump, second event in a four-part pre-Olympic competition.

Eino Kankkonen, Duluth, Minn., was third in the field of 79 of the world's finest jumpers and John Ballantyne of Minneapolis was 15th. John Bower of Auburn, Maine, was 4th; Harry Coyer of Toledo, Ohio, 5th; and Lyle Sweeny of Webster, Vt., was 82nd; and Dave Hicks of Duluth was 86th.

The competition will continue at Innsbruck, Austria, "After" in the week and conclude at Baden-Baden, Germany, on Monday.

The four events start at Kankkonen, Jan. 2.

Kankkonen leaped 218 feet, 10½ inches and 282-2 and gained 227.5 points. Nils Ballantyne, of Toledo, was 2nd with 227-1 and 227-2 and 273-11½ and 218.3 points, while Josef Przybylo of Poland placed third with 277-3 and 265-1 and 218 points.

His points were based on form as well as distance.

Kankkonen jumped 270-8 on each of his attempts and totaled 10,217 points. Ballantyne had leaps of 232, 211 and 290-10.




