PARIS, Feb. 1 (UPI)—President Charles de Gaulle will not change his stand on neutralizing Southeast Asia despite Johnson's rejection of the proposal and will seek quick support from communist nations on the plan, informed diplomatic sources said.

Democrats Pick Boise For Meeting

Walker said he would not support the Boise site if the Democrats did not pick it.

The parties will nominate all congressional candidates this year during a revised primary law for the first time.

Also setting the convention were Twin Falls and the Butte County area.

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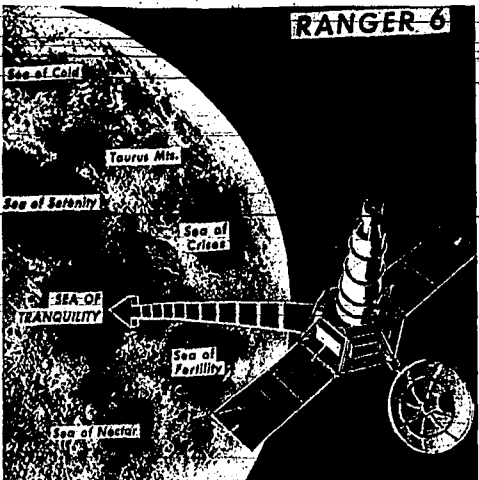

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1 (UPI)—President Johnson flatly disputed today French President Charles de Gaulle's proposal to neutralize Southeast Asia. He said that as long as the communists continue their aggression the idea would not be in the interest of the region.

Johnson told a news conference that a neutralization suggestion thus applied only to South Viet Nam and not to the whole of that area of the world.

Under present circumstances, the President said, "I don't agree with de Gaulle's proposal. I do not think that it would be in the interest of freedom to share his view."

He went on to say that as long as the Viet Cong communist guerrillas continued their raids and sought to expand South Viet Nam, the United States would continue to support the South Viet Nam government.

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U.S. Ranger Rocket Zeroes in on Moon

PASADENA, Calif., Feb. 1 (UPI)—America's Ranger VI spacecraft zeroed in on its moon target today with such precision that scientists canceled a maneuver that would have angled the television camera toward the lunar surface.

The camera-angling maneuver was canceled only hours before a predicted blip-aye hit on the moon's sunlit face, scheduled for 1:24 a.m. PST Sunday. Highly confident scientists said they expected the probe to succeed.

Albert G. Young, president of the United States Steel Corp., said the probe would be the first of a series of lunar exploration and to spell-out of the greatest accuracy feats of the space age.

They said a battery of six television cameras, which will take the first close-up pictures of the moon, would get the desired results on the spacecraft's present "on target" course.

"There is no sense in taking an unnecessary risk with another maneuver when everything is going so well and we can still achieve our objective," said Dr. William H. Tucker, chief of the spacecraft's mission.

The canceled maneuver, called "lunar descent," would have angled the probe from Earth about an hour before the spacecraft's impact on the moon to aim the cameras.

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Bonneville Rapped by T.F. Chamber

The Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce passed a resolution Friday afternoon condemning the Bonneville power administration for coming into southern Idaho.

The resolution further resolved that this board of directors urge revocation of the order, issued by the secretary of the interior, extending Bonneville power authority and service into southern Idaho.

The directors of the chamber of commerce of the United States are urged to discourage the further expansion of federal enterprise by refusing to provide funding for the proposed transmission line for Bonneville power into southern Idaho.

Idea Unfolds Into Annual Tradition for Style Show

Pink hair, oil paintings, homemade cake and old phonograph records all played a part in turning an idea into a tradition. The basic plan was a fashion show, and sometimes Dame Fashion was lost in the shuffle, but she finally emerged triumphantly and successfully.

So it goes again this year, as the St. Edward's Parents club plans the annual "Artists and Models" fashion show slated for 8 p.m. Thursday in St. Edward's school auditorium. This annual event is in its fifth year.

It began in November, 1959, when the Catholic Women's League, in need of funds, decided to sponsor a fashion show. Mrs. Rudy Assmunder and Mrs. George Bever were appointed co-chairmen and knew if they were to be successful they would have to come up with a new approach.

They pondered — and gradually a plan took form. They would ask the Art Guild of Magic Valley to make the auditorium into a kind of art gallery, and they would call it "Artists and Models." Two shows in one, an art show and fashion show.

The artists liked the idea and agreed to bring a variety of pictures to display — as it turned out the display exceeded \$6,000.

There were some pretty tough obstacles to hurdle the first year. For one thing, they had very little money for table decorations, and that's where the old phonograph records came in. Mrs. Donald Zuck spent hours cooking old 78 rpm records in her oven. If you place a record on some kind of container, coffee can, pan or bowl, and put it in a slow oven, gradually the record will soften and drape over the container — no two will be exactly alike.

In fact, Mrs. Zuck cooked up quite a few records before finding the ones that draped best. Unfortunately, record manufacturers do not all use the same formula, some would fall apart when heated, some would just sag, and some would drip, but finally she got 40 that looked good.

She then busily gathered all the weeds in Magic Valley, selected the best, spray-painted them in pastel colors, sprayed the draped records gold, arranged the pastel weeds in the records and they were beautiful. In fact, there were so many compliments they sold them all after the show.

A big picture frame was built, and when the models appeared, they stepped into the frame, paused a moment to make a pretty picture, and then stepped from the frame and out through the audience. It was very effective and had in nicely with the theme.

The group since has acquired a ramp about three feet high that extends far out into the auditorium.

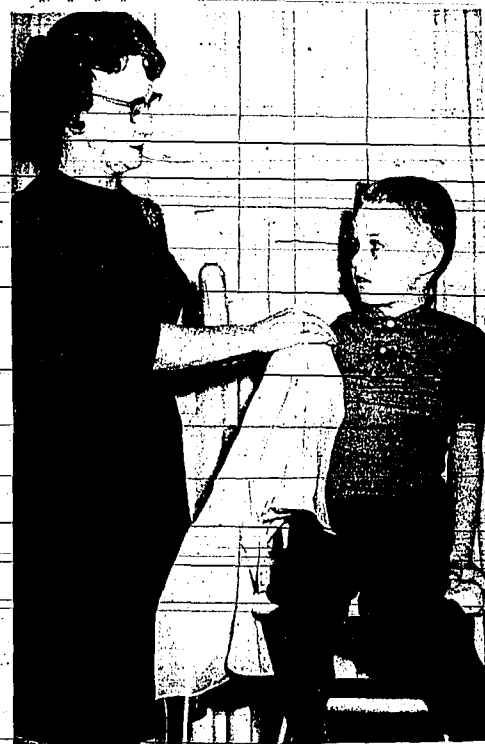

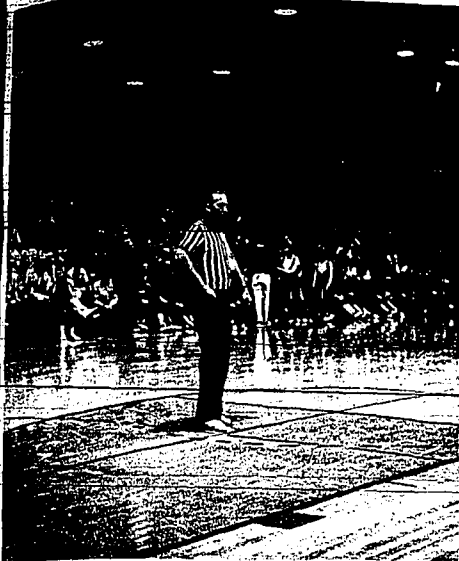

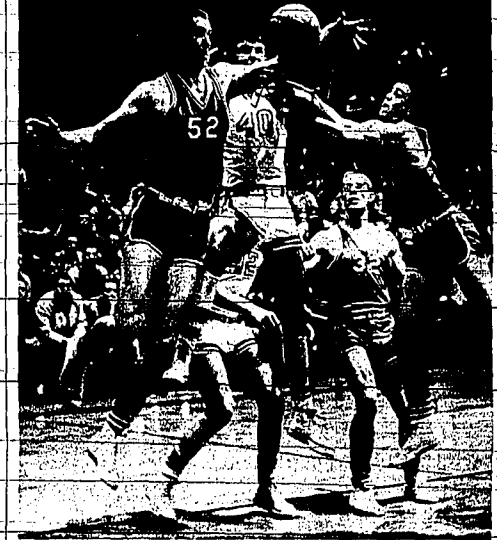

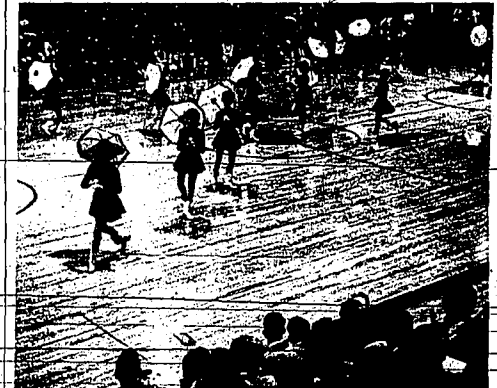

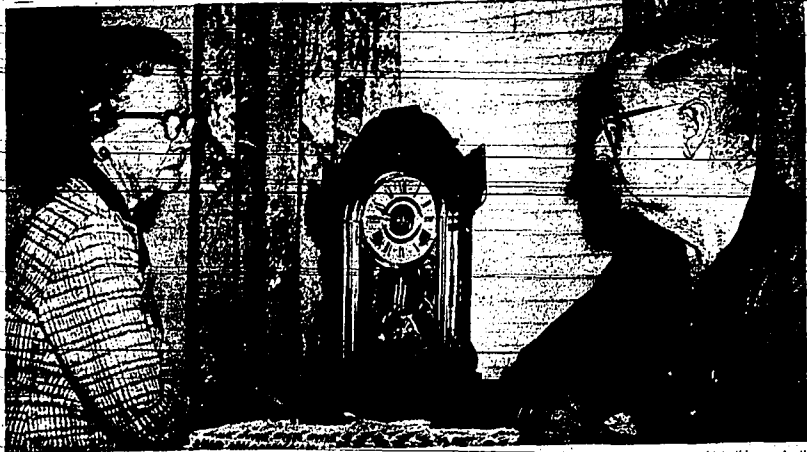

Undercover Agent Heads Institution

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1 (U) — You'd expect the new head of the famous Smithsonian Institution to be a distinguished scholar. It is. But you would expect him to be a sometime secret agent, or, at least, a professor who could play with the world's great scientific treasures. This man of many parts is Dr. Sidney Dillon Ripley, 46, who is the 11th-year-old Smithsonian, an institution that ranks at the top in Washington's attractions for tourists and dignitaries alike. Ripley moved into his post Saturday, coming from Yale where he was director of the Peabody Museum of Natural History, combining administrative work with his pursuit of ornithology. It was at the Peabody, in connection with the exhibition of some treasures from the tomb of King Tutankhamen—4000-b.c. belly-dancing episodes took place. Dr. Ripley thought a program of appropriate music at the exhibition would go well. He had a professor who could play authentic Egyptian folk music. Ripley agrees. It wasn't until the shyly young woman started her writhings before 180 trustees and honored guests that it dawned on Ripley that Egypt's authentic folk dances were the belly-dances. "It was a distinct shock to me," he says. "Actually, though it was rather striking, she went over like a house afire." Ripley played the role of a secret agent—as a civilian with the office of strategic services in World War II. In one of his last undercover missions, Ripley remembers, he wound up parachuting into a field of mine in Thailand. The story is published story that he jumped from the plane in full gear. Ripley was born in New York City Sept. 20, 1917, and at the age of 13 was sent to the family home in Thailand. He developed a strong feeling for Asia and its people, and in time became a leading authority on birds of the Far East. After graduating from Yale in 1938, he sailed on the first of many trips which took him throughout Southeast Asia. He received a Ph.D. degree from Harvard just before getting into the OSS. In the OSS, part of his work was training men for undercover jobs in enemy territory known to him because of his present career.

After 82 Years, Mantle Clock Still Ticks Away in Residence of Pioneer

William B. Clark's father and mother got a clock for a wedding present in 1882. That was in Iowa. The clock still ticks away today on the mantle of the Clark home at the corner of Fifth and Spruce streets. The clock is now the Mantle Valley at the same time. The elder William B. Clark came to Shoshone from Emmet, Iowa, in 1882. He was 21 years old and immediately notified his wife to sell the home in Iowa and bring the family west. The father met the family when the train arrived at Shoshone. The Clark family was a four-horse team-pulled wagon. Leaving Shoshone they drove to Shoshone Falls where they had lunch in the hotel which was located there at that time, but which later burned down. They drove on to the town of Rock Creek that night and camped out. It was an interesting night. W. B. Clark recalls that as a youngster he remembers sleep about the citizens of Rock Creek were "whooping it up" for the reason and the mother, father, a brother and sister, as well as his wife, got little sleep. With the dawn they moved on and spent the next night about where the present town of Rock Creek stands. "The next day, about noon, they arrived at Shoshone, where the elder Clark was bringing the family for a fresh start in a fresh country. With them on the pumpie ride from Shoshone to the ranch—trip which took more than a day and a half, with two overnight camps—came the mantle clock. At the ranch it was found that the clock refused to run, but when Clark fired that and it has ticked away ever since. "We wind it every Sunday. It runs all week that way and keeps perfect time," Clark says. Of the arrests, 4,276 resulted in convictions and two in acquittals. Miscellaneous fines totaled \$22,701.70; drunken driving fines, \$1,866.50; and radar fines, \$10,791.71. Jail terms totaled 144 years, seven months and 509 days. Prosecution was declined on 183 citations, with 62 statutory dismissals noted. Patrolmen compiled 558,705 miles with expenses of \$21,091.20 reported for credit cards, which included fuel and lubrication, and \$1,860.29 for repairs, for a total of \$22,951.55. Some 34,706 hours were logged, including 10,978 hours patrolling, 1,202 hours investigating accidents, 351 hours making accident reports, 783 hours in court, 107 on escort duty, 223 hours making safety talks, 184 hours doing motor vehicle inspections, 464 hours working radar, 94 hours serving executions and 10,863 hours miscellaneous duty. Loan Project Outlined at Glens Ferry

Glens Ferry, Feb. 1

Clude Mafinger, Boise, vice-chairman of the bureau of reclamation, was guest speaker at a public meeting held at the Glens Ferry city hall by the board members of the King Hill Irrigation district Wednesday evening to acquaint the water users of the necessity of the proposed small project loan.

The Rock chairman of the board of directors, stated board members have been working closely with the bureau of reclamation to provide a means of improving the Snake river alluvial silt problem, Glens Ferry siphon, Basin siphon, King Hill siphon and part of lateral can, which is a branch of the King Hill siphon.

The proposed loan would be used to replace the wood siphons with concrete and steel, thus cutting maintenance cost.

Rock added.

Mafinger stated that under the small-reclamation-project act the King Hill Irrigation district is eligible for the loan to be used to rehabilitate and improve its irrigation system on the same basis as other irrigation districts in the west.

The loan of \$600,000 for the proposed contract, if approved by the land owners, would be a 30-year loan, 5% per cent interest.

Payments to the government would begin the eighth year, upon completion of the project. During this time the district would build up a reserve fund for other needed replacement work, Mafinger added.

Second Neighborhood Rink Puts Local Couple in Class of Hobby Experts

WANT TO KNOW how to build an outdoor skating rink? Ask Mrs. and Mr. Donald Lambert, 197 Moreland avenue, who are old hands at the task and who, for the last two years, have had the most popular neighborhood rink in town.

It is run like a business—all proper, and such—but it's all free to the youngsters thereabouts. The Lamberts give the skaters, for instance, free soup (and no one ever says they are free) and free drinks. Most are dispensed in white cups bearing the name of the youngsters to whom it is assigned. Each youngster gets the soup by the spoonful.

One rule infraction and a warning is given. Second warning turns the skater off the rink for the balance of the day. If he has a change of heart he can come back the following day.

The Lamberts have learned a lot about rinks—and kids—since they got the rink idea.

For instance, they discovered that their house was actually on a hill although the ground looked level to the naked eye. Result: parts of the rink are shallow and parts more than 18 inches deep.

Flooding the area does not make a skating rink. The owners should know, because the rink in question offers about 7,000 square feet of skating space and 6,000 cubic feet of ice.

Rinks—this type, at least—are made by the spray method. Water, in thin streams, comes through a common hose and common nozzle and into the air, where it takes application after application. One layer must freeze

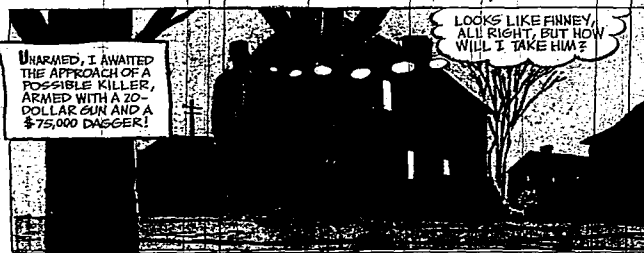
