Wallace Loses, But Still Stirs Demo Troubles

WASHINGTON, May 6 (AP)—Once again voters have proved how much they like a famous name—and George Wallace, Alabama's states' rights governor, has proved he can stir up problems for Democrats even while losing. Seven widely scattered primaries were held Tuesday in which: Robert Taft, Jr., and Bud Williams scored landslide victories; Astronaut John H. Glenn, Jr., ran well in a race from which he had withdrawn; Sen. Barry Goldwater, Ariz., picked up Indiana's 92 convention votes in his chase after the Republican presidential nomination.

2 Die, 40 Hurt as Tornadoes, Big Storms Lash Midwest Area

A rash of tornadoes and severe thunderstorms struck areas in six Midwestern states Tuesday killing two persons, injuring more than 40 and causing extensive property damage. Heavy rain, hail and tornado winds swept sections of Nebraska, North and South Dakota, Minnesota, Iowa and Kansas.

Industrialist Takes Swing At BPA Rates

BOISE, May 9 (AP)—Idaho industrialist R. Simplot says the government must stop the sale of federally generated power to all the people.

Simplot said the sale of federal power to private utilities, rather than to industry, would solve the problem of "subsidies" to private industry.

The statement was prompted by a Bonneville power administration agreement to deliver power to the Monsanto company's electric furnace elemental phosphorus processing plant at Soda Springs for 23 mills per kilowatt-hour from Utah Power and Light company, for slightly less than five mills.

The contract, Simplot asserted, amounts to a "25 million dollar subsidy." He added that his wet process plant at Soda Springs can now compete with Monsanto.

Simplot said he believes Monsanto "carried out" Bonneville and got the 22 mill rate because it feared the BPA threat should the firm have signed a 20-year contract with Utah power.

Simplot, who serves on the board of directors of the Idaho Power company, said the utility is prepared to take care of the power needs of southern Idaho.

He suggested that power generated at BPA and Tennessee Valley authority dams be sold to private enterprise "where it belongs."

"Private enterprise can build the dams," he said. "Let the government subsidize the costs adjusted to flood control, navigation and other uses. Then let federal and state commissions regulate the price of the power to the consumer."

NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON, May 6—Uncle Sam's relief program for victims of the Good Friday earthquake in Alaska is being set on a three-dollar bill. It has been decided that the 40th state is not as deserving of help as the country of Chile.

The country of Chile, a few years ago, good old Uncle Sam's aid program, gave that country an outright grant of 20 million dollars. Then he took a little more than 100 million dollars of the American taxpayers' money for earthquakes reconstruction at the rate of three-fourths of one percent interest, repayable in 40 years with a moratorium of 10 years on the repayment of principal.

SHODDY DEAL—But businessmen and industrialists in Alaska are being asked to pay Uncle Sam's interest-free loan for small business administration, with a repayment period of only 30 years and a moratorium on principal and interest for the first year, and on principal for the next four years.

This is shoddy dealing with American citizens. Under the law Administrator Eugene Foley of the SBA has the power to charge any interest he wishes, since three per cent is the maximum rate permitted and no minimum is specified. Yet Foley is giving administrative assistance to refuse to lavish on Americans the same generosity they heap upon foreigners.

NATIVES DON'T COUNT—The administration has been slow to the point of sick at what it is doing. Granting that outright grants be made to rebuild the private sector of the Alaskan economy. Yet over the years, the U.S. has made grants of more than 28 billion dollars to 92 foreign countries to develop the industrial and business sectors of those countries. Europe is fat and prosperous today because its economy was rebuilt with the help of nearly 33 billion in U.S. grants, no part of which will be repaid despite the continued existence of the Alaskan natives. The Alaskan handicap is that this amount isn't foreign enough. Through fiscal year 1963, the U.S. lent \$1,626,108,369 to 38 foreign countries on terms of three-fourths of one percent interest, repayable in 40 years with a moratorium of 10 years on the repayment of principal. This, of course, is only a part of the more than 100 billion Uncle Sam has poured into its foreign aid program since World War II.

GIFT OF HARD CASH—These loans are in fact grants because of the financing vagaries involved. For each loan the U.S. makes at three-quarters of one percent, it must borrow money at slightly over four per cent. The 400 million dollar loan represented an outright grant of 75 million.

It is the apology of officials of the foreign aid program that interest rates are lowered to a country's needs. This is okay, but it seems a little incongruous that the three-quarters of one percent rate, using the same tape measure, hundreds of small businessmen in Alaska would qualify for such loans.

This is, indeed, a strange if wondrous country. The lenders are ready at a moment's notice to send bags of money to Bolivia or Togoland whenever those countries stick out their hands. But apparently Alaska has been disqualified on the grounds that it is an American.

President Johnson has signed into law a bill giving Alaska an emergency disaster relief fund of \$0 million, and is seeking another 22.5 million to keep the state and local governments from having to raise 22.5 million less than was allotted to Chile.

Meanwhile, Greening is furious with Sen. Clinton P. Anderson, D. N.M., who heads the special presidential commission on the Alaskan situation. Anderson says that his mission is to attempt to get more relief for the state.

Views of Others

A BUDDING HIGHWAY
 Development plans for highway 30 from Utah through Snake River country are the earnest and constant attention of Bonneville county.

Soda Springs enthusiasts are hounding the highway development program as "the main future route to Yellowstone" and well it may. The route is to go south to Utah and the new Yellowstone highway freeway from Idaho Falls to Ashton, the Upper Snake River valley will become one of the Intermountain area's most scenic highways. Both the Snake and Teton national parks are the pot of gold at the end of this rainbow as well as gateways to Sun Valley, the fabulous Salmon river country, and of course, both wings of the Snake River into the high country.

It has not always been so. Highway 89 from Utah to Jackson Hole has been woeful most of the tourists the past 10 years with the wondrous Tetons and colorful Jackson, Wyo. Both the wretched Jackson Hole and the adjacent Rockefeller interests have applied a most beguiling and dynamic promotion formula for the area.

The budding highway 30 is another wing from Utah, and all compass points south and west to Jackson Hole.

The highway is already paved from Wayan, Idaho, to Soda Springs where it connects with transcontinental highway 30. Part of the road from Wayan to Freedom is already paved and another half mile is under way. Freedom is the northern anchorage point; with highway 89 into Jackson Hole.

The rutted, dust clouded road from Grays Lake to Idaho Falls may be one of the biggest, roughest highways in the West. It is the only road because this link would not only connect with 34, but also transcontinental highway 30 as well for a new avenue to East Idaho. The potential is impressive.

The highway committee of the Idaho Falls Chamber of Commerce has done yeoman duty trying to interest Bonneville county and the state in this highway strike with little success.

The highway has two dividends—not just the new tapping of highway 30 and a new north-south route into the upper valley but a service of considerable value to ranchers along this new spawined road. It may not have top priority now—but here's one to watch and work on.

That was when Soviet Premier Khrushchev put his missiles there. Kennedy backed him down. But Khrushchev's deal with Castro remained. And direct military action against Castro now might mean war with Russia.

Even if Russia didn't intervene, a direct attack by the American giant on the Cuban island — while talking peace to the world — wouldn't make the United States look good anywhere.

The Doctor Says

 When the cause of a disease and effective preventive measures have been known for more than 100 years, it should be as a shock to learn that some millions of people in the United States have this disease. Yet this is the case with trichinosis, an infestation with a microscopic worm. Fortunately, it is so mild in most cases that the victim, if they don't know they have it, is unaware of it.

The worm in a resting stage becomes encysted in the animal's muscles and, when the pork is eaten, the digestive juices dissolve the cyst and the worm becomes active in the intestinal tract. Although they do not harm directly, they leave behind myriads of youngsters (larvae) that penetrate the intestinal wall and are carried in the blood or lymph stream to the muscles of the victim.

There they in turn go into a resting stage but if there are enough of them they set up an inflammatory reaction. This causes the victim to have fever, weakness, headache and sores in the involved muscles. A massive infestation may even cause death or death may be caused by a high concentration of the parasites in the heart. There was a case of this disease but this is a disease that has been used to treat a variety of infestations in animals. It has now been tried on a human subject and the results are the best treatment, however, is prevention and this consists of refusing to eat any pork products that have not been thoroughly cooked. Of course, you should also be careful not to ingest any raw pork products to be infested is condemned.

There are still some persons who have a decided preference for raw pork and even they can protect themselves by storing the meat in a deep freezer at five degrees for 34 hours at five degrees for three weeks.

Russ Match Sub-Building In America

WASHINGTON, May 6 (AP) — The Soviet Union may be building atomic-powered submarines at a rate of seven to 10 a year, at a cost of \$10 million each, according to sources here.

This would appear to about double the American production rate.

Available records show that in the last full year, the United States constructed nine nuclear-powered submarines, either Polaris or attack ships.

The U. S. program carries construction through only about another two or three years, when building of 41 Polaris and 44 attack submarines will have been completed and the last of them put into fitting-out yards for final work.

The Soviet Union has given no indication of a construction date for her atomic submarine program.

Despite His Whirlwind Pace, Johnson Has Strong Heart

WASHINGTON, May 6 (AP) — Despite the whirlwind pace he's been keeping, President Johnson's heart—the heart that suffered an attack in 1955—is apparently still doing fine.

That was the indication from the White House today in answer to a query concerning the state of the President's health.

The query was motivated by the fact that the President, ever since he took office, has maintained a fast and vigorous work schedule—ranging from sudden airplane trips to fast-paced on-the-spot news conferences held on the quarter-mile driveway behind the White House.

At least one published report has said some of Johnson's associates have been worried about his energetic pace—in view of his history of having had one heart attack.

However, there are indications the President knows how to mix rest and relaxation with his fast-stepping work day.

The White House said Johnson's latest electrocardiograph examination—a test of his heart's rhythm—showed a normal finding. The same is true of his pulse, blood pressure and breathing rate.

Furthermore, there is "no enlargement of the heart," the White House said. It was the first technical word on Johnson's health since Dec. 4, shortly

after he took office.

None of Johnson's own doctors—and he has them in various parts of the country as well as the White House—were available for interviews on the subject.

But one doctor outside the White House—who has nothing to do with President Johnson's case—told a reporter, the information given out by the White House, together with the obvious fact that Johnson has been leading a fast work pace, add up to this in his opinion:

"The fact that he has been able to maintain the pace gives reassurance that his coronary attack of 1955 was well-healed."

The doctor said the medical details given out by the White House could be interpreted this way:

1. "Normal" EKG: Means that the electrical-conducting system that makes the heart work was not damaged permanently by Johnson's coronary thrombosis in 1955.

2. "Normal" pulse: Means that Johnson's heart is responding well to its workload—that is, it's not going too fast, or too slow.

3. "No enlargement of the heart": Means for one thing that the area of heart muscle damaged when a clot blocked Johnson's coronary artery during the attack has healed well. It also means that unaffected muscle in the heart has been able to carry the heart's work-load without becoming enlarged.

Signs that the President knows how to taper off from a hard-driving schedule include the following:

During his walkabout in the White House back yard last Saturday he told reporters he is usually in bed by 11 p.m.—and watches television or reads until about 3 a.m.

He is awake by 6:45 a.m.—automatically, and without any alarm clock, he indicated—but he stays abed a couple of hours after that, reading, or just resting.

Thus, he indicated, he rests up to 10 hours, even though he's not sleeping that long.

Moreover, he swims before lunch—and takes a nap every afternoon.

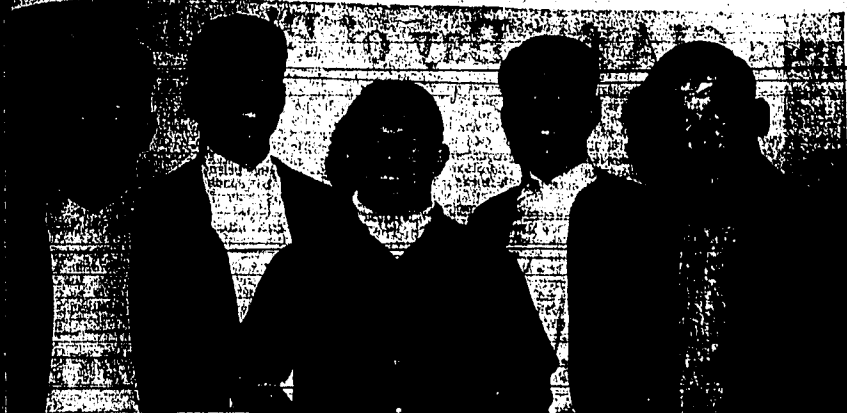

Book Blames CIA for Bay of Pigs Disaster

NEW YORK, May 6 — The central intelligence agency (CIA) was the chief architect of the Bay of Pigs disaster and deceived and betrayed the late President Kennedy, it was charged Tuesday in a book written by a Washington reporter.

The book, "The Bay of Pigs" by Haynes Johnson of the Washington Star, was written in collaboration with Cuban invasion commanders (Manuel Artime,

Jose Peres Roman, Ernado Oliva and Enrique Ruiz-Williams. The book will go on sale May 16.

Johnson quoted the brigade commanders as saying the chief CIA instructor at Base Trax, the secret invasion training camp in Guatemala, told them shortly before the invasion was launched that the Kennedy administration might order the invasion halted at the eleventh hour.

The instructor, known only as "Frank," told the men that in event of cancellation they were to "make some kind of show, as if you were putting up the advisors, in prison, and you go

ahead with the program as we have talked about it, and we will give you the whole plan, even if you are your prisoners," the book said. Frank said his CIA superiors would give instructions on how and when to undertake the invasion even though it was canceled.

Eric P. Swenson, executive editor of W. W. Norton and co-publisher of the book, said page proofs of the book were sent to the CIA two months ago with comment invited. He said the CIA offered no comment.

Johnson also charged the Kennedy administration's invest-

igation of the 1961 fiasco revealed that the CIA deliberately failed to tell the brigade commanders anything about its alternative emergency plan drawn up on the specific orders of the President. The plan called for dispersal of the invasion brigades in the mountains in case the guerrilla warfare was unsuccessful.

Swenson book said CIA officials "routinely assured" the President that the alternative plan was operational and that the Cubans had been fully briefed on it and had been trained to execute it. The author said the CIA's reassurances

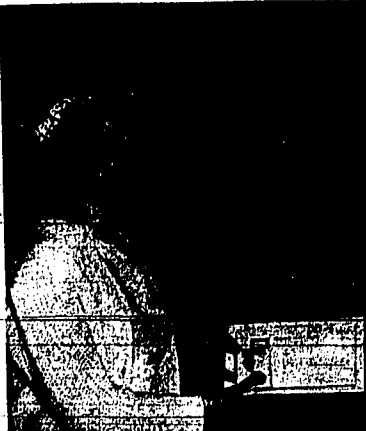

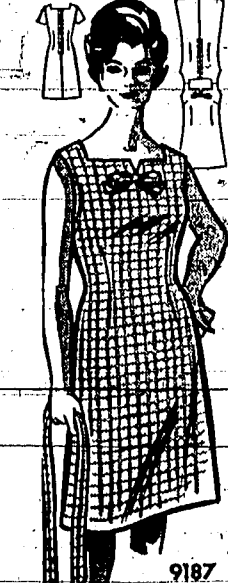

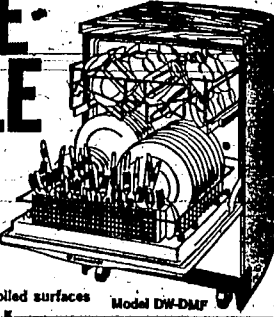

Packers Trade Ringo, Gros for Eagle Linebacker

GREEN BAY, Wis., May 6 (AP)—The Green Bay Packers traded veteran offensive center Jim Ringo and reserve fullback Earl Gros to the Philadelphia Eagles today in exchange for linebacker LeRoy Caffey and a choice in the National Football League draft next December. Ringo, 32, a seventh round draft choice in 1959 after he started at Syracuse, has been an all-NFL selection as a blocking center for the past seven years. He has not missed a game with Green Bay in the last 10 years.

Gros, 24, was Green Bay's No. 1 draft choice three years ago. A former Louisiana State star, he has served as an undrafted player to Jim Taylor for two seasons, carrying 77 lines for 367 yards and four touchdowns.

Caffey, 23, became a starter as a left linebacker in his rookie season with the Eagles last year. A seventh round draft pick, the 6-foot, 3-inch 240-pounder played fullback and linebacker at Texas A and M. He reportedly can run the 100-yard dash in 10.1 seconds and last year returned an intercepted pass 74 yards against the New York Giants.

In Easton, Ringo, told radio station WEST that he doesn't know if he will play football next year. He said he would have to discuss the situation with his wife, Green Bay coach Vince Lombardi, and Eagles' owner Jerry Wolman.

Ringo said that if he had to be traded the Eagles would be his No. 1 choice because he felt they are a growing team in the league's eastern division and they come from an area close to his home. Ringo lives in Palmyra, 3 miles from Easton, about 40 miles north of Philadelphia.

"But being with a team 11 years and realizing you are no longer a member is quite a problem," he added.

Eagles coach Joe Kuharich was elated with the trade, the fourth the Eagles have made in the last two months.

The trade is "a terrific boost to the Eagles offense," Kuharich said.

The trade of Ringo leaves the Packers without an experienced center, although offensive tackle Bob Skoronski can fill in at the position.

Handling a future trade the candidates for the center position will be rookies Ken Bowler of Wisconsin and Turley Todd of Virginia.

The departure of Ringo and Gros cuts deeper into the number of veterans of the 1957 championship club still with Green Bay. Others traded away include defensive end Bill Quintan, defensive back Johnny Symank, guard Ed Blaine, center Ken Inman, ends Lee Fulkins and Gary Kintafelo, tackle Ron Cassert and defensive back Howie Williams. Lew Carpenter, Nelson Toburen and Ben Agajanian have retired.

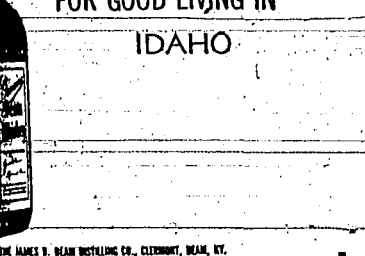

The Big Sky conference made its decision this week on the status of the football scholarships. The process probably had to do with Idaho coach Dee Andros and the school's financial position.

The conference decided to allow all schools to offer football scholarships. This means that schools like Idaho which do not play a full conference can still offer scholarships. The conference is playing a full conference for the first time in its history. It was playing in the meantime it was playing against tough opponents, including the northern division schools and was this year.

If the conference had committed to 10 additional football scholarships instead of the "other sports" it would have pleased Idaho fans to a large extent. It is that through last year Andros was using only 10 scholarships—and this year it is 17 or 18.

While Idaho Vandal fans are cheering Andros right up there with him in bringing things to a close, the conference plans the kind of thing, it appears.

Idaho is an ambitious coach. He wants all right but he doesn't like to field a pretty good team and compete against some bigger name foes. He may not mind the Big Sky conference, but he doesn't like the reduction in scholarships, which reduces his chances to win at least some respectability, the traditional foe of the Green, Washington State, and Oregon.

The new conference will allow member schools 20 scholarships for wrestling and largely sports. It would be a good thing that were any one of these schools independent it would not be so many. This particular one, as this spring again has been, is not situated in the same belt and conducive to baseball, track and golf.

The spirit is willing but the flesh is usually weak and cold. The thing that puzzles here, however, is that Idaho State has been building its grid program and improving its schedule as much as it can. It is finding difficulty in breaking up the "name" schedules as the schools don't like this "nothing to gain, everything to lose" situation. But Idaho State, given a "breakthrough" or two, is not far from a breakthrough. It has reached its "last plateau" stage.

Idaho and Montana State have had "name" schools on their schedule and again would not have to build great deals away there. Only Wabash, the school of the bunch, has been long way to go.

When it is realized, no matter how much Idaho can maintain its momentum, it may all be over. Perhaps the next coach will be flat again. But if the school has football talent it can be predicted. Good luck to Washington, Green and Idaho. Hullo Whitworth, Fairbanks, etc.

Many Pole Intellectuals Protest Red Suppression

By LEON DENNEN
NEW YORK, May 6 (AP)— An amazing protest against censorship and restrictions on speech by 34 of Poland's top scholars, religious leaders, scientists, poets and journalists...

of communist rule. And the government's prompt reaction is proof, if needed, that there is very little freedom of expression in Poland today. "Restrictions in allocation of paper for printing books and magazines and increasing press censorship endanger further development of Polish national culture," the protest said. "The influence of public opinion on the right to criticize free-

dom of discussion and access to reliable information are indispensable to progress and national welfare." President Johnson obviously was misled by his advisers when he asserted recently that "there has been a greater degree of freedom of speech in Poland since 1956 and the nation's intellectual activity is stimulating and lively." He also said that "Poland has obtained a large autonomy from the Soviet Union." The President considers himself a realistic politician. The reason for his statements might have been what is known in diplomatic lingo as "realpolitik." He was trying to justify the United States policy of extending trade privileges to Poland and Yugoslavia under the clause of "most privileged nation."

But in the view of specialists on communism, it was tragic that President Johnson used erroneous information to remove the stigma from American trade with the communists. His clean bill of health for Poland's oppressive regime is already being exploited by the Reds as proof that even America does not support intellectual freedom behind the iron curtain. Wladyslaw Gromka, Poland's communist chief, thus feels free to employ repressive measures against the courageous intellectuals and religious leaders who challenge his dictatorship. According to United Nations reports, the Polish radio has banned all programs by the people who signed the protest. Antoni Blonimaki was ready to go on the air when it was with-

Kott was killed after it was already in print. Kott, who was scheduled to go to Paris to receive a literary prize for his essays on Shakespeare, also had his passport withdrawn. The 33 and aged Blonimaki was even refused emergency treatment in a government hospital. Yet so strong is the urge for freedom and human decency behind the iron curtain that not only the 34 intellectuals and church leaders withdrew their signatures from the protest despite the greatest pressure by the Red regime, it is no longer American policy to liberate the captive nations of East Europe by force. But while liberating the oppressed nations, we can at least give moral support to the heroic men and women who carry on their fight for freedom.

Planning of Large Formal Weddings Requires at Least 3 Months' Work

While it's true that many weddings take place with a minimum of advance planning, because of the bridegroom's sudden departure to the armed forces or an unexpected business relocation, a large formal wedding requires at least three months' work.

There are hordes of details to be arranged, decisions to be made, shopping to be done, and housing to be found, all of which takes hours of time.

Bridal consultants suggest this sort of timetable, adjusted, of course, to your own individual situation.

Three months before the wedding:

Decide on the type, size, location and time of day of the wedding.

Invite the members of your wedding party, with due regard to their commitments to studies or jobs.

Call on your clergyman with your fiancée to set the wedding date. This also gives the clergyman an opportunity to counsel with you. After this visit, the church secretary will reserve the church, organist and sexton for the occasion.

Draw up your guest list, and decide which guests will be invited to the reception, if you plan to limit this group. This is not a solo venture, since you will have your fiancée's list as well, distant relatives to consider, and painful moments as you shift individual names to second priority.

Decide where the reception will be held, and what the menu and other arrangements will be. Since the bride's family pays for the reception, it is imperative that the family's financial

circumstances govern the elaborateness of the reception.

Choose your wedding dress. This decision is made easier if you consult bridal house advertisements in advance to get some ideas of style and price.

Order your invitations and personal stationery, bearing your future name. Informals are invaluable, carrying either your married name or monogram.

Begin to choose patterns for china, silver and glass, and register them in the gift registry of your store. This is a less commercial move than it appears, for gift givers want to present you with something compatible with your tastes, and prefer you give some indication.

As soon as you have chosen your new home, make up a floor plan to carry with you when you go furniture and rug shopping. Be sure to include height of ceiling as well as other dimensions.

Many large city department stores have free interior decorating services which can advise you. Don't hesitate to take advantage of them, for they are usually practical, rather than fanciful.

Begin your trousseau shopping.

Suggest both mothers shop for their gowns, which should not only be harmonious to each other, but should blend with your color scheme for the bridal party.

Two months before the wedding:

Finish addressing invitations or announcements.

Select gifts for your attendants.

Continue the other activities begun a month ago which are so time-consuming.

Go with your bridegroom to get the marriage license.

One month before the wedding:

Have the final fitting on your gown.

Arrange to have your portrait taken when the gown is ready.

Mail your invitations and prepare a check list as reception arrangements arrive. Give the caterer a general idea of the number of guests expected.

Check on the bridesmaids' dresses and accessories.

Plan your church music and floral decorations.

Arrange accommodations for a luncheon for your bridesmaids and a rehearsal dinner. The entire wedding party plus both sets of parents will be included in the latter.

Two weeks before the wedding:

Write thank-you notes.

Arrange a seating plan for reception guests. If you plan to have a brides table, write out place cards. The parents may sit at the bride's table with the wedding party, or may have a separate table.

Send wedding announcements and glossy photographs to the newspapers.

One week before the wedding:

Give caterer the final figure on reception guests.

Ask a friend to be on hand for last-minute telephone calls and wires, and expedite the reception.

Rehearse your wedding ceremony, so all will go smoothly.

Your wedding day:

This is a day in which to forget all about the detailed arrangements you've been working on for months. Let someone else worry about last-minute changes and be your happiest and most glowing.

Young couples who have to watch closely over the clothes budget would do well to take tender, loving care of their suits and coats to lengthen their years of wearability.

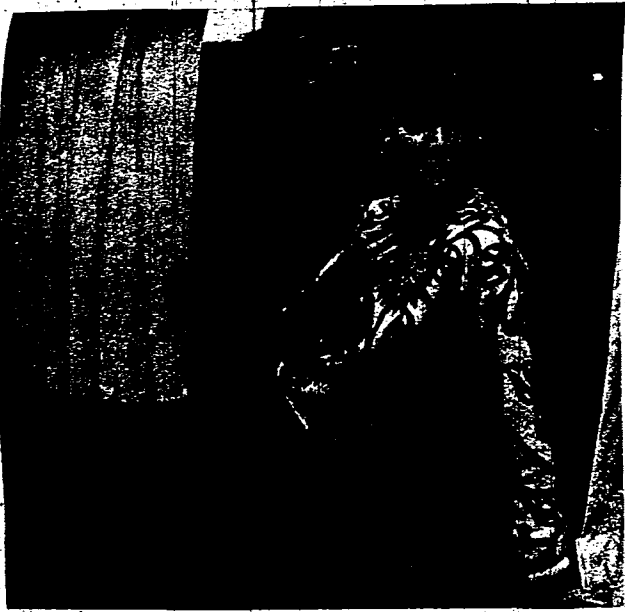

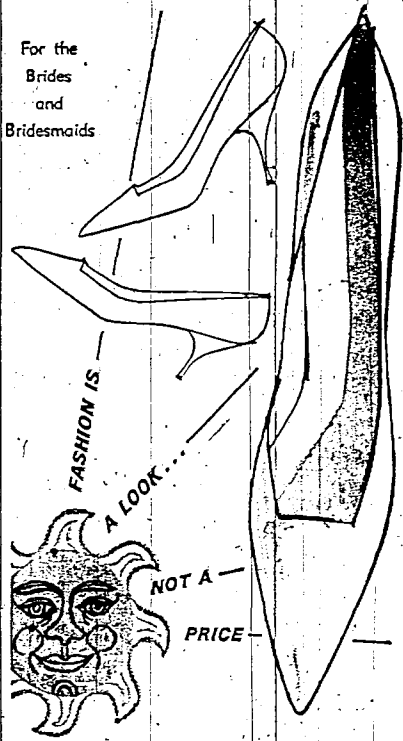

In Forefront Of Fashion

Creators of wedding fashions have come to the rescue of that sometimes desperate woman, the mother of bride or bridegroom. Destined, in years past to find nothing more interesting to wear at the wedding than *scrub lace*, she now can be seen in the forefront of fashion.

"Belts has been done to death," says one sympathetic designer, "though sometimes it can be combined with off-beat colors."

He has been busy creating long gowns for mothers very much in keeping with the bride's own gown. Fabrics may be identical, with mother wearing a light turquoise linen dress, and daughter in the traditional white, also linen.

Another designer, sympathetic to mothers and even grand-

Ads saying separate kitchen probably mean kitchenette, in your hometown vocabulary, and often a dressing or sleeping alcove is called a separate room when it isn't.

If you can accept this shrinking of the walls, and imagine yourself at home with *brl* and *col bath* (fireplace and colored tile in the bathroom), you'll be a contented city dweller.

Biggest trial in an apartment given to the determinedly contented is lack of space for possessions. So in your home-hunting, count closets and storage shelves with care. You don't need yards of work space in the kitchenette, but you may need as many *disboards* as you can get. If you sleep on a studio couch, there must be a place for daytime storage of linens and blankets.

If they don't exist, what can you build in? Can you put extra rods in the bathroom and inside the closet door? Will a cupboard on casters fit into the kitchen?

Newlyweds Get Advice: Discuss Your Finances

Attitudes toward money, as much or more than the absence of it, can cause an incredible amount of friction in the home of the newlywed young couple.

Says Theodore Hackman, a caseworker at one of Community Service society's centers, "Money is made up of emotional components. A relaxed, mature couple can share it without resentment. Each can give and spend without reproaching the other. For them, money is a positive emotion, expressing love, faith and benevolence."

But money may be utilized negatively, he says, to give vent to hate, hostility, spite and ignorance. "The husband may be a tightwad, so his wife retaliates by overspending when she has a chance. Or she may be counting heavily on his getting a raise, and when he doesn't, she'll take it out on him by not getting supper."

Hackman points out money is one of the easiest subjects to fight about, because it is so tangible and concrete. The management of available funds may be the actual start of disagreement, or the dollar fight may serve as an escape hatch to which to flow up on other topics of disagreement.

Hackman is sympathetic with young couples who haven't the experience or maturity to operate on a restricted budget. "It's not easy to postpone buying the *kl*, or to hang on to the old car a little longer."

He points out that friction is likely to develop if the couple want to duplicate the standard of living in the two homes they have left, rather than being patient enough to start married life on a much simpler level.

"Realistic discussion of money matters before marriage is most vital for teen-age couples," he comments. "Mutual goals must be arrived at. The two must feel they are sharing money, rather than competing over it."

"Also, they must indicate to each other what aspects of living are so important that they are willing to do without in other areas to gain them."

He cites as an example the mutual desire of one couple to set aside savings for one record a month. "It was all they could afford, but it was terribly important to their lives."

Money, he adds, will stay in its proper place when couples learn that its expenditure is a matter of joint sharing and planning, with a high percentage of compromise.

Wife on Narrow Budget Must Use Brain in Buying

Brains rather than brawn are prerequisites for the young wife who must run a home on a shoe-string.

And if she, like so many teen-ager brides today, has little if any skills in cooking, sewing and improving, she's in for a real program of self-education.

"Processed foods and drip-dry clothes cut down on the young homemaker's time in the kitchen," agrees Louise Addis, who has guided many inexperienced young brides to better homemaking.

"But in return, she sees an average of 6,000 items in the supermarket. How to shop wisely in the face of so many choices is a problem for her. She has to learn all this in a hurry, too."

Mrs. Addis, the director of home economics and nutrition at the Community Service society in New York, comforts the novice housekeeper by adding that "there is a fantastic amount of good information available if the girls are interested in the challenge."

"Government pamphlets, meal-planning suggestions put out by utility companies, shopping guides and menu ideas in daily newspapers, and market information distributed by county agricultural offices are extremely helpful."

Before plunging into the intricacies of the nearest supermarket the young bride can do her homework via the ads on special buys that appear in the

daily newspapers, advises Mrs. Addis. If she has freezer space, and if the weekly budget will take it, she can buy specials in quantity. And though a half-cent saving doesn't seem like much, it pays to invest in the "7 for 45¢" and "3 for 71¢" items.

Until the new shopper has gained some experience, Mrs. Addis recommends she understand, and also that she study the shelves and counters with a discriminating eye before she even begins to fill her shopping cart. Prospective menus can be scrapped and new ones built essentially as special sale items are discovered.

With increasing experience comes increasing confidence, and the young homemaker will automatically make the choice between fresh, frozen or canned green beans, depending on the season of the year, the availability and therefore the price.

She'll also be aware that a new product that is being introduced is likely to be under-priced, and that a store's own line is likely to be cheaper than others. By then, she's well on her way to getting her debt as a wise shopper.

Line Is for Greetings

Though the term "receiving line" may sound both formal and formidable at a wedding reception, it actually means little more than a grouping of participants in a wedding to receive greetings from the guests.

Introductions do not need to present a problem, since thoughtful guests who know few in the receiving line are very likely to identify themselves without embarrassment.

Those the bride's mother knows, she can introduce in friendly fashion to the groom's parents by saying, "I want you to meet Jeanie's godparents, Mr. and Mrs. White."

Brides Still Use Formal Invitations

While handwritten notes inviting guests to your wedding are perfectly acceptable if the ceremony is to be small and informal, the traditional formal invitation is still used by most brides-to-be.

This can be engraved or printed in engraving style on a white, ivory or cream-colored double sheet of quality paper, which is folded and inserted in the envelope. Accompanying it is a small, separate reception card.

The folded invitation and reception card are placed in an envelope which is left unsealed and is addressed simply "Mr. and Mrs. Robinson." This envelope is then slipped into a larger one which is addressed for mail.

If young children are invited

to the wedding, add their names on separate lines on the inside envelope, below their parents' names. Older children should have separate invitations. The casual addition of "and family" is strictly out of place.

The wording of the invitation is a formal one which has retained its classic dignity through the years and changing times. "The honor of your presence" is still requested with formality, and the invitation to the reception asks for the "pleasure of your company."

If the wedding is semi-formal, the bride-to-be may choose a smaller size invitation which is placed in the envelope without folding. The wording, however, is identical.

If the wedding is a simple chapel ceremony with only members of the family present, it's customary to send out announcement cards announcing the marriage and giving date and place of the ceremony. Enclosed "at home" cards state the couple's new address and the date they will be back from their wedding trip.

Budgeter Can Make Useful Gadgets for Convenience

Although hardware stores are loaded with all kinds of marvelous gadgets for better home organization, it's possible for the inventive young woman to create a number of do-it-yourself conveniences herself and from practically nothing.

To store paper bags, take a wire coat hanger, bend it way down from the hook, then turn it up about halfway from the bottom. The folded bags can slide neatly over, and then be hung out of sight in a closet.

Use plastic wraps, too, to cover mixing bowls and mixers, for

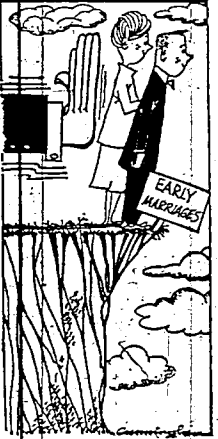
Gifts for Brides Can Be Silver

Letters of thanks should not be signed "Mary and John Bates." Mary expresses John's appreciation, but signs it herself. The important point is that the thought and effort behind the gift be all made worthwhile by the tenor of the bride's note to the donor, no matter the size or value of the gift.

Back in pioneer days before such a thing as a bank existed, the thrifty housewife hid spare change in the family cookie jar against a rainy day.

That little habit is still a good one for young couples to imitate, particularly if they can't

Put more money into those things which are worth the investment because they will last longer and be easier to care for (truly scrubbable wall covering for the kitchen, a really good mattress).

Remember the value of furnishings drops drastically when they are no longer new. And second-hand furniture sometimes can provide better style, materials and workmanship than inexpensive new pieces (but be sure second-hand upholstered items have been properly cleaned).

Purchase of poor quality workmanship could be a wise decision if the style is good and the item will not receive the kind of wear that would expose its weakness.

Be alert to the decorative possibilities of the inexpensive-look in the dime and drug store as well as the well-known shop—price tags are not the arbiter of good taste.

Drug and dime stores have lamp shades, house plants, wastebaskets, incense burners for kitchen towels, inexpensive foam rubber forms which can be covered for pillows and inexpensive throw pillows.

Look in these stores for the small accessories: wooden figurines, ash trays, simple figurines, picture frames, jars, vases, pitchers, trivets, tiles and plaques.

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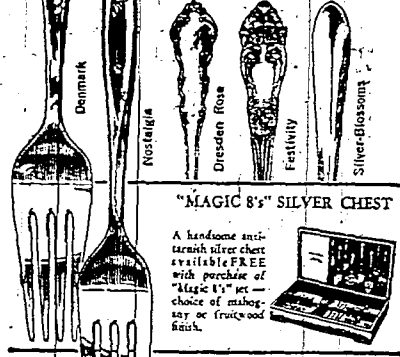
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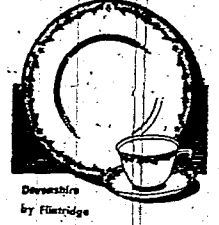
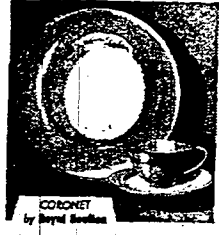

Invitations Hold Prime Importance

Whether you're planning a small informal wedding with only two weeks in which to make arrangements, or are having a large ceremony and a country club reception, the delicate matter of deciding on the guest list is of first importance. Fortunately, the invitation

serves dual purpose. For distant relatives and friends who could not possibly attend, it becomes an announcement of your forthcoming marriage. It can also be used selectively, for you may have a church full of guests for your wedding, and invite only a fraction of them to the reception. The larger the wedding, the sooner you must decide on the guest list for engraved invitations. In the traditional third-person style, are prerequisite. These should be ordered at least one month prior to the ceremony.

Kitchen Appliances Are Good Useful Gifts for New Brides

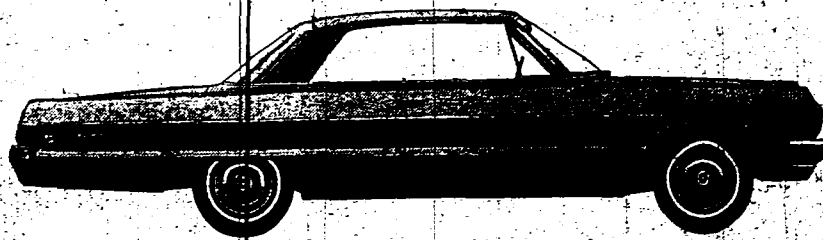
Consider having a kitchen shower for the bride. To give her a big gift, a dozen friends can each contribute a few dollars toward it. This way the bride will have the fun of opening a lot of packages and her kitchen will be stocked with some extremely useful aids to good cooking. Electric appliances include toaster, one that toasts and bakes, it's streamlined and doesn't take up too much space. The bride can bake a meat loaf, casserole dish or dessert in it, and she'll use it endlessly for reheating foods. These toaster-ovens are also perfect for English muffins, biscuits, rolls and brown-and-serve breads. Mixer, a large stationary one is a good choice, but if the bride's kitchen is small, one of the electric sturdy portable electric beaters will fill the bill. Skillet, the temperature dial on this modern utensil can take the guesswork out of some of the bride's cooking. Electric skillets can be put to many uses and are attractive to serve from.

Blender, the bridegroom as well as the bride will enjoy using this appliance for mixing drinks and many kinds of food preparation. Coffemaker, this handsome appliance will be wonderfully useful when the bride entertains. Small kitchen tools include rubber and metal spatulas with wide and narrow blades, one of each width, two rubber and two metal, would make a fine gift. Once the bride starts using these she'll know she can't get along without them in many steps of food preparation. Kitchen shears are likely to be used constantly by the bride. The sort that look like ordinary scissors (without a spring at the handle) are easiest to handle and do everything from mincing parsley to quartering a duck. A small hand juicer is a convenience because small amounts of lemon and orange juice are called for so often in recipes. An attractive miniature cutting board and a small sharp knife are a perfect accompaniment. A little whirl-type beater that can whip up an egg or a little

A small ceramic mortar and pestle that may be used for crushing both garlic and herbs is easier to clean than a garlic press. These mortar and pestles are available at pharmaceutical supply houses and some specialty houseware shops. As a go-along, a bride would probably appreciate a miniature French lettuce basket in which to store garlic. Ice cream scoops—a bride might be presented with a small and large size. There's also an up-to-date shovel-type scoop with which the bride (or the bridegroom) could remove hard-frozen ice cream without really trying. A set of wooden mixing spoons—the bowls of these come in various sizes, and the handles in various lengths. A colander—nowadays these are widely available in enamelware in enormously attractive colors. Small rotary-type graters for cheese, nuts, parsley. Also flat small graters and shredders for lemon and orange rind, fruits and vegetables. Measuring cups and spoons. Supply a set of metal measures (½, ⅓, ¼ and 1 cup) for dry ingredients. Also a one-pint glass measure for liquids. A set of metal measuring spoons (¼, ⅓

the father of the bride gave the bridegroom a "dower" of silver equal to her weight. John Hull, one of America's earliest silversmiths, was the first American father actually to place his daughter on the scales, and balance her weight with silver shillings. Originally, gifts to the young couple were in currency. But in the late 18th century, silver was substituted, because silver plate then became available at low cost. Every wedding couple then received at least one silver plated tea service.

Traditional Bridal Showers Are Still Based on Customs

Modern brides reap sizable harvests of "loot" at the traditional bridal shower.

And many have come to feel this is only fair because in their single days they gave to their friends who preceded them down the aisle.

But still there is a sentimental side to the custom, and most brides enjoy the party atmosphere and being surrounded by their close friends at this great moment in their lives. The gifts are an added bonus.

One legend which tells how the bridal shower originated concerns a Dutch girl who fell in love with a poor but charitable miller who gave most of his flour to the needy. Because the girl's father did not approve of the miller, he refused to give the girl her dowry, necessary to set up housekeeping, unless she married a wealthy farmer.

Townpeople who had been asked by the young miller joined together and donated small gifts to help the couple. When massed together and "showered" upon the girl, the gifts exceeded the value of the dowry she was supposed to receive.

But the term "shower" was not coined until the 1890's when someone conceived the idea of filling a Japanese paper parasol, then a popular fad in interior

decoration, with little gifts. The bride-to-be was obliged to open the parasol over her head, resulting in a "shower" of gifts. A bride had to have a pretty hard head even back in Roman days. At the wedding feast it was customary to break the wedding cake over her as a sign of abundance. Guests took home small broken pieces of cake, and eventually these "tokens" were invested by the superstitious with the power to make single guests dream of those they would marry. If the tokens were tucked under their pillows on the wedding night.

Brides also had rigorous going in the 14th century in Europe. Wedding guests scrambled to obtain the bride's garter, a symbol of good luck. The disheveled brides finally took to throwing a stocking instead. And with time, custom has made the event less wearing on the brides. They can just toss their bouquets today, and the girl who catches one is supposed to become the next bride.

Orange blossoms, now attached to the bridal veil or carried in her bouquet, were thought by the Saracens to insure happiness and good fortune.

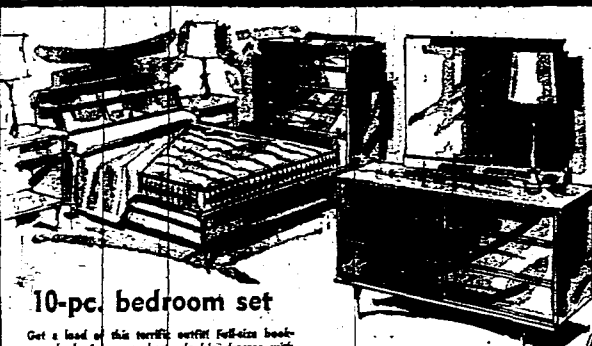
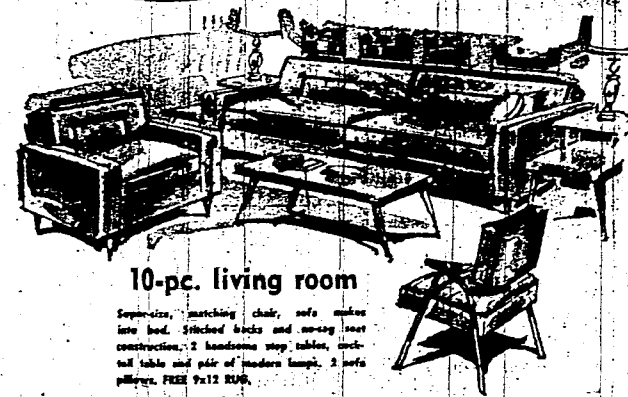
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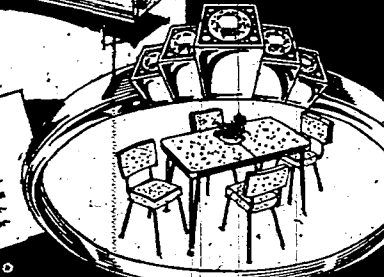

Gold Band Has Honored History

"With this ring I thee wed." In hundreds of thousands of ceremonies across the country, in cathedrals, chapels and homes, there comes the moment when the wedding ring, slipped on the bride's third finger by the bridegroom, symbolizes both the ritualistic and the contractual meaning of marriage.

The wedding ring has had a long and honored history, since the days when the ancient Hebrews fashioned wedding rings of gold, filigreed and richly engraved. Representations of important moments in Jewish history were painstakingly carved on the rings.

At the time of the Roman empire, wedding rings were first made of iron, gold being reserved for official ceremonial occasions. Later the rings were gold, and because gold is easily inscribed, they were often beautifully decorated with the bridegroom's seal, or with some inscription to the bride, or possibly to one of the gods.

Sanctioned by both church and civil ceremonies, the wedding ring became a part of the entire marriage ritual which was almost unchanged from Roman times to the 11th century.

The advent of Christianity tended to ritualize the wedding ring's use and material. Only gold was thought valuable enough, and the third finger of the left hand was designated as the proper place.

Wedding bands varied in style through the centuries. When Prince Albert married Victoria, he put on her hand a golden ring fashioned as a snake, composed of 14 hinged joints, 12 of them set with diamonds.

But later in the Victorian era, there was a reaction against the highly ornate, and a general return to the plain gold band.

Gifts of Linen at Showers

For that blushing bride-to-be on your list, Mrs. Anne Sterling, director of consumer relations for the American Institute of Laundering, suggests giving practical as well as attractive gifts of linen.

To assure quality in the gifts you'll be giving, Mrs. Sterling has compiled a guide for buying linens.

Make sure the towels you purchase for the bride's hope chest are color fast. All towels don't hold their rainbow colors after laundering. As a further aid in choosing top quality towels, feel, and pull them at different points to make sure that all sections stretch evenly. Uneven tension in the weaving process can cause towel parts to pucker or become distorted after laundering. Look for close, large, full, fluffy, and thickly packed loops, which indicate that the towels will be absorbent and will give good service.

Pastel and decorator patterned sheets and pillowcases are ideal for shower gift-giving. For quality linens, look for threads that are evenly woven and of the same thickness. Check sheeting for firm, compact selvage edges and hems that are smooth and straight with even stitching.

The best measure of quality merchandise is the certified washable seal of the American

Institute of Laundering. It is awarded only to manufacturers' items that have passed rigid laundry tests.

When considering a tablecloth as a gift for the bride, first find out the size of the table on which it will be used. Many tablecloths are not preshrunk and users can expect a certain amount of shrinkage after laundering. Also make sure that the colors and prints are colorfast so they can be laundered without fear of fading or bleeding of color.

If you're thinking of buying embroidered tablecloths, place mats, or napkins, make sure you're getting embroidery. Some "embroidery" is only glued to the fabric, one washing can loosen the backing and cause the design to come off. Check the wrong side of the fabric for embroidery threads. If they are present, the embroidery is genuine.

If you decide on a chenille bedspread for a bridal gift, check to see that the pile is securely held in place in the background fabric. If it is not held securely it may slip out.

CROSSED SWORDS

"Entertainment" will cover movies, dinners out, and the usual forms of relaxation, but you may wish to broaden the term to include a sum set aside for a vacation, equipment for

Storage needs can be taken care of by choosing basic cases, the decorator says, which can be used in any room in the house.

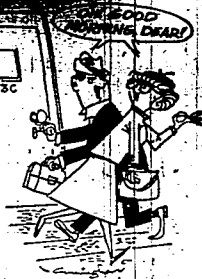
