## Saigon Is Still Tense Following Ship Sabotage

SAIGON, Viet Nam, May 4 (AP)—The U. S. destroyer USS K. Swenson arrived in Saigon today for what is expected to be an American show of force following the sinking of the aircraft transport Card in the Saigon river. A spokesman said the Swenson was on a routine patrol. Aboard was Capt. C. C. Hartigan, Jr., commander of the seventh fleet's destroyer squadron. The Swenson tied up within sight of the Card, which has been partially refloated since terrorists tore a 28-foot hole in its side with explosives before dawn Saturday.

## Strike Shakes Republic's Ruling Junta

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic, May 4 (AP)—A threat of a 10-day strike by the Dominican Republic's 10-month-old ruling junta is expected to develop from a report that a group of military and civilian leaders has called for a halt to the government's strike of tax and compulsory labor. Unruly crowds burned tires, smashed bottles and dumped garbage in Santo Domingo today. The government declared the strike illegal, saying it was politically motivated and that the union had failed to give the junta a 24-hour notice of the date of the strike. A government radio broadcast warned the public that a 1963 decree of national emergency still was in effect. It authorized deportation of any person entering the country by sea or air.

## Wilderness Bill Passage Seems Likely

## Snow Survey Shows High Water Content

Water content of snow on Magic Mountain is almost double the average for May, reports the Twin Falls soil conservation district after snow courses were measured for the first day of May. There are 45 inches of snow on the course with water content of 21 inches. Average water content is 18.8 inches for this time of year, reports Myron Dossett, SCS snow surveyor. However, warm weather and rains are needed to promote runoff into the reservoirs, said Dossett. Deadline ridge has 58 inches of snow and 28 inches of water content compared to 18 inches of water for a five-year average. Other stations are Hummingbird Springs 31, 33 and 34.3; Cedar Creek, 13, 15 and 19; Goat Creek, 43, 18 and 18.4; Pole Creek, 13, 25.1 and 21.1; Pole Creek Meadows, 46, 18 and 20.2; Red Point, 47, 10 and 7.9; Wilson Creek 31, 12.5 and 3.3. Dossett reported the snow course at Shoshone basin was under water and was not measured. While Bear Creek Meadows was slightly under last year's reading, it won't affect runoff in Twin Falls county. Most of the snow goes down the Burnside river. Dossett also reported much of the area was bare south of the new course, for example O'Neil basin. Low flows are mostly gone and streams in the most part, are running clear.

## Idaho Districting Case Is Delayed Until Next Year

BOISE, May 4 (AP)—A panel of three federal judges delayed today until after the 1965 session of the Idaho legislature a decision in the state's congressional redistricting case. That means congressional representatives will be elected this November on the basis of the existing districts and the legislature will have a chance to change them in its regular session. The judges, asked to order at-large election of congressmen this year, agreed with the contention of Atty. Gen. Allan G. Shepard and three Democratic officials that a statewide vote would disrupt the election machinery.

## Brown, Hatfield Offer Water Plans

SAN FRANCISCO, May 4 (AP)—The governors of California and Oregon offered separate proposals today for ending the West's historic fight over water. California's Edmund G. Brown called for creation of a western states water commission to guide federal studies looking toward a regional pooling of water resources. At the same time, he pleaded for a settlement of differences between California and Arizona over water rights. Oregon's Mark O. Hatfield indirectly suggested hands-off tapping his state's streams for exports to Southern California and urged Westerners to develop their own program.

## Second Riot In Red Bloc Is Reported

VIENNA, Austria, May 4 (AP)—The day's second riot in three days broke out in Sofia, Bulgaria, as communists youths blocked the path of Bulgarian Orthodox churchgoers en route to Easter mass. In Czechoslovakia, youth group demonstrations during Prague's May Day celebration Friday turned into battles with Czechoslovak police and resulted in 31 announced arrests. The official Czech news agency, CTK, confirmed the disturbances in Prague, but Bulgarian government agencies remained silent about the clashes in Sofia. Reports from the anti-communist bloc of churchgoers had been involved in clashes with both police and communist youths. Entrances to Alexander Nevsky cathedral in Sofia were blocked by youths shouting anti-clerical slogans. Police closed the cathedral doors to prevent incidents, and the fighting ensued.

## Britain and Yemen Fight Is Growing

ADEN, May 4 (AP)—The government of the British protectorate today confirmed reports that the heads of two British soldiers killed in a border skirmish were paraded through the capital of neighboring Yemen. Interior Minister Sheik Hussein Bin Ahman said the report of the shooting and subsequent display in Taiz was correct. He said the guerrillas ambushed a British patrol in mountainous border country Friday. Britain has sent in troop reinforcements and has pulled out its ground-to-air rockets from Cuba, depriving Fidel Castro of the means to blast American planes from the skies over his island. 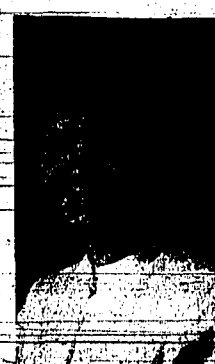

—Nominate candidates for two governors' mansions, four senate seats and 63 house seats.

—Decide other issues ranging from unpledged presidential electors to a right-to-work labor law.

Most of the attention will be on Indiana, where Gov. George C. Wallace of Alabama makes another bid for northern votes in his campaign against the Johnson administration's civil rights bill. He is opposed in the Democratic presidential preference primary by Indiana Gov. Matthew W. Welsh, a stand-in for President Johnson, and three other candidates. The winner can lay claim to 21 first-ballot votes.

On the Republican side Sen. Barry Goldwater, Ariz., is the top choice to top a field of four which includes Sen. Charles McNamara, Calif.; Sen. J. Glenn Phillips, Pa.; and two lesser-known candidates. The winner gets Indiana's 21 first-ballot votes at the Republican national convention.

Delegates to both conventions will be chosen next month.

Also at stake in Indiana are nominations for 11 house seats. Five independent candidates will appear in the primary election, five from the GOP. Sen. C. Bruce is quitting to seek the Republican senate nomination at the state convention next month.

Other key elections Tuesday, Ohio's Rep. Robert Taft, Jr., son of the late Sen. Robert A. Taft.
