

GOP Leaders Advise Against Special Session

BOISE, June 15 (UPI)—Republican legislative leaders advised Gov. Robert E. Smylie against calling a special session of the legislature this year to deal with a proposal for state water development. The GOP leadership met within the past few days and agreed to advise the governor against calling a special session, source who declined to be quoted by name revealed.

A source who declined to be quoted by name revealed that the stand by the GOP leaders kills any prospect of a special session on the water question. Smylie said he would call it if two-thirds of the lawmakers indicated they would approve a constitutional amendment proposed by a 31-member drafting committee.

The amendments would have permitted, if approved by voters, creation of a state water agency with authority to issue revenue bonds to finance projects.

The GOP lawmakers took the position that there was no immediate threat to diversion of Idaho water because of a pledge by Secretary of Interior Stewart Udall that the administration would not permit it.

Smylie has said despite that pledge, the state should move as fast as possible to harness its water. Smylie's naming of the committee followed unveiling of a Los Angeles proposal to pipe 25 million acre-feet of Snake River water to southern California.

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Catholics Feuding on Race Issue

LOS ANGELES, June 15 (UPI) — Two Roman Catholic priests who attended seminary together joined today in criticizing James Francis Cardinal McIntyre for his alleged negative attitude on racial issues.

The Rev. Terrence W. Hallinan joined his seminary classmate, Rev. William J. Murphy, in claiming that the archbishop of Los Angeles does not have "an open policy on civil rights."

The Rev. Father Murphy, assistant pastor at St. Mary's Church, Los Angeles, said, however, that he did not support the Rev. Father Hallinan's views that the cardinal should be removed from his post.

Father Hallinan last week revealed that he had written to Pope Paul VI asking the holy see to remove the cardinal.

In his letter, Father Hallinan said Cardinal McIntyre had refused to take a stand against segregation and admit there was a "moral issue" involved.

The 20-year-old priest said he since has been relieved of his duties as assistant administrator at St. Albert's Church in Compton, but was not relieved of his priesthood.

Father Hallinan's parish is composed about 80 per cent of Negroes.

FIVE-DAY FORECAST

The mean pressure pattern aloft shows a low center in the Gulf of Alaska and a high pressure area in the eastern Pacific. In between, a westerly flow of air will prevail into the central and intermediate regions during this week.

Temperatures under this weather pattern will average from 60 to 70 degrees. There will be periods of clearing skies, even through much of Saturday. Daytime temperatures will show greater departures from normal with nighttime temperatures holding near to slightly below normal. Small day-to-day temperature changes are expected through Wednesday with minor warming into the end of the week. Normal temperatures for this week are Gooding 58 and 48; Twin Falls, 62 and 48, and Burley, 57 and 45.

Developing storm systems from the low pressure center in the Gulf of Alaska will be carried from the Pacific by the westerly air flow and move across southern Idaho at frequent periods this week. Showers. Thursday morning, again on Wednesday and then lighter showers again Friday make up the precipitation pattern through Saturday. Total precipitation from showers this week will range from .25 to .50 of an inch.

Sunshine will be quite limited the first part of the week with periods of clearing into the latter part of the week and will average around 50 to 60 per cent of possible. Soil temperatures at the three- to eight-inch depth will remain little changed, ranging from around 6 to 60 a few local areas to the low 70's.

Haying has become a problem and weather prospects through this week hold little promise for good drying conditions needed to cure hay. New growth may necessitate the first cutting even if some favorable weather prospects field work such as culturing and planting can expect to be delayed as wet fields and poor drying conditions continue. Below normal temperatures and more than normal sunshine will further delay hard grassing and plant growth. Additional soil moisture in rangeland areas will help provide good livestock feed in summer ranges.
