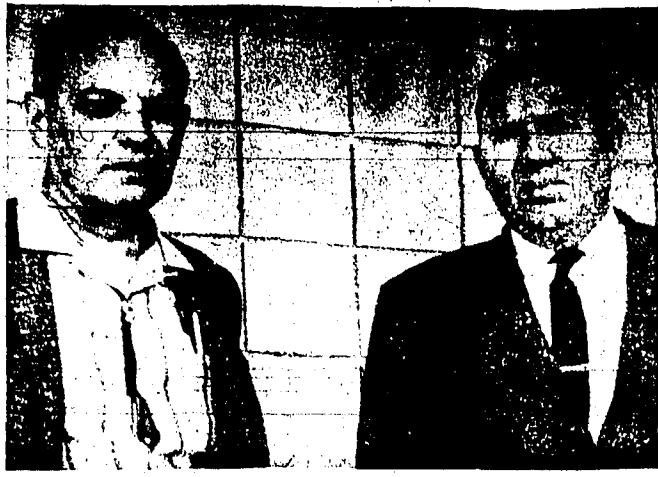

Kennedy Film Available Next Autumn

NEW YORK, June 1 (AP)—A dramatic documentary motion picture on the assassination of President Kennedy will be produced by David L. Wolper in association with United Press International for worldwide television and movie release this autumn. It was announced today.

Wolper said the documentary "Four Days in November" will be shown in November. It will include on the assassination and related events never before shown publicly.

Representatives of Wolper Productions and UPI have obtained film on the events in Dallas and Washington from every available professional and amateur source for production. Producer-director Mel Stuart who has interviewed eye-witnesses, traced the route of accused assassin Lee Harvey Oswald and viewed thousands of feet of film in assembling material for the documentary.

Growing Population, Booming Auto Registrations Make Control Necessary

With a growing population and local automobile registrations growing about 20 per cent greater than the increase in population, traffic control is necessary, states a report by the Twin Falls city engineering department.

Traffic control study should be a continuous thing that must change with the population's desire to travel from one place to another and park when they arrive, all to be accomplished with as much economy and safety as possible, the report states.

The heaviest traffic accident frequencies resulted within the original townsite, principally in the central mercantile district, and along addition avenue east of Five Points west to Rock creek.

The areas of high accident frequency have been analyzed from an engineering standpoint, and suggestions made for improvement of the physical conditions of these areas to aid in the reduction of accidents.

The report said on Addison avenue the majority of accidents resulted from the combination of left turning movements and high speed. During 1962, 42 cars were hit from the rear while stopped, or slowing for a left turn. Four additional accidents occurred when drivers misjudged the speed of oncoming traffic during a left

turn movement.

It is recommended that a 12-foot wide median strip with left turn bays at each side street be painted the length of Addison avenue west.

This action would require the elimination of all parking along the street. The painted median would give visual protection to cars desiring to turn left by allowing them to leave the traveling lanes while waiting for an opportunity to complete the turn movement.

If the driving public fails to respond to the painted delineators the next step for accident prevention would be to construct raised, or curbed, median strips with left turn bays. This would provide physical as well as visual protection for cars stopped for left turns, the report notes.

The Five Points north accident rate was low for an awkward intersection that carries about 10,000 vehicles per day. The report says this intersection needs total reconstruction. The reconstruction would be necessary for a length of approximately 600 to 600 feet back from the intersection, particularly along Blue Lakes, Blue Lakes boulevard north and Addison avenue. It is

south-bound. Although these buttons "could" be crossed physically by cars without damage, the line of buttons would tend to force the cars in the outside lane into the right turn only.

The Kimberly road and Locust street intersection is controlled by traffic actuated signals, and three are left turn bays on Kimberly road. Although the accident rate was not high at this intersection during 1962, it has been reported to the police department that the traffic signals often catch the Kimberly road driver by surprise.

It is recommended that "signal ahead" signs be placed on Kimberly road approximately 300 feet on each side of the intersection and that several of the large trees on the northeast corner be removed.

WASHINGTON, June 1—There has been too much wishful hair splitting about Alabama Gov. George Wallace's three forays into the North with his hateful, racist, and bigoted rhetoric. He has scored three victories in a row—in Wisconsin, Indiana and Maryland.

In none of those states did Wallace lose a single vote. In fact, he lost only one vote in Wisconsin, and that was to a Republican who had been elected in 1960. In Indiana, he lost only one vote to a Democrat who had been elected in 1960. In Maryland, he lost only one vote to a Democrat who had been elected in 1960.

Andrew Tully, a practical politician, Wallace could not have expected to do much better.

RIBICOFF'S BLUNT APPRAISAL—Thus it is good to note that some of Capitol Hill's advocates of the civil rights bill have not been misled by the headlines that have been enough to acknowledge Wallace's existence. Sen. Abraham Ribicoff, D. Conn., appraised Wallace's showing in Maryland, where he netted a whopping 43 per cent of the Democratic vote, with blunt common sense.

"Wallace did score a big victory, and we should not gloss it over," Ribicoff said. "It proved that a lot of Americans in the North as well as the South do not believe in civil rights."

JAVITS UNREALISTIC—Javits must know this is hot air. Few, if any, in the North have been "deceived" by the bill's attackers. They just do not, in Ribicoff's words, believe in civil rights because they're afraid it will affect their social and economic lives. They're afraid provisions such as fair employment will force them to mix with citizens they wish to avoid and will create new competition for their jobs.

CIVIL RIGHTS BILL UNAFFECTED—Wallace's three victories are not likely to have any effect on the civil rights bill now in the senate except perhaps to delay a vote on cloture for a few more days. The bill, sponsored by Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, D. Minn., eventually will pass. Republicans as well as Democrats are on the spot in this election year, and cannot seem to be dragging their feet.

But the effect of the Wallace forays was to remind the people's government that the people still have a strong interest in the four freedoms of the bill. When a man as unpalatable to northern traditions as Wallace nets 35 per cent of the vote in three northern states, he reflects a national unease. That 35 per cent may have to accept the bill as inevitable, but they have served notice they don't like it.

DOWN WITH REFERENCE MEN

Everyone should have a windmill to tilt at. Our windmill for the day is "1964 reference man." We don't want to tilt at him. We just can't warm up to him.

The 1964 reference man, in case anyone has not heard by now, is the "moderately active" American used for purposes of comparison by the National Academy of Sciences-National Research Council. According to a recent report, the food he eats contains 2,500 calories, averages 1500 American extra-much less energy than the 1958 reference man. Therefore he needs less food per day—or at least fewer calories—than the man in 1958. About six pats of butter less, for example.

We wouldn't mind eating less. Our eyes have never been bigger than our stomachs. Sometimes one of these official-sounding reports can remind a man that greed is one of the traditional sins when even his best friends won't tell him.

HOFFA YOUNKED GREEK HISTORY

President James Hoffa of the Teamsters union comes close to qualifying as the protagonist in Greek tragedy—brought down at last by profligate use of his own power and pride.

No power in organized labor or in industry approached the personal power exercised by Jimmy Hoffa. He was a force to be reckoned with. He could and did shake off the course and expulsion voted by the AFL-CIO; he could brush away the evidence of corruption, criminality and venality in his union uncovered by the United States government. Snuff, we imagine, would be even more convenient. From the standpoint of handiness alone, snuff-taking on a large scale seems doomed.

World Corners

When Soviet First Deputy Premier Anastas Mikoyan visited Japan in 1961, he bore with him a letter from Nikita Khrushchev warning the Japanese that the presence of United States bases there could drag them into a nuclear war.

The irritated Japanese replied that they would not let the Khrushchev warning as an attempt to interfere in Japan's internal affairs.

On his current visit to Japan Mikoyan carried with him another Khrushchev note.

It suggested that the Japanese join the Soviet Union in demanding a total nuclear test ban, including underground, and that it was time they signed a World War II peace treaty.

Again the Japanese reaction was not, "Jeez, they said there was a question of adequate guarantees of a test ban and then for settlement of Japanese demands for return of the Kurile Islands."

But in Mikoyan's briefcase were other proposals which were of more interest to the Japanese. Mikoyan submitted a list of goods worth 350 million dollars which he said the Soviet Union wanted to buy from Japan, not only for its expanding chemical program but also for a new five-year industrial plan beginning in 1966.

Credit terms, he said, should be granted for from 10 to 15 years.

Japanese businessmen, eager to expand their worldwide trade, had long dismissed interest in the "peace" treaty. But Mikoyan would do at least some business.

Industrial Japan suffers from an imbalance between exports and imports.

But in at least one respect she was in an enviable position.

As part of their struggle for influence in Asia and Africa, both the Soviet Union and Red China have been wooing Japan.

The Chinese want Japanese fertilizer, chemicals, and even whole plants.

Chinese trade delegations have been visiting Japan in increasing numbers; and many influential Japanese have visited the Chinese mainland.

Besides buying from the Japanese, the Chinese also want to sell to them.

Japanese imports from Red China last year totaled 75 million dollars and are expected to jump another 30 per cent this year.

In terms of world trade the figures are small, but they are a part of an increasing effort by the Chinese Reds to earn the hard foreign currencies they need to buy grain, raw materials and industrial products.

The efforts of both the Soviets and the Red Chinese pose problems for the United States.

The United States has opposed long-term credits being granted to the Soviets by Britain and France, on the grounds that such credits simply amount to another form of foreign aid and underwrite the Soviet economy for years to come. It soon may be necessary to undertake similar practices.

Increasingly close Japanese economic ties with Red China would pose this and other problems. Japanese influence among smaller Asian nations already is increasing. If increasing economic ties with Red China should lead finally to diplomatic recognition and support of Red China, many of these smaller nations might follow suit.

The Doctor Says

Q—Our 18-month-old son has a craving to eat dirt. He'd rather eat dirt than candy. He is otherwise normal. What can I do to stop him?

A—Dirt is not uncommon for a toddler to eat a great variety of substances that are not food. This is part of his exploration of his universe. The cause is not known, but this tendency does not indicate any lack of an essential nutrient in his diet—dirt would not supply such a lack.

All toddlers are attracted to and prevented from eating things that are harmful. Fines of old paint from the walls present a real hazard—lead poisoning—unless the walls have been painted with one of the newer lead-free paints.

The best way to stop your son from continuing this or any other potentially dangerous habit is to issue a firm ultimatum. No more dirt! You must teach him early in life that there are some things he just can't do.

My 11-year-old daughter has a high IQ, but she can't seem to do her school work properly. Her father was killed in an auto accident when she was six. Could this have anything to do with her poor school work?

A—Emotional reactions of children to the death of a loved one vary greatly. It is certainly possible that your daughter is still brooding over the death of her father and this could have a bad effect on her school performance. This would be especially true if she has never had a chance to talk out her ideas and fears about death. Some children have weird and unrealistic

ideas that need to be aired and clarified. The fact that five years have already elapsed would indicate a deep-seated problem for which your daughter may need the help of a specialist in child psychology.

Q—Our doctor says our five-year-old son has polyostotic fibrous dysplasia. He says there is no cure for it. What is the cause and how should we do it?

A—Your son's condition is due to a developmental defect. It is characterized by bone cysts and is usually limited to one side of the body. Fibrous connective tissue in the place of bone in the cystic areas. Finally the affected bones are fragile and easily broken, especially in the form of braces, is necessary. 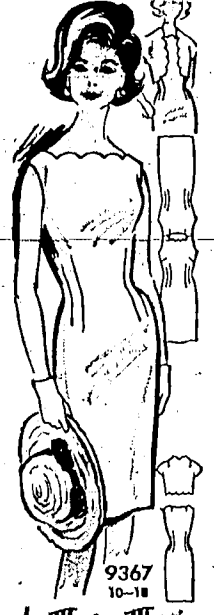

Scarfiotti Wins German Auto Race

A 10-minute cloud burst hit sections of the track eight minutes before the finish but the run continued to allow on the grandstand. Scarfiotti's Ferrari answered on the track but did not leave it during the storm.

A record crowd of over 300,000 fans watched the race, which counts toward the manufacturer's grand touring world championship.

Many of the 82 cars that started were forced out by accidents and mechanical troubles. Several swerved off the track but there were no injuries.
