UAW to Drive For Fringe Improvement

DETROIT, Feb. 3—The United Auto Workers' annual convention is going to drive hard for improved fringe benefits, particularly pensions, in its participation in the UAW.

The UAW is having no doubt that fringe improvement will be the main goal, even if the union's annual convention is to pass a resolution to "work for" it.

UAW President Walter P. Reuther said he will not ask Congress to pass a law that would result in a wage increase, but he would like to see the industry's most lucrative fringe benefits increased and fringe rates cut.

Motor company reported that fringe benefits as a percentage of total cost of production are about 10 percent, while the UAW's demand is for 15 percent.

General Motors sold employee insurance cost 175 million dollars in 1952; supplemental unemployment benefits cost 43 million, and pension cost 42 million.

Prize figure breakdowns for 1952 are not available from the UAW. The bureau of labor statistics reports the hourly straight-time pay of auto workers averaged \$1.10.

Bonneville Slams Idaho Power

IDAHO FALLS, Feb. 3 (AP)—The Bonneville Administration's southern Idaho manager labels as false Idaho Power company assertions that a BPA transmission line will mean less tax money for Idaho schools.

Parachutist Lives After Long Plunge

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Feb. 3 (AP)—Parachutist Fred Hastings, 29, Louisville, was in serious condition today after he plunged 5,500 feet to the ground at Seymour, Ind.

Hastings, making his first jump with the Kentucky Parachute Association, landed feet-first in a soft, wet field Sunday.

James Truitt, another jumper who was watching from the ground, said Hastings was saved from death when his reserve parachute blossomed briefly.

"He said Hastings was to fall free for about 20 seconds before pulling his parachute cord at about 3,000 feet. Hastings was falling feet down and a spread-eagle position when the cord was pulled. The parachute failed to open properly."

Truitt said Hastings was jerked up and pulled the cord on a safety parachute. The second chute became entangled in the first one until near the end of the plunge.

Jordan Asks Park Road Be Opened

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3 (AP)—Sen. Len B. Jordan, R-Ida., has written the department of interior with the backing of five other Republican senators, urging year-around opening of U.S. highway 20 through Yellowstone park.

He said the park service should reconsider a decision describing it as infeasible to keep the route open in the winter and conduct hearings on the idea.

"An east-west highway through Yellowstone park would bring large scale economic benefits to states bordering on the park and to businessmen who serve travelers all along highway 20," Jordan wrote Secretary of the Interior Stewart Udall.

"Yellowstone national park is a winter fairland of beauty which would attract many visitors and satisfy a large part of the demand for winter recreational activities."

Other signers of the letter were Sen. Bourke Hickenlooper and Jack B. Miller of Iowa, Republican; and Carl T. Curtis of Nebraska and Millard E. Ewing of Wyoming.

"All of the senators of the respective states were given an opportunity to sign," said Jordan.

Slacks-Pushers Skirts-Tops

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WASHINGTON, Feb. 23 (AP)—The Atomic Energy Commission is pushing studies this year on developing a giant nuclear power plant that could produce more fuel than it uses and might someday pump water over mountains in the southern California desert.

The commission has asked congress for \$3 million dollars in the next budget to continue research on the 500,000-kilowatt plant—larger than any nuclear power plant now in the United States.

The commission's "fast-track" concept proposed by Vice Adm. Hyman Rickover, often called the father of the nuclear submarine.

An AEC spokesman stressed

that the studies have been under way for more than a year and there is no indication at this time when proposals from industry might be asked on building the reactor.

And as for California's interest in a design—way of fitting great quantities of water from northern into southern California, "that is just in a discussion stage," the spokesman said, adding:

"We are telling them (the California department of water, electric and gas) that we are working on our development work and they are telling us their position."

A small 60,000-kilowatt advanced-reactor is already

being successfully operated for the AEC by the Duquesne Light company at Shippingport, Pa.

It takes its name from a central core of solid enriched uranium, surrounded by a blanket of natural uranium.

Under normal conditions only 7 of one per cent of natural uranium is fissionable. But, the spokesman explained, it is converted into plutonium in the reactor by the fission that takes place in the core.

This makes the remainder of the natural uranium eventually usable in producing heat energy for the power plant. The spokesman said:

"This concept has the potential

for producing more fuel than is consumed," he said.

In the proposed 500,000-KW reactor the AEC believes an even more efficient production of power could be achieved by using a core of uranium 233 and a blanket of thorium—enriched uranium is uranium 235.

The thorium is considered more efficient as a fuel.

The 500,000-KW plant, if built, would be larger than any nuclear plants now in the United States, but others of that size have been proposed by private utilities.

Boise-Cascade Officer Picks Betterment, Not 'Biggerment'

BOISE CITY, Feb. 23 (AP)—"We're interested in betterment, not just biggerment," said V. Hangerberg, the dynamic president of Boise-Cascade Corporation whose sales have increased six times since he took over in 1952.

"In other words," he told investors and stock brokers at a meeting here last week, "we don't expand just for the sake of expansion."

"We do it to make our company better."

But bigger the company certainly is and better, too, by most standards of measurement. When he took over the company, it was a small, local firm. Now it is a major producer of the first nine months were \$1.45 a share.

Final 1963 earnings were not available.

Boise Cascade spent about \$10 million dollars on research in 1963. One research product, in cooperation with the University of Idaho was a soil conditioner made from previously useless material.

Hangerberg said his company was now looking not only for expansion in the South and East, but also in the West.

It went to Guatemala as the first step last year, operating a paper mill for a local firm there.

"We're exploring Spain, Italy, Pakistan, Japan and the Philippines," he said, and explaining that there were nations on the "fringe" of the European Common Market.

Hangerberg said the pulp and paper industry is in the process of an enormous expansion with supermarkets becoming popular.

"These nations," he said, "can't wait for a local firm there. They want to wait 10 years. They make some very attractive offers. Our American know-how, such as this something that is good for international relations, good for them and good for us."

Boise Cascade stock is sold over the counter and has increased in value six times from \$6 a share in 1954 to about \$36 now.

Common stock increased from \$200,000 to 4,000,000 shares.

The number of shareholders has increased from 308 to 6,000.

Hangerberg was asked by the stock brokers if his company planned to list its stock on the New York stock exchange, and he said he didn't feel the company was quite ready for that, although it met all the requirements.

He was also asked about a recent article in a weekly news magazine (Time) where it was suggested he was bringing in a young man to his young executives (this 166 top men average 40 years in age).

Hangerberg said he had men from all areas and schools. Last year he hired 40 and only five of them were from Harvard.

Hangerberg himself is a graduate of the Harvard business school, but he is a Washington, Minn. product and got his mechanical engineering degree from the University of Minnesota.

Negro Makes Threat to Burn Himself

CHARLOTTE, N.C., Feb. 23 (AP)—A Negro minister has threatened to burn himself Easter Sunday as a sacrifice to the civil rights movement if all-color-brothers are not dropped in this university town.

The Rev. H. "Elihu" Cox, 32, North Carolina field secretary for the Congress of Racial Equality, made the threat at a rally Sunday, and encouraged other Negroes to do the same.

"If I thought it would do any good," he said, "I would come to Chapel Hill, talk to town leaders and University of North Carolina officials. That, I think, I would burn myself."

It is believed that Cox's threat is to embarrass officials in the Negro Movement camp in this country, he said.

Water Right Legislation Is Needed

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23 (AP)—At a time in Idaho's history there has been greater need for legislation to clarify conflicting laws involved in state water rights, Sen. Jordan B. Judd said today.

Jordan said the senate-subcommittee on irrigation and reclamation has scheduled hearings March 10 and 11 on a bill to clarify the relationship between the United States and the states in the use of the waters of certain streams.

Similar legislation in the past has failed, Jordan said, because of lack of a broad base of support from "the grassroots groups who felt the bill did not, in their opinion, go far enough to limit federal authority."

"I think such an attitude was mistaken," Jordan said. "We might have been better off today if support had been forthcoming."

He said the senate bill, of which he is co-sponsor, does not "do all that some sponsors want but does all that we sponsors believe can be implemented in this congress under any circumstances."

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3 (U)—The two top Republican leaders in congress have asserted they have no intention of agreeing to President Johnson's suggestion for a political truce.

Sen. Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois and House Speaker Charles A. McNichols of Indiana spoke out Sunday, a day after Johnson told a news conference it was in the country's interest "to keep fire from mingling and petty politics and getting into any political battles."

"Believe me there is no going to be a political truce," said Dirksen. "That would be a phenomenon that is unheard of in the history of this country."

McNichols, referring to polls that show Johnson garnering 75 per cent of the vote in this against potential GOP opponents, said he was that far ahead, he'd want a political truce, too.

Feighan could not be reached.

No one would say exactly why the subcommittee questioned the granting of a visa to Burton, but it was understood the members wanted more information about the state department's "moral criteria when admitting aliens to the United States."

The congressional source said he personally doubted that the subcommittee had plans to proceed any further with the investigation and that it might end with today's hearing.

"If that's the reason my shop was destroyed," White said, "I think it's lowdown. I consider my business what I charge for a haircut and I plan to keep it that way."

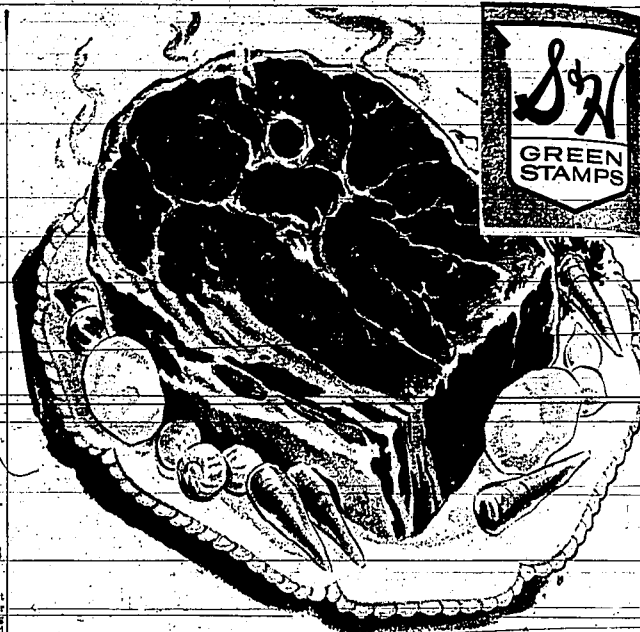
