They filed suit for trespass on grounds Ward then claimed they cultivated land, causing considerable damage. Ward claimed the Trunettis had built a fence which encroached on his land. The unanimous opinion upheld a district court judgment of \$200 in damages to the Trunettis, barring Ward from their land. The high court also ruled that the Trunettis owned the disputed property.
