

## Waters Recede, Leaving Ruins Across Montana

GREAT FALLS, Mont., June 10 (AP)—Montana's floodwaters receded today leaving behind a vast trail of death and destruction. At least 30 persons were dead, 38 missing and thousands homeless as the massive flood moved down the Missouri river over lowland areas near Great Falls, the state's largest city. As deadly floodwaters inched downward, weather observers expressed concern about conditions on the Missouri 200 miles upstream from Great Falls.

## Panel Bill Ties up Dam Construction

WASHINGTON, June 10 (AP)—A house commerce subcommittee approved a bill today designed to tie up dam construction in the Colorado river until congress can determine if they should be federal projects. The measure, by Rep. John J. Pickens, R., Ariz., would prevent the federal power commission from issuing any permits for such dams before Dec. 31, 1965. The bill originally made the Dec. 31, 1965, but the subcommittee accepted a recommendation of interior department officials, who testified before it yesterday, and extended the time to 1967.

## 17 Jailed After Negroes Fight Police

TUSCALOOSA, Ala., June 10 (AP)—Police held 17 Negroes in jail today while watching for possible signs of new demonstrations in the wake of yesterday's bloody street battle. The Negroes were taken into custody after a 15-minute riot at a school playground last Tuesday night. Negro teenagers had been shouting taunts and curses at officers who patrolled the city to prevent further violence. But there was no physical struggle like the earlier one which went more than 30 persons to a hospital for treatment of cuts and bruises and tear gas irritation. Negro leaders, some of them still in jail as the result of the club with police, gave no indication of their future course. The Rev. James Bevel, an associate of the Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr., in the Southern Christian Leadership conference, was sent to Tuscaloosa and reportedly was in conference with some of the other leaders. City authorities assumed that some effort might be made to keep the anti-integration demonstrations alive despite the ban that touched off the outbreak of club swinging and rock and bottle throwing. Ninety-six Negroes went to jail in the aftermath of the rioting, and most of them still were in custody today.

## 75-Day Filibuster Ends in Historic Senate Roll Call

WASHINGTON, June 10 (AP)—The senate voted today, in a history-shattering move, to choke off the 75-day-old Southern filibuster against the civil rights bill. Each senator's time to debate the bill and all amendments will now be limited to one hour. This appears to assure passage of the far-reaching bill, possibly before the end of next week. The house passed the bill on Feb. 10 by a vote of 290-130. The senate has been battling over it since March 9, with Southern opponents mounting a record-breaking filibuster against it.

## Rain Covers Valley, Wind Topples Trees

Continued rain and "soupy" skies were reported across Magic Valley Wednesday after a general storm Tuesday afternoon in which wind uprooted a tree at Richfield and a localized twister near Fairfield tore the roof off a loafing shed. Electrical and telephone wires were torn out when a tree was uprooted at 2:15 p.m. Tuesday two blocks east of Richfield's main street. The power failure lasted for one hour and 20 minutes in West Richfield. At Fairfield the roof was blown off a shed at the Charles Packham ranch in the Minnard area. Mrs. Alvin Peterson said a localized twister also blew the top off a straw stack on her place and tore up some of the hay-bales.

## 2-Mill Levy Is Approved At Murtaugh

MURTAUGH, June 10—Qualified taxpayers in Murtaugh school district No. 418, Twin Falls and Cassia counties, gave overwhelming approval Tuesday afternoon to a two-mill levy for the school plant facility fund. Voters decided on 5 to 3 to continue the two-mill levy not exceed a 10-year period. Funds can be used to purchase school buses, improve, acquire or purchase a school site and to remodel or repair any existing building, demolish or remove school buildings, furnish and equip any buildings including lighting, heating ventilation or sanitary facilities, and appliances necessary to maintain and operate the buildings of the district. During a special meeting Tuesday night the school board set July 6 as date for opening sealed bids on a new construction. Bids for school construction, resulting from a \$200,000 bond issue passed Feb. 25, were opened May 31, but all were rejected. The school board was reorganized during a meeting Monday night here, with Earl Wright, Jr., being sworn in as a new member to serve a three-year term. Truman Abel was elected chairman and E. J. Morgan, vice chairman. Wayne Hoyle will continue in charge of school buses.

## Nuclear Optimism Expressed

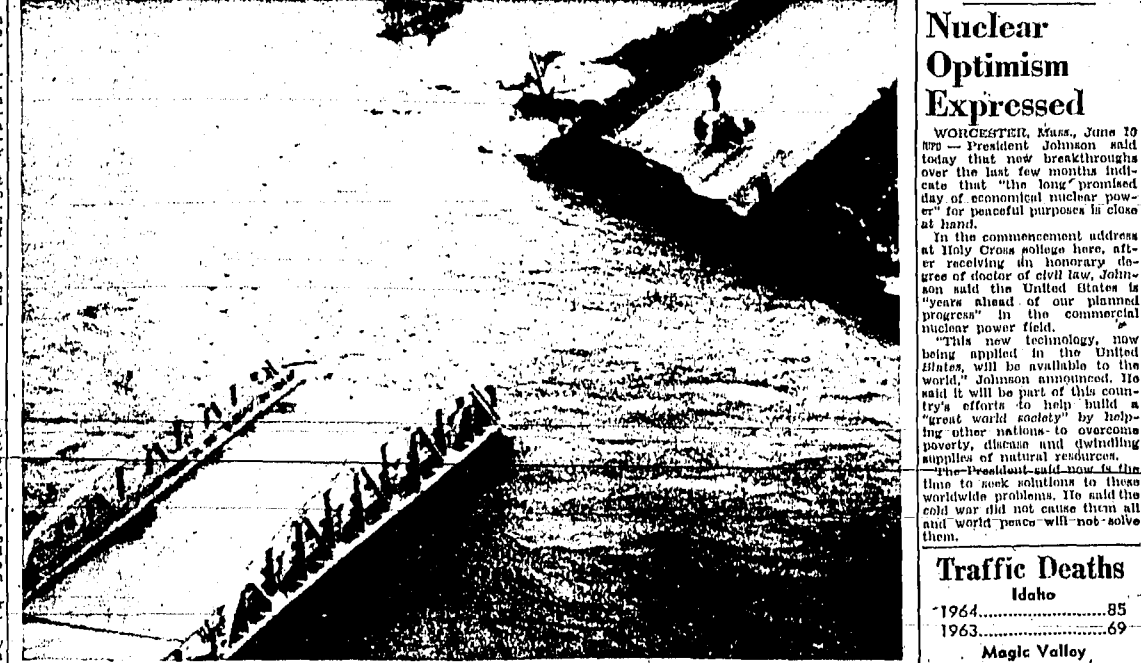
WORCESTER, Mass., June 10 (AP)—President Johnson said today that new breakthroughs over the last few months indicate that "the long promised day of economical nuclear power" for peaceful purposes is close at hand. In the commencement address at Holy Cross college here, after receiving an honorary degree of doctor of civil law, Johnson said the United States is "years ahead of our planned progress" in the commercial nuclear power field. "This new technology, now being applied in the United States, will be available to the world," Johnson announced. He said it will be part of this country's efforts to help build a "new world society" by helping other nations to overcome poverty, disease and dwindling supplies of natural resources. "The world will not be a better place if we do not solve these worldwide problems. It is the cold war did not cause them all and world peace will not solve them."

### Report Nears On Merger Of Railroads

**SPOKANE, June 10 (AP)**—The president of the Northern Pacific railroad told the chamber of commerce here yesterday that a report on a proposed railway merger is expected soon.

Robert B. MacFarlane said the merger between the N.P., Great Northern, Burlington, F. Great Northern, Portland and Seattle, Spokane, Portland and Seattle railroads will not get final approval for at least a year.

He said the interstate commerce commission has to wait a year before issuing a decision to give time for exceptions to be filed to the proposed merger agreement.

Speaking generally of the railroad outlook, MacFarlane said the road faces two main problems: the inequality of government regulations between transportation services and inefficiency caused by archaic work rules.

He said government regulations give trucks and barges a competitive advantage over railroads. He said that railroads were seeking an opportunity to be more competitive with subsidized water, truck and air transportation. But he said railroads are not subsidized and are not looking for subsidies.

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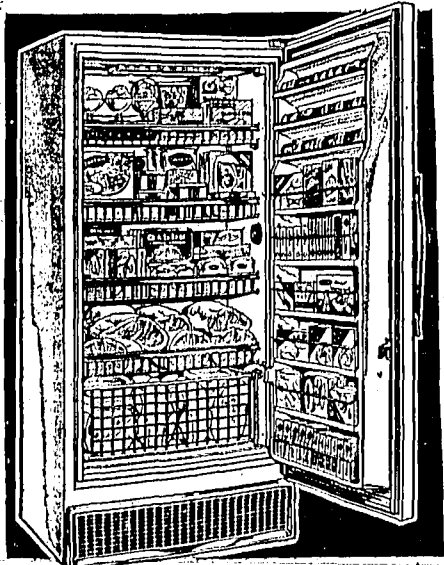

Funeral services are tentatively set for Saturday afternoon at Summers mortuary in Boise.

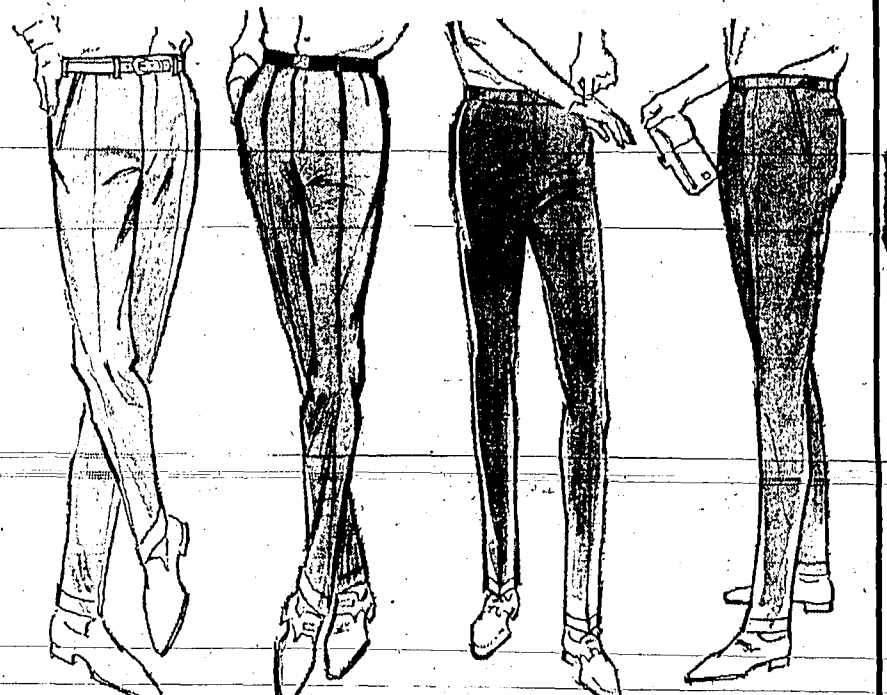

# News Around Idaho

**MOSCOW, June 10 (U)—**The first candidate for a University of Idaho Ph.D. in political science concludes in a study of Idaho voting that the state is predominantly Republican. Herman D. Julian, Moscow, said in his thesis that on an average during the 12 years from 1950 to 1962 Republicans captured 51.9 per cent of the vote.

**POCATELLO, June 10 (U)—**Five nationally known scientists will be at Idaho state university this summer as visiting lecturers for the National Science Foundation Institute in physical science. Supported by a \$55,000 grant from the NSF, the institute began at 10 a. m. Monday and will continue through July 31. It is the first of a series of three annual summer institutes which will treat the 48 participants, all secondary school teachers of science and mathematics, to the degree of master of teaching of physical sciences. Dr. John H. Harnam, the institute director, said the first visiting lecturer will be Dr. Henry Eyring, dean of the graduate school at the University of Utah.

**POCATELLO, June 10 (U)—**Bannock county State Sen. Perry Wheeler was elected tonight at the Bannock county Republican convention to the state Republican assembly in Idaho Falls Friday and Saturday.

**POCATELLO, June 10 (U)—**Seventy-three teachers in the Pocatello school district have resigned this year compared to 67 a year ago at this time, but Superintendent Nelson Ellis thinks the exodus is about even.

**MOSCOW, June 10 (U)—**Prof. William H. Coon will retire this month after 40 years of teaching chemistry at the University of Idaho. He was a 1924 graduate, returning to the university after World War I, and began work as a teaching assistant while he studied for a master's degree.

**BLACKFOOT, June 10 (U)—**Judge Paul Crane, Blackfoot, justice of the peace in Blingham county, has taken exception to the "punchpress" operation of the state's inferior courts in the handling of traffic violations. Judge Crane declared that there was no equity in the law for traffic offenders. He held that as long as the traffic violations were defined as public offenses, in Idaho, the principal consideration under the law, he declared that the courts should decide either to handle traffic cases in an intelligent manner or change the system.

**BOISE, June 10 (U)—**The deputy commanding general of the Sixth army arrived from San Francisco yesterday for a two-day inspection of Idaho, Nevada and California army national guard troops in summer training. Maj. Gen. J. E. Thelmer will fly by helicopter to the desert range south of Owyhee field today to watch firing and tactical maneuvers.

The IFYE program is under the leadership of the national 4-H club foundation and the federal extension service.

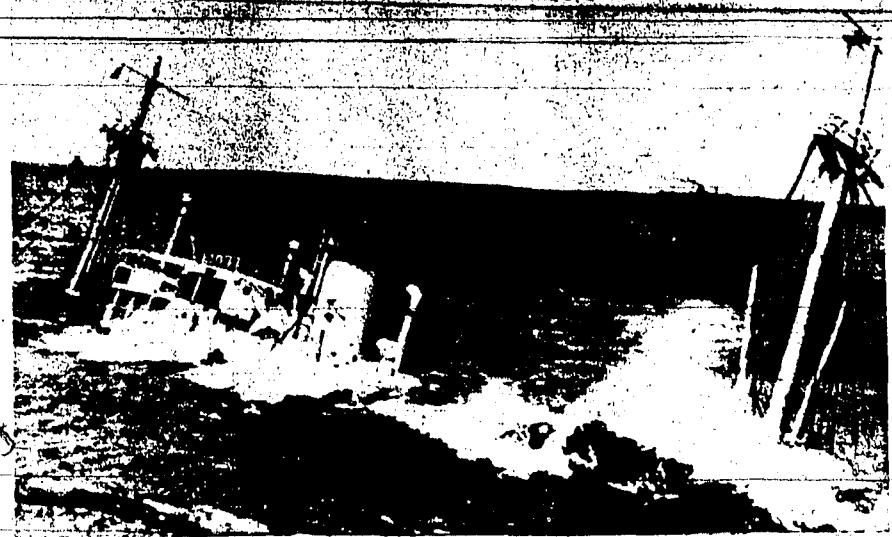

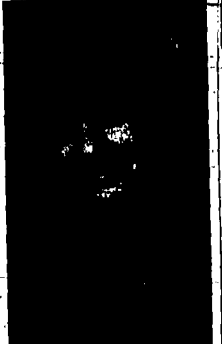

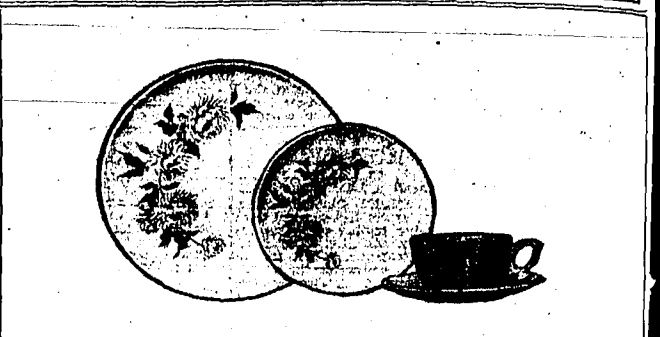

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# Aussies in Viet Nam Under Fire

**SAIGON, June 10 (AP)—**Official sources disclosed yesterday that Australian training teams in South Viet Nam already have exchanged fire with communist guerrillas.

The disclosure followed a report from Canberra, Monday that Defense Minister Shane Peacock planned to send the Australian advisers into combat areas for the first time.

There are about 30 Australians in South Viet Nam now to train the Vietnamese. They bear arms, accompany trainers on unit-level patrols and operate under orders to fire in self defense.

The Australians work mainly in the northernmost part of South Viet Nam in the region controlled by the first army corps. About half of them are in training camps on the coastal plains. The rest work in guerrilla warfare centers where Vietnamese specialists are trying to rally the mountain tribes of the rugged central highlands.

In West Coast markets wholesale beef prices continue to move down; prices of some fresh pork cuts show an upward trend; ready-to-cook fryer chickens are somewhat lower in price, and in the Pacific Northwest, egg prices have declined; all grades and sizes of eggs are down as much as 3 cents a dozen.

Fresh produce plentiful are apples, bananas, Valencia oranges, strawberries, broccoli, cabbage, carrots, cauliflower, celery, lettuce, onions, potatoes and spinach. In good supply are lemons, asparagus, sweet peas, tomatoes, and bunches of vegetables.

Fish buys include plentiful supplies of halibut, rockfish, salmon, scallops, sole and cod.

# Byrd Talks All Night Against Rights Bill

**WASHINGTON, June 10 (AP)—**Sen. Robert C. Byrd, D.-W. Va., kept the senate in session all night for the first time in four years with a marathon talkathon today against the civil rights bill.

The 46-year-old partner of Deep South forces opposing the bill quit by pre-arrangement, still in good voice and seemingly none the worse for the experience.

He stopped just before the senate began the procedure to vote on a leadership move to gag just such filibustering against the legislation.

Byrd agreed in advance to sit down just before 10 a.m., EDT, the time set for placing the gag rule question formally before the senate.

The West Virginian ended his personal filibuster at 9:51 a.m., EDT, after holding the floor 14 hours and 13 minutes.

Byrd started talking at 7:38 p.m. EDT yesterday. When he finished, he still looked spry and clear-eyed.

Byrd is a former supermarket meat-cutter, and standing hours was nothing unusual for him. He took the floor actually at 5:45 p.m., EDT yesterday but did not start speaking until nearly two hours later.

He dived through the ages the history of private property rights and how opponents of the civil rights bill contend they will be trampled by the legislation.

This was Byrd's second all-nighter in joining a southern forces to oppose such legislation. He did a similar bit a few years ago, but he agreed in advance to quit today at 9:59 a.m., EDT, one minute before the planned debate of the cloture rule motion.

Standing first on his left foot, then on his right, and swaying back and forth to ease his legs and back, Byrd traced the institution of private property through the ages, citing the Bible, Aristotle, Cicero, St. Thomas Aquinas, Locke, Hume and contemporary court decisions.

Much of his argument was lost in transmission, however.

Jim Moody, a state department worker who sat in the visitor's gallery for about three hours, said, "He was numbing so much you couldn't tell what he was saying."

About 200 visitors, many of them fleeing the muggy Washington weather in the air-conditioned gallery, were on hand until midnight. But they began drifting away as the hour grew late and Byrd's voice grew lower and lower.

Byrd read from closely typed pages plucked from a large book, customarily to pencil in corrections. As the night wore on his pauses became more frequent and he paced around his cluttered desk.


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### Geneva Meet Gets U.S. Peace Plea

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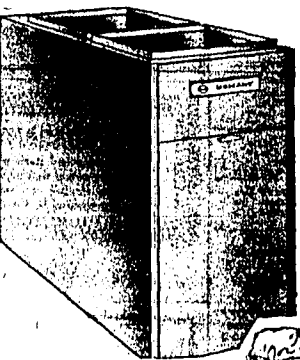

WASHINGTON, June 10 (AP)—President Johnson's family is "one of the wealthiest ever to occupy the White House," with holdings calculated at nine million dollars, the Washington Evening Star said today.

In a lengthy report by staff writer John Barron, the newspaper asserted:

The Johnson holdings in television and radio stations, land, banks and stocks now are worth more than nine million dollars.

"And," the article added, "a rolling issued by the federal communications commission last April could greatly increase their value."

The fortune, the newspaper said, was amassed almost entirely while Mr. Johnson was in public office, mainly since he entered the senate and began his rise to national power in 1948.

The White House had no immediate comment on the story.

The Star noted the common version that the fortune is mainly due to Mrs. Johnson's acumen and energy in buying up a small, part-time, debt-ridden Austin, Tex., radio station in 1943 for \$17,500 and developing it into a highly profitable TV-radio business.

"Mrs. Johnson," the newspaper continued, "doubtless has made impressive contributions. But there is strong evidence that Mr. Johnson himself has participated vigorously in the family business ventures."

"Several Texans who dealt with the Johnsons prior to last November say they always dealt with Mr. Johnson, never with his wife."

"Mr. Johnson, it should be noted, owns no stock in the company which has title to most of the Johnson property and has assembled the family with such amenities as limousines, an airplane, a cabin cruiser and the LBJ ranch itself. A majority of the family company stock, 84.45 per cent, is owned by Mrs. Johnson and her daughters.

"Last Nov. 20, a week after House, the family relinquished control of the company by putting the stock into a trust."

"The trust agreement stipulates that neither the President nor his wife shall receive any information on how the family property is administered."

"Since then, according to Washington attorney Abe Fortas, an old friend and personal adviser to the President, Mr. Johnson has not engaged in or discussed any family business. But in gathering material for this article, the Star has received allegations to the contrary."

The bulk of the Johnson fortune, the Star pointed out, has been derived from investments in Texas television and radio stations.

The newspaper noted that during his first term in the senate, Johnson was a member of the commerce committee which has jurisdiction over the federal communications commission. The FCC, in turn, regulates all television and radio stations.

"The public records of the FCC," the article continued, "show no evidence that Mr. Johnson ever sought preferential consideration from the regulatory agency."

The latest FCC ruling affected the Johnson family fortune came this spring. As the Star put it, "the commission voted to continue probably fatal regulations upon an Austin television cable firm which is competing with one allied with the Johnson company."

If Capital Cable, the firm allied with the Johnson interest, succeeds in driving its competitor out of Austin, Capital's total worth could be between five and 10 million dollars, according to broadcasting industry sources.

Even an option agreement which the Johnson company to purchase half of Capital Cable at a price which would be well under a million dollars.

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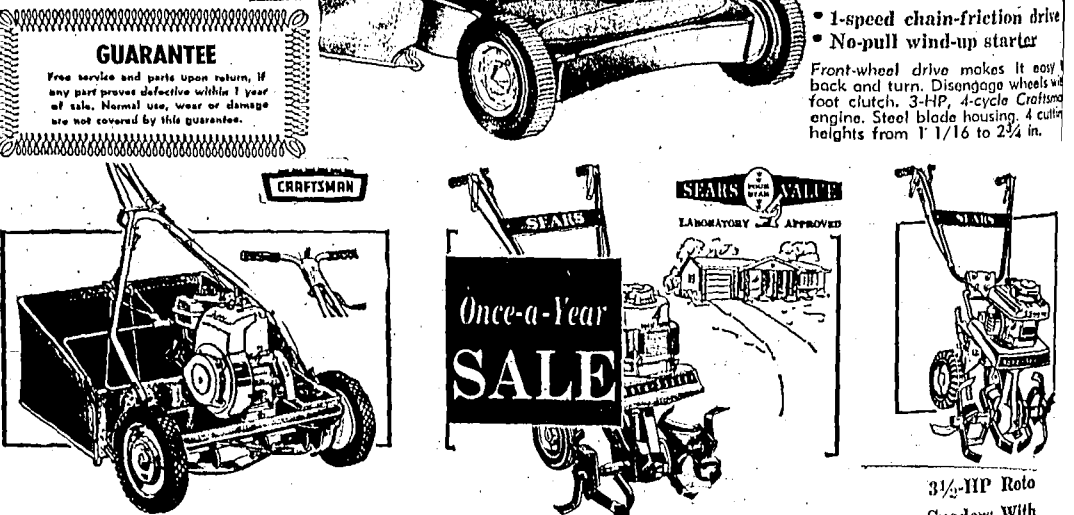

## Kansas Says U.S. Has Laws Now For Cattle Crisis

WASHINGTON, June 10 (AP)—Rep. John Dingens, called on the agriculture department today to use existing authority to give cattle producers relief from excessive imports.

In a letter to Secretary Orville Freeman, Dingens cited sections of the 1933 and 1935 agriculture acts. One authorizes the secretary to buy surplus commodities at "market prices," the other requires the secretary to inform the President when commodities are imported in such quantities as to interfere with other programs of the department.

The President then, Dingens said, shall call for a U.S. tariff investigation.

Dingens noted Freeman is using the first authority, purchase of surplus beef, but is not using the second.
