NICOSIA, Cyprus, Feb. 12 (AP)—Undersecretary of State George Ball and British envoy Cyril Pickett called on President Makarios today to present the latest U.S.-British proposal to land an international peace-keeping force on Cyprus. Ball hurried to the meeting shortly after he arrived from Turkey on his flying peace mission. The conference took place as fighting between Greek and Turkish communists flared anew in the south, coastal city of Larnaca, 38 miles southwest of Nicosia. At least one Greek Cypriot policeman was killed, a police spokesman said.

"It means that we are wasting huge sums on politically oriented programs which are designed to help one special interest group or another. Invariably many are helped who don't need help, and

To Hazard, a flight to the moon is a distinct possibility. Earlier, it must have been a lot of others too, for the put "Fap" to work designing equipment that might be used by a lunar expedition once it reached, and landed on the moon.

To many, the equipment seemed entirely impossible. To Hazard, it had an attraction. So it sent its photographers out to see what the equipment looked like, had it photographed, and printed it on the cover of one of its lunas.

Hazard has designed, known other things, a moon suit and a spacemobile, a carriage type affair that can be used as a means of locomotion.

A graduate of the University of New Mexico, he has been honored with a masters degree as well as a B.S. in mechanical engineering. Since then, "Fap" has spent 17 years in specific studies of missile flight tests, propulsion, lunar operations and analysis.

He is here to relate what may happen when an expedition may take off for the moon. He's dead serious about it, and those who hear him in his address, "How Will We Live on the Moon?" may soon be doing more than raising eyebrows when it is mentioned again that we may be going to the moon.

Hazard is a competent, experienced engineer in the space field, has worked on lunar exploration, been senior development engineer at jet propulsion laboratory, has served as project engineer for the Sergeant weapon system, gas turbine generator set and is an author and



T. F. Adventurer Tells of Killing Nine-Foot Tiger During India Hunt

By KENNETH AMOS

Edward Pedersen, Jr., a Twin Falls big game hunter, last November did what most adventure-loving men only dream about. He and his father, Edward Pedersen, Sr., Salt Lake City, went into the teak forests of India to hunt the dangerous Indian tiger.

The hunt itself was scheduled for Nov. 15 to Dec. 1, but after receiving some 25 vaccinations, which were required before leaving the country, they were able to leave the U.S. Nov. 4.

They flew by jetliner from the United States to Japan, where they spent a few days; then on to Hong Kong for another few days, and finally to their destination, the heart of India.

Pedersen said the reason they decided on a tiger hunt was because tigers are one of the hardest animals to kill.

He said, "The tiger is a night hunter which makes it difficult because of the extra equipment you must have available to you, such as lighting. Also, the animals have keen eyesight and sensitive hearing."

Pedersen pointed out he had been on other big game hunts, including huns in Alaska, but this was his most difficult hunt because they hunted steadily 20 hours out of the day.

He said he thought the tiger is the most dangerous animal in the world because he will turn on you, ready to fight at all times, whether he is wounded or not.

Tigers average around 450 pounds, which is about 200 pounds more than a lion, Pedersen noted. He said the tiger he shot was nine feet from his head to his tail. He also shot a leopard seven feet long; a sambar, which is like a large elk; a gazelle, an Asian antelope; a four-horned deer and a wild boar.

"Tigers are hunted during the day," Pedersen said. "Native

hunters drive the tigers in a funnel-shaped pattern with the hunter stationed at the bottom of the funnel.

"To be certain the tigers are moving toward the hunter, native hunters are sent ahead of the hunters to distract the animals so they will move toward the narrow part of the funnel pattern."

"The hunt usually takes place in tall, thick grass, and if you see the tiger at all, it is just for a split second. You must hit the beast in the shoulder or the back, because if a tiger is only wounded, he becomes a man-killer."

Pedersen said, "Since I used my tiger late at night, a different method of hunting was used. The natives find an area a tiger has inhabited. Here they tie down two or three male calves."

"The calves must be male due to the native superstitions concerning the use of female calves for bait. A lookout is posted, and when the tiger returns and makes the kill, the report is given. The hunter and a helper then go to the site, bury the kill, and wait on a platform for the tiger to return."

He said, "When my tiger returned, we had to be very quiet. You cannot cough, breathe hard or even move, because the tiger can hear the rubbing of your clothes."

Pedersen said when his tiger returned, it sensed someone was near and paced back and forth for some time, investigating the area. He said the tiger at one time went under the platform and was close enough he could hear it breathing.

"Finally, deciding nothing was amiss, the tiger returned to the platform. Pedersen said, 'While waiting, the tiger would crack the bones so loud the noise could be heard for a block.'

I raised my gun, a .375 caliber rifle, flipped on the spotlight and made my kill. I used 300 grain bullets and a four-power

scope." Pedersen said you have about 10 seconds after the spotlight goes on in which to shoot. The leopard also was bagged by this same method at about 8 a.m.

Pedersen pointed out, "During my stay in India, I learned some of the customs and way of life. To us, Americans, it seemed pitiful the way the natives have to live."

He said all water has to be boiled three times before it is fit to drink.

"The natives are clean—they bathe every day—just they live in crude two-room shacks, one room to live in and the other for their livestock."

"The Indians are so proud of their crops they have a member of the family on station at all times to frighten away the animals. They always have on hand a year's supply of grain so they won't be faced with starvation."

En route home, the Pedersens visited New Delhi and the Taj Mahal, Calcutta, Bombay, London, New York and back to Idaho.

Pedersen said in a year they are going back to hunt game they didn't get this year. Both want to bag an Indian buffalo and a sloth bear.

23 States Get Mineral Lease Money

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12 (AP)—Twenty-three states this week are receiving federal money for mineral leases on the last half of 1963.

Secretary of the Interior Earl A. Tamm said the money during the last six months of the year from bonuses, royalties, and rentals from mineral leases totaled \$50,641,241.

Under the law, all the proceeds from mineral leases are split between the federal government and the state in which the land is located. The federal share is 50 percent of such receipts.

The reclamation fund received nearly 243 million dollars for the last six months of the year. The treasury general fund received a little over 3 million dollars, or 10 percent of the total.

The distribution of the July-Dec. 31 share ended a year's period of receipts for the federal share of receipts for the last six months, and had previously received \$3,028,866 for the last half of 1963.

Wyoming topped the list, getting 37 percent, or \$18,732,119 for the last six months, and \$7,633,870 for the first six months of the year.

The shares of the other 22 states for the last six months of the year included:

California: \$1,111,250; Colorado: \$1,029,200; Idaho: \$700,000; Montana: \$610,700; Nevada: \$529,000; Oregon: \$470,000; Utah: \$1,501,000; and Washington: \$201,000.

Mrs. Charles Allen Lauded At Civic Symphony Concert

Del Slaughter, conductor of technical mastery of the instrument, the Twin Falls Civic Symphony, is to be commended for his programming of the final concert of the season. This concert, which featured Mrs. Charles Allen as organ soloist, was presented Tuesday evening at the O'Casey Junior high school auditorium.

Each member of the orchestra deserves thanks for the time and effort which was expended in the hours of rehearsal necessary to perform a concert of such diversity. The program included music from Bach through Schubert to contemporary works.

A salvo of "brava's" is due Mrs. Allen for her brilliant execution of the virtuosic passages in Handel's "Concerto No. 2 for Organ and Orchestra." Her exacting

sense of style, combined with technical mastery of the instrument, made the concerto the high point of the program. There was very good balance between organ and orchestra in the concerto.

Unfortunately, the orchestra somewhat overpowered it in the first section of the program, Bach's "Sheep May Safely Graze." The phrasing by the string section in the Bach merits special mention for its sensitivity.

Mozart's music requires a certain sense of style which is not always easy to achieve. During the performance of his "Symphony No. 40 in G Minor" some of the subtleties of Mozartian style came through quite well in certain passages. This was especially true in the early part of the second movement and some

of the woodwind phrases of the third movement, as well as in parts of the final movement.

The familiar "Valse Triste" by Schubert moved very well and displayed excellent ensemble work in the violin section. "Perpetual Motion" by J. Strauss, Jr., had a delightful interplay between flute and bassoon. The strongly rhythmic "La Campanella" by Liszt, was very successful.

The precise rhythm of the ballet music from Schubert's "Rondeau" was well maintained, but its romantic mood was not too evident. "Russian Soldier's Dance" by Reinhold Glier, another ballet composition, was performed with full awareness of the mood to be created. It was exciting and vibrant in its intensity.

As an encore, the orchestra presented "Bells of the Ball."

For stage plays, lecturers or speakers, musical concerts or solos, graduation ceremonies or pageants, the auditorium should have a deep stage with special equipment, convenient dressing rooms, and backstage facilities for dramatic training; permanent seating and an over-all design to enhance visibility and "perfect" acoustics.

Twin Falls has a long claim to be the most exciting example of civic and entrepreneurial leadership in Idaho today. What started in 1959 as a small volunteer group of citizens interested in the economic growth and cultural development of the area and surrounding area has now become an organized push with such momentum that nothing less than complete auditorium facilities and a stronger economy in prospect. Community leadership has been strengthened and is here to stay, but it must share the spotlight with a growing spirit of determination throughout the community to satisfy not only present needs, but to tackle future developments without fear of undue problems. The past five days has seen the community activity that has become the trademark—of the 60-member Executive

"Sales" committee in recent weeks. Many executives have reported that subscription sales on their list are greater than at any previous time in the campaign. Some members of the committee anticipated unprecedented "boom" reports and throughout the city there is an atmosphere of unbridled confidence among citizens over future cultural, industrial and agricultural developments within the community. The eleventh tri-weekly report Wednesday of the campaign teams spells out the significant progress being made in the subscription signing by most of the community's major business firms and individuals.
