### Idaho National Guardsmen Get Special License Plates

If you are driving along a highway and see a car with white license plates, you may be wondering which has the letters "ING" before the numbers. It does not mean it is from another state. It's an Idaho car, and it may be from your home town.

For the first time in Idaho, special license plates have been made for a branch of the armed forces. Automobiles with the license plates which have the prefix "ING" on them are members of the Idaho army national guard. The license plates that have "ING" on them are for Idaho air national guard.

The national guard is the only branch of the armed forces which has special license plates for its members.

The special plates are the same color as the regular Idaho license plates, and have the words "IDaho" across the top of the plate and "national guard" across the bottom.

### Power Group Okays Gas Rate Case

**WASHINGTON**, Jan. 15—The federal power commission approved Wednesday a settlement of a natural gas rate case which would provide a 24-month moratorium on higher rates in the Pacific Northwest division of El Paso Natural Gas company, except for two customers.

Under the settlement, El Paso will continue its present rates in the Northwest division at least until Nov. 1, 1965, unless rates of its suppliers are increased by a net of more than \$20,000.

The division supplies gas to utility customers in Colorado, Idaho, Oregon, Washington and Wyoming.

The two exempt utilities, one each in Utah and Colorado, are served under a special rate schedule.

The case involved a rate increase application in 1957 by Pacific Northwest Pipeline corporation, which was merged into El Paso in 1958. The \$20 million dollar increase went into effect, subject to refund, in February, 1958.

### Snake River Storage Shift Eyed

**CHEYENNE**, Jan. 15—Representatives of state and federal agencies met Wednesday in Cheyenne to discuss possibilities of replacing a part of the Jackson lake storage capacity with storage at some other site on the Snake River system.

Dave Crandall of the bureau of reclamation office in Boise said a study is being made by the bureau with the cooperation of federal and state agencies to determine what can be done to avoid extreme drawdown of Jackson lake such as occurred in 1957.

Crandall said in normal years of runoff it is possible to hold Jackson lake levels at a point which allows recreational use of the active capacity of the reservoir.

But he said in the years of drought it is necessary to withdraw the Jackson storage to meet the irrigation water requirements of more than one million acres downstream. He said when levels are drawn down, the recreation users and aesthetic values are severely impaired.

The purpose of the discussion was to exchange data relating to the fish and wildlife, recreation, forest impact and other multiple-use uses for replacement storage.

### Johnson Plans 'Some Kind of Cabinet Contest'

**Haroldsen Is Speaker for BPW Confab**

HAILEY, Jan. 16—Earl Haroldsen, Twin Falls, manager of Idaho Power's southern division, was guest speaker at the Sun Valley Women's club meeting Monday evening at the Inchausti dining room.

Haroldsen told his audience that Hailey, San Francisco and New York city were the first three communities to have electricity. He said the 10-pole generator such as is displayed at the Ketchum-Sun Valley road, is an actual working generator used there to generate electricity in those days.

He told of the growth of Idaho Power company since it was incorporated in 1916. He discussed the increase in kilowatt hours, earnings and costs.

He stated 93 per cent of the shareholders of Idaho Power company stock are individuals and 69 per cent of those stockholders are women.

He said in the beginning and up until 1919, the electric service for the Ketchum-Hailey area was only for eventing. One 10-pole generator was turned on so housewives were lucky enough to have their own electric lights.

The first electric stoves were described as resembling iceboxes, with the electric plates on top of wooden stands.

Lucy Friedman told of her parents purchasing such a stove where E. W. Rainey was manager of the West Coast Power company here. These were known as 100-watt stoves and were the first manufactured.

Haroldsen said he has the original manuscript of the late Sen. E. R. Rockwell, who was manager of the West Coast company for several years and was a pioneer in this community.

**Unemployment Report States Workers Actively Seek Jobs**

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16 (AP)—The typical unemployed American is not a good-for-nothing loafer who would rather live off jobs benefits than hold down a steady job.

This was one of the major conclusions reached Tuesday in a special labor department study. In-depth of nearly 10 million persons who were out-of-work for a month or more in 1961.

The first detailed survey of the "unemployed" ever conducted in the United States indicated that the jobless—as a rule—were less educated than the average worker and more likely to be in less skilled, lower-paying occupations. It also showed that the average amount of unemployment compensation received by these workers in 1961 was about \$275 for 12 per cent of their average annual income of \$2,300. Millions of them had to withstand hard-borrow \$300 or more that year to meet living expenses, the report said.

The department also found: 70 per cent of the 10 million unemployed workers studied, nearly 10 per cent were men and the vast majority were in the prime working years of 20 to 40.

They showed a "relatively strong" attachment to the labor force and were willing to accept lower-paying jobs or shift to a different type of work to get back on a payroll.

Fifty-five per cent were heads of families who were the main support of wives, children or other relatives.

All told, the study said, at least one standard method and 10 per cent used two or more avenues, such as checking with state employment offices, calling on local employers, writing let-
