

Fighting Flares Hot In Cyprus Port Community

SYDNEY, Cyprus, Feb. 13 (AP)—Heavy fighting broke a cease-fire in the southern port of Limassol as Greek and Turkish Cypriots swung makeshift armor into a five-hour battle against the Turkish quarter. Then the American and British diplomats pursued talks with the aim of landing an international peace force on this troubled island. An Associated Press correspondent said he saw five Turkish dead in a Turkish Cypriot area of Limassol overrun in the battle. He said the total number of deaths is not yet determined. Only officials granted access to the surrounded quarter. Greek Cypriots said they lost one dead and several wounded. A British military source said Greek Cypriots used armored bulldozers, an old tank and homemade armored cars. The original cease-fire was established Wednesday night. British troops moved in as a last resort to try to separate the combatants and were themselves fired on. 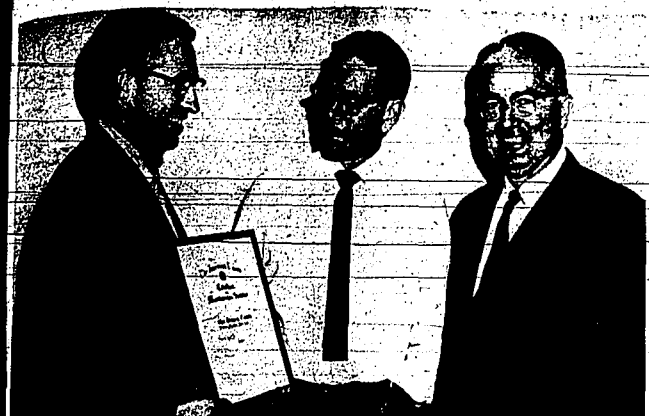

Japan's Left Wing Casts Eye to China

TWIN FALLS, Feb. 13 — Japan's left wing and some businessmen are applying the pressure on the government to follow the example of France and recognize Red China.
Prime Minister Hayato Ikeda is a close friend of the United States and has refused to be stampeded into abandoning his policy of non-recognition. But he shows signs of wavering on some points.
In debate with the Socialists and Communists in parliament yesterday, Ikeda conceded that a new situation would arise should Red China be seated in the United Nations this fall as the sole representative of the Chinese people.
If that happens, Foreign Minister Masayoshi Ohira told Socialist Chikao Nomura, Japan will "normalize" its diplomatic relations with the mainland. He did not use the word recognition, however. This position leaves the government-room-to-manuever over the issue reaches the decision-making stage.
Ikeda said Japan has yet to determine what policy to follow toward the question of seating Red China in the United Nations. This appeared to be a report from declarations that Japan and the United States would maintain closely with the view of leaving off Red Chinese only.
Americans here and in Washington are reported to be reconciled to the likelihood that Japan cannot long resist if the dam breaks on the current recognition, but other states resist from France's move.
Efforts are reported for closer ties with Peking has come from firms that believe a considerable expansion of trade between the two countries is possible.

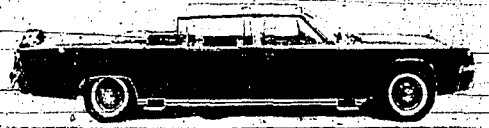

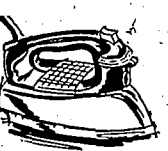

"One lady reported that when she told the men she wanted to have a relative, who had been in the business, present to hear the story, they left without making an appointment to return."

Although the calls are perfectly legal when made in response to a card sent in by the householder, the door-to-door canvassing is in violation of a city ordinance.

"In similar instances in the past, these crews have charged about one-third more than local contractors for the same quality of material, so the chamber urges people who may be considering a purchase of this kind to check prices with a local firm before making any commitment," Orange said.

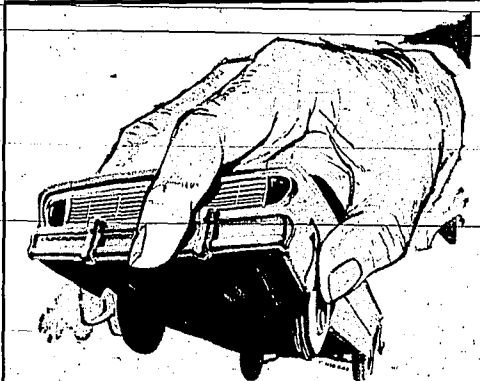

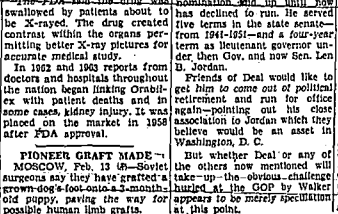

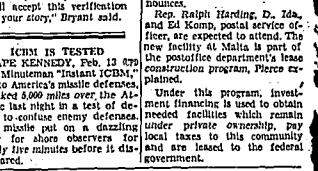

Attorney at Hailey Talks About Rights

HAILEY, Feb. 13 — The chief growing threat to American democracy by the passing of state and individual rights to the federal government was stressed by V. K. Jeppson, Blaine county prosecuting attorney, at the Sun Valley Business and Professional Women's club meeting Monday night at the Star cafe.

Introduced by Mrs. Lloyd E. Smith, program chairman, the attorney spoke on the civil liberties bill passed by the house of representatives this week. He pointed out many well-meaning but harmful provisions which have unwittingly helped the cause of communism in the U. S. by their actions.

He mentioned as examples a brief in a recent grazing permit hearing, a notice of hearing on several "use it or lose it" permits for small airports throughout the west, of which the Hailey airport is one.

A representative of each airport could appear in Washington, D. C. and have allotted either five or 10 minutes to present his case for continuance of the airport. Jeppson declared that he would like to see congressmen urging passage of the proposed constitutional amendment to revoke the first amendment to the U. S. constitution allowing prayer and bible reading in schools and at voluntary non-secular events. This would stop suits now pending to eliminate the word "God" from the pledge of allegiance and on coins, it was felt.

Mrs. Fred Pover, club president, read the proposed amendment. New members welcomed were Mrs. M. J. Palmer, business manager of the Blaine County hospital; Nancy Carter, with the Blaine-Lincoln county department of public assistance; and Jo Ann Zimmerman, Sun Valley accounting office.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Feb. 13 — The nation's so-called boom-boom, a "big boom" in Oklahoma City's residential area, is taking the jarring in stride to a point.

Most folks are getting used to the boom, which sound like "thunder." They're coming now eight times a day.

The federal aviation agency reported it received 613 calls during the first week of the tests, which started Feb. 3. Many were complaints, officials said, but most were just from persons who wanted to know what was happening.

The most serious objection came Wednesday when a plumb line, Woodrow W. Bussey, filed suit in federal court seeking to halt the tests.

Bussey, 46, named PAA Administrator Najeb Hailey in the suit filed in behalf of his daughter, Julie. Bussey claims the tests have impaired his daughter's hearing and have interfered with an existing condition in his inner ear.

"A sonic boom that can shake a house can do nothing but harm to the delicate membrane of the human ear," the suit contends. Bussey claims the tests started without his consent, so they are unconstitutional.

U. S. Attorney Andrew Foster said he isn't sure what the government's action will be. He said it is the first such suit to be filed where sonic boom tests have been conducted on an announced schedule.

The tests will continue for six months. The PAA wants to see if the public can adjust to repeated sonic booms, which will be a by-product of supersonic transport flights starting sometime in the 1970's.

2 War Crime Defendants Meet Death

FRANKFURT, Germany, Feb. 13 — Dr. Werner Heyde, facing trial next week as a Nazi war criminal, committed suicide in his cell at a Gestapo prison today.

The state prosecution of the case was announced today.

Wednesday another defendant in the case, Friedrich Tillmann, leaped or fell from the window of a washroom in the eighth floor of an office building in Cologne.

The two were to have gone on trial in Limburg, West Germany, last week.

Heyde, 61, was office chief of what the Nazis called its euthanasia, or patient killing center in Berlin during World War II. Heyde, 61, also was employed at the center. Tillmann became director of the Cologne Criminal asylum after the war.

A third defendant is Dr. Hans Hestermann. Yet another defendant, Gerhard Bohne, disappeared from his home at Dueseldorf last year and is believed to be in Latin America.

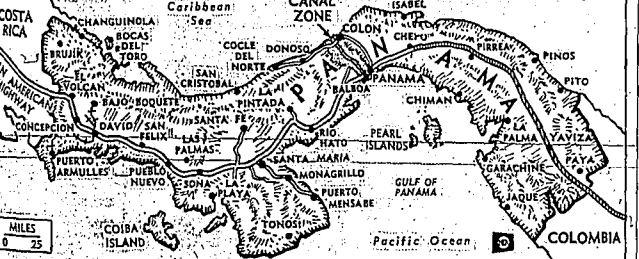

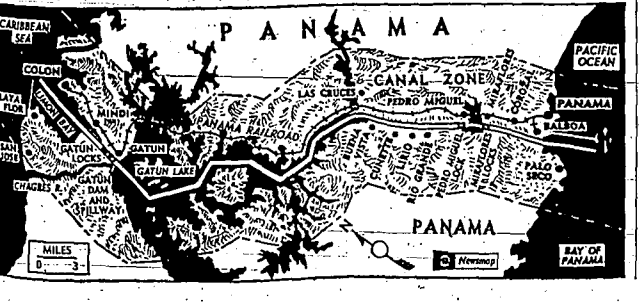

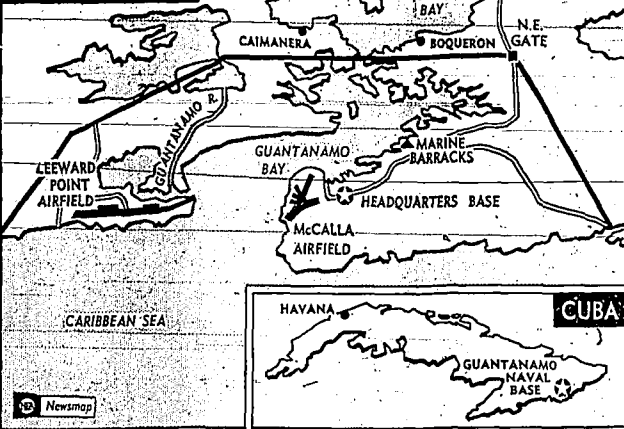

Lincoln Manuscript Gets \$16,000

NEW YORK, Feb. 13 AP—The only known manuscript of Abraham Lincoln's address commemorating the Union army after the battle of Fredericksburg brought the top price Tuesday in a Lincoln's birthday eve sale of historical-manuscripts and letters.

The document, from the collection of the late Philip Ward Jr., was sold for \$16,000 to the Carnegie Book Shop of New York. It was dated Dec. 22, 1862.

It was among 20 historical and literary items sold at public auction at the Park-Herbert galleries for a total price of \$72,150.

The second highest priced item was an archive of more than 100 letters and memoranda revealing little-known facts about the personal and political career of the Empress Carlota of Mexico. It went for \$5,000 to a private collector in New York.

Other high-priced items included:—A letter from George Washington to the vice president of Pennsylvania written in 1788 announcing the British evacuation of Philadelphia. It sold to Philadelphia collector Charles Seafair for \$2,000.

—Parts of a message to the house of representatives by Lincoln in May, 1861, which contains three of Lincoln's signatures, for \$1,100 to Mary Benjamin Cantelero.
