HOUSTON, South Viet Nam, May 11 (AP)—A communist agent suspected of plotting to kill U. S. Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara on his arrival Tuesday from a window at police headquarters today, police said. The agent, identified as Nguyen Van Trol, was arrested from a second-floor window, landed on a jeep, and a leg and was hospitalized. Police said he was one of three suspected Viet Cong agents picked up Saturday night as they tried to mine a bridge on the route McNamara will take from Saigon airport into the capital, U. S. 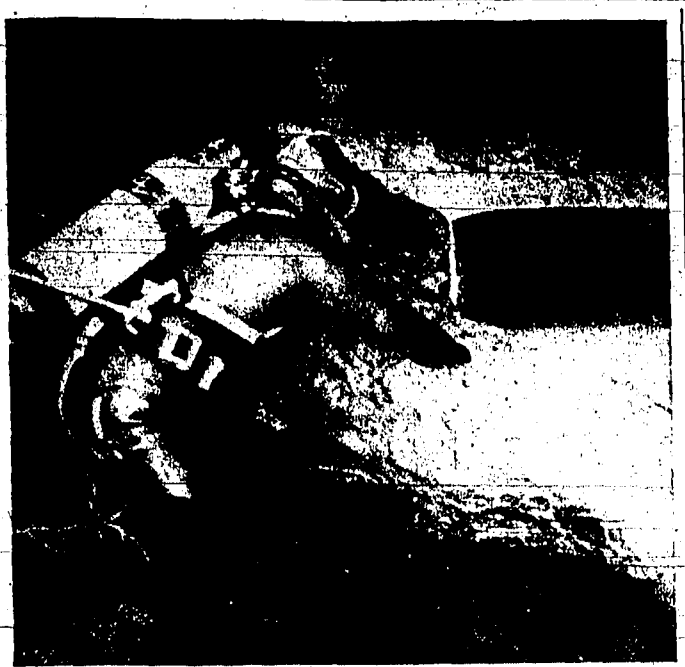

Five Boiseans Murdered, Police Hunt for Killer

BOISE, May 11 (UPI)—More than 30 men searched the New York canal today for the body of a Mother's day killer of five, presumed drowned last night in the bullet-punctured chubu by a police car. Officers checked headgates of the concrete-lined ditch on the outskirts of the city where a car driven by Raymond Reasons, 54, plunged into the water. A patrolman said he saw Reasons climb from the sinking vehicle after it went off a bridge but that the suspect fell into the water after he shot at him.

Vote on Rights Bill This Week Unlikely

WASHINGTON, May 11 (AP)—Hopes of senate leaders for additional voting on jury trial amendments to the embattled civil rights bill were dealt a blow today by Southern opponents. Sen. Richard B. Russell, D., Ga., spokesman for the Dixie bloc, told newsmen he didn't think there would be any votes this week. He added, however, that a meeting of the Southern senators will be held Tuesday and he will be in a better position then to assess the situation.

Pair of Men Facing Trial Over Thefts

Harold McDermund, 171 Monroe street, and Vernon Mort, 1111 N. 1st, were bound over to District Court by Twin Falls Police Judge Dale Adams on charges of first degree burglary.

Congressional Committees Face Mass Of 'For' and 'Against' BPA Testimony

WASHINGTON, May 11 (AP)—Congressional committees, considering a request for money for a new federal electric power line in the West, are facing a mass of conflicting testimony. Witnesses from several states close up aides at senate and house appropriations committee hearings last week on a BPA power and light company, which will own the line. The proposal has sparked what probably is the most heated political power fight in Idaho since the Hells canyon dam controversy a decade ago. Cost estimates for the proposed line, nearly 500 miles long, range from 73.3 million dollars to 132 million, depending on whether figures of proponents or opponents are used.

71 Americans Die In Military Plane Crash Near Manila

MANILA, May 12 (Tuesday) (UPI)—A U. S. military transport plane carrying 83 American service personnel crashed last night during a rainstorm a half mile short of the runway at Clark air force base in the Philippines, killing 71 persons. The 12 survivors were in critical or near-critical condition at the Clark base hospital 60 miles north of Manila, an air force spokesman said. The Philippines disaster raised to 167 the total number of persons killed in a series of air crashes since last Thursday.

Gov. Wallace To Campaign In Hot Spot

BALTIMORE, May 11 (AP)—Alabama Gov. George C. Wallace today carries his Maryland presidential primary campaign to the Eastern Shore community of Cambridge, where racial violence threatened his campaign.

The scheduled 5 p. m. (EDT) speech in Cambridge was one of two planned by the segregationist governor as he headed into his final week of campaigning for the May 19 primary.

A group of civil rights demonstrators in the racially tense town met briefly at midnight Sunday and sang "freedom songs," but police reported they were orderly. About 20 persons gathered in the town square to join the singing but dispersed about an hour later.

Wallace, who said yesterday in two interviews that he did not expect his appearance in Cambridge to cause any trouble, was assured he would get maximum police protection.

About 400 Maryland national guardsmen were ordered to Cambridge over the week-end for security duty, and a city of police officers were on duty Saturday that Wallace would receive maximum security. The town has been under limited martial law since last June's disturbances.

Railworkers On Idaho Line Strike

SPOKANE, May 11 (AP)—Firemen on a Washington-Idaho segment of the Milwaukee road went on strike today to protest alleged violations of Washington's full crew law, a spokesman for the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen reported.

The strike affected firemen working between Cle Elum, Wash., and Avery.

Other brotherhoods honored the picket lines, and actively in the Milwaukee yards ground to a halt. Picket lines were formed in Spokane, Malheur, and Cle Elum. A spokesman said they would form later today at Post Falls and St. Maries.

Mt. Etna Lava Flows Five Miles

CATANIA, Sicily, May 11 (AP)—A new lava flow poured down the west slope of Mt. Etna today in a resumption of an eruption which started three days ago. Lava flow from the great central crater of Europe's tallest volcano had stopped Sunday after the stream of molten rock had flowed nearly five miles down the mountain to the town of Bronte, one of the 20,000 population of Bronte.

Explosions from the crater began again Sunday night and the new lava stream, over the earlier lava bed, was flowing at four to six feet a minute. The new flow was about six miles from Bronte.

McNamara Ends German Parley

BOHN, Germany, May 11 (AP)—U. S. Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara flew to Saigon today after three days of talks with West German leaders.

Karl-Uwe von Hassel, West German defense minister, said McNamara's visit was "a very important step" but did not specify what matters had been at issue.

Before leaving, McNamara met Chancellor Ludwig Erhard and renewed his discussion with Von Hassel, who went with him to the airport.

CONCORD, Calif., May 11 (AP)—"Shut" the one clear word from an airliner before it crashed, has top-level investigators probing for clues to the death of 44 aboard, one of them a passenger.

"I don't care which way a senator votes for this bill," Humphrey said, "but this filibustering is a demand on the part of the senate to act like a senate." Humphrey told newsmen.

Humphrey, floor manager of the bill, said he was advocating a massive letter-writing campaign by the American public and at the same time served notice that long sessions were back on tap again, starting tonight.

Russian Backs Arab Stand on River Dispute

CATMO, May 11 (AP)—Soviet Premier Khrushchev gave his support to the Arab world today in its opposition to diversion of the Jordan river waters by Israel.

Speaking to the United Arab Republic's one-party national assembly, Khrushchev said Israel planned to "rob the Arab world of its own water."

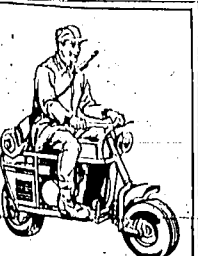

CHICAGO, May 11 (AP)—Two work stoppages by railroad firemen were ended before services were interrupted Sunday, one by the Pennsylvania Railroad and the other by International Union officials. The Pennsylvania railroad was in court to fight about 120 employees to work at its Chicago yards after they called in "sick." After the firemen ended a 24-hour wildcat walkout against the New York Central Railroad at Mattoon, Ill., after Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers (BLFE) international officials told them to go back to their jobs. The 25 failed to report for work in a "disagreement over interpretation of work rules," a railroad spokesman said.

PORTLAND, May 11 (AP)—Earnings that exceeded those of any prior year were reported today by the Boise, Cascade Corporation. President R. V. Hanberger told the annual stockholders' meeting in Portland that the 1963 profit totaled \$7,300,000, a gain of 46 per cent over 1962 earnings of \$5,035,000. Sales for 1963 totaled \$218,000,000, a gain of about 35 per cent over 1962. Hanberger said the outlook is "continued gains" this year, although he said the competition expected to be as keen as in 1963.

News Around Idaho

POCATELLO, May 11 (U)—City crews will comb the west side of Pocatello in the final week of a month-long cleanup drive. City trucks will pick up trash, debris and other unwanted items from the west side of the city, where residents have been encouraged to clean up their property. The cleanup drive is part of a program to beautify the city under a similar plan earlier this month.

POCATELLO, May 11 (U)—Idaho State university plans to use a \$28,700 federal grant in two programs for the training of teachers for mentally retarded children. The grant to ISU came from the department of health, education and welfare. Dr. Donald F. Kline, head of the department of education, said about \$12,500 of the grant will be used next school year to develop a program for the teachers, and \$13,200 will be used to cover 11 full grants to special education teachers during the summer of 1965.

SANDPOINT, May 11 (U)—A severe windstorm on Lake Pend Oreille stirred fears Saturday night for the safety of two fishermen. But Leo Mahler and Dan Blackmer said they were only delayed by motor trouble in their outboard motorboat. They turned up unharmed early Sunday.

LEWISTON, May 11 (U)—Fears were expressed Saturday that approval of a constitutional amendment which would authorize the port of Lewiston to issue revenue bonds would lead to creation of public utility districts in Idaho. The proposed amendment came under discussion during concluding sessions of the North Idaho Chamber of Commerce convention at Lewiston. W. W. Lott, chairman of the Lewiston port commission, said the amendment is necessary for development of slackwater navigation at Lewiston on completion of the Lower Granite dam on the Snake river. But R. J. Bruning, a Wallace newspaperman, said he feared the amendment would open the door for setting up "kissin' cousins" to public utility districts. Bruning said he was not opposed to the port of Lewiston but he expressed concern over another provision of the proposed amendment which would extend the limit of general obligation bond issues by legal subdivisions in the state from 20 to 30 years.

Arias Takes Early Panama Ballot Lead

PANAMA, May 11 (U)—Former President Arnulfo Arias took an expected slight lead today in fragmentary returns from Panama's presidential election.

The tedious ballot counting may not produce the winner until Wednesday.

Early returns from Panama City precincts gave the 63-year-old American-educated Arias a steady lead over the government coalition candidate, Marco A. Robles, 58.

The ultimate question is whether Arias will be permitted to take the presidency he won in 1940 and 1948. Each time he was ousted by a coup after serving less than three years.

Sinatra Rescued From Pacific Swim Mishap

HUHU KAUAI, Hawaii, May 11 (U)—Singer Frank Sinatra had a close brush with death Sunday when he and three other persons were swept out to sea by a huge wave near his rented house on the island of Kauai.

"In about five minutes he would have been gone," said Fire Lt. George Keawe, who took part in the rescue. "His face was turning blue."

The near tragedy happened as Sinatra, Mrs. Howard W. Koch and two unidentified persons were struck by the wave as they waded in the surf of Wailea bay.

The singer and Mrs. Koch, wife of the executive producer of a film which Sinatra is making in Hawaii, were swept about 75 yards out to sea by the undertow.

The other two persons fought their way back through the surf and shouted for help.

Skiers Quit

OBLO, May 11 (U)—Bjoren Skals and his Norwegian expedition have abandoned their attempt to ski across the North Pole. Skals radioed the newspaper. Afternoon he was giving up 200 miles short of the pole. He said his group would encounter too many open stretches of water and too much broken ice on the return trip in June.

Apollo Space Escape Plan To Be Tested

LAS CRUCES, N. M., May 11 (U)—A major test of the Apollo escape system is scheduled Tuesday at the White Sands missile range, near here in southern New Mexico.

Space agency officials said the test will involve the firing of a Little Joe 2 solid-fuel rocket saddle-mounted on a full-scale model of the Apollo spacecraft.

Their goal is to check the ability of the rocket engine on the escape tower, with 155,000 pounds thrust, to pull the 9,500-pound space capsule off an exploding launch vehicle.

Hoffa's Use of Union Funds Probed by U.S. Department

WASHINGTON, May 11 (U)—Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz began today an investigation of the use of union funds to pay legal fees for Teamster President James R. Hoffa.

The labor department said the investigation began after a complaint by 18 members of Teamster local No. 107 in Philadelphia that Hoffa had been using union funds in violation of the Landrum-Griffin act.

The law provides that if a union member is charged with violating his trust, and the organization and its officials refuse, or fail, to take action, any union member may sue in federal court to recover misused union funds or property.

The Philadelphia Teamsters asked Wirtz to investigate their charges promptly and provide them with the results of the investigation, so they may take appropriate action.

The labor department said the results of the investigation will be made public.

The investigation is provided for under the Landrum-Griffin act, which authorizes the secretary of labor to make an investigation if "he believes it is necessary in order to determine whether any person has violated, or is about to violate, the law."

The law also provides that the secretary may release the results of such an investigation to "interested persons or officials."

Laotian Leader Asks for Unity

VIENTIANE, Laos, May 11 (U)—Premier Souvanna Phouma made a fresh appeal to the Communist Pathet Lao today to support his efforts to achieve national unity and fraternal harmony in crisis-stricken Laos.

Speaking at independence day ceremonies, the neutralist premier recalled his warning a year ago of the "dangerous impasse" in attempts to unite Laos' three warring political factions. He said the "situation has gone from bad to worse."

Balloonist Claims Seven New Records

MINNEAPOLIS, May 11 (AP)—A young ex-paratrooper who soared to 37,000 feet under a small plastic balloon returned to earth with a claim of seven world altitude records and a recollection of extreme quiet.

In his little gondola seven miles high, said Tracy Barnes, 25, there was an "unusual feeling of absolute quiet, absolute stillness."

Barnes said Sunday's flight was successful in all respects, and he experienced nothing worse than a slight headache.

His journey in a three-by-four foot plastic gondola lashed to a 30-foot high balloon filled with hydrogen began at 5:15 a. m. at an airport 12 miles south of Minneapolis. It ended at 7:30 a. m. in a clover field near Mondovi, Wis., 80 miles southeast.

The polyethylene balloon was fabricated by Barnes at his barn workshop in Long Lake, Minn. His home is in nearby Orono.

Barnes' goal was to smash the 1940 record of 23,266 feet set by the Soviet Union's Boris Neverov in a small 3A balloon.

Barnes' 3A balloon broke that mark, he said, and also six records for larger balloons. These were a 1936 mark of 35,807 feet set by J. J. Burinski of Poland and the chalked up by Don Picard of Blouf Falls, S. D., in 1941, at 34,422 feet.

The 36-page press of the afternoon daily was not damaged. No one was in the building.

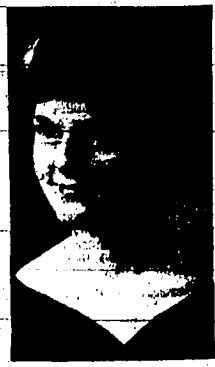
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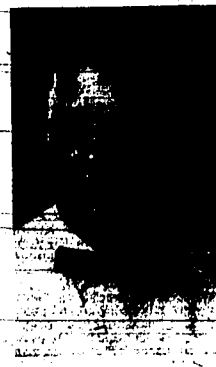

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Solon Says Nurse Home Code Needed

WASHINGTON, May 11 (AP)—Nobody seems to be able to get together and agree on standards for nursing homes, Sen. Frank E. Moss, D. Utah, said today, adding this is one of the major problems in caring of the aged.

He described as sobering the results of three days of hearings by his subcommittee, but said in a statement he thinks they pointed up the problems and "there is some better prospect" now.

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Buhl School Board Okays New Budget

BUHL, May 11—The Buhl school budget for 1964-65 totaling \$587,161 was adopted by the board of trustees following a public hearing Friday evening at which no protests were voiced.

Although the budget shows an increase of \$20,742 over last year's \$566,419, the district will operate on the same levy of 41 mills which includes 30 mills for maintenance and operation and 11 mills for bond interest and redemption.

The assessed valuation of the district shows \$8,164,513 compared to last year's \$8,118,616. By June 30 the bonded debt will be \$1,344,487.

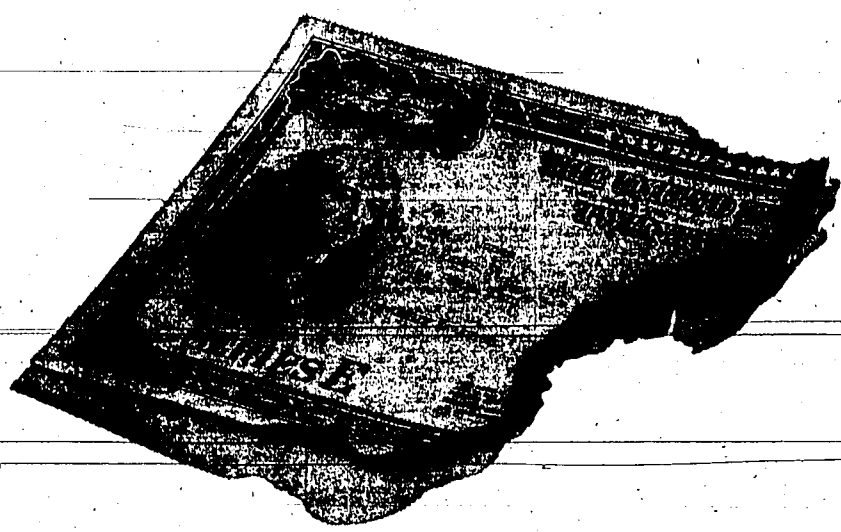

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
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
