

## Asia Area Strategy Formed

WASHINGTON, June 3 (AP)—Secretary of State Dean Rusk and Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara returned today from a Honolulu conference with "a number of recommendations" for President Johnson on new action to strengthen Southeast Asia against communist pressures.

Landing at Andrews air force base, Rusk told newsmen "We brought back a number of recommendations, and we usually do from these meetings."

He said "the commitment of the American nation, its people and its government," to protect Southeast Asia against red aggression "are well-known."

Then he added: "The problem is to make sure the other side fully understands that we mean what we say."

Rusk and McNamara were expected to see Johnson late in the day after the President's return from a speaking trip to New England.

McNamara was asked whether there are any plans for expanding the Vietnam war by sending North Vietnamese troops to North Vietnam. He declared "No plans have been recommended to the President for approval and none has been approved."

This stopped short of denying that plans have been made by military experts, but it was in line with Johnson's statement yesterday that he was not personally aware of any plans.

Alides traveling with Rusk and McNamara said much of the planning in the two-day Honolulu strategy conference, which included last night, was concentrated with ways of strengthening the anti-communist war effort in South Viet Nam and supporting more effectively the government of Premier Nguyen Khanh.

Officials returning with the two cabinet officers declined to say exactly what steps would be proposed to Johnson for achieving the purpose Rusk had made of making communist forces Viet Nam. He said the Soviet Union aware of U. S. determination not to let Southeast Asia fall to red conquest.

McNamara flew from Washington to Hawaii last Sunday. Rusk went there from Texas where he served last week as President Johnson's special representative at funeral services for Indian Prime Minister Nehru. He said his time in India had been "a most deeply moving experience." He expressed admiration for the manner in which the new Indian leadership had acted to fill the gap created by Nehru's death.

## Idahoans Feel Goldwater Is Almost "in"

BOISE, June 3 (AP)—Idaho Republican party officials agreed today Barry Goldwater was in a huge stride toward winning his party's Presidential nomination.

"Goldwater is in," State GOP Chairman John Mackurray today predicted flatly after hearing the Arizona senator had won the California primary. "He has got it in the bag. He's going in with almost 500 votes."

"I look for Goldwater to be in on the first ballot, certainly no later than the second when the favorite sons have had their say."

Gov. Robert E. Smylie, chairman of the National Republican Governors' association, agreed. "I stand with what I said earlier," the chief executive said, "that his win there virtually clinches the nomination and demonstrates the effectiveness of his organization."

Harley Markham, Pocahontas, Idaho Republican state chairman, committee man, and Mrs. Glenna Barnett, Boise, the GOP national committeewoman, also believe Goldwater will be the nominee.

Markham said the California primary made it "very obvious" it puts Goldwater almost within striking distance of the nomination on the first ballot because "he is the key to the tipover."

He said the nominee will be Goldwater.

"It can't be anyone else," Markham said.

I agree with the rest of them," Mr. Barnett said. "This is all he needed. It's a tribute to the precinct workers' efforts in California. This is evidence of his strong grassroots support at the precinct level."

## First Crop of Alfalfa Ruined By Hailstorm South of Burley

About 2,000 acres of land in the Golden valley area south of Burley were hit by hail Tuesday afternoon in a general rainstorm which varied in intensity from a heavy downpour in Twin Falls to light drizzle in Fairfield, Gooding, Shoshone, Carey and Wendell. The first crop of alfalfa was reported ruined on the Golden Valley and Kenyon farms after hail covered a strip about four miles wide, 10 miles south of Burley. Farmers said Wednesday the alfalfa plants will recover from the pounding and they expect the second crop of hay will not be affected.

Beets and grain also were pounded into the ground, but farmers in the area said they feel these crops will "come out of it." Potatoes still are being planted and hardly any plants are above ground yet, so they were not damaged by the hailstones which were described as large as marbles.

Farmers recalled that Tuesday's hailstorm was not as intense as one about this time last year. Further south, at Oakley, 33 of an inch of rainfall was reported from Monday to Tuesday nights, but no hail fell in Oakley.

Twin Falls received 56 of an inch of the epicyclonic rain Tuesday, but was less than the 76 of an inch which fell May 28.

A heavy downpour which elongated Twin Falls storm sewers overflowing Tuesday afternoon also weakened a portion of the road to Shoshone Falls. Late Tuesday evening a 7-foot-long and 3-foot-wide section of ground along the north side of the road about 150 yards from the top of the grade, was washed out.

It was reported that only about a foot-wide section of the roadway was taken out when the adjacent ground gave way. Twin Falls police were notified of the washout about 9:30 p.m. See HYORTH, Pg. 2, Col. 4

## Warren Panel Still Unsure About Oswald

WASHINGTON, June 3 (AP)—Some feeling exists among members of the Warren commission that no final conclusion should be reached at this time that Lee Harvey Oswald acted alone in the assassination of President John F. Kennedy.

A spokesman for the seven-member commission had told United Press International previously that the group's final report would dispel all speculation that the assassination might have been part of a political conspiracy.

But sources now say there is some feeling by commission members that it would be premature to reach such a conclusion until the investigation ordered by President Johnson is completed.

The commission, headed by Chief Justice Earl Warren, plans to hear a number of additional witnesses and is not expected to wrap up the inquiry before late June.

## Rain, Hail Pelt Midwest From Rockies to East

A band of heavy rain and hail pelted parts of the Midwest eastward to New York today and temperatures skidded near freezing again in northern Minnesota.

An intense hailstorm pelted the Madison, Wis., area with two inches of quarter-sized ice balls Tuesday night. Many showers fell over coastal Virginia through the central and northern Rockies and southeastern Florida.

Light rain teased parched areas of Indiana, victims of a dry spell dating back to late April.

The derby will be held from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m., sponsored by the local Moose lodge with the Twin Falls parks commission as co-sponsor.

The fishing area will be stocked early Saturday morning with trout donated by Frame Trout farm, Canyon Trout farm and Greene's Trout farm, according to Chad Browning, Twin Falls parks and recreation director.

Some of the prizes donated by local merchants will be given to fishermen with the biggest fish, the first fish caught, the most fish, the longest fish and the heaviest fish.

A fishing area will be blocked off between Elizabeth boulevard and Harmon Park avenue.

## Homage Paid In Vatican To Pope John

VATICAN CITY, June 3 (AP)—Pope Paul VI led the Roman Catholic church today in homage to Pope John XXIII on the first anniversary of his death.

The pontiff descended into the crypt beneath St. Peter's Basilica to celebrate a memorial Mass before the flower-decked tomb of Pope John. Then he knelt for several minutes in silent prayer.

A succession of masses followed before the tomb. One was celebrated by Mgr. Louis Capovilla, who was Pope John's private secretary.

Another memorial service was scheduled at 8:30 a.m. Monday, Pope John's native village where his brothers still work their farms.

Pilgrims by the thousands thronged to the pope's birthplace in the north Italian mountains. A petition with 50,000 signatures, asking the start of a beatification cause for Pope John, was brought to Bishop Clemente Cacciari by the foundation of the north Italian mountains.

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## Bever Hit On Statement About Power

REPORT, June 3—The president of the Snake River Valley Power association Tuesday sharply criticized a statement by George D. Dyer, Idaho's Valley Republican chairman, in a statement describing the Bonneville Power administration as "pure socialism."

John Brog, Rupert, accused Dyer of "reversing the great Republican policies which built our enterprise... on southern Idaho's once-desert lands."

"Most of the free enterprise economy on the Columbia river basin," Brog said in a statement, "was built on the foundation of river development as envisioned and achieved through the efforts of such Republicans as Idaho's Sen. William L. Borah and Oregon's Sen. Charley McNary."

"The new Downhatch dam on the Clearwater river, named for another Idaho Republican, will produce another 300,000 kilowatts of power which will go into the BPA system to bring more wealth to Oregon and Washington."

"I urge Dyer to stop his ranting because Dyer thinks it is 'unwanted and unnecessary' for Idaho."

Borah, Brog declared, "urged congress to adopt a policy of 'public ownership' development and control of our water power... to keep this heritage wholly and exclusively for the people as a whole."

The people of Oregon, Washington and Western Montana have utilized the great resources of the Columbia river system in accordance with the dreams of Borah, McNary, Senator Morris and other great spokesmen of the Republican party," Brog said.

"Their economies have grown as predicted and their private power companies have shared in the prosperity. Idaho alone has faltered to where we were the only Northwest state with a drop in per capita income last year."

Brog never veiled that the people of southern Idaho should not have the federal dams which have contributed so much to free enterprise development of the region."

## Waitress Is Attacked at World's Fair

A 10-year-old waitress at the World's Fair was raped at knifepoint near her home today by two men she described as Negroes as police launched a 5-million dollar search for a subway terror in New York City.

The attack came only hours after Mayor Robert F. Wagner announced plans to curb increased incidents of violence which have plagued the nation's largest city. The plans include the assignment of hundreds of additional police to nighttime patrol duty.

Police withheld the identity of the girl, who is of Chinese descent and who works at a Chinese restaurant at the fair.

Detectives said she told of being attacked as she left a bus in the Hellgate major section of Queens while returning home from work.

## Johnson Asserts U. S. Military Strength Is Great

NEW LONDON, Conn., June 3 (AP)—President Johnson said today the United States is stronger militarily than any adversary combination of adversaries but "the staggering strength is not to destroy but to save, not to put an end to civilization but to put an end to conflict."

Johnson prepared for graduation exercises at the Coast guard academy, Johnson predicted that this country's strength will continue to grow more rapidly than the might of all others.

# Goldwater Grabs Smashing Win in California Primary

SAN FRANCISCO, June 3 (AP)—Sen. Barry Goldwater grabbed a commanding lead for the GOP presidential nomination today with a stunning California primary victory. Confounding the pollsters who had made him the underdog, the Arizona senator came from behind in the vote count to nose out New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller for the state's 86 Republican presidential-nominating votes.

Goldwater's victory had been forecast by the electronic projections of the television networks. But it took all-night tabulations of the actual votes to establish him firmly as the winner.

Rockefeller carried most of the California counties in what was a liberal vs. conservative battle.

Southern California returns, chiefly from Los Angeles, gave Goldwater his first victory in a major contested primary after losses in New Hampshire and Oregon. This put him near the 655 delegate votes required for the nomination.

The Associated Press tabulation of returns from 31,316 of the state's 31,661 precincts showed Goldwater 1,023,930, Rockefeller 885,800.

Goldwater was getting 50.9 per cent of the vote. Most of the network projections had ranged around 51 per cent, a figure on which CBS settled after having predicted generally that he would win with 53 per cent.

Oblivious to a short-lived bomb scare, Goldwater took a triumphant nap as he flew from Los Angeles to Washington.

He had a passenger off Goldwater's job-airliner in Los Angeles and made him unspack a satchel. When no bombs or guns were found in it, airline officials let him reboard.

In high good humor, Goldwater joked with reporters on his arrival in Washington.

Adding to the long dispute between Arizona and California over the waters of the Colorado river, the Arizona senator cracked: "I have a different attitude toward California now. They can have all the water we have."

Goldwater previously had called his California victory a "gut and stop" toward the presidential nomination.

Pierre Salinger, former White House press secretary, trounced State Controller Alan Cranston for the Democratic nomination for the U.S. senate seat held by ailing Democratic Sen. Clair Engle.

"The Salinger victory dealt a setback to Gov. Edmund G. Brown and other party elements who supported Cranston. If power of the Kennedy alliance, showed too, the vote-pulling used heavily by the press secretary to the late President.

The 39-year-old former San Francisco newspaper reporter will face the Republican nominee, onetime actor George Murphy.

## Concedes

NEW YORK, June 3 (AP)—Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller today conceded defeat in the California Republican presidential primary, but he said he would continue to fight for fundamental GOP principles.

## Guardsmen Called In Midwest Strike

Nearly 1,000 Michigan National Guardsmen kept the peace today at Hillsdale, Mich., scene of the bitterest of a rash of labor disputes in the Midwest. Negotiations at the Essex Wire Corp. collapsed yesterday on the eve of the plant's reopening, authorized by Gov. George Romney after he had kept the plant closed for five days. Guards and imported labor had kept the plant in partial operation during the strike. Feelings were bitter in the city where strike violence has flared sporadically since the international union of electrical workers pulled out its 180 production workers 90 days ago. The IUE was attempting to win its first contract at Essex. It had replaced the "honor" union as bargaining agent at Essex.

## Tot Taken, Later Found To Be Safe

CRAIG, Colo., June 3—A 1-year-old child was found safe after being pulled out of a car late last night, seven hours after he was taken from a stroller near his home.

Moffatt county Sheriff's Captain Dean Lawton said in Craig the child was recovered from a couple who gave their names as Ronald and Sara Elliot.

## General Says Power Misuse Is Problem

ATLANTA, June 3 (AP)—Gen. Curtis E. LeMay said today "modern weapons must do better than it has in the past." The U.S. air force chief of staff said in an address at commencement ceremonies at the Air Force academy.

A graduating class of 495 cadets received diplomas from General LeMay in the academy football stadium.

LeMay said the United States arsenal of missiles "will build toward an objective of more than 1,200 by 1970."

"Over that period," he said, "our forces of more than 6,000 first-line aircraft will be continued with new, improved models coming into the inventory."

"There is no evidence of stagnation in the present power balance. It still favors us by a clear margin. It is still determined by relative pace of actions going forward in all the areas of national endeavor—social, economic and military," he said.

### Quiet Effort Started for Utah Schools

**SALT LAKE CITY, June 3**—A quiet effort to solve Utah's school crisis has begun today by leaders of the Utah Education Association and three other school groups.

UES officers comprising a special committee to work out special solutions to the crisis have been in consultation with members of the Utah board of education, State School Board, Education Association and the Utah Society of Superintendents.

The cases were described as "collegiate."

UES members, when they voted last month not to sign contracts for the coming school year, authorized their leaders to seek alternate solutions to the crisis if no special session of the state legislature was called.

UES leaders also were preparing for Thursday's "routine" meeting of the house of delegates at Provo high school. The highlights of the session will be the election of officers of the UEA, chairmen—teachers—committee.

The meeting will begin at 9 a. m. It will be followed by a session of the UEA Local 1700—teachers' association.

House of delegates members will be concluding officially a meeting that began in April and was suspended until the governor's school study committee made its report. That report and Gov. George D. Oyler's subsequent refusal to follow its recommendation for a special legislative session triggered a two-day "recess" by UEA members in late May.

### N. Y. Mayor Opening War On Terrorists

**NEW YORK, June 3**—Mayor Robert F. Wagner declared all-out war today on rascals Negro terrorists, hoodlums and other hoodlums as well—pledging 5 million dollars to beef up the police force with 900 more men to stem a rising tide of violence on streets and in suburbs.

The announcement came after an emergency meeting of top city officials called by the alarmed mayor to deal with the situation which has grown so desperate in some areas that one newspaper, the World-Telegram and Sun, suggested citizens may soon be forced to travel in armed groups for safety.

"We are determined to see that we have law and order in this city of ours," Wagner said. "And we have agreed to a number of emergency moves."

Police Commissioner Michael J. Murphy, who attended the meeting, warned that while the latest terrorist and violence has been in Brooklyn, hoodlums could break out in other parts of the city as well.

Dozens of special policemen and undercover agents have been working for weeks, for instance, in Harlem investigating reports that rebel Black Muslims have been recruiting teen-agers as "blood brothers" and training them to fight in case of racial disturbances.

The alarm sweeping the city was spurred by teen-age Negro gangs which terrorized white passengers on four separate subway trains during the week-end. The whites were attacked with knives, bottles, fists and even a meat cleaver.

### Johnson Opposes Any Aggressions

**WASHINGTON, June 3**—President Johnson yesterday emphasized to Israeli Prime Minister Levi Eshkol, America's "firm opposition . . . to aggression and the use of force or the threat of force against any country."

This was pointed up in a joint communique at the conclusion of two days of talks, which said that Johnson returned to the territorial integrity and political independence of all countries in the Near East.

### Schofield Not Happy Over U.S.-Red Pact

**HOUSTON, June 3**—Republican congressional candidate Keith Schofield yesterday asserted that the signing of the United States-Russian consular treaty will create new centers for Soviet espionage in the United States.

"In Chicago, New York, San Francisco, or wherever Soviet consulates are established," Schofield said in a statement, "the consulates will serve as centers to carry out espionage and other assignments directed against the U. S."

"The United States," he declared, "will not enjoy similar advantages in the Soviet Union and the additional protection afforded to American citizens by the treaty will be negligible or non-existent."

Schofield described as a "farce and a mockery perhaps unparalleled in history" what he said was a promise by the Soviet Union in 1933 to never again engage in subversive activities in the United States.

### Greater U. S. Aid Pends for Cattlemen

**WASHINGTON, June 3**—Reports circulated in farm circles today that President Johnson soon will ask congress for legislation which would broaden government credit assistance to cattlemen hard pressed by current low prices.

These reports said the President had decided to rely on such credit measures and on efforts to expand exports of beef to bring improvement to the cattle situation.

Some farm groups and some members of congress have urged that the government buy both cattle and beef for export under the food-for-peace program and that it offer payment to encourage cattlemen to market animals at light weights. All these measures would be aimed to reduce cattle numbers and hence the supply of beef.

There is general agreement between the government and most farm groups that overexpansion in cattle production has contributed to the low prices. Some cattlemen put much of the blame on increased imports.

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### Sad Results

Utah high school student's survey about Utah's school problem is indicative of public understanding and knowledge generally, the nation has far more trouble than anyone ever imagined. Those in public positions or activity dealing with the public have known for years that the average citizen is complacent beyond comprehension. In addition, many adults fasten to erroneous facts and beliefs they are firmly convinced are nothing but the truth. It's difficult enough to combat apathy, but even harder to straighten out erroneous "facts."

Christina Roberts, 16-year-old junior at Lehi high school, selected 100 adults at random for her survey. The purpose was to determine how much citizens knew about their schools. Miss Roberts proved Utahns actually know little about their schools and, judging from some of the answers to the questions she asked, a good percentage couldn't care less.

For instance, 76 per cent believed Governor Clyde was justified in refusing to call a special session of the legislature, 66 per cent thought teachers were not justified in their two-day boycott of schools, 67 per cent thought schools needed more financial aid and only 58 per cent thought teachers were underpaid. If the varied responses proves anything, it's that Utah teachers haven't done a convincing job of selling their point to the public.

Significantly, not one of the 100 persons interviewed knew the name of the state superintendent of public instruction and guesses of the sum asked by a governor's special commission ranged from \$800,000 to nine billion dollars!

Those who are concerned with public opinion contend that the public always should be given the proper facts to help individuals form their opinions. Thoughts of individuals, taken collectively, comprise public opinion. But what happens when the individuals refuse to absorb a few simple facts that are available to anyone who can read?

Although many civic-minded persons are not ready to admit it, even after the same situation has existed for years, the simple fact is that too many individuals cannot be bothered. They have "too many other things" on their minds, notably, the pursuit of personal pleasure and enjoyment. Sad, but true, about the only thing that can arouse the interest—even momentarily—of many Americans is to interfere with that personal pleasure. It's possible to arouse plenty of interest if something interferes with a television station, or by curtailing fishing, closing the bowling alley and so on.

There's no reason to expect Idahoans would make any better score on a survey similar to the one conducted by the Utah student. There's a simple little test readily available to each reader. How many trustees serve on your school board and who are they?

**"THEY" GET AROUND!**  
The anonymous pronoun, "they," comes in right handy for those persons imagining persecution, looking for scapegoats, persons who cannot pinpoint critics and any number of reasons. Above all, "they" can be right active during a political campaign. Candidates, who for some reason or other either cannot name their opponents or don't care to, fall back on the familiar "they."

Those who accept use of the anonymous pronoun are indeed gullible. Whenever anyone starts talking along that line, ask for the identity of those referred to only as "they." Particularly in a political campaign, voters are entitled to know if "they" are out to control the results of an election one way or another.

The latest use of the anonymous pronoun comes from George Hanson, a Republican candidate for second district congressman. "They" are blamed for "one of the meanest character assassination attempts in Idaho politics for years."

Hanson goes ahead to declare, "I am prepared to publicly answer any accusations. I have nothing to hide." That's fine and such things should be out in the open. Let Mr. Hanson identify his opponents, if he can. If not, he should bring into the open the charges he contends are character assassination. Let's have some facts about the material and the attempts at character assassination. Perhaps such facts can shed a little light on the identity.

## NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON, June 3—Sen. Warren Magnuson, D. Wash., has come up with a proposal to help the American businessman cash in on the new markets created in the so-called developing countries by our foreign aid dollars.

He wants the government to hire veteran American salesmen to work out a drive to find new buyers for U.S. products. The foreign buyer, says Magnuson, should be exposed to some American expertise—men with 20 or 30 years of "hard, competitive selling experience."

**POLITE ARM-TWISTING**—Give these Yankee peddlers a grounding in the language and economy of a foreign country, says Magnuson, and they can do a better job of selling our products to some polite arm-twisting. These would be men who could talk knowledgeably "and in the language of trade" that the foreign businessmen understand.

It is a project, says Magnuson, aimed at a paradox that is costing the U.S. business community a lot of money each year. American foreign aid dollars put a developing country on its feet, and then our competitors from other countries step in and take over the new markets for industrial plants, machinery, chemicals, trucks and buses.

**U. S. EXPORTS PREEMED**—American businessmen who have been whistling about foreign competition—German cars, Italian shoes and French movies—should embrace the fact that the U.S. may be the largest exporting nation in the world, but it is being pre-empted by both the European Common Market and communist trade offensive. Today we export only four per cent of our gross national product, while West Germany exports 18 per cent, Great Britain 14 per cent, and France 13 per cent.

A bell tolls here for the American economy. Uncle Sam is still trying to whittle down his balance of payments deficit, while he looks for work for the 12 million new jobseekers who will join the labor force in the next 10 years. Increased exports mean jobs. At present, the U.S. exports by a billion, 100,000 new jobs are created.

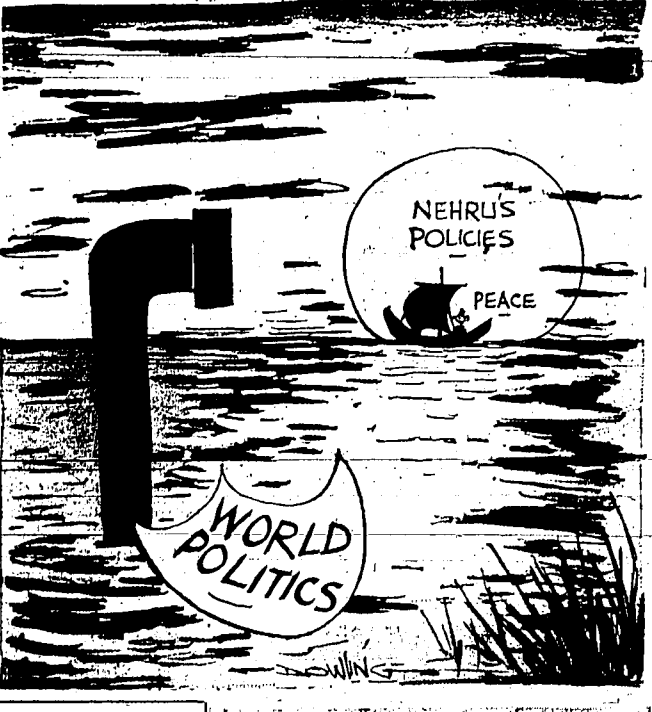

# U. S. Considers Job Training Proposal

WASHINGTON, June 3 (AP)—The government is considering a proposal which proponents say would give American job train-

ing its biggest boost since the GI bill.

The idea, proposed by the federal committee on apprenticeship, is to treat job skills like capital investments and give employers tax credits for training new workers and upgrading the abilities of present employees.

Cost to the employer is the greatest single bar to an adequate apprenticeship and training program in America, the committee said in making the recommendation to Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz.

## Treble Damages Granted in Case From Trust Suit

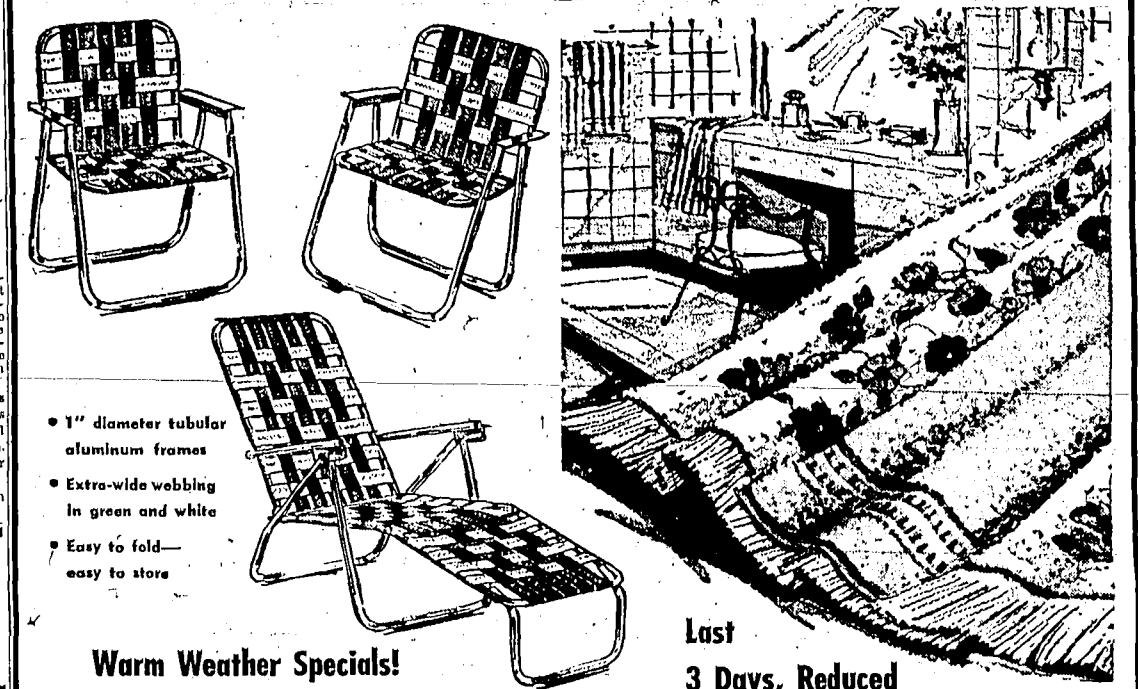

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# Lawyer for Ruby Leaves For Teaching

DALLAS, June 3 (AP)—Jack Ruby's third chief defense counsel, legal-medicine expert Dr. Hubert Winston Smith, has resigned to return to teaching at the University of Texas law school.

Another defense lawyer, Phil Burleson, announced the action yesterday and said he and Joe Tonahill will carry on the legal battle. Ruby, convicted of slaying Lee Harvey Oswald, accused assassin of President John F. Kennedy.

"We do not anticipate any new attorney in this case and do not for the present see any necessity for one," Burleson said.

Smith was not present when Burleson and Tonahill conferred with Judge Joe Brown about Ruby's new conditions. They contend he has become insane since his March 14 conviction and sentencing to death.

# South Korea Students Riot Against U.S.

SEOUL, Korea, June 3 (AP)—At least 10,000 South Korean students shouting for overthrow of the pro-American government fought police in the streets of Seoul today and stoned a U.S. army bus.

Several American soldiers were inside the bus when stones crashed through the windows but they were not injured.

Observers said the demonstrators apparently mistook the U.S. army bus for a South Korean police vehicle. The driver was a Korean.

Similar anti-government demonstrations broke out in three other cities in one of the most violent days of street fighting since student protests started early in the spring.

Similar demonstrations in 1960 led to the downfall of President Syngman Rhee and sent the republic's first president into exile.

At least 150 students were arrested in Seoul this morning. Three others were injured when a wall collapsed.

The cabinet was called into emergency session to discuss possible measures to take against the growing revolts by university and high school students. There was speculation that martial law would be imposed.

The health department invited representatives of the majority of state agencies and the six mental health regional planning committees, will work on formulation of a statewide mental health program.

FOCATELLO, June 3 (AP)—The problem of taking care of drainage in the hillside subdivisions here remained unresolved after a special session of the Pocatello city commission yesterday afternoon. The city of Focatello called the meeting in an attempt to negotiate an agreement on who should pay for the cost of carrying drainage water from the northeastern part of the city. City engineer Maxwell said the estimated cost of the project, which would cost \$150,000 for installation of 200 feet of pipe to carry the drainage water to a creek.

BOISE, June 3 (AP)—The Idaho supreme court will hear arguments in six cases Thursday and Friday, including an appeal by the state of Caldwell from a decision on a motion for summary judgment. District Judge Gilbert Norris ruled the city went beyond its police power in the ordinance. Appeal by Carl Schoessler from a Blaine county decision awarding \$650 in damages to Robert J. Soran. # House Okays Water Study By Colleges

WASHINGTON, June 3 (AP)—The house approved yesterday a \$6 million dollar, 10-year program to establish water resource research centers at land grant colleges in all 50 states and Puerto Rico.

The house bill, however, would authorize only half as much money as voted by the senate.

The senate measure included money for additional federally-financed research into water problems.

The house approved its version by voice vote.

Rep. Wayne M. Aspinall, D., Colo., chairman of the house interior committee, said his group thought it would be better to make "a much more modest" start.

The house committee, in recommending passage of the bill, said:

"The rapid growth of population and industry in the United States has been accompanied by ever-expanding demands on our nation's limited water resources. 'Growing water shortages' declared industrialization expansion and increased agricultural production are significant factors in the increased national requirements.

"The rather sudden national awareness of impending water shortages and the necessity for making the most effective use of the nation's water resources has focused attention on water resources research."

# U. N. Council to Send Delegates To Asian Area

UNITED NATIONS, June 3 (AP)—Security council members agreed yesterday to send three of their number to Southeast Asia for 45 days to investigate border incidents between Cambodia and South Viet Nam and to study ways to prevent their recurrence.

Cambodia, which with France had opposed any role for the United Nations in Southeast Asia, gave its conditional assent to the measure in private talks held by the council members, reliable diplomatic informants said.

# Threat

WASHINGTON, June 3 (AP)—A man telephoned a bomb threat to the Sheraton Park hotel last night, less than an hour before President and Mrs. Johnson made a brief, unexpected visit to a dinner honoring United Nations Ambassador Adlai E. Stevenson.

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# Carrier and Motor Vessel Hit in Fog

NORFOLK, Va., June 3 (AP)—The aircraft carrier Lake Champlain and the Norwegian motor vessel Stavanger collided in dense fog in Chesapeake Bay before dawn today.

Naval fleet headquarters said no injuries were reported on either ship.

Fire broke out in two of the Champlain's hangar deck bays but were put out in 45 minutes.

Both ships were damaged in the collision, which occurred 38 miles south of Annapolis, Md., near Patuxent river, Md.

The Champlain reported she had no underwater damage. The Stavanger reported to the Champlain that she needed no assistance.

On May 6, the Lake Champlain and the destroyer Decatur collided in the waters of Cape Henry. There were no injuries on either ship, but the Decatur's superstructure was damaged heavily.

# Evidence in Anderson's Case Sought

MOUNTAIN HOME, June 3 (AP)—A demand that the air force be ordered to produce complete listing and description of documents it used to charge former Airman Gerald Anderson with murder was on file in third district court today.

Attorneys for Anderson made the request in a list of 44 interrogatories that covered nine pages.

Anderson has sued the air force and several of its personnel for \$250,000. He claims he was wrongfully arrested in 1962 and that his privacy was invaded when air force investigators made tape recordings of sessions he had held with a Catholic chaplain.

The former airman had been charged with the April 9, 1962, knife slayings of Mrs. Nancy Joy Johnson, 22, and her son, Danny, 7. He spent almost 10 months in confinement before the confession of another man led to his freedom.

The attorneys asked in the interrogatories that the air force be required to list how many records or reels of sound recordings were made of conversations, interrogations and the voice of Anderson between April 9 and 30, 1962.

Also requested were documents prepared against Anderson in the case, a description of him and where they can be examined and photostated.

# No Failures

RENO, June 3 (AP)—The Reno city council is considering an ordinance which would require a business license to get a special license, ranging in cost from \$25 to \$100, to quit his business.

A representative of the Better Business Bureau told the council the law would head off "fake going-out-of-business" sales where a firm moves additional merchandise "through the back door" for sales lasting many months.

# Stamp Collectors Find Cape Name Wasn't Changed

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla., June 3 (AP)—A stamp collector is learning that, while the missile center was renamed Cape Kennedy, the city still is Cape Canaveral.

Stamp collectors have deluged Postmaster Lyle Meadows and his four clerks with "what day covers." These are decorated envelopes, bearing the new John F. Kennedy stamp, which collectors send in to be mailed back with the postmark they want as a souvenir.

The collectors wanted a Cape Kennedy postmark on the new stamps honoring the late president, but such a postmark does not exist.

The city council rejected a suggestion that the community's name be changed to conform with the cape's name change.

# Dr. Shearer to Aid Fund Drive

SANTA BARBARA, Calif., June 3 (AP)—Dr. Tom E. Shearer, president of the College of Idaho, will become coordinator of fund-raising operations for the Center for the Study of Democratic Institutions here July 1.

Shearer, head of the Caldwell, Ida., liberal arts college since September, 1954, submitted his resignation Monday. The center was founded in 1950 by the Fund of the Republic as a non-profit educational foundation to examine issues basic to freedom and justice in the 20th century.

In the two-year campaign, the center so far has raised 2.3 million dollars toward a 10 million maintenance fund goal. The 10-year campaign also seeks a 10 million endowment fund.

# Mongolia's Pro-Peking Slate Purged

LONDON, June 3 (AP)—Pro-Peking leaders have been purged in Outer Mongolia and the Soviet-Union is moving in technicians to replace thousands of Red Chinese "experts" being sent back to China, diplomatic sources said today.

The Chinese had moved into the communist country during the past two years, ostensibly to help the Mongolians with technical development projects.

But the sources said the Kremlin obviously feared the Chinese would seek to subvert the Mongolian regime and win it over to Peking's hard-line communism.

The regime of Oter Mongolia has come out in support of Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev's policy of peaceful co-existence and of closer relations with the Kremlin.

# Idaho Eyes Plan to Get Lake Control

June 3 (AP)—Legal action is being cited as a possibility in a move to establish control of lakes and streams in Idaho.

Land Commissioner O. J. Buxton said he had filed a petition with the state land board to have an inspection trip to Hayden lake in northern Idaho.

He said he found in one area that a lakeowner had built a concrete wall 75 feet into the lake and had extended his property by dumping fill material into the edge of the lake.

At many other places on the lake, Buxton said, it appeared that beach areas had been widened by the dumping of material into the lake.

"Maybe we ought to re-establish meander lines on all lakes," Buxton said. "I was informed that the lake level at Hayden lake has been raised and I don't know where the meander line is."

He said he had instructed a land department engineer to investigate and the land board asked Buxton to make a detailed report at its next meeting.

# Old Beef Is Seized to Cut Typhoid

LONDON, June 3 (AP)—The government today ordered certain cans of 13-year-old Argentine canned beef taken off the market to combat a mounting typhoid epidemic in Aberdeen, Scotland.

An inquiry under an independent chairman was announced by the government.

Secretary of State for Scotland Michael Noble told the house of commons there were 24 confirmed cases in Britain's worst epidemic in 27 years and that 8 other persons were under investigation in a hospital.

Noble said the chance that the epidemic which caused the outbreak was contained in canned corned beef could not be ruled out and that certain six-pund cans were being withdrawn from sale.

The tinned beef recently was released from government stores because of a beef shortage in Britain caused by lower production in Argentina and in Europe.

Noble did not name the firms that had supplied the meat, but said the germ was of a type found in South America, Spain and the southern United States.

# Hoffa Reports Fund Donations For Trial Costs

CHICAGO, June 3 (AP)—Frank and Alvin Karpis members have raised more than \$100,000 into a fund to help James H. Hoffa pay lawyers defending him against fraud and conspiracy charges, the Teamsters union chief says.

Hoffa said the donations have ranged from \$1 to \$100. He said "We're not using a penny of it until we hear from the internal revenue service on whether the donations are taxable."

In Washington, the IRA declined to discuss Hoffa's case, but in a similar case in 1950, the service ruled that contributions to an official's defense fund were not gifts and constituted gross income subject to taxation.

# Ex-Tammany Chief Is Ousted

NEW YORK, June 3 (AP)—Former Tammany hall chief Carmine De Sapio was washed out of national politics last night when he was defeated in a second consecutive bid for district leadership in Manhattan's Greenwich village.

De Sapio, for years a New York Democratic party power, conceded defeat to reform candidate Edward J. Kelly, who once before beat him for the post in the general election last November by the razor-thin margin of 41 votes.

But De Sapio contested the election in court and had it overturned on the basis of invalid ballots. The court ordered last night's re-run.

The closed-circuit device in theaters let hordes of Americans watch the Cassia Clay-Honey Liston francs and argue about the outcome as heatedly as did

**KIMBERLY, June 3** — Kay Walker, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Walker, and Jane Slaughter, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Slaughter, Jr. will leave this week to attend the summer honors program at the Idaho State university, Pocatello.

The chance for a special program of college study held in conjunction with the 1964 summer session at the university.

## Three Die as Bus Tips on Illinois Curve

**WAUKESHA, Ill., June 3** — A chartered bus carrying a gay party of Wisconsin women home from a cosmetic plant tour skidded and overturned on a slippery curve yesterday. Three persons were killed and at least 45 injured.

Four persons were trapped in the wreckage when the bus, carrying 40 persons back to the Milwaukee-Waukesha, Wis., area from a suburban Chicago Avon cosmetic plant, went out of control in a rain, slammed into a bridge abutment and overturned on U. S. 41.

Two of the trapped victims were dead when power machinery and two trucks righted the crumpled bus and strangled them.

Among the dead, according to hospital officials, was Mrs. Angela Santarelli, Milwaukee, an Avon saleswoman who arranged the tour.

Lake county sheriff's deputies said two persons were dead on arrival at St. Theresa hospital in Waukegan and a third was dead on arrival at Zion Benton hospital in nearby Zion, Ill.

Sheriff Charles E. Larson of Lake county said the bus skidded, turned over on its left side and slid across the bridge on its side and almost plunged into the Des Plaines river below. It came to a stop on the bank of the stream.

Hitting the abutment, Larson said, caused the bus to "split open like a can of sardines."

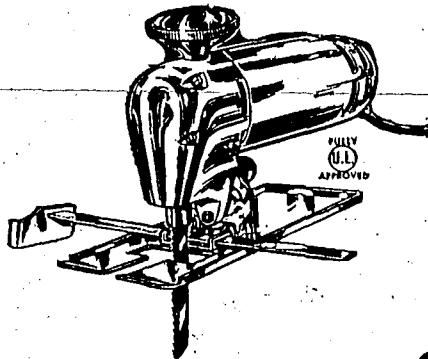

## Schedule Is Bypassed at AAWU Meet

**SEATTLE, June 3 (AP)—**A football round-robin schedule for the eight teams of the Athletic Association of Western Universities was bypassed Tuesday as the conference council concluded the four-day spring meeting of the West Coast combine.

Also derailed was the problem of a new nickname necessitated by the expansion of the "Big Six" to eight teams with the addition of Oregon and Oregon State.

"The council," said executive secretary Tom Hamilton about the expansion problem, "made a recommendation to the presidents and chancellors who meet Sept. 3-4 at Berkeley, Calif."

A proposal by the basketball coaches that a round-robin program be adopted for the 1965-66 season was approved, with each team to play each other member team twice on a home-and-home basis.

But the council ruled all other sports schedules—including football—shall be drawn on an individual basis with emphasis on conference opponents where possible.

Schedules of most teams are drawn through 1971 in football, after which a round-robin program could have been arranged. Only Washington and Stanford will meet all other conference members next fall.

The two new members and Washington State have only four conference games each. The council ruled the conference championship will be decided on a percentage basis, counting only conference games but the Rose bowl team still will be selected by a vote of the faculty athletic representatives after the season's final game.

### Wall Street Chatter

NEW YORK, June 3 (AP) — Bache and company comments that the recent strength in rail stocks not only reflects the expectation of benefits from increased efficiency and economies but also favorable economic conditions.

"In view of the fact that economic conditions remain strong," Bache says, "there have been few speculative excesses, the public is not wildly bidding up stocks and volume is not unusually heavy, we construe this period of hesitation to be a buying opportunity and feel the long term uptrend remains undisturbed."

J. W. Sparks and company says that despite the sluggish performance of the market, "we believe that confidence in the near term future of the list is still warranted." The brokerage firm writes that "it is still our opinion that the industrials may well advance to the 640-650 zone and thus confirm the previous accomplishment of the rails."

Reynolds and company says "it would seem that a reasonably constructive attitude can still be maintained, although over-enthusiasm in speculative issues should be avoided." Reynolds suggests that new stock purchases should be confined to stocks which are maintaining favorable fundamental and technical patterns despite the general weakness."

## Report Advocates Standard Street Widths

(Editor's note: This is the fifth in a series of articles on a report by the Twin Falls city engineering department on a master plan for traffic control and street widening.)

The master street plan calls for the city of Twin Falls to adopt standard street widths by revision of the existing ordinance. It was recommended that residential streets be 36 feet wide from curb to curb; commercial streets be 44 or 52 feet wide; collectors—residential, be 40 feet, and commercial be 44 feet. Arterial streets, for the present development, should be 44 feet and should be widened to 64 feet in future development.

The city should adopt minimum street right-of-way widths through revisions in the planning and zoning ordinance and the subdivision ordinance, the report said.

The report said proposed routes deemed advisable for adequate arterial and commercial street development, in accordance with a master street plan, should be an 80-foot minimum.

And all other street dedications should be 60-foot minimums, with the exception of dead-end streets with no possibility of fu-

ture extension. These dead-end streets could have a minimum right-of-way of 50 feet, with a turn-around at the closed end of a 100-foot minimum diameter.

The report said it is time to seriously consider the matter of adequate street right-of-way width. The term "adequate right-of-way" is based upon some conclusion as to the width of street necessary to safely and economically carry the existing and projected future traffic flow, from and through an area.

The report said street width normally is determined by the existing and/or predicted traffic use, which must consider factors of vehicle frequency, size and speed. Vehicle weight should be considered for strength design.

Although compact cars have reached some popularity in recent years, the standard and luxury cars continue to be constructed wider and longer. This indicates that wider traffic lanes should be constructed to accommodate these larger vehicles.

Although there is a general divergence of definition as to proper names for the different types of street sections developed

for certain uses within urban areas, only four sections were discussed in the report.

They are residential streets, which provide access to individual properties; commercial streets, which provide access to individual businesses and industries; collector—streets, which connect neighborhoods and residential and commercial streets to the arterial street system, and arterial streets, which provide main road transportation network.

It is recommended residential streets should be 36 feet wide from curb to curb. The report said residential streets should be wider to provide easy access to all contiguous property at reasonably slow speed.

It is recommended commercial and industrial streets be developed to a 52-foot width where adequate right-of-way exists or can be readily acquired. The report said where lesser right-of-way is available, a 44-foot street width is recommended.

It is recommended a street designated as a collector should be 44 feet wide because of a large volume of traffic.

When the capacity of a four-lane, 44-foot-wide street is reached, it becomes necessary to widen the arterial to or develop one-way complete or one-way carry the traffic. A widening program should consider the versatile section now being installed in other cities.

This section is 64 feet in width. The 64-foot section can be developed with four 12-foot travel lanes and two eight-foot parking lanes; or four 11-foot travel lanes and a four-foot parking lane; or four 11-foot travel lanes and a four-foot parking lane raised median strip to separate traffic traveling in opposite directions; or four 13-foot travel lanes with a 12-foot wide raised median strip providing left turn bays at side street intersections.

The 64-foot section can be developed with four 12-foot travel lanes and two eight-foot parking lanes; or four 11-foot travel lanes and a four-foot parking lane; or four 11-foot travel lanes and a four-foot parking lane raised median strip to separate traffic traveling in opposite directions; or four 13-foot travel lanes with a 12-foot wide raised median strip providing left turn bays at side street intersections.

# IV. The Weapons and the Men

The First World War did not just happen; it was planned. It was planned badly and stupidly, but it was planned. The Germans had been projecting the details of their armies' movements for so many years that they had to revise them to keep them up to date. The French also had a master plan to attack Germany, but they did not have a good defensive plan. The British had no plan; they expected to remain neutral. Russia was depending on the three factors that had defeated Napoleon a century before: vast area, inexhaustible manpower, and bitter winter weather. Austria was counting on German armed might to back up any move she made.

All these countries, except England, had various treaties and alliances. None except Germany had enough powerful modern weapons in the hands of highly disciplined troops. The British Navy was the world's biggest, but the Admiralty was watching the growth of German sea power with great apprehension. The British Army was small but professionally well-trained with soldiers who were the best riflemen in Europe. The French Army was large but it did not have the right weapons. The Russian Army was largest of all and could quickly be made even larger, but the men were without modern equipment and there were not enough officers to command a second mustering of troops. The Austrian Army was a poor copy of Germany's.

The weapons that were to count were the 3,500 heavy guns the Germans were ready to use to blast their way through. The French 75s were beautifully engineered but too small to hold off the German advance. All the armies had machine guns, but no one could yet foresee the effect they were to have upon the conduct of the war. No army had enough of them; the Germans had most. Airplanes were few and of little importance. They were to increase rapidly in numbers and effectiveness during the next four years. The navies had reached a high state of development, but they were not to be decisive—except for the submarines.

Completely new for warfare were radio communication, deadly poison gas, automobiles, effective armored tanks and torpedoes and airborne craft which could be directed toward a target. (Stationary mines and balloons had been used before.)

But military men had little experience with the results these innovations would have on actual conflict. The high commands had 19th century battlefield training to fight a 20th century war. They had to learn their lessons on the battlefield and that was the tragedy which was to cost millions of lives and billions of dollars. Technology had advanced too rapidly for men to understand how it would affect human destiny. A simple pistol was enough to knock the world askew at Sarajevo.

# After-Effect of Pesticide on Fish Feared

HELENA, June 3 (AP) — The Montana fish and game department is more alarmed about the delay than the immediate effects of pesticides on fish, game birds and other wildlife.

It is accepted in some circles that unless there is an immediate kill of fish and game animals after mass aerial spraying the chemical is safe.

"We use to feel that way ourselves," said Frank H. Dunkle, director of the fish and game department.

However, after years of study, department scientists have concluded that delayed fish mortality resulting from mass spraying

of DDT insecticide is generally more serious and widespread than kills immediately following spraying.

The delayed mortality occurs in two general ways:

—From reducing the supply of insects on which the fish feed.

—From accumulations of DDT residues in the fatty tissues of fish and then moving to vital organs in time of stress, such as spawning, when the fish use the fat reserves.

Fish and game scientists also refer to a "sublethal" effect of DDT residues in fish and say it may prove more serious even

than the delayed mortality because it can threaten future fish population.

The "sublethal" mortality results from DDT residues in the eggs of fish. After the eggs hatch, it remains attached to the tiny fish for some time and the fish gets its sustenance from the egg.

A study made in New York showed that when DDT residues in fish eggs reached a concentration of 200 per million, the developing fry died.

Montana biologists, in a limited sampling this spring, found evidence of DDT concentrations approaching the lethal level as

Trout eggs taken from the Bitterroot river in western Montana had a DDT content of 2.3 parts per million. A more intensive study is under way.

"It is not improbable that these sublethal effects of chemical sprays may prove far more significant than the more easily observed direct losses of fish and food organisms," a fish and game department scientific report says.

The department is concerned about the possible effects of insect and weed killers on game birds and other wildlife as well as fish, but used fish as an ex-

ample of the deadly potential of the pesticides.

The department became concerned about the effects of DDT on fish in 1955 after a large-scale kill of trout and whitefish in the Yellowstone river following a mass aerial spraying for spruce budworm in the Yellowstone park area.

The Yellowstone river controversy resulted in a cooperative study by the fish and game department and the U.S. forest service on seven streams before the after-spraying.

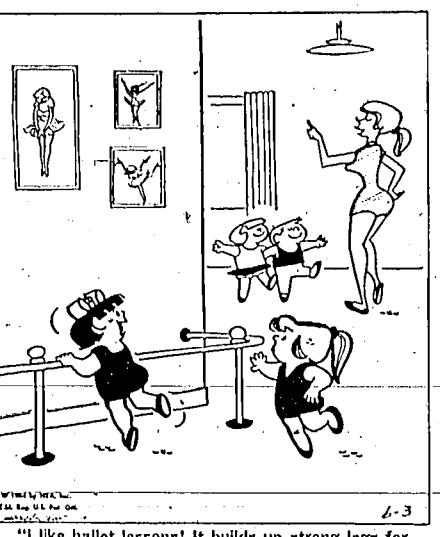

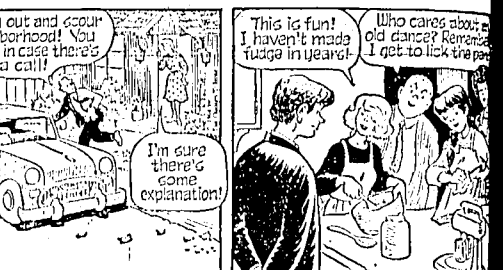

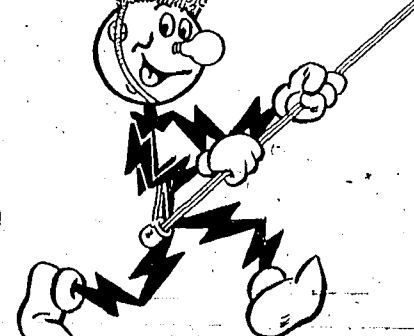

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## Texan's D-Day Assignment Was Tough One

**EDITOR'S NOTE**—Every commander worries about "hardships" in the field—an unexpected ditch, a patch of hidden swamps that can lose a battle. There was nothing unexpected in which a Texan faced 20 years ago. What he found made a man sweat.

**COLLEGE STATION, Tex., June 3 (AP)**—"First time you mentioned it, I thought you were trying to scare me," said Lieut. Col. Earl Rudder to Gen. Omar N. Bradley.

Assignment: Land 200 men on a difficult shelf, scale a 100-foot cliff and destroy German guns trained so they would cut to any troops landed on Omaha beach.

"No soldier in my command has ever been wished a more difficult task than that which befell the 34-year-old commander of this Ranger force," Gen. Bradley wrote in his book, "A Soldier's Story."

New recognition of Rudder, now president of Texas A and M university and a reserve major general, will come Friday when he is honored by a representative of the United

States to mark the 20th anniversary of the Allies' crash-landing through Europe in World War II. He is in the delegation headed by General Bradley and appointed by President Johnson to attend ceremonies in France.

To prepare his troops, Rudder trained them on the stony cliffs of the Isle of Wight, ropes with grappling hooks and ladders carried by amphibious trucks were to be used in scaling the Normandy cliffs. The trucks proved useless.

As Rudder closed in on Pointe du Hoc, enemy artillery raked his landing craft, Bradley wrote.

"As the Rangers went up the ropes hand over hand, the enemy dropped grenades on their heads. A destroyer raged in and swept the top of the cliffs with her guns.

"Within five minutes after they had landed, the first Ranger had belted over the top. Seconds later his companions swarmed up behind him."

Rudder's boat was the first to reach shore, official army records show.

About noon of D-day, Rudder sent this message: "Location Pointe du Hoc mission accomplished—need ammunition and reinforcements. Many casualties."

About three hours later came a reply: "No reinforcements available."

Relief came on D-day plus-2. The battalion had suffered more than 50 per cent casualties and Rudder himself had been wounded three times.

Rudder received decorations from three countries, including the distinguished service cross, the United States' second high-

est award for individual valor. He later commanded an infantry regiment which helped repulse the last major offensive of the Germans, the Battle of the Bulge.
