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Nevada Pilot Wanders on Desert Roads

Water Grab Studied by Commission

Seattle, Jan. 21 (UPI)—Members of the seven-state Columbia River compact commission agreed Monday to study a proposal to block plant to divert water from the Columbia river stream.

In a one-day meeting, the 40-member commission studied a proposal by Los Angeles for diversion of "Snake" river waters near Hagerman to the California city.

Commissioners concluded the diversion would result in the loss of millions of dollars in power revenue as well as a significant amount of irrigation water in the Pacific Northwest.

Legal counsel advised California could not appropriate Idaho water without federal approval, but California could probably obtain the necessary support.

The commission—composed of delegates from Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana, Utah, Nevada and Wyoming—decided the Los Angeles plan presents a threat because it is feasible.

Commissioners decided a spokesman said that the diversion would be detrimental to Northwest interests and can only be blocked by court action.

A compact draft signed Oct. 1, 1952, was nullified last year by all Columbia Basin states except Washington and Oregon.

The commission heard from Ken Billington, executive secretary of the Public-Utilities Districts Association, and also from Clarence Barton of Oregon.

Billington promised FUD support for the compact if more suggestions were met, and Barton urged reconsideration of a detailed compact section establishing criteria for control of floods.

The commission voted to ask Billington and Barton to submit written objections within six weeks for consideration by a commission meeting that will be scheduled on receipt of the objections.

ADA Wants More Medical Care Legislation

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21 (UPI)—Americans for Democratic Action (ADA) thinks that the administration's medicine bill does not go far enough and should be expanded.

Frank P. Langbein, of Baltimore, an ADA spokesman, told the house ways and means committee in prepared testimony that the administration's proposal "makes a real contribution" but does not go far enough to meet the health needs of the aged.

He said that it should be expanded to include the aged in the physician's office and the patient's home, adding that the present bill might limit the use and abuse of hospital beds by requiring hospitalization of patients to obtain care.

Parana River Power Plant Is Planned

BRASILIA, Jan. 21 (UPI)—President Janio Quadros said Monday he and Paraguay's President Stroessner had reached agreement in principle to build the world's largest hydroelectric power plant on the Parana river border.

He said a team of Brazilian technicians would go to Paraguay soon to begin work on details.

Airlift From Panama Is Ended

CHARLESTON, S. C., Jan. 21 (UPI)—An airlift of American dependents from Panama ended Monday with the arrival of 14 dependents, raising to 1,000 the number of dependents here since late Wednesday.

The air force said 29 others depended on a commercial airliner. About 150 dependents were to leave Panama today about the tropical upsurge, probably for Brooklyn, N. Y., and 40 others are to go to New Orleans about the flood.

Goldwater Is Optimistic About Race

NEW YORK, Jan. 21 (UPI)—Barry Goldwater says it "won't be too patently obvious" for him to modify his plucky conservative campaign technique, the New York Times said today.

In a Washington interview with Charles Mohr, Goldwater said, "I have to take my chances that more people will like what I say than not."

The Arizona senator leaves Washington today for a 21-day campaign tour of New Hampshire, where he faces Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York in the Republican presidential primary March 10.

Goldwater told the Times he might have lost the tentative promise of support of 150 to 175 prospective delegates to the Republican National Convention in New York City.

Goldwater said he was quoted as saying he still thinks he is ahead on the race for the GOP nomination and that he will "remain" through primary election victories.

As for the increasing interest in former Vice President Richard M. Nixon as a presidential candidate, Goldwater said, "I have no base to start on. He has no working support."

Asked about the polls showing Nixon running strongly with GOP voters, Goldwater said it might be true Nixon was doing well, "with the man in the street. But this is not true of the man in the party, the precinct worker."

President Suggests Freeze on Missiles

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21 (UPI)—President Johnson today said the Geneva disarmament conference has a five-point program for preventing nuclear war, including "a veritable freeze" on the number and types of strategic nuclear missiles and warheads.

He also proposed East-West agreement to halt production of all nuclear weapons materials.

Johnson offered further discussion means of prohibiting the threat or use of force, directly or indirectly, whether by treaty, coercion, subversion, or the clandestine supply of arms—to change national boundaries or to dis-

place established governments. "It is now," he said, "that the security of the world can be safeguarded within the scope of such an agreement."

Johnson said that "this initial measure preventing the further expansion of the deadly and costly arms race will reopen the path to negotiations in all types of force."

He said it was "in this spirit of early action" that the United States hopes for a halt in production of fissionable materials for weapons use.

"We have started in this direction," Johnson said, "to hope the Soviet Union will do the same—and we are prepared to accept appropriate international verification of the reactor shutdown already scheduled in our country."

Johnson announced a closing of some nuclear reactors in his state of the union message to Congress Jan. 8. He said at that time that he would be advancing new proposals to the disarmament conference.

The President told the 17-nation meeting that there was only one item on the agenda—"It is ahead—and that future generations will mark 1964 as the year the world turned for all time."

Johnson said he had for Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev both had observed that the territorial disputes is not in the interest of any people or country.

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
