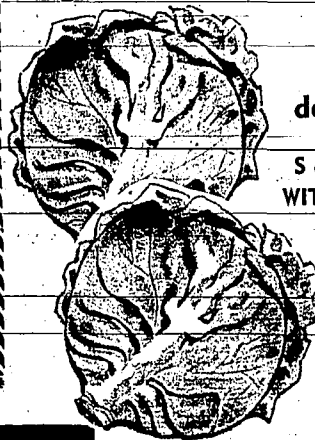

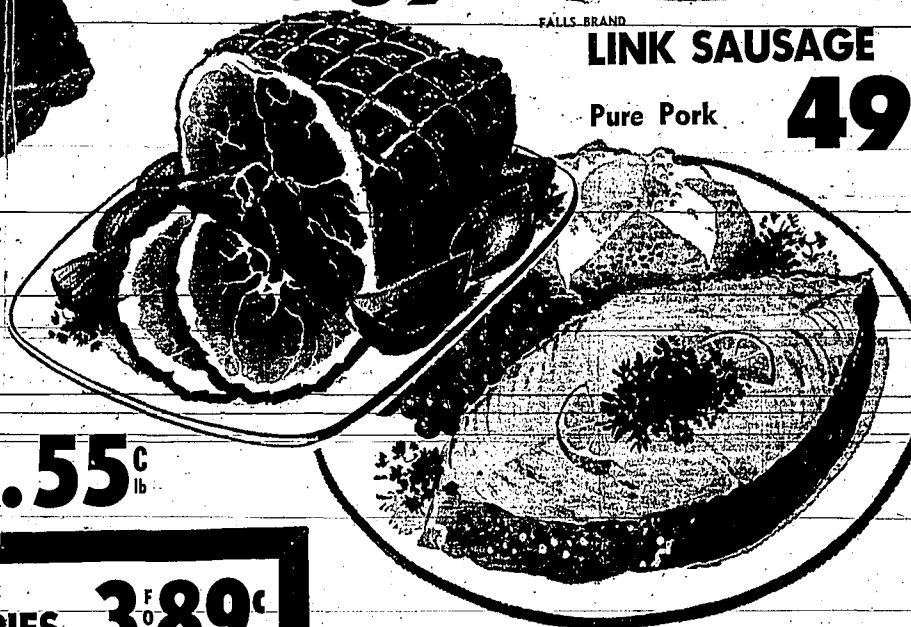

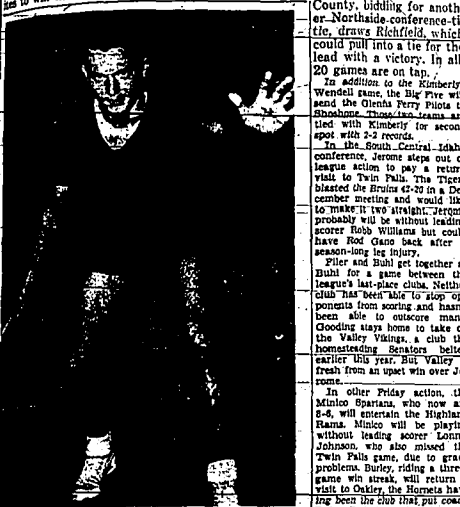

KANSAS CITY, Jan. 30 (AP)—The Kansas City Athletics broke up in a deadlock late Wednesday.

The city rejected Finley's proposal for a two-year lease and Finley turned down the city's request for a four-year lease.

A short time before the meeting started the American League extended from Feb. 1 to Feb. 15 the deadline for signing a lease.

The league turned down Finley's bid to move to Louisville and to sign at Kansas City by Feb. 1, after expiration from the city.

Finley, after taking two proposals by the city under advisement with officials in Oakland, Calif., and asked the league for a meeting to consider a move. The league made no response to this request.

The Athletics owner again said city officials Wednesday he signed for more than two years. It turned down the two new four-year proposals offered by the city.

One was for four years at two years' rent. The other was for four years at \$50,000 a year, with two four-year options that included a sliding scale.

Finley repeatedly declared he would like to stay in Kansas City. "We are ready," he said Wednesday and challenged the city. "Are you ready?"

## Tobacco Area Leaders Eye Smoke Report With Terry

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30 (U)—Tobacco area leaders and congressmen called for a crash program of research to find a way to make cigarette smoking less.

Terry backed the research program and conceded there's much to be learned such as: "I would give a great deal to know whether the type of tobacco used for pipes and cigars has anything to do with the lesser hazards associated with these modes of smoking."

The scene was the crowded hearing room of the House agriculture committee, whose chairman, Rep. Harold D. Cooley, D., To a man, the governors and N. C. comes from a state that

produces 70 per cent of the nation's export tobacco.

Gov. Terry Sanford, N. C., told the tobacco sub-committee, "I do not suggest that we should close our eyes and protect the industry regardless of the human cost."

"Health is more valuable than any industry," he said.

But Sanford, as did other tobacco states, said the \$-billion-a-year industry directly and indirectly provides employment for 17 million Americans.

Before the committee are several resolutions calling for top priority research to make smoking safer. Cooley has spoken of spending \$ million dollars.

## Economic Pinch Is Making Panama Squirm

PANAMA, Jan. 30 (U)—The economic pinch from the Canal Zone tightened today, Panama's government, facing dwindling revenue, put itself on an austere budget.

The once lush tourist business is dead for the present. This is a blow to the purses of businessmen and the government treasury alike.

The collapse of diplomatic relations with Washington, leading to fear among businessmen of U.S. economic reprisals, is another blow to the economy.

The austerity program, announced by President Roberto Chiari, means no pay increase to

some government employees as well as the most essential projects.

Chiari recently warned of the dangers of a recession and urged Panamanians to work harder to make the economy less dependent on revenue from the U.S. Canal Zone.

Directly and indirectly, the

Canal Zone poured \$2 million dollars into Panama's economy in 1963. This is important to a small nation with a government debt of \$93 million dollars. At least \$ million of which is in foreign loans.

The economy began to wobble as soon as violence broke out Jan. 12 in what began as a dispute between U.S. and Panamanian students over raising U.S. and Panamanian flags at an American school in the Canal Zone.

Luxury hotels are nearly empty. Taxi fleets catering to tourists find no customers. Panamanians on cruise ships no longer set off to buy in Panama's shops.

Business is so bad employees at

some of the luxury hotels reportedly took pay cuts.

Many business and financial figures fear the U.S. government will be pressured into suspending aid programs if Panama does not agree to negotiate a new canal treaty.

The U.S. aid program was suspended for a time because U.S. personnel withdrew for safety from Panama to the Canal Zone.

But Washington decided to go ahead with its current \$3 million-a-year aid program.

There also are U.S. loan agreements totaling \$13 million.

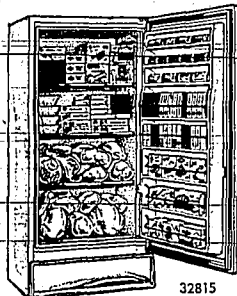
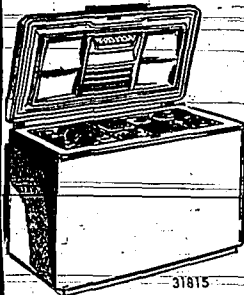

## Power Struggle Shaping up Within Ranks of Idaho's Republican Party

By RICHARD CHARNOCK  
DOISE, Jan. 30 CPA—A power struggle intensified by the race for the GOP presidential nomination is rapidly shaping up in Idaho's Republican party.

Some 100 leaders expressed concern that the battle, which is turning an old schism between the conservatives and moderates, may seriously damage the party.

Although the Gem state generally is considered in GOP circles to be "Goldwater country," there are enough influential moderates in Idaho to possibly win an uncommitted delegation to the national convention next July.

Gov. Robert E. Smylie, for instance, already is on record urging the state's Republican as-

sembly last June to send an anti-communist delegation to San Francisco. State Chairman John McDermury also is steering clear of picking one candidate over the others.

Spuyten long has been an admirer of New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller and, in early 1964, was considered a potential running mate if Rockefeller got the nomination that year.

Now, with the rise of Rockefeller's star and uncertainty on the political horizon, the glow of error is reported taking a downward look at Pennsylvania Gov. William Scranton - the much less vocal aide who has been seen as a possible compromise possibility between Rockefeller and Scranton.

There are some who say the geographical gap between Spuyten and Scranton could be helpful in

the Idaho governor's own political ambitions.

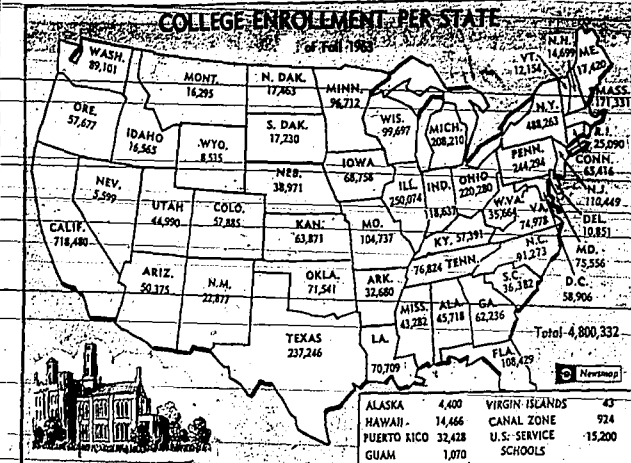

The search will lead to a better understanding of all snake venoms and means to combat their deadly effects.
