

## Johnson, Turk Set Confab

WASHINGTON, June 13 (AP)—Prime Minister Ismet Inonu of Turkey will begin a conference with President Johnson on the Cyprus crisis June 22, the White House announced today.

It is expected that Prime Minister Ismet Inonu will be invited to meet with Johnson on the Cyprus crisis, although nothing has been said about this officially.

The Inonu visit grew out of the week's mission to Greece and Turkey by Undersecretary of State George W. Ball.

Inonu will arrive in Washington on June 21, the White House said, and his consultations with Johnson will begin the next day.

George E. Beedy, White House press secretary, said he did not know how long the Johnson-Inonu talks would continue.

The United States has been deeply concerned about an armistice between Turkey and Greece over Cyprus, where Greek and Turkish Cypriots are feuding.

Ball, holding a news conference here Friday, said he had emphasized in talks with Inonu and Panandreu that the United States would be unlikely to support any plan that would be unworkable.

Inonu was invited to meet with Johnson after the President last week launched new efforts to end the Cyprus crisis.

At yesterday's conference Ball said there has been "enormous pressure within Turkey for intervention with Cyprus."

According to some accounts, Inonu last week persuaded Inonu to abandon plans for a Turkish invasion of Cyprus.

Although the invasion threat seems to have receded, all characterized the Cyprus situation as still dangerous.

Lowery noted that the shock wave of a sonic boom precedes the noise. Most of the damaged windows were on the ground floor, he said.

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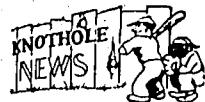

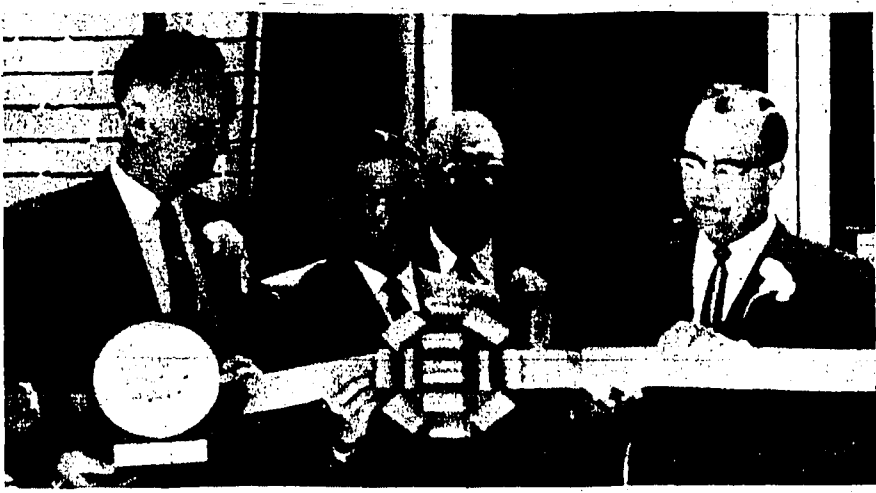

## News Around Idaho

BOISE, June 13 (AP)—A recommendation urging its members not to accept employment with Utah until sanctions against that state imposed by the National Education Association are removed was adopted today by the Idaho Education Association. Sanctions by the NEA were imposed following a two-day walkout by Utah's 10,000 public school teachers last month to dramatize demands for more money for education of the state's 270,000 pupils.

BOISE, June 13 (AP)—Resolutions urging an increase in state aid to the public schools and a review of Idaho's tax structure were adopted today by the executive committee of the Idaho Congress of Parents and Teachers. The committee met to discuss the state legislative platform for presentation to the PTA's annual meeting in Pocatello next November. In its education plank, the committee urged the legislature to provide a minimum of 80 per cent of the average expenditure of \$453 per child in neighboring states for the maintenance and operation of public elementary and secondary schools.

POCASTELLO, June 13 (AP)—Pocastello city officials hope to get the towners soon to some long-unanswered questions about the Fort-nun river flood control project next spring. City Commission Chairman Earl J. Pond said City Engineer C. H. Reddy, district engineer for the U. S. Army corps of engineers, will meet with city and county officials Wednesday at 4 p.m. in the municipal building.

BOISE, June 13 (AP)—The 1,700 men of the Idaho national guard's 160th armored cavalry regiment are scheduled to leave for their home stations today. Their two-week long summer encampment was climaxed with a regimental parade and graduation of 21 cadets from the Idaho military academy. Among those receiving appointments as second lieutenants in the national guard at their graduation ceremonies yesterday was David A. Belaker, Gooding.

BOISE, June 13 (AP)—The president of the Idaho Farm Bureau federation said today that a decline in cattle prices is not likely to result in a reduction in the price of pork hams. He said that 50 cents in the last 10 years while meat packers have increased their markup by \$7 and the retailers by \$20. He said that cattle ranchers are receiving 10 cents less of the consumer beef dollar than they did in 1954, but the packers receive an additional eight cents than they did 10 years ago and retailers an additional eight cents, he said.

MOHOCW, June 13 (AP)—University of Idaho will give degrees to 1,077 students—the largest graduating class in its history—at commencement exercises tomorrow. The commencement speaker will be Robert V. Hunsberger, Boise, president of the Boise Cascade corporation. Honorary degrees will go to H. Rex Lee, Governor of American Samoa, and Dr. Eugene B. Cluffee, president of Boise Junior college.

BOISE, June 13 (AP)—Farm employment in Idaho in the week of May 24 was estimated at 69,000 persons, the U. S. department of agriculture reported today. That compares with 72,000 in the corresponding period last year.

BOISE, June 13 (AP)—Rep. Ralph Harding, D., Ida., told supporters of the Bonneville power administration today that he would continue a vigorous effort to obtain transmission facilities to carry Idaho's surplus power to southern Idaho. He noted that the house appropriations committee, in refusing to authorize one million more in appropriation to begin planning of the line, suggested that efforts be made to have privately owned utilities wheel the power. He said if such an arrangement cannot be made it is likely the committee will look favorably on an appropriation for a transmission line in the future. He said he would work to that end.

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## Is It too Late for Scranton?

WASHINGTON, June 13 (AP)—"The hour is late," Scranton of Pennsylvania said so himself Friday when he finally took the plunge into the race for the Republican presidential nomination.

Exactly one month is left before the delegates to the GOP national convention meet at San Francisco to choose their nominee. Scranton's entry, at the very least, could make the convention more interesting than it had shaped up to be.  
The burning question for those who would like to head off Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona is: "Do we have enough time?"  
Most tallies show Goldwater quite close to the 555 delegate votes needed to win.

A companion question is: What might former President Dwight D. Eisenhower, the country's most popular Republican, decide to do in any positive way—in this situation? Eisenhower welcomed Scranton's entry as "good for the health and vigor of the party."  
Eisenhower was widely reported this week to have first urged Scranton to make himself more available, and then to force to accept it. He said anything that might split the party.

Scranton appeared to have answered with a loud "no" to a question that had been raised: Would he run for vice president with Goldwater? Goldwater words he used in his announcement didn't sound flattering to Goldwater.  
Scranton declared: "In a presidential year the candidate at the top of the ticket can help those below. Or he can doom them to undeserved defeat."  
Goldwater issued a statement of monumental calm: "I welcome all Scranton into the race as one of the outstanding governors in the nation."  
And Goldwater expressed hope that the party will unite "as one purpose—to defeat Lyndon B. Johnson in November."

Eisenhower has said that the platform the GOP adopts is as important as the candidate it will choose.  
Even before Scranton announced, Eisenhower said he wanted a wide open convention to stir national and party interest. Otherwise, why have one?

With President Johnson unopposed for the Democratic nomination and with Goldwater taking a long lead among the Republicans.

The antique machine used to staple the buttons is no longer in use, but the buttons can be sewed on by hand.

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### Female Sleuths Get Their Man Heartless Way

**SAN FRANCISCO, June 13** — The world's largest bank uses an all-female staff of sleuths to track down the forgers, counterfeiters and other criminals who try to cash checks from the Bank of America profit.

Under the guidance of assistant cashier Helen Randall, the female detectives investigate all checks brought in by customers. Checks have been lost, whose or — as it sometimes turns out — misappropriated.

While seldom leaving their desks, the Bank of America investigators work closely with police agencies throughout the country. Often they are responsible for arrests.

Mrs. Randall, for example, remembers the case of a cross-country confidence man whom she brought to justice without ever meeting him.

The young man was going from city to city buying travelers' checks and then reporting them missing. He would collect reimbursement from the bank. Later cashed, the original checks.

The man-thief posed at various times as an exchange student son of a wealthy South American and as a businessman.

After a time, Mrs. Randall began to suspect all the fraudulent claims were coming from the same man. She eventually tracked him down when he posed as a businessman, stranded in Philadelphia, and scheduled to be married the next day in Mexico.

He sought an immediate refund for \$1,700 in travelers' checks.

Talking to him on the telephone, Mrs. Randall recognized him. She contacted Philadelphia police, and then called the confidence man back. She kept him on the phone until officers arrived to arrest him.

Along with tracking down dishonest customers, Mrs. Randall's staff has the job of making refunds to the honest ones — those whose checks have been lost or stolen.

One man got his money back after six men kidnapped him and forced him at gunpoint to endorse travelers' checks as "ransom."

In other cases, Mrs. Randall's staff sometimes returns lost checks to people who didn't even know their checks were missing. That too, Mrs. Randall said, is a "very rewarding aspect of our work."

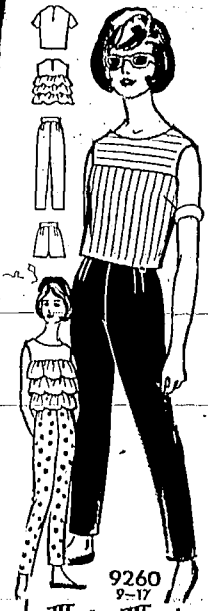

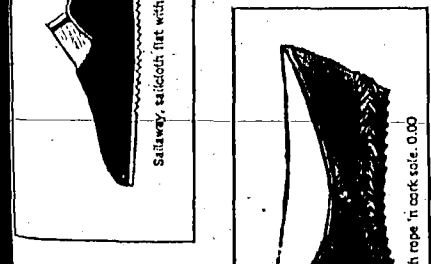

## Objection to State Having Own Insurance Is Blasted

Editor, Times-News: The statement of Ralph Peters from Jerome appearing in the June 3 Times-News concerning a move in the state of Idaho to create a self-insurance program for the state is most shocking.

Mr. Peters speaks as a director of the Independent Insurance Agents in Idaho. He charges that if the state creates a self-insurance program, it is contrary to the free enterprise system; that it would lead to fiscal irresponsibility; and that a fund would be created which would tempt politicians.

I believe in insurance because insurance coverage is necessary if injured parties are to be taken care of by the free enterprise system rather than society.

I cannot, however, understand how insurance companies or their agents can put together some of the biggest lobbying forces in the country requesting protective legislation under the guise of saving free enterprise and then complain because the State wants to engage in fiscal responsibility by saving the taxpayers money.

No matter how much insurance companies cry about loss, it is not in business for the benevolence of mankind.

The insurance companies want laws which make it difficult and sometimes impossible to collect insurance benefits; they want lower taxes on their vast property holding; they want in-

dividual taxes less so more money can be used for premiums on insurance; and they want fiscal responsibility in government.

How can Mr. Peters and his independent insurance agents in good conscience say that the state of Idaho should not conduct its own insurance program and save the taxpayers of this state thousands upon thousands of dollars spent in premiums?

Apparently, Mr. Peters believes the free enterprise system means that the government should never do anything to save money and reserve to itself the right to scream when our political leaders spend money. Let's give the taxpayers a little more money and I dare say they will buy a little more of our insurance.

## Fabled Camas Lilies Bloom Again On Prairie Rich in Indian Lore

FAIRFIELD, June 13—The camas lily came first. Then came the Indians, followed by the white men, who, in turn, were followed by the hogs.

Then came the war, because the Indians considered the camas roots their very own.

The Indians are gone from Camas prairie and things are different.

From the Happy Hunting ground up above, the Indians of

### Blooms

FAIRFIELD, June 13—Now at the peak of blooming, the Camas lilies of this valley should continue to do so through about next Tuesday.

Many spots of the valley are covered with the vivid blue lilies at present, the result of a late and wet spring.

Great area of concentration is about a mile south of Hill City. This community is 14 miles west of Fairfield by paved road. Fairfield is less than a two-hour drive on paved roads from Twin Falls.

the past must be looking down on the prairie with yearning.

The camas roots are back in profusion. Their vivid green stems, topped by blue blossoms, just as vivid, blanket scores of acres in various spots on the prairie.

Old timers say the display beats anything seen for years and is the direct result of the late, wet spring.

One especially beautiful area is just south of Hill City, a community 14 miles west of here. Two large fields have camas blossoms so thick that, even up close, it gives the appearance of

a lake, deep blue and rippled by the moving breeze.

From time that stretches back before the memory of the white man, the Indians had been coming to the Camas prairie each spring to dig up the camas roots.

They were not so much interested in the beauty of the blossoms. These blossoms served only to tell them that the roots were ready for the harvest.

What they were interested in were the roots—actually they are bulbs which look very much like any lily bulb.

The squaws, the braves and the youngsters camped in the immediate area each spring because the prairie was covered with the plants.

The roots (or bulbs) were dug from the ground and allowed to dry, after which they were pul-

verized into a type of flour the Indians used to make a form of bread. It was a staple food for the members of the Indian bands and they came into the area from all directions.

Today, the apparently unlimited fields of the camas lilies are gone because of the inroads of civilization.

But this spring, for the first time in many years, visitors are

able to get a glimpse of things as they were in the "old days," before the white man came into the area.

The lilies are back by the millions and in full bloom. Peak blooming should continue through about Tuesday of this week, permitting inspection by residents of Magic Valley.

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## Vaccination Is Important To Traveler

Next to the passport and the visa, the most important documents for the foreign traveler are the international certificates of vaccination, says Dr. Luther C. Thompson, medical director.

Most people who run into delays of quarantine have failed to present a valid certificate of vaccination against smallpox, in the United States the certificate is published as public health service form 731, which is given out with passport application. It may also be obtained from local and state health departments, from offices of the U.S. public health service or it may be purchased from the superintendent of documents, U.S. government printing office, Washington 25, D.C., at 10 cents a copy.

Vaccination against cholera is recommended by Dr. Luther L. Terry, surgeon general of the public health service, for all travelers to Asia and the Western Pacific, except babies less than 6 months old.

The vaccination consists of two inoculations seven to 10 days apart. For adequate protection, the second inoculation should be obtained not less than six days before departure.

Travelers entering the United States from cholera infected areas are being required to present a valid international certificate of vaccination against cholera in the past six months.

Official information on overseas health hazards and on required and recommended vaccinations for international travel is available from the division of foreign quarantine, public health service, Washington 25, D.C.

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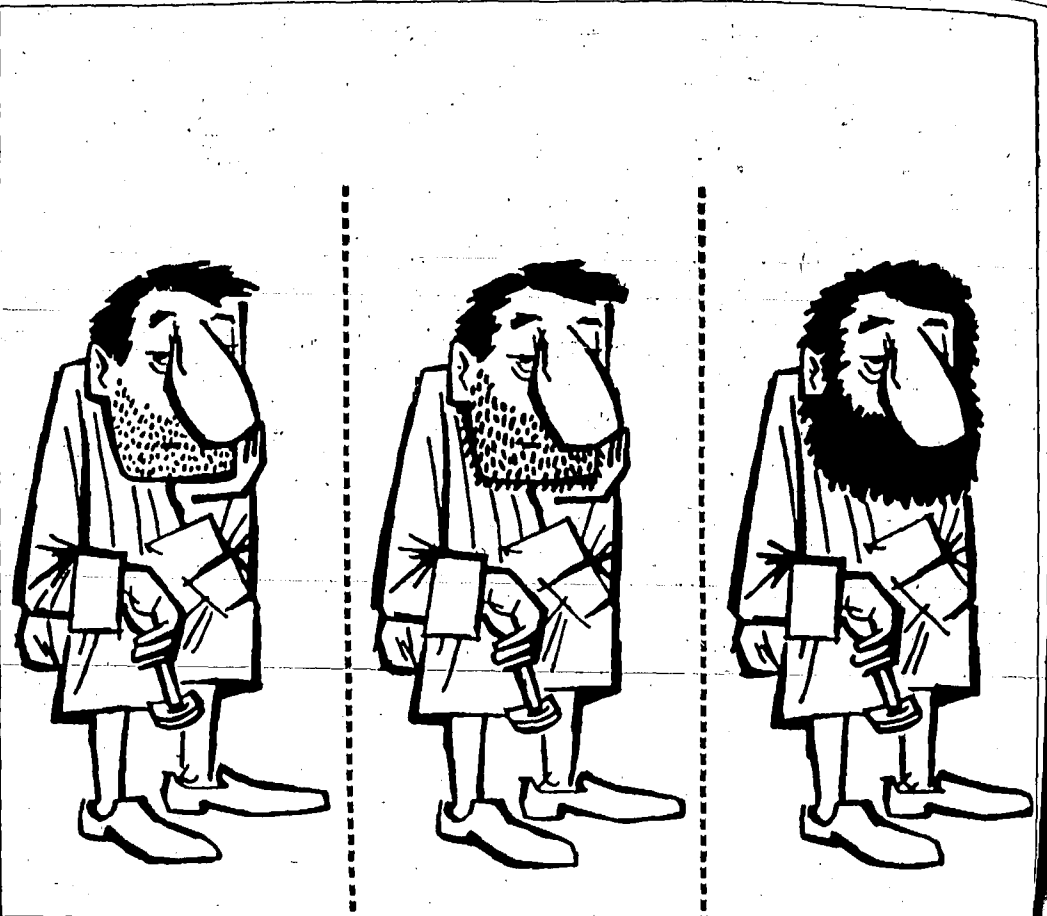
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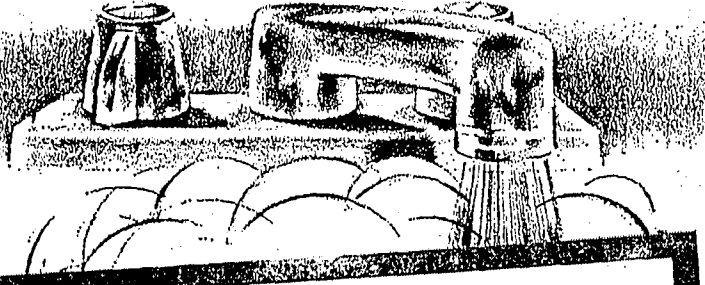
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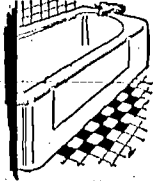

### Idaho Begins to Put New Five Point Program Into Action to Boost State

By John H. Woodworth,  
Director Fish-Game Department  
BOISE, June 12—The end of a fiscal or budget year in an age of increasing state activity is a time for stocktaking as the state department. This year, the fiscal year is bowing out and a new budgetary period is about to begin.

Projection figures show disposable income will double by that date, and that people will travel twice as far each year as they do now.

Access to hunting and fishing areas. This still is the No. 1 objective in the five-point program. During the past year, a great deal of progress has been made. Over 75 access projects have been developed since the program was initiated this year.

Although it is a little too early to predict what the actual increase in revenue will be from the new program, it is clear that the program is authorized by the state legislature as part of the five-point program over a year ago, it does not mean that a large part of it was achieved.

Management people are aware of the need for access to the state. The pressure of people on the shores of Priest and Pond Oreille lakes indicates that more access and development is a No. 1 priority.

Other access needs in northern Idaho include the lower Couer d'Alene river, Round lake near St. Maries, and additional access to Couer d'Alene lake.

With the creation of the research position in the department and the university cooperative unit, much can be done to help the state.

Over in eastern Idaho, there is a need to develop more access to Blackfoot reservoir, and in the Black canyon of Bear river near Grange. Boat ramps are needed at American Falls and Blackfoot reservoir, and access to the Snake river is needed in the Musselshell area.

Development of new fishing waters and acquisition and development of public shooting grounds. The department already has demonstrated what new fishing impoundments can do at Spring Valley reservoir in Latah county, and the entire log pond at Horseshoe Bend north of Hagerman.

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## Rocks From Oakley Quarries Being Used Commercially in Northwest

OAKLEY, June 13—Rocks are rocks, no matter what you do with them. But when they are at your back door, why not take advantage of their use as several Oakley men have done?

Not just ordinary round boulders, but the smooth flat rocks that are being made into decorative pieces throughout the Northwest, are coming from the mountains in different quarries south of Oakley.

Anyone driving through Magic Valley can note many beautiful homes with such rock adorning their yards in one form or another.

Many of the houses are featuring "stone rock" on their front outside fireplaces and walls, while planter boxes, walks, barbecues, fireplaces and patios can be seen outside.

On the inside, if one were to take the time to look, probably can be found a front room fireplace and occasionally a solid rock wall adding an artistic touch to the room.

Going out of Magic Valley and into the "highlights" of the big cities, such as Las Vegas, for instance, a person might be surprised to learn that stone on the

Thunderbird, the Riviera, the Sahara and several others is none other than the product that comes from this part of the country.

In Oakley several businessmen are actively engaged in selling the rock and some make their entire living from it. During the summer it is common to see semi-truck-loads leaving town on their way from the mountains to yards throughout the Northwest where the rock is sold.

Spokesmen for the group point out that this is not soft rock, but hard quartzite, with colors running from glittering greys to yellows, browns and sometimes reds.

Not only are there smooth, flat stones ranging from one-half to three inches wide, but there are also large, thick pieces known as "builder stone" which are being used more and more for the present.

Pre-cast means that instead of a piece at a time being put on, entire walls are raised in sections at once, such as those featured on most of the modern Parkway stores.

The formation of these quarries also is interesting, as it comes out of the mountain in various sized sheets and sizes. Both heavy machinery and hand work, in the form of pick and shovel, must be used to get the job done.

Crowbars also are a necessary tool and when the going gets too tough dynamite sometimes has to be used to loosen some of the rock. Then for a few days the pickhugs are a little on the easier side.

The rock usually is loaded onto the truck at the quarry or else trucked to several yards around Oakley where it is stockpiled for those who desire buying in smaller amounts.

The men point out that the stone is sold by the ton and many people would have no use for a ton, so smaller amounts are sold.

Even though all the quarries are strictly "off limits" to rock collectors, occasionally a stockpile at the quarry site has been known to come up missing.

The latest thing in Oakley which will feature the stone which has been donated by the various men in the industry will be the fireplace planned for the "Vigilant" newest addition south of Oakley this time for the July 24 celebration.

### Trail Work Is Becoming More Important in Forest

Trail use of the Challis national forest is becoming increasingly important as people have more leisure time and longer vacations to enjoy the out of doors. Present day trails are a vital part of the national forest transportation system. They are used by nature lovers, pickers and guides, recreationists and stockmen. In recent years these people have taken to the trails on foot, on horseback and on trail machines.

Construction and maintenance of forest trails is an important part of the program of work on the Challis national forest. During 1963 Challis national forest areas reconstructed seven miles of trail on Loon creek and Rapid river. In addition, 1,000 miles of trails were maintained — 100 miles by forest crews and 130 miles by contract crews.

In the past, most of the reconstruction and maintenance work has been done by hand and horse. These methods are still used in the primitive and wilderness areas, but on other parts of the national forest the use of trail machines and gas powered equipment has helped reduce costs.

Very little mechanized equipment, except for trail machines, is used on the Challis national forest. Light portable rock drills and chainsaws are used extensively.

Trail safety is a must for all types of travel. If you are traveling on foot watch out for loose rolling rock. Proper foot-gear is important whether walking or riding. Many of the trails on the Challis are in the mountain country and a snake bite kit should be carried by all travelers.

Other valuable items for the trail traveler are first aid kit, compass and maps of the gen-

eral area in which you are traveling. If you are traveling alone, no matter by what means, leave an itinerary with relatives or friends.

With the various methods of traveling and increasing number of travelers, good trail manners must be the rule rather than the exception. Conflicts which might arise between horse use and trail machines can be eliminated by using common courtesy.

Proper trail manners dictate that trail machine riders pull off the trail as far as possible and turn off their machine to allow horse or foot travelers to pass. Good trail manners help to prevent serious accidents.

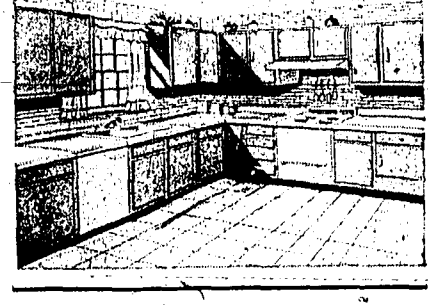

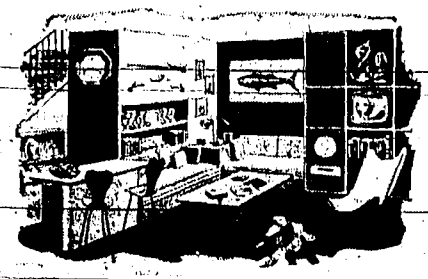

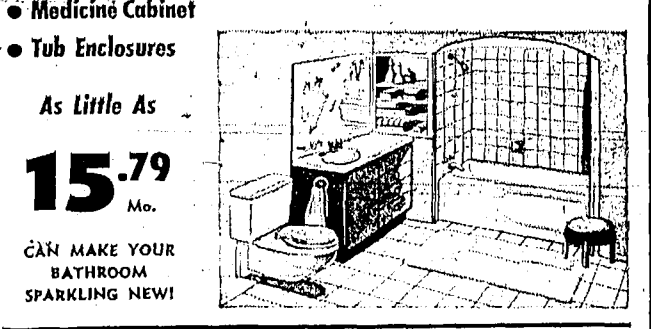

**Camas Lilies  
Dot Historic  
Prairie Area**

Lilies are to be sown in many areas of the prairie—but the soft, wet areas south of Hill City present the greatest display.

The plant grows best in heavy soil and early pioneers of the area say that one of the best areas used to be where the lilies are now.

This return of the blooms is something unusual and not just a recurrence to be taken for granted.

The historic background connected with the camas root and the Indians and the whites is one of the most interesting stories in Idaho history.

The camas actually came back in the spring of 1878. Peral authorities were not keeping their word that the Camas prairie valley was to be for use of the Hancock Indians.

The valley was agreed for them by the treaty of Ft. Bridger, but now, less than a decade later, the white stock was gradually taking it over.

In fact, hundreds of hogs had been imported into the area because they enjoyed feeding—and prospered—on the camas roots.

So it was in May, 1878, that the Indians came back into the valley for the annual harvest and the white people had invaded their root fields. Cattle and horses were also grazing in the valley which the Indians, by the treaty, were supposed to have for their own.

A skirmish between a group of Indians and whites resulted in the wounding of several and proved the spot for Chief Buffalo Horn's required.

This chief was known as an able hunter who had provided efficient leadership as principal Hancock scout in the Nez Perce war of 1877. He and some 50 "braves" were dissatisfied with the army ways of the white man.

Some historians say Buffalo Horn actually was behind and provoked the shooting on the prairie which marked the start of the last of the Indian uprisings.

Chief Buffalo Horn decided to risk all-out war and led his group on a campaign which made anyone in his path fair game.

From Camas prairie Buffalo Horn led his group south for refuge on the King Hill stage station and then on to the ferry at Cleary Ferry. They sank the ferry.

The people of Bureau valley fled west of the Indian uprisings reached them. Freighters abandoned their wagons and stock and fled for safety. Several white people were killed.

The Indians met little resistance until they reached South Mountain, near the fabled fast-growth town Silver City. Buffalo Horn reached there with an estimated 60 warriors.

There they met a company of 25 volunteers from Silver City. On June 8 the two forces faced each other and one of the last great fights between the Indians and the whites was under way.

Chief Buffalo Horn took chances, and was killed. As a result of the fighting among the Indians, now without a leader, the Hancock Indians escaped and the Indians will go to fight no more. Two white volunteers lost their lives in the skirmish.

Other Indians show up in the history of Idaho about that time and a little later, but that was the beginning of the end.

For years afterward, Indians returned each spring to Camas prairie to dig for roots, but it was not the same. Fences now dotted the landscape and the Indians had stretched away in the distance undisturbed by much of anything.

As late as eight years ago a group of Indians—riding in an automobile—stopped at a local store to ask directions to "where the roots are." That was about the last of it.

It started back in the spring of 1878 because of cattle, horses and hogs and a treaty negotiated by the white men.

Today, for this spring at least, the Camas lilies are back in strength and by force of numbers provide a beautiful glimpse into the past beauty of the Camas prairie, once the property of the Hancock Indians.

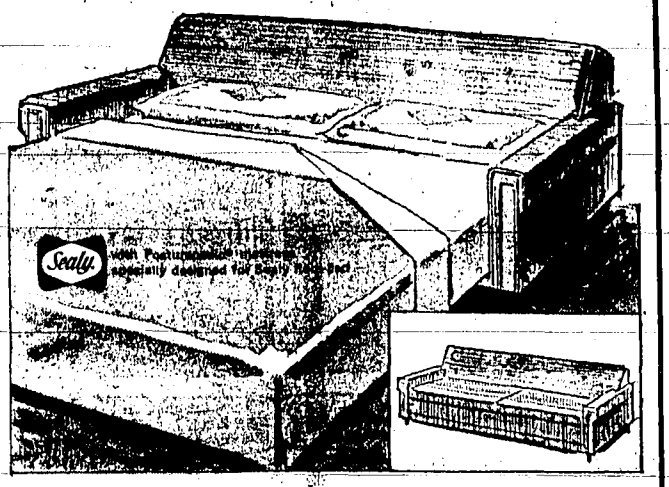

Ray Turner, high school principal, reported that Mrs. Jane M. Trostman, formerly of Jerome, has been offered the position of high school English instructor. Positions yet to be filled in the Wendell school system include high school principal, music instructor, high school and junior high mathematics instructor.

# Sea Water Desalting Method Is Idea of Ex-Resident

Dr. Glenn G. Havens is one of those gifted fellows who think of new ways to benefit the desires and dreams of the human race, and then continue on with the idea to get the job done.

Dr. Havens, who started his schooling in grade schools of Twin Falls and was graduated from Hazelton high school, has caused widespread interest with his latest idea, a process which points to major cost reductions in desalting ocean water.

The first model of the unique process, dreamed up by the former local resident, was demonstrated recently to the press, government and business representatives at the San Diego Gas and Electric company's South Bay plant.

Fresh water filters through the tube membranes under pressure but salt does not. The equipment consists of lengths of tubing and a pump and is simple, inexpensive and easy to maintain.

The new system will be developed in agreement with the Hichfield Oil company and is being manufactured in a large plant in San Diego.

This idea which has proved successful is only one of many developed by Dr. Havens down through the years.

His first job, after receiving his doctorate, was with the U. S. Rubber company as assistant manager in charge of development projects in Ohio. After nine months in that position he went

with Convair in San Diego as Staff engineer.

It was during this period that he developed an adhesive compound considered to be one of the most important developments in the manufacture of high speed jets.

The compound which was his own development and which was manufactured under his direction, eliminated use of rivets and permitted the aluminum skin of the plane to adhere without them, even at the high speed of jet craft. It also permitted a change in metal from aluminum to manganese which, because it is much lighter, permits a given plane to fly some 10,000 feet higher and at higher speeds.

On the 13-3d, for instance, this special tape which cost about \$10,000 for that size job, saved more than a half million dollars in total costs over the old rivet method.

He pioneered the manufacture of the glass fishing pole which is now universal. He formed a company to manufacture the poles and built a plant at Costa Mesa, Calif., where 100 employees turn out more than 3,000 poles each working day.

Only recently he sold the plant to Garcla Manufacturing company. The plant, together with former holdings, now make the company the largest manufacturer of glass poles in the world.

Right now, with water the topic of most discussions in the

southern-California area, his ideas of making fresh water from sea water is being watched closely. After trials, it is expected to be adopted for large communities.

Yet while all this is going on, Havensman admits his friend has "other ideas in his mind."

"Just what they are is anyone's guess but they are there," Havensman said on returning from the trip to the coast.

And so Dr. Havens, who started his schooling in Twin Falls and graduated from a high school at Hazelton which no longer exists, has continued on to become a millionaire several times over with one workable idea right after another.

Although it would fit inside a bedroom closet, the demonstration model is producing 300 gallons of fresh water daily.

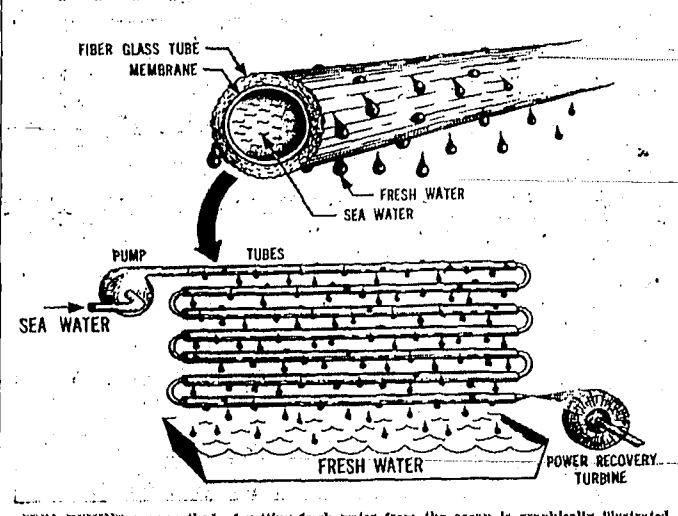
Does it taste good? Sure does, attests Lynn Hempleman, route 2, Twin Falls, who tasted it.

Hempleman went through grade school with Dr. Havens and also was his roommate at the University of Idaho during their college days. From the University of Idaho, where he was graduated in 1927 with a degree in science, Dr. Havens entered graduate work at the same school and emerged with his masters degree. Then went back to the University of Wisconsin and completed work for a doctorate, also in science.

Maintaining communication down through the years, the local man was present in San Diego shortly after the first public demonstration of the new system.

"I hesitated to drink the water which had come from the sea," Hempleman said, "but after I did, I found that it tasted just like any other water. It was really something."

According to what Dr. Havens, now president of Havens Industries, San Diego, told Hempleman, the process works on the principle of reverse osmosis, in which sea water is forced through fibreglass tubing integrally lined with a special membrane of modified cellulose
