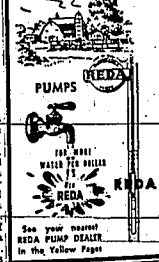

U.S. Chief Uses Soft Farm Touch

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31 — President Johnson used a soft approach in his budget message to tell congress that the American agricultural production plan is too big, but without a doubt he put across his point.

At the present time, our farms are able to produce all we need for domestic use and all we can reasonably expect to sell abroad with substantially less land and manpower than are now being used," Johnson said. "As a result, we have crop surpluses, inadequate farm income, underemployed rural people and improper land use."

A wide range of government programs—ranging from the grain and wheat programs, rural area development, and the more constructive use of surplus production at home and in food for aid. Nevertheless, we need further efforts to help the farm economy adjust to the rapidly changing economic and technological environment and to help the nation take advantage of its remarkably productive agricultural resources."

At another point, the President said "while too large a part of our productive resources is still devoted to agriculture, we have derived important advantages from the resulting excess farm production by using our agricultural commodities to raise the level of living of low-income people in our nation and to provide needed food assistance to people of other nations."

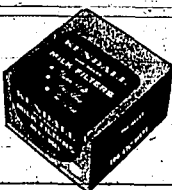

Soviet Agriculture Production Falls Below Rosy Heights Predicted in '59

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31 — An agriculture department study shows that Soviet farm production has fallen sharply below the rosy heights predicted when the communists seven year plan went into effect in 1959.

Production in the USSR during 1963 fell sharply below that of 1962 and even below the 1959 base period from which the Russians claimed to predict agricultural production turnover per capita output of the United States.

Russia had an extremely good crop year in 1962. There was a good growing season, production was high. Soviet officials themselves announced the average 1962-63 plan. Agricultural growth was to be 10 percent a year through 1965.

But something happened. With the 1963-64 crop year, production in 1960-61 dropped to 97. In 1961-62 it was 100. In 1962-63 it was again 100, but in 1963-64 it dropped to 96.

The decline in farm output last year would have been more severe had it not been for disastrous slaying of livestock and the subsequent production of more meat than usual, and a record cotton harvest. Thus, five years after the start of the seven year plan, not only has the Soviet goal not been approached, but farm production is at a lower level than when the plan began.

Soviet officials announced in Moscow last week that more than 50 million head of livestock had been slaughtered in 1963 because

there was not enough livestock feed supplies. The slaughtered animals included, by the Soviet count, 1.6 million head of cattle and 23.3 million head of hogs. The Moscow report called the slaughter a selective culling of herds. U.S. officials scoffed at the explanation.

The agriculture department noted that in 1963 the Soviet Union turned from exports of grain to imports of grain. It was a wheat and other grain to heavy imports of wheat.

The department said the immediate causes of the 1963 failure in production and supplies were a dry fall, a severe winter in 1963 at about 60 million hectares. This is close to the estimate made by the U.S. agriculture department.

Other important crops that registered shortages in 1963 included potatoes, sugar beets, and sunflower seeds.

The department said the bright spot in Soviet agriculture was in cotton production. Moscow reported that by the end of November, 1963, more than five million metric tons of unstained, ginned cotton, had been delivered to the government. The department said that if this report is correct, this is by far the largest Soviet crop ever harvested.

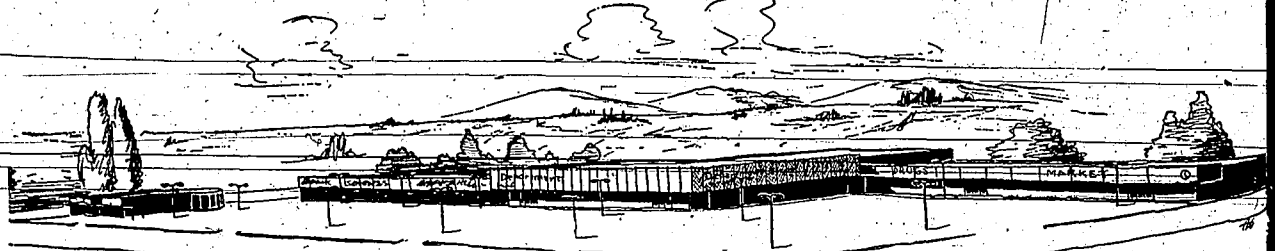

Clyde Urges Passage of Wilderness Bill

AN FRANCISCO, Jan. 31 (AP)—Gov. D. Clyde, Utah, today urged passage of the wilderness bill now pending in the Senate.

In a speech to the National Industrial Conservation conference, Clyde said, "Our objective must be to use all of these resources for the maximum good and for the maximum possible use."

Clyde said he wasn't against preserving areas of natural wilderness—"as long as we keep the program in perspective."

"Most of the scenic and recreational values," he said, "can be preserved under a program of multiple use that does not preclude the orderly development of the land."

"The same forest area, for example, can provide excellent recreation for a watershed, allow extraction of underground minerals without harmful surface erosion, and at the same time, provide a reasonable amount of grazing, offer abundant recreational opportunities, and so on."

Clyde said many early proposals for wilderness legislation were objectionable for a variety of reasons. But "each succeeding proposal," he said, "has been an improvement on the predecessor and the current Senate bill is essentially good legislation."
