Makarios Wants To Abolish Linking Treaties

NICOSIA, Cyprus, Jan. 2 (AP)—British mediator Duncan Sandys made repeated calls on President Archbishop Makarios of Cyprus today in the wake of Makarios' announcement of the 1960 treaties linking Cyprus with Britain, Greece and Turkey. In Athens, the Greek cabinet met on the continuing crisis in this island nation and asked for an extraordinary and immediate meeting of the Atlantic alliance council in Paris. The feuding parties on Cyprus are Greek-speaking Cypriots and Turkish-speaking Cypriots. Members of the Atlantic alliance, as is Britain, London's Foreign Minister Sir Alec Douglas-Home summoned the British cabinet for an extraordinary session Friday just after he had received a report from Sandys on his return from Nicosia.

The diplomatic maneuvering continued, a cease-fire continued in Nicosia for the fourth day without renewed fighting. Charging Turkey with "aggressive actions" in the communal strife in Cyprus, Makarios announced Wednesday night he would seek to dissolve agreements under which Britain, Greece and Turkey guarantee Cyprus' sovereignty. The treaties with all three powers must be abrogated to get rid of the agreement with Turkey and to continue the work of the government. He made plans the Turkish government is the object of their ire. The action came amid fresh bloodshed on the 12th day since Turkey invaded the island. 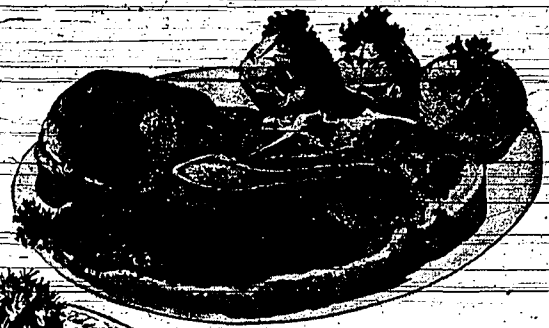

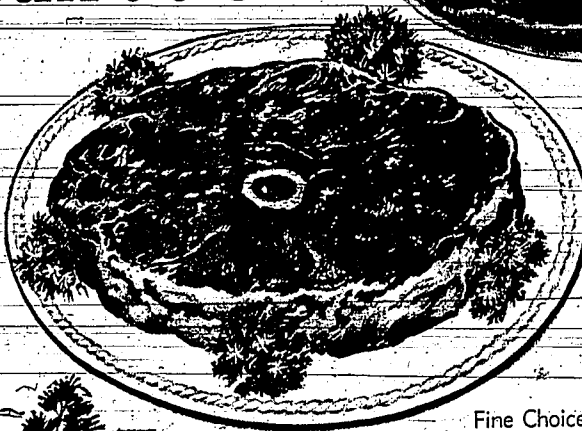

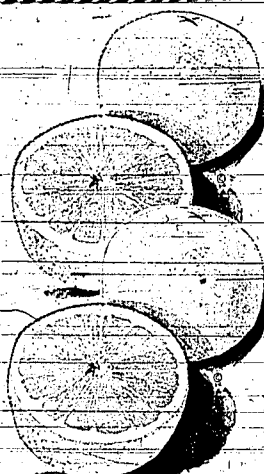

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—Because unemployment is still the nation's biggest economic problem, the \$1.5 billion dollar vocational education bill would come out to be the most important of the bills passed by the 88th congress.

"Admittedly, this is a long job. After all, congress passed four education bills in the last four years of more than a billion dollars each," says a committee member. "But the bill passed by the 88th congress is a landmark. It is the first time that federal education research as well as vocational training is included in the bill. The vocational program will give employment the full quota of the program in 1936."

TRAINED MEN-SEARCH.—Before passage of the vocational bill, the federal government was spending only \$10 million a year for vocational education. It will now spend an average of \$200 million a year. The program that will give new urgency, and new status to a neglected field.

This makes sense, industry's most urgent need is for skilled labor—plumbers, electricians and the like. The bill provides for advertisements seeking a total of 6,112 skilled workers. Many employers are offering vocational training in their factories at a rate of 700,000 a year—a figure which approximates the number of unemployed 14-to-19-year-olds who dropped out of school.

WAGES SUBSTANTIAL.—These young men of vocational training are getting good wages. Doctors or lawyers or architects. That is a fact of the 80 per cent of the nation's school population. Education is the key to a better life. Vocational education. Yet few of them have any training in vocational fields. A butcher can earn \$100 a month and a mechanic \$100 a month. A body man in an auto repair plant can command \$100 a month after he knows his trade. Surely, the boys and girls to learn those trades is in school.

Not only now, however, the nation has all but ignored this need. During 1934, the American taxpayer spent \$1.5 billion for vocational education. Federal taxation to support the country's public schools. But of the \$1.5 billion spent on secondary education, only \$100 million went for vocational training.

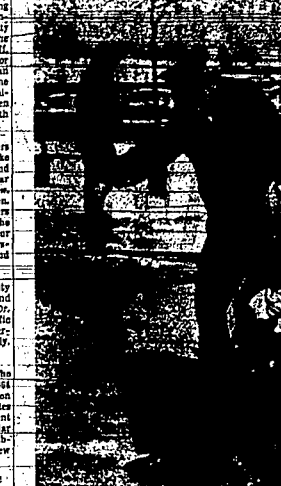

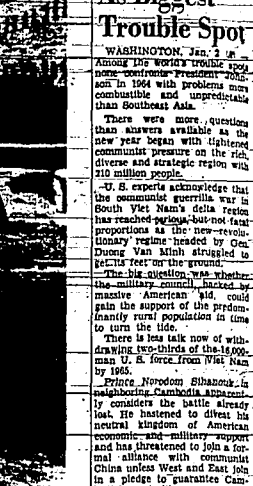

A coast guard pilot said after a morning inspection flight that the floating layer of fuel oil broke up overnight and hardly a trace could be seen.

Forty thousand gallons of thick oil floated from an undersea tanker in the machine in the area and coalesced Tuesday. It formed a blanket seven miles long, three-quarters of a mile wide and two inches thick.

Hoover Says Reds Exploit U.S. Youth

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2 (AP)—FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover said Wednesday reported a plot by the American Communist party toward the left among the nation's youth.

In his year-end report to Allen Dulles, the nation's largest foreign intelligence agency, Gen. Robert F. Kennedy told the FBI that the party is exploiting the youth plan approved by Gus Hall, general secretary of the Communist party, USA.

"In October," Hoover said, "Communist party delegates met in Chicago, Ill., to lay the groundwork for a new national youth organization aimed at exploiting what the party describes as a drift toward the left among young people."

Hoover said Hall stipulated that the youth movement "abundantly exploit the exploits of the left among young people."

Harvey Oswald, the accused assassin, has been completed by the FBI in the hands of Chief Justice Earl Warren, head of the President's commission probing the assassination.

While the FBI arrested 12,000 persons—78 more than in 1962—Hoover was disturbed by a 10 per cent annual increase in bank thefts of the average 123 robberies, burglaries and "larcenies" of banks each month, many are committed by "amateurs."

FBI officials attribute the increase and "difficulties in apprehending" to growth of suburban bank branches and the lack of a criminal record for a "one-time offender."

"As far as money is concerned, the FBI hasn't had any difficulty," Hoover said, "in the investigation of all phases of the assassination of President Kennedy."

"Pills, savings and interest increased to more than 210 million dollars," Hoover said, "a figure exceeding the total amount of funds spent to operate the FBI during 1962."

Part of the funds were used to pay Frank Sinatra to pay the ransom demanded for his 18-year-old son. Three more accused in the California kidnaping were also caught by the FBI.

When another master-builder killed—this time in Mississippi during civil rights violence—the FBI moved in fast. Byron de la Beechth was arrested by agents who turned over to local authorities who charged him with slaying of Medgar Evers, NAACP field secretary. Evers, 39, was buried in Arlington National Cemetery.

Hoover praised the unsung FBI disaster guard charged with the duty of identifying bodies.
