- 1. Recall of the order assigning official military units to the former hold by Pathet Lao ministers and disbandment of neutralist units.
- 2. Dissolution of the revolutionary committee which announced the rightwing military coup April 19.
- 3. Severe punishment of the coup leaders.
- 4. Restoration of the situation to the status quo before the coup.

# Final Phase Of Race to Open Friday

WASHINGTON, June 4 (UP)—The final phase of the race for the Republican nomination for president gets under way Friday amid indications that Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona is only slightly away from a first-ballot victory.

Washington state Republicans open their convention and delegates to the GOP national convention will be chosen in two Colorado districts Friday.

By Saturday night some 60 delegates will be chosen in Washington, Colorado, Alabama and Hawaii, and political observers say the race will be gauged to the impact of Goldwater's victory in Tuesday's California primary.

That victory gave him 56 delegates for the Golden State, boosting his first ballot strength in the Associated Press survey of delegates already chosen to 447. That contrasted with a claim of 454 by Goldwater's headquarters.

A spot check of political leaders in most of the 15 states and Puerto Rico, where a total of 250 delegates remain to be chosen, showed that Goldwater is expected to win between 140 and 190. And another 25 or so of those unchosen delegates could wind up in the senator's corner before the convention opens July 13 in San Francisco.

# Gas Eruptions on Oklahoma Land Ruin 80 Acres

NASH, Okla., June 4 (UP)—Gas eruptions have turned an 80-acre tract in north-central Oklahoma into a farm couple said today.

Craters ranging from inches to 50 yards in length and 30 yards in width quickly filled with water, Wilkins said.

# Ethiopian Envoy Shot by Driver

STOCKHOLM, Sweden, June 4 (UP)—An Ethiopian ambassador to Sweden was shot in a chaotic scene in the Stockholm criminal police reported.

The police said Ambassador Ahmed Agedo was hit by three revolver bullets. The shooting occurred on the embassy grounds.

A police spokesman said the shooter, whose name was withheld, had received a letter from the ambassador which he refused to obey. During the argument, the police suddenly drew his revolver and fired three shots, the spokesman said.

various types of dealers. During the hearings many dealers testified before each session asking that voluntary controls be used rather than mandatory controls. Agrow Production Manager C. Vassars said, "The announcement puts the responsibility on the dealers—we are not going to be in charge of the industry."

He inferred that the company was going to take exceptional steps to protect its investment.

"We don't make heavy decisions. We've been in business for over 30 years and we will fight to stay in business here," he said.

Henry Chaffee, Northrup King Seed company, said the decision seems to be a sound one. It is a real challenge to all Idaho growers and the commission has put the responsibility where it belongs—on the dealer and the grower.

Many dealers felt the decision to give the industry an opportunity to fight for its right to do business was right. However, a few of the record, felt that the commission was equally wise in maintaining the position that should the industry not clean up its own act, the government would be justified in imposing strong controls.

Harvey Schlagenhauf, representing Callatin Valley Seed company said, "We are glad to see that the commission has decided to give the grower a chance to eliminate the presence of certain bacterial diseases in Magic Valley without imposing regulations on the industry."

"Regulations are very difficult to administer for a situation such as disease. The seed companies have initiated a rigorous sanitation program and if we can get our hands clean, Mother Nature will do the rest. The bacterial diseases should be minimized, if not eliminated."

By and large the announcement was hailed as a victory for those who opposed the quarantine. It was felt the possibility of a quarantine still over the heads of the industry would serve to stimulate action on a voluntary basis.

One dealer said the hearing "did accomplish one thing—it made everyone aware of the seriousness of the problem."

"We will probably get better cooperation on voluntary controls now," he said.

# Udall Plans To Keep Post For Present

WASHINGTON, June 4 (UP)—Secretary of the Interior Stewart L. Udall says there has been no change in his plan to stay on in the government as long as President Johnson wants him.

### South Korea Threatened With Clamp

SEOUL, South Korea, June 4 (AP)—Students staged anti-government demonstrations in four Korean provincial cities today and President Chung Hee Park's cabinet threatened to place the entire country under martial law. More than 6,000 students overran police lines in a rock-throwing riot in Kwangju, 150 miles south of Seoul. Police tried to scatter the students with tear gas, but they squatted in front of the provincial government building and shouted for Park's resignation and the lifting of martial law in Seoul. Many students and policemen were reported injured.

Less violent demonstrations broke out in Incheon, Pusan and Chunchon. More than 2,000 high school and college students were involved.

Heavy troop reinforcements kept Seoul quiet, enforcing martial law proclaimed by Park in the capital after 30,000 students and adults rioted Wednesday. More than 600 police and demonstrators were injured and 91 persons were arrested.

After an emergency cabinet meeting today, a cabinet spokesman said the government would be extended to the rest of the country if the demonstrations continued.

### Briton Says No Force in Berlin Near

MOSCOW, June 4 (AP)—British Labor party leader Hugh Gaitskirt said yesterday after talks with Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev that he believes neither East nor West is likely to attempt a solution by force of the Berlin situation.

Wilson, who conferred with Khrushchev for two hours Tuesday, also discussed the Laotian crisis and said it is probable the Soviets will accept a Polish plan for a conference on Laos.

On Berlin, he said, "both sides recognize that the present conditions are unacceptable but they also realize that it would be dangerous to take any unilateral action."

He said the Russians have not changed their views on trying to turn West Berlin into a free city without Allied troop garrisons, but neither America, Britain, nor the Soviet Union, however, is likely to attempt a solution by force.

Wilson said he took up the Laotian situation as a problem of "immediate and urgent interest" with Khrushchev and Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko.

### Idahoans Urge Campaign to Aid Apprenticeship

WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—A national advertising campaign in the interest of apprenticeship is urged by an Idaho group. Three spokesmen for the Idaho apprenticeship advisory committee of Boise promised the campaign at a conference with members of congress and labor group officials. ### Business Mirror

NEW YORK, June 4 (AP)—Figures don't lie. But it's how you interpret them that reveals whether you're an optimist, a pessimist, or just cautious. And in an election year the difference becomes sharper.



If you're an optimist you can say that from Jan. 1 to May 31 U. S. gold stocks rose by 27 million dollars. If you're a pessimist you can do a little figuring on your fingers and say that means that in May the United States must have lost 25 million in gold, because at the end of April the gold stock had been 32 million ahead.

If you're cautious you can say that the long run and not the month to month changes that count. And anyway, even if May was disappointing, any gold gain is a relief after the loss of more than seven billion dollars on the gross national product—the total dollar output of goods and services which charts the course of the nation's economy.

Optimists — and President Johnson is one — say that the gain so far this year foreshadows "steady economic" growth through the rest of this year and well into 1965. Pessimists reply that the expansion in the early months of this year was

not at all fast a clip as in the final months of 1961. The cautious say that the upturn, now starting its 40th month, seems sturdy so far despite its advanced age as business upswings go, but has yet to reveal just how much steam is still behind it — and especially just how much of an effect the federal income tax cut will have.

And the nation's financial dealings with other lands also are subject to interpretation. The optimists cite the near elimination of the deficit in this nation's balance of payments in the first three months of the year. The pessimists say a slight trend the other way developed in April, with exports 2 per cent below March and imports 1 per cent higher.

The cautious warn that the real test is in the months just ahead. "The outflow of dollars normally slows early in the year and picks up later on. This year imports are expected to increase because of the nation's prosperity. Exports may level off because of financial problems in other lands. And just ahead is the largest outpouring of dollars by American tourists abroad."

### NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

BY ANDREW TULLY  
WASHINGTON, June 4.—I am sorry to see that Rep. WILBUR MILLIS, an honest and competent man if too preoccupied with balance sheets, is still wedded to the Kerr-Mills medical assistance for the aged program (MAA). It is a sad case, a good man refusing to admit he was wrong.

Although the MAA has proved a cruel hoax on the aged, Mills is still bent on perpetuating this long-rotted operation by adding a sweetener. The Arkansas Democrat, chairman of the house ways and means committee, has proposed an increase in federal-state payments to the so-called "medically indigent" in Knoxville, he keeps the administrator's medicare program bottled up in his committee.

### PROVE INABILITY TODAY

An increase in MAA payments won't do the job. The formula for inclusion and exclusion for human dignity. It is based on the requirement that elderly persons who are ill prove that they're too poor to buy care. The aged with more than minimum incomes or savings are out of luck. In some states, the finances of relatives are investigated, and those with modest incomes are taken to court and forced to give aid.

It is not surprising, then, that MAA has been a colossal flop. For four years only half of the seven of every 1,000 aged in the nation are getting any help from the program. Benefits are meager and administrative costs are high; in Kentucky, for example, these costs are as much as 17 per cent of the benefits.

### ADMINISTRATION - SPONSORED BILL AN ANSWER

Clearly, the logical answer to this problem is the administration-sponsored bill which would provide medical care for the aged through contributions to the social security by employer and employee. This is a form of savings under which the elderly would receive care as their right; they would not have to take a pauper's oath to keep welfare medical aid savings they may have been able to accumulate.

Mills' formula also includes a six per cent increase in social security payments to those who have retired. As a substitute for medicare, this plan would cost \$2.50 a month for those aged 65 per cent since 1948; since 1948 the cost of medical care has risen 65 per cent and that of hospital daily care 185 per cent.

### BOON TO HONEST INSURANCE

This would return the good from the fly-by-night insurance plans which in the worst of times dole out a handout when you send in your claim. It would be a boon to honest insurance companies which now are forced to boost premiums paid by younger people to cover the cost of benefits to the aged that would enable the aged to keep what they've earned and what they may have been able to accumulate.

**THE BAKER CASE.**  
It appears almost a cliché that full exposure of what has become known as the "Bobby Baker case" will never take place. It is obvious, on the face of it, however, that it would be difficult for a man who never received more than \$10,000 a year to have been paid for his services more than two million dollars, as Baker did while in the employ of the United States senate. Thereafter a complete investigation is in order.

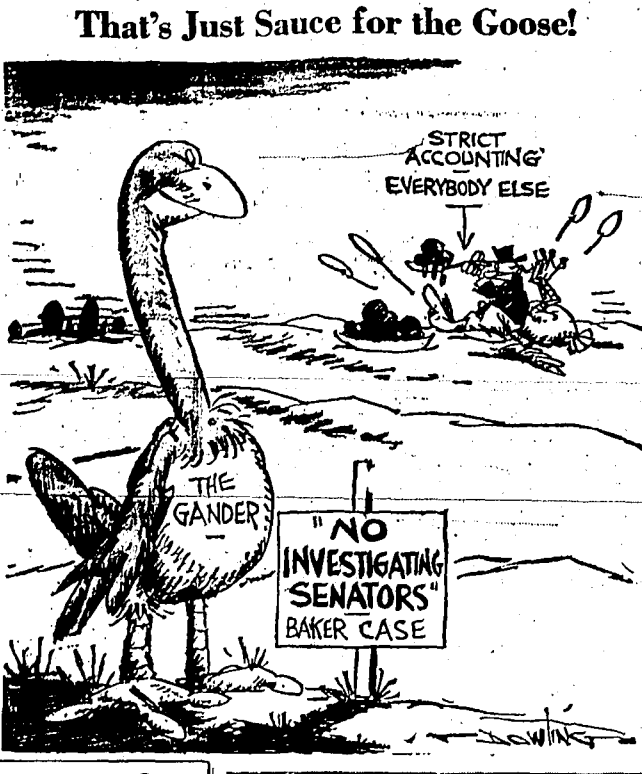

WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—The House yesterday unanimously approved a two-year, 2 billion dollar federal aid program for building new primary, secondary and urban highways throughout the country.

The legislation totaled 50 million more than was recommended by President Johnson. But the House public works committee said highway construction was a big generator of employment and urged an increase.

The 10 states which will receive the greatest share of the funds are California, 69.2 million; New York, 57.8 million; Texas, 57.8 million; Pennsylvania, 42.6 million; Illinois, 42 million; Alaska, 40.3 million; Ohio, 39.5 million; Michigan, 35.8 million; Missouri, 25.5 million; and Georgia, 24 million.

The annual amounts would be apportioned beginning in July 1965.

# Hawaii Asks No Change For Sugar

WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—Sen. Daniel K. Inouye, D., Hawaii, renewed today the contention of the Hawaii congressional delegation that the agricultural department has an obligation to resist "domestic sugar" legislation this year.

In a letter to Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman, Inouye emphasized that the department participated two years ago in industry discussion which led to an agreement to support compromise sugar-act amendments to remain in effect through 1966.

The senator took issue with the department's reply to a previous letter in which the delegation expressed concern about movements to amend the sugar act this year to increase domestic beet sugar allotments.

The department denied being a party to any agreement two years ago.

"I certainly recognize that the department has not been a party to any formal, signed contract," Inouye said. "However, in the opinion of the department, it was a party to an agreement to jointly advocate in the congress a domestic program which was only formulated after being thoroughly discussed between the administration and the domestic industry over a period of many weeks."

Inouye said his records disclose at least 12 meetings between government and industry representatives between March 5 and May 9, 1962. Some of the meetings, he said, were called by agriculture department officials.

# Appalachia, Coal Declared Tied

WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—President Joseph E. Moody of the National Coal Policy Council Inc. said today that the economic future of the Appalachian states is tied to the coal industry.

"Coal is bread to Appalachia," he said in a house public works subcommittee. Moody testified during hearings on President Johnson's plan to fight poverty in the 10-state Appalachian region.

# Lively Presidential Race Seen

By JACK BELL, AP Political Writer

SAN FRANCISCO, June 4 (AP)—If the presidential race matches Sen. Barry Goldwater, against President Johnson the November election campaign will have few dull moments.

There is some difference of opinion over whether Goldwater's defeat of Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller in Tuesday's California primary carried the senator over his last big hurdle toward the Republican presidential nomination.

But if Goldwater is nominated at the mid-July convention here, the fireworks probably will start exploding even before the August Democratic convention goes through the formality of nominating the President.

Goldwater, the conservative, would arrive to offer a choice, not an echo, to Johnson's professed liberalism.

The senator described himself to California audiences as "the only Republican who has the prospect of a chance of beating Lyndon Johnson."

He called the California primary outcome "a victory for the

great majority of Republicans across the country who share my belief that Lyndon Baines Johnson can be beaten in 1964 if Republicans concentrate on the man and not on each other.

All signs indicate that Johnson would welcome Goldwater as his opponent. The President, an experienced free-wheeling campaign stump, might even be tempted into a television debate with Goldwater, who has been accused by critics in his own party of furling executive from the hip in some statements on major issues.

Because of the limitations on what a president can say publicly, Johnson has not indicated if he will debate his opponent on TV. But Johnson has shown a keen interest in the kind of crowd pleaser and individual handshaking that Goldwater gives every state of deterring. However, if Goldwater is the Republican nominee, he probably would have to campaign as the underdog.

In his California campaign, the senator laid out the pattern of the attack he could be expected to make on Johnson in a general election contest.

Among other things, Goldwater said the administration's foreign policies offered a "path to suicide" that the country faced "another Korea" in South Vietnam and might face all of southeast Asia to the communists.

"We are following the same path of appeasement that we followed in the 1930s," he said.

"The Democrats have been making a book on Goldwater's utterances for several years. Any quotations they might have misqu岸ted probably were dug up by Rockefeller's researchers and injected into the chief executive's attack on the senator.

Democratic speakers have only

to quote Rockefeller's assertion that Goldwater's call for an end to arms control treaties and his proposal to quit the United Nations if Red China were admitted and up to a "blueprint for defeat and disaster."

That there was the matter of civil rights, where Johnson is committed to "strong support" of the bill before the senate and Goldwater is opposed to some of its provisions.

Depending on what the GOP platform has to say on the issue, Goldwater-Johnson could have wide repercussions in the month. There the Democratic president probably would get a run for his money from a senator long the favorite of Southern Republicans.

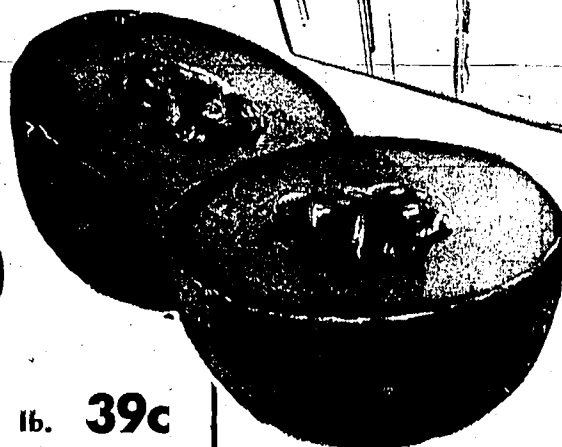

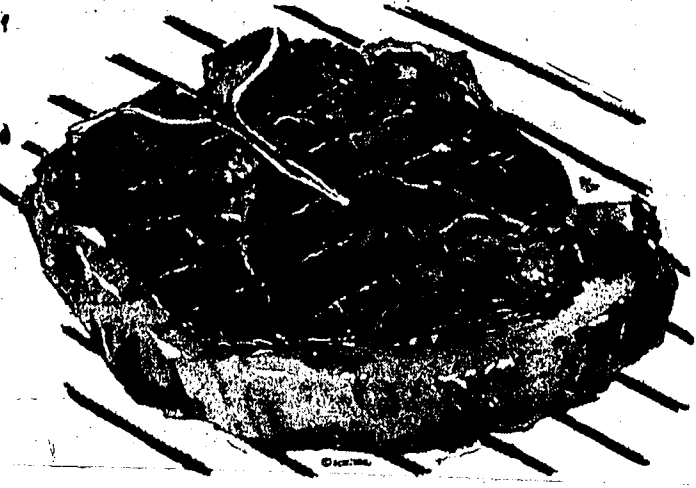

## Man Held on Auto Theft After Chase

Miss Wallace, who was held in jail here for investigation, was released Wednesday afternoon. She told police the couple supposedly purchased a car in California and had left there May 25. They had stopped for gas at a Burley station when they got into the dispute which touched off the stolen car episode.

### Computers Not Smarter Than People, Just Faster, California Vote Proves

NEW YORK, June 4 (AP) — The first law about computers is that they are not smarter than people, only faster. This was demonstrated again Tuesday night when the three major television networks engaged in a computer battle in the California primary election that seemed at times to overshadow the contest between Arizona Sen. Barry Goldwater and Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York. The contestants in this electronic-mechanical battle reacted all night on the basis of information and background given them by human beings. When the computers were acting simply as high-speed adding machines, their results were rock solid. But when they began declaring on the basis of a fraction of the vote that Senator Goldwater was the definite or probable winner, the computers were reacting to certain assumptions made by humans. The assumptions, perhaps oversimplified, were these: There are definite patterns in voting. And these patterns in terms of age, ethnic background, education, economics and social level. Then find a certain number of precincts that give you the proper reflection of these patterns. Get the returns from these precincts as soon as possible after the polls close, put them into the computer and it will, in seconds, project them into a statewide figure through a series of calculations that would take a man hours to accomplish. As long as the patterns are valid, and as long as the voters stick to these patterns, the computer can do no wrong in projecting. "But the trouble with people," one computer expert told UPI, "is that you can't ever be absolutely certain what they will do. You can reckon on strong probabilities, but anything is conceivable. It is certainly conceivable that if a couple of dozen people at the right place wake up feeling crochety on election day and do a flip-flop, you could wind up with a distorted projection." The Columbia Broadcasting system—(CBS)—declared—Goldwater the winner in California Tuesday night 23 minutes after poll-closing. As a matter of fact, people in some of the state's 32,861 precincts were still voting. CBS did so with its vote projection analysis and on the basis of only 18 of the 46 precincts selected by the network for special voting characteristics. But as the night wore on popular vote figures put Rockefeller in the lead, and experts look to the air to explain why the actual votes and the computers' projections seemed to be contradictory. Goldwater himself stated a sort of victory statement on the basis of the early projections but later adopted a more-wait-and-see attitude. "Now that the votes are in," the computer specialist said, "there is no arguing that the computers were vindicated. But I guess you couldn't be absolutely certain until now that no appreciable number of people in California woke up feeling crochety yesterday. The patterns proved valid."

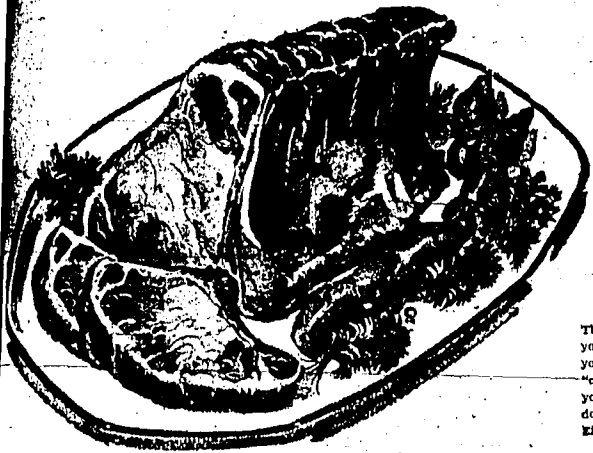

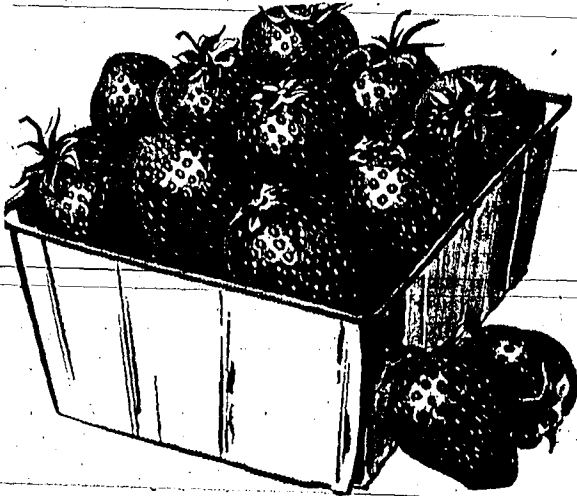

He added that he hoped to meet President Nasser during his visit.

In Louisville, Ky., Bill Favrehan said Wednesday that Clay's backers are planning a fight for him this year, preferably with Sonny Liston, the man he beat for the title.

Favrehan, Clay's manager, said a rematch is being considered for Louisville in September. If that bout isn't possible he added "we're still planning for Clay to fight another opponent—no matter what he says."

### Atlanta Still Hopes to Get NFL Team

ATLANTA, June 4 (AP)—Atlanta still has a good chance of landing the fourth NFL franchise by National league franchise by the 1966 season, stadium authority chairman Arthur Montgomery said Wednesday.

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# Community Plan Urged to Solve Traffic Problem

(Editor's note: This is the last in a series of articles on a report by the Twin Falls city engineering department on a master plan for traffic control and traffic engineering.)

## Harding Hopes For More Silver

WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—Rep. Ralph R. Harding, D., Idaho, expressed hope yesterday that congress will enact this year a bill authorizing an increase in the minting of silver coins.

Harding said he introduced two measures affecting the silver industry. One would prohibit sale of silver bullion by the secretary of the treasury and the other would require silver dollars to have silver monetary value equal to the face value of the coin.

Under the initiation of a comprehensive community plan to aid in making the most of the many civic improvements under consideration. There are facets of such a plan that could undoubtedly be accomplished locally, but it is recommended that outside help be sought in this study field to be employed for guidance.

This study of traffic control, truck routing and master street plan is intended to be of immediate value to the city, but it is also recommended that the engineering investigations be incorporated as a part of an eventual comprehensive community plan.

Additional recommendations include a street lighting study. Upon adoption of a master street plan and receipt of a firm commitment from the Idaho department of highways concerning highway location through the city, a study should be conducted on the existing traffic signal control system.

Adoption of a master street plan will require the installation of many additional traffic control signs. It is recommended that a complete sign survey be conducted with the ultimate goal of replacing non-standard signs. This replacement could be conducted on a stage basis, but a replacement schedule should be prepared as a conclusion to the survey.

Rough and broken streets can be a traffic hazard in themselves by causing loss of driver control, or swerving, to avoid a street blemish. The major causes of street surface failures are inadequate base construction and

inadequate drainage facilities. Although not directly related to traffic control, a storm sewer system to provide adequate drainage and greatly lengthen street life cannot be ignored when master street plans are considered. It is recommended that a master storm sewer study be considered.

It is recommended that street construction ordinances, methods and financing procedures be reviewed. The municipal street maintenance costs, which are now paid by tax money received from special street levies, will become increasingly burdensome if curb and gutter, adequate drainage facilities, and higher type road construction methods are not adopted.

As there are many ramifications to a street ordinance re-

view, it is recommended that a thorough study be made of financing procedures and policies with possible modifications that would upgrade street quality, reduce maintenance costs, aid traffic movement, improve property appearance and reduce tax monies now required to build and maintain streets.

Possibly the most far-reaching recommendation involves the comprehensive plan. Twin Falls appears to be on the verge of great strides toward civic betterments and improvements.

The construction of an auditorium and convention center will be financed by private subscription, downtown merchants are actively and seriously working toward rejuvenation of the central retailing area, the city gov-

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# General Fund Is in 'Red' Starting June

BOISE, June 4 (AP) — Idaho's general fund moved into June with a general fund deficit of \$234,447, slightly less than the \$238,001 balance of \$1,387,091 a year earlier.

Budget Director Don Walker said it is still too early to predict if the books will balance at the end of June, the end of the first half of the current biennium.

But he said the deficit indicates income is running close to the predictions of \$65 million for the period compared with \$63 million appropriated for the period by the 1963 legislature.

The report, released by State Treasurer Marjorie H. Moon and Auditor Joe H. Williams, listed a treasurer's balance of \$471,700, outstanding warrants of \$1,671,484 for an auditor's balance of \$1,300,163 overdrawn.

Tax notes outstanding totaled \$3 million but the note redemption fund contained \$366,920.

A year's tax notes outstanding totaled \$1,850,000.
