

Jah Education Leaders Summon Teachers to Work

SALT LAKE CITY, May 19 (AP)—Leaders of the Utah Education association called on their 10,000 teachers today to return to work. The action, if approved by a mass meeting of Utah teachers, would be a two-day walkout that has been 90-per-cent effective. Just before the mass meeting, a court order issued to restrain NEA officials from ordering or encouraging strike action by Utah teachers. The injunction was signed by Judge Joseph G. Jappeson just before the teachers met to decide what to do next in their efforts to get more money.

NEA Invokes Sanctions Against Utah

WASHINGTON, May 19 (AP)—The National Education association today invoked sanctions against Utah, and urged its 902,000 members not to support the current teaching crisis over the state aid to education is being.

Most of the public schools opened today, as Monday, when the two-day teachers' protest walkout began. Substitute teachers, supervisors, parents and NEA officials took charge in the schools. But many closed after an initial roll call.

The state board of education sought the injunction. The order places legal restraint on NEA officials from "encouraging teachers or other personnel to breach their contracts or to refuse to sign next year's contracts."

The teachers were to discuss at a mass meeting today proposals that included prolonging the walkout and continuing to refuse to sign next year's contracts.

They hope to force the hand of Gov. George D. Clyde and get more school money.

The walkout was triggered by Clyde's refusal to meet the recommendations of his study committee and call a special legislative session to consider an emergency 5-million-dollar appropriation for schools.

Kenyon Green, T.F. Pioneer, Succumbs

Mr. Green came to the Twin Falls tract on Jan. 1, 1906, and in 1914 started an orchard bearing his name. The orchard, which he held in 1961, is located near the present farm-labor-camp.



Psychiatrist States Ruby Needs Help

PHILADELPHIA, May 19 (AP) — Dist. Atty. Henry Wade said today a court-appointed psychiatrist believes convicted murderer Jack Ruby needs mental treatment. Judge Joe Brown is expected to order a sanity hearing for Ruby, and lawyers are appealing his death sentence for the slaying of accused presidential assassin Lee Harvey Oswald.

Dr. Robert E. Schindler, the psychiatrist asked by Brown to examine Ruby in his cell at the Das county jail, reported to the judge yesterday. Neither Schindler nor Brown would reveal his findings.

Wade told women that Ruby had been seen stumbling and acting "in a very unusual way" and that Ruby needs a kind of treatment.

Two other psychiatrists also are to report to Judge Brown on Ruby's mental condition before a ruling is made on the sanity hearing.

Ten Die in Freighter Ocean Fire

LONG BEACH, Calif., May 19 (AP) — Ten persons apparently died when fire ravaged the passenger-carrying Norwegian freighter Sandanger off the Mexican coast Thursday.

A rescue ship saved 45 persons, the body of an unidentified woman was found and nine other persons are missing and presumed dead.

The victims were believed to include the ship's seven passengers, all from California.

Apparently most of the all-Norwegian crew and the passengers were asleep when fire erupted aboard the 8,000-ton vessel off the coast of Mexico, early Monday.

The ship was on route to Le Havre, France, via the Panama canal.



Quake Effect Has Alaskans Very Tense

ANCHORAGE, May 10 (AP) — A number of the shattered city, the Alaska earthquake of March 27, has become tense and nervous from a steady series of aftershocks.

Their reactions have not been unusual, said doctors, psychiatrists and psychologists in an Associated Press survey.

"I think everybody reacted calmly and adjusted quite well to the disaster," said Dr. William A. Davis, assistant professor of psychology at Alaska State University. "There has been very little maladaptive or abnormal behavior."

The earthquake had a sizable impact emotionally," said Dr. J. E. Langdon, a psychiatrist who expects it will not prove to have been overdone."

Another psychiatrist, Dr. W. J. Baker, said people "rose to the occasion because it was a clear and present danger and they addressed themselves to the need which had to be taken care of."

The earthquake actually helped some emotionally upset persons, said the doctors, because it enabled them to forget their real or imagined personal problems.

There was very little panic in the original quake, they said, because people had no warning, probably didn't realize at first how severe it was, did not witness many casualties and were not in large crowds that generate mass terror.

That the aftershocks have been causing acute anxiety was indicated in a survey of 100 residents of a local university class. Many of them felt panicky.

The U.S. coast and geologic survey at Fairbanks said it appeared that aftershocks strong enough to be felt could be expected for several weeks.

Langdon said that for some residents the quake was followed by excessive sleeping and fatigue.

Residents are becoming angry about the impact of the quake, he said, and probably will become depressed this summer or fall if there is lack of progress in solving problems.

Doctor to Testify at Murder Trial

VALE, Ore., May 10 (AP) — Oregon's chief medical examiner was the first witness to be called Tuesday in the first-degree murder trial here of Wilford Keith Harris, 44.

He is Dr. Rossen Henry.

Harris is charged with engineering the auto crash last Dec. 18 in which his wife, Vera, 37, was killed. Harris is supposed to be plotting the crash to collect \$110,000 in insurance he carried on his wife, the mother of 10 children.

Hair and blood found 12 miles from the scene of the fiery auto accident was identified late Monday as most likely that of Mrs. Harris by an Oregon criminal investigator.

Sgt. Ralph Prouty of the state crime laboratory at Portland said that hair and blood specimens found near the burned out 1959 Buick also belonged to her.

"It is highly probable that this hair that I received and examined is from a common source," Prouty told the circuit court jury.

He added to the dozens of exhibits, colored slides which contained on one side hair taken from the head of an autopsy and hair found near the car and far from the scene of the crash on state highway 7a.

Three specimens of hair and dried blood have been introduced in the trial, but Prouty covered only two of them Monday—the patch found near the car and one found 12 miles up the highway at a turnout.

Prouty told the court that there were points of similarity in the different specimens of hair that "established the probability" it was all from the same head.





PAPANICOLAOU TEST FOR CANCER

Q. Would you please discuss the Pap, or smear test for cancer?

A. In its earliest stage of development, cancer of the cervix (neck of the womb) seems to be confined to surface tissue for some time (months, perhaps, but not years) before it penetrates into deeper structures. The best chance for cure is during the early, surface stage. Several tests can be used to detect trouble early, one of which is the Papanicolaou or smear test. This test is based upon the fact that cancer cells are more loosely attached to one another than normal cells. They thus tend to shed more easily and, in cervical cancer, the abnormal cells tend to collect in the vagina. Cells are obtained by swab, spread or smeared on a glass slide, and studied under a microscope. The Pap test has the advantage, so far as the patient is concerned, of being quite painless and simple. If suspicious cells are found, other tests are made to confirm or definitely rule out cancer.

U.S. Subs Near Egypt

PORT SAID, Egypt, May 19 (AP)—Premier Khrushchev has today said the Arabs would be in a great danger if the United States introduced Polaris missile submarines into the Mediterranean.

The Soviet leader evidently reacted to negotiations between the United States and Spain for the joint U.S.-Spanish naval and air base at Rota as a "U.S. submarine base."

In an obvious reference to U.S. fleet operations in the Mediterranean, Khrushchev said the superpowers use aircraft carriers to warships to lie in wait for nationalist movements.

"They use warships as observation posts and to bring pressure on the policy of non-alignment," he said. "Aircraft carrier operations aim at restoring reactionary systems in Asia and Africa."

Standing on an anti-imperialist monument to Egyptian war dead, he condemned the British and Israeli attack of 1956. "The lesson of that defeat," he said, "is that the West's politicians are unable to realize the aim behind this shameful end."

He added that the goal of Britain and France in the attack was "to destroy Egypt's independence." He called Israel "the sent of imperialism." The Soviet leader paid tribute to this city, saying: "Port Said is renowned among the world's cities because it is a great harbor before which the dreams of the invaders collapsed."

Khrushchev said that in the past it was in the power of the nations "to enslave all of Asia and Asia's peoples." "But today the time is gone when the imperialists can commit their brutal crimes."

The Soviet premier looked restful after a train journey through the delta from Cairo. His wife accompanied him. Khrushchev pledged that the Soviet Union would always stand in Egypt against "imperialist aggression."

Industrial Commissioner Carter Nelson said the mines located in the San Rafael mining district west of Green River employ 11 men.

Poverty Root

WASHINGTON, May 19 (AP)—The roots of poverty in this country are, simply, lack of education and the deprivation it brings. Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz told the national committee for support of the public school Monday night.

Wirtz said a study of 2,500 young men who had failed the selective service mental test showed that 80 per cent of them were dropouts, and 40 per cent of the dropouts had stopped school at the eighth grade or below.

Boy Hanged By His Hands, Father Jailed

HOUSTON, May 19 (AP)—Blond, crew-cut Spencer Church, 9, still loves his mother and father. But he does not want to live with them if he is going to be hanged by his hands any more.

Spencer testified Monday at the aggravated assault trial of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Winston S. Churchill.

Churchill, 40, was found guilty and sentenced to six months in jail. His wife, Mary, 29, was found innocent of the same charge.

The boy told Prosecutor Reuben Hope that his father had hanged him from a bedroom wall by his hands. A sister, Margaret, 7, also testified she had been hanged by her wrists "two different times."

Hope asked Spencer why his father punished him so. "I was bad and was not supposed to eat," the boy replied, "and daddy caught me. I hung there most of the night."

"I love my mommy and daddy, but I don't want to live with them if they are going to hang me anymore."

Scrub Land Speculators Get Huge Profits From Swindles

WASHINGTON, May 19 (AP)—Congress was told Monday that land speculators have reaped big profits in one case a million dollars in 18 months—through sales of scrub land for vacation sites for the elderly.

In testimony before a Senate subcommittee investigating frauds against older people, W. Dan Bell, president of the Denver area Better Business Bureau, told of "cheating, lying, and swindling" speculators who sell the elderly retirement homesites on a waterless desert.

Bell said land promoters had recognized Colorado as a "sleeping state" in 1961 and had begun campaigns to offer "free lots" through the Seattle World's Fair and other public events.

Bell said both those who contracted to sell the raw land to the promoters and the persons who planned to purchase vacation lots were left holding the bag when many of the promoters simply disappeared.

The promoters often bought wasteland valued at as little as \$12 and acre and sold it for \$1,500 to \$2,000 an acre, Bell said. One promoter was estimated to have cleared a million dollar profit in a year and a half, he added.

Despite the unscrupulous practices, real estate officials from California, Colorado, Oregon and New York said they felt state laws could keep the speculators in line. The committee is investigating the possibility of tighter federal laws against speculators.

The state officials said that the problem is not with their laws, but with the laws of other states used by the speculators as a base of operation.

75 Teachers Are Dismissed After Levy Is Defeated

BOISE, May 19 (AP)—The Idaho fish and game department Monday reminded Idaho anglers that it is unlawful to refuse to produce licenses and fish for inspection if a conservation officer asks for them. It was one of a long list of reminders. Other unlawful acts:

To use more than one hand line, or one rod or pole with line or hooks, in any Idaho waters.

To use a hook larger than one-half inch measured from the point to shank in chinook salmon centers in the taking of salmon.

To use a gaff hook except in landing a fish from a boat.

To fish for salmon, trout or cutthroat with the aid of artificial lures or baits.

To deposit live fish from one watershed to another or from another state into Idaho. Live fish may be taken from and used for bait only in the Kootenai river in north Idaho.

To use a set line except in the Kootenai river for the taking of ling or sturgeon.

However, the agency said only one set line is permitted in the taking of sturgeon in these waters and this must be attended at least once every 24 hours. In all other parts of the state, set lines are prohibited for any kind of fishing.

Mauch Fined For Run-in With Umpire

HOUSTON, May 19 (AP)—Philadelphia Manager Gene Mauch has been fined \$150 and suspended for two days for a run-in with umpire Leo Weyer in Sunday night's game against Houston, it was revealed Monday night.

Mauch was not in uniform Monday night as the Phillies and Colts played a night game. He watched from the stands. He also will miss Tuesday night's game in San Francisco.

The fine was levied by National League President Warren Giles for Mauch's part in a fifth inning war of words with Weyer Sunday night as the Phillies defeated the Colts 2-0.

Weyer first ejected catcher Clay Delrympis for arguing ball strikes. Weyer then ejected Mauch to the aid of his receiver, Weyer also ejected the Philadelphia manager.

This is the second time Mauch has been suspended for arguing with an umpire. He was fined \$100 and suspended for two days for pushing umpire Ed Vargo July 7, 1960.

Killebrew Is Beginning To Defend Title

NEW YORK, May 19 (AP)—Harmon Killebrew, playing a passive role over the first month of the 1964 baseball season, has finally become an active member of Minnesota's lineup. He has been successful in his American league homerun title.

Killebrew only had four homers in the Twins' first 31 games. Then, he cracked five in his next five games, including a pair in Sunday's doubleheader against Boston. With nine, he trails the leaders, teammate Bob Allison and Rocky Colavito of Kansas City by one.

Killebrew led the AL with 48 homers last season and has a lifetime total of 187.

Clay Begins African Tour In Ghana

ACCRA, Ghana, May 19 (AP)—The American embassy, the scene of an angry anti-American demonstration in which the American flag was pulled down, was a scene of jubilation Monday as scores of Ghanaians huddled world heavyweight boxing champion Cassius Clay.

Clay, who arrived here by air Sunday, explained to the press himself. "Mouhammad Ali," a Muslim name, because "I rediscovered myself."

Clay paid a courtesy call on American Ambassador William P. Mahoney Jr.

Like the king he calls himself Ali, Clay wore a red, green, blue and black headwrap with African sandals to match.

Clay arrived at the embassy at about 10 a.m. Without announcement, but within three minutes a crowd of 100 people had gathered. By the time he finished his 15-minute courtesy call, the whole compound was full of people chanting, "Clay, Clay."
