

Nehru's Body Cremated In Ancient Hindu Rite As Vast Crowds Mourn

NEW DELHI, India, May 28 (AP)—Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru's body was cremated in the flames of a funeral pyre today in an ancient Hindu ceremony attended by thousands of mourners on the banks of the sacred Jumna river. Ending an era, Nehru's 77-year-old grandson, Sanjaya Gandhi, touched a torch to the huge pile of sandalwood on which the prime minister's body lay. Police had to beat back crowds with clubs when the gun carriage bearing Nehru's body approached the crematorium site after a funeral procession through the city. Thousands of shuffling feet set up a dust cloud that obscured even the towering walls of the nearby Red Fort.

Saturn Moon Rocket Soars Into Orbit

CAPE KENNEDY, May 28 (AP)—A Saturn-I upper booster, billed as the world's mightiest rocket, today hurled a pioneer model of NASA's Apollo moonship into orbit on its first practice flight around the Earth. With one mighty thrust of slightly more than 10 minutes, the booster sent a spacecraft from Cape Kennedy to an orbit some 100 miles up. The flight was a milestone for the space agency, which said "our information from the flight center in Greenbelt, Md., tells us that we have a satellite in orbit." The Saturn-I worked flawlessly from start to finish. The success was the sixth straight without failure for the booster and measures a major stride forward in the drive to get two astronauts on the moon in late 1968. The Saturn-I, generating more power than 31,000 family automobiles combined, rose from its launching pad with a ground-breaking roar at 10:59 a.m. PDT.

Rocky and Goldwater Step up Pace

LOS ANGELES, May 28 (AP)—Sen. Harry Goldwater, bolstered by a major victory in California, stepped up his pace today to visit Monterey where Goldwater had been Tuesday for a round of appearances before a group of supporters.

Goldwater revealed the neutrality statements he had received from the former vice president, the United States ambassador, and the Pennsylvania governor.

Both Nixon and Scrantom recalled they are not out to stop either Rockefeller or Goldwater in the primary election next Tuesday.

There was, conversely, no such statement from Lodge. His son George, appeared at a news conference early Wednesday to urge Lodge supporters to vote for Rockefeller, saying it was "the surest way to endorse Lodge in California."

U. S. Drugs Will Face Tough Study

WASHINGTON, May 28 (AP)—The government announced yesterday it will insist on a broad-scale review of drugs placed on the market from 1938 to mid-1961 to make sure they are safe and effective for human use.

The food and drug administration (FDA), overruling objections from the drug industry, issued sweeping new regulations to enforce the tougher 1962 drug control law.

Before this law was passed, new drugs were cleared on the basis of safety alone. Now they must be shown to be effective for their intended purpose by sound medical evidence.

Today the regulations apply to all drugs for human use that were cleared under the 1938 food, drug and cosmetic act until new reporting and review procedures took effect last June 28.

The government will have new power to order a drug taken off the market if the manufacturer fails to submit the required reports to the FDA. But, however, cannot be taken before Oct. 30.

Alaskan Water Put Off Limits For Southwest

WASHINGTON, May 28 (AP)—Sen. Ernest Gruening, D-Alaska, missed yesterday that thirty Arizonans and Californians need not look to the Yukon river to meet their water needs.

"We think we're going to head all the water up there," he said. "There is other water they can get without going so far north."

Oruening thus joined Sen. Henry M. Jackson, D-Wash., and Sen. Joseph R. Biden, D-Ill., in asking to fence off northern rivers from arid southwesterners faced with dwindling water supplies.

Jackson, chairman of the senate interior committee, has served notice that the Columbia river is out of bounds, while Biden has said Idaho will use all the water it can get from the Snake river.

Oruening staked off the Yukon in response to a question about an ambitious plan proposed by a group of Arizonans seeking firm to transport water from the Yukon as far south as Mexico.

The Alaska Democrat indicated the water of the Yukon river would be needed for the proposed 1.3 billion dollar Rampart dam in the heart of Alaska.
