## Anti-U.S. Violence Hits Cyprus

NICOSIA, Cyprus, Feb. 5 (P)—An emergency airlift began today the hundreds of American women and children from this Mediterranean trouble spot today as anti-American violence continued on Cyprus. Terrorists bombed the American embassy in Nicosia Tuesday night, slightly injuring a marine guard, then set ablaze two cars owned by U.S. government employees. U.S. Ambassador Fraser Wilkins ordered a "voluntary" evacuation of American dependents to Beirut, Lebanon, explaining he no longer had confidence in the ability of Greek Cypriot police to keep order.

Archbishop Makarios, the Greek Cypriot president, inspected damage to the embassy and denounced the bombing as the work of "heinous criminals."

The terrorism appeared designed to destabilize Greek Cypriot opposition to an American-British plan to assign a United Nations peace force to enforce the truce between the warring Greek and Turkish communities.

Makarios, in effect, rejected such a force Tuesday by demanding that the United States and Britain "pay such a condition as is acceptable because it would give the Soviet Union a chance to interfere."

The United States took up its peacekeeping role on Cyprus at the request of Britain, which has been unable to work out a solution to prevent revival of the communal violence in its former colony.

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# Giant Strides

Recent successes in the U.S. satellite program emphasize the progress that has been made. It seems almost incredible that the first satellite, launched in 1958, was a mere 100 miles from Earth. Now, after six years ago, although the Russians achieved that first orbit, the U.S. wasn't far behind. Satellite and missile launchings are so common and take it takes something extraordinary to gain attention.

The U.S. had two launchings in short order that attracted plenty of attention. The first of the two ventures was the launching of a satellite in 1958, which was the heaviest satellite launched to orbit. It was a mammoth project, with the entire rocket weighing 662 tons at takeoff and the resulting satellite weighing 37,700 pounds.

Within hours, Ranger VI blasted off on a historic trip to the moon. It wasn't the first time a rocket from the U.S. hit the moon, but the pinpoint accuracy demonstrated further U.S. progress.

Scientists were always back close to the moon and in this respect the U.S. program is far behind the Russians, who reported photos of the dark side of the moon on Sept. 13, 1960. Just before the failure and success just falls of a Mars probe while the U.S. probe of Venus was successful.

It's the over-all progress that is so impressive. If Russia continues progress continues and the last six years, the world may be on the verge of entering a space age that might rival some of the wildest dreams. Perhaps artists will have to write their efforts to keep ahead of reality.

# WORKING FOR UNCLE

The nation's salary taxpayers are all in a tizzy over these days. Everyone is working full time for Uncle Sam and will be for some weeks yet. In the interest of perpetuating the taxpayer, the government obliging taxpayer to work for Uncle Sam, or else no one can deny the internal revenue service insists on taking its slice off the top 30 before the taxpayer can spend any of his earnings, he has to pay his share. For taxpayers who are working these days on their income tax returns for last year have an easy way to figure out just how long they worked for the U.S. treasury last year. When the individual taxpayer's salary arrives at the total of his income tax for last year, it's a simple matter to tell how many weeks or months of working was necessary to pay taxes.

Although the withholding tax might take a little time to pay, it's a lot better than the tax for those who are not. It's easy to see where the money goes.
