

## Administration Rapped by "Ike" Over Asia Policy

PHILADELPHIA, June 16 (UPI)—Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower charged yesterday that the Democratic administration has let inexperienced persons make key foreign policy decisions. The former chief executive also criticized the administration's conduct of the anti-communist guerrilla war in South Viet Nam. "I am quite sure we have had in the past few years fewer experienced persons associated with making our foreign policy, and mistakes have been made," Eisenhower said.

## Idaho GOP's Goldwater Stand Played

The question for President Goldwater in Idaho questioned the soundness of a Republican resolution today. Douglas D. Kramer, state chairman for Scranton, said the Idaho Republican convention held last week in Idaho City adopted a resolution commending the delegates to the national convention to Sen. These Republicans who say Goldwater or nothing should be free, I wonder how happy they will be if a deadlock occurs there Goldwater can't win, but another candidate could with Idaho's 14 delegates. The delegates elected are outstanding and intelligent Republicans in Idaho. Their candidate is a distinguished American. It is too bad the Idaho Republican assembly did not have the right in its own people. Even Goldwater himself states the delegates in San Francisco should have a choice."

## Police Fear Executive Is Crash Victim

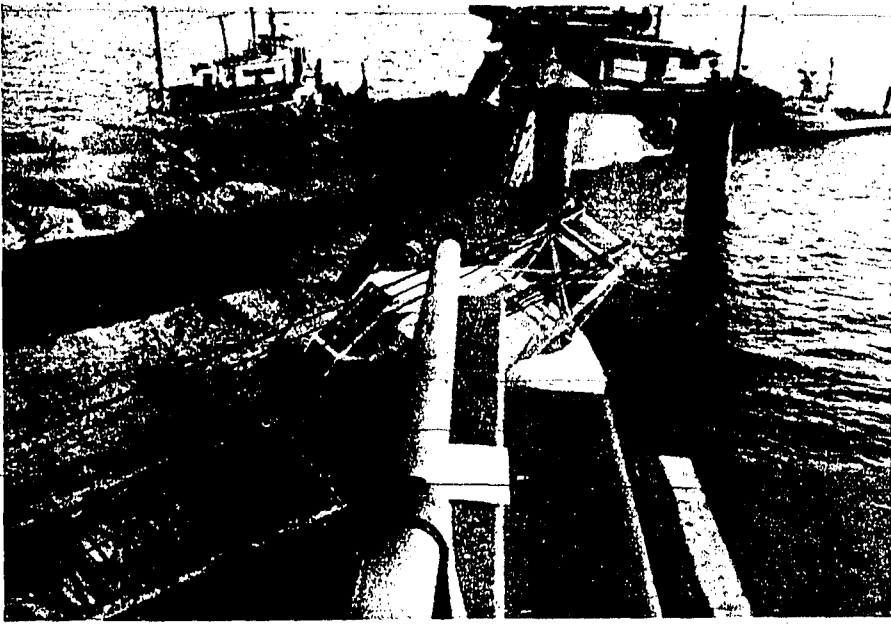

## Six Are Killed as Bus Plunges Off Wrecked Bridge Into Lake

NEW ORLEANS, La., June 16 (AP)—Two barges smashed through the world's longest bridge before dawn today and a Trailways bus plunged into Lake Ponchartraine, killing six passengers. The bus fell in 15 feet of water. Skindivers dove in to help recover bodies. A coast guard helicopter airlifted two survivors to hospitals. No one could say how the towboat, with its two barges, hit the Lake Ponchartraine causeway—a brightly lit highway on stilts across the 24-mile-wide lake. The lake was mirror-like and visibility clear.

## City Street Changes Get Commission OK

Before Twin Falls city commissioners took action Monday night on several proposals to handle traffic problems, they had to change the city code so that future changes in traffic patterns could be made without rewriting the code. The city will designate traffic patterns by resolution rather than ordinance. The ordinance system would require repeal and new ordinances each time a change was made. ## Some States To Dispute Court Rule

## Japan Isle Rocked as Quake Hits

NIIGATA, Japan, June 16 (UPI)—A massive earthquake struck a 300-mile stretch of the west coast of the main island of Honshu today, shattering buildings, smashing bridges and setting off raging fires that burned into the night. It was the worst tremor to hit this earthquake-prone country since 1923, when 143,000 persons were killed in the Tokyo-Yokohama area. The official Japan Broadcasting corporation, NHK, reported 22 persons dead, one missing and 196 injured. More than 3,000 buildings and houses were destroyed or damaged by the quake, which hit at 1:03 p.m. (12:02 a.m. EST).

## Earthquakes Can't Be Predicted

WASHINGTON, June 16 (UPI)—Tuesday's disaster in Japan underscored again the unhappy fact that no means exist of forecasting killer earthquakes. The Honshu cataclysm occurred three months after a U.S.-Japanese conference in Tokyo on earthquake prediction research. The conference began March 9 and ended March 20. Seven days later, on Good Friday, one of the worst earthquakes of all time hit Alaska, catching everybody by surprise. Jack Oliver of the Lamont Geological observatory of Columbia university, one of the American delegates at the Tokyo meeting, reported that the general tenor of the conference was that, while specific earthquake predictions are not now possible, a number of promising lines of investigation offer the hope that, at some time in the future, fairly detailed predictions can be accomplished.

## Goldwater Lashes Into Administration

DALLAS, June 16 (UPI)—Sen. Barry Goldwater charged the Johnson administration today with lagging in leadership of the free world and "directing the failure" in the Viet Nam war. The front-running GOP presidential hopeful addressed the biggest Texas state Republican convention in history in the city where the Goldwater-for-President boom was born. Every mention of his name drew thunderous roars from delegates.

## Idaho Falls Wreck Kills Mother of 4

IDAHO FALLS, June 16 (UPI)—The mother of four children was killed today when her car collided with a truck on a rain-slicked Idaho Falls street. Dead is Mrs. Phyllis (Coleen) Taylor, Idaho Falls. Her 6-year-old daughter, Susan, and Calvin W. Sessions, Idaho Falls, driver of the other car, also were injured.

## Reseeding Boosts Idaho Wheat Crop

BOISE, June 16 (UPI)—Anticipated spring wheat production in Idaho is 18,156,000 bushels, an increase of 26 per cent from last year, the U.S. agriculture department said today. The report said the increase from last year is due mainly to extensive reseeding, particularly in eastern Idaho, of winter killed fall wheat. All wheat production in the state is expected to total 36,325,000 bushels, a drop from 36,592,000 last year and the five-year average of 36,310,000.

## Johnson to Put Prestige On Line in Cyprus Meeting

WASHINGTON, June 16 (UPI)—President Johnson is putting his personal prestige on the line in a dramatic effort to avert war between Greece and Turkey which would blow a gaping hole in NATO's southeastern flank. Officials said today that the President, in separate meetings here next week with the Greek and Turkish premiers, would urge them to negotiate face-to-face as soon as possible to settle the explosive Cyprus issue in which the Soviet Union already is meddling.

## Women Pickets Protest Topless Swimming Suits

ALLENSTOWN, Pa., June 16 (UPI)—The local women's group rejected today the demands of a group of women pickets that the store call off scheduled showings of topless swim suits for women. Wayne Holben, sales promotion manager, said the suits are to be received this week from the manufacturer and they will be shown to customers. "but we are not saying how. Seven women, ranging from 30 to 60 years old, picketed the store Monday with signs reading, "Let's keep it clean," "Bikinis are bad enough" and "Hosers, keep the tops on."

## Change Said Assured

POCATELLO, June 15 (AP)—The chairman of the Fair Apportionment committee today said Idaho's reapportionment will be a major step forward.

"It will be a major step forward," said Arthur H. Pocatello, chairman of the Fair Apportionment committee today. "It would mean to continue to do for lack of money, but it is almost certain to be passed. It will be 1967 before a reapportionment legislature could meet."

The committee was formed to study the need for a reapportionment of Idaho's representatives in the U.S. supreme court. It has been estimated that it will cost at least \$10,000 to take the case to the U.S. supreme court. "It will be no longer (than) the appeal has to be dropped because the mounting cost cannot be met. Even with the supreme court decision, it would mean that we have to be started, and much money and time would be lost."

# Ririe Dam Funds Sought by Solon

WASHINGTON, June 15 (AP)—Sen. Len Jordan has asked the senate public works appropriations subcommittee for \$400,000 to complete the pre-construction planning on Ririe dam in eastern Idaho.

# De Gaulle Seeks Successor Move

PARIS, June 15 (AP)—President Charles de Gaulle will seek a constitutional reform permitting Premier Georges Pompidou to succeed him should a replacement be necessary, political circles said today.

The reports said De Gaulle is determined to run for a second seven-year term in next year's presidential elections but that he will start the term at the age of 76 and wants the line of succession clear.

# Kennedy Planned to Write, Teach

NEW YORK, June 15 (AP)—President John F. Kennedy planned to spend the rest of his life writing and teaching after eight years in the White House, a former aide said today.

Arthur M. Schlesinger Jr., was quoted in the current issue of Look magazine about the late President's plans. Schlesinger was Kennedy's confidant and a White House adviser.

He said Kennedy expected to be re-elected this coming November and complete the unfinished business of his administration. He then would be 51 years old upon leaving the White House, and too young, he felt, for retirement.

The President intended to establish his headquarters in Boston where he planned to live at least part of the year, Schlesinger said. His office was to be in the John Fitzgerald Kennedy library to be built on a site he had selected only two months before his death.

"Kennedy wanted to hold seminars and talk to young people at Harvard where he had gone to school, and also at a half-dozen other nearby colleges. At the same time he was going to write his memoirs."

# Idaho Demos, GOP Praise Primary Law

Idaho political leaders today generally agreed that they like the way the new pre-primary convention law worked in state assemblies during the past week, though some changes will be needed.

It was the first test of the convention system under a law that moved Idaho part-way from the open primary. One purpose was to give the parties more control over the nominees.

"I think it's an excellent law," said state Democratic Chairman Al Hunter, Twin Falls. "The obvious enthusiasm of the delegates was tremendous."

"It gives the party worker a chance to participate," he said. "There's almost unanimous desire on the part of the working Democrats throughout the state to maintain the law."

Republican Chairman John McMurray said the GOP assembly turned up some "growing pains" but added:

"Some mistakes were made and we found some flaws and weaknesses in the law. But a big majority of the delegates were satisfied with it and felt they had an opportunity to participate in party affairs and have their say."

"I believe the big majority of the people feel we should give it a fair trial," he said. "Weaknesses will be corrected by the next legislature and it should be kept in existence. It will strengthen the party with more direct participation."

Leut. Gov. W. E. Drevlow said there wasn't a chance to really evaluate the law at the Democratic assembly because of a lack of opposition to the candidates.

"I think the big test will come in 1968 when we nominate state officers," he said.

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### Red Cross Lists First Flood Totals

GREAT FALLS, June 16 (AP)—The American Red Cross disaster headquarters in its first damage survey yesterday set the toll in the Montana-Idaho flood zone at 37.

Don Bachman, director of the disaster relief effort for the Red Cross, said its report listed 17 towns dead and 20 million and presumed dead.

It said 39 were hospitalized and 312 persons suffered injury or illness attributed to the flood.

Bachman said 2,191 families suffered some kind of loss. He said more than 1,000 of these families live in the flood county.

He said 166 homes were completely destroyed, 35 suffered major damage non-structural.

The Red Cross director said nearly 170 farm buildings also were damaged.

Bachman said the Red Cross will give mass care to a total of 130 disaster victims and workers.

### Small-County Legislators Hit Supreme Court Action

Observers agreed Tuesday that the supreme court declaration that state legislators in both houses must represent equal numbers of people will bring an overhaul of Idaho's legislature and give more power to more heavily populated areas.

Gov. Robert E. Smylie said he believes the matter will require urgent legislative attention. But he added that the question of a special session will depend on pending litigation before the high court and thinking of legislative leaders.

The auxiliary's share of funds will provide wheelchairs, hospital beds and other equipment which will be available to the general public free of charge.

### Asia-Peace Is 'Hanging' Says Peking

TOKYO, June 16 (AP)—The Peking People's Daily said yesterday that "the peace in Indochina and southeast Asia is hanging by a thread" and hinted for the first time in the current Laos crisis that China might be forced to react to American "provocations."

The Daily, official newspaper of the Chinese communist party, published an editorial titled "Sofisticated Provocation by U. S. Imperialism." The editorial was broadcast by the New China News agency and monitored in Tokyo.

The specific complaint was the bombing by U. S. jet fighter escorts of Khang Khai, headquarters of the communist Pathet Lao faction on Laos' Plain des Jarres. Peking earlier charged the bombing destroyed buildings of the Chinese mission to the Pathet Lao and killed one Chinese.

### Wife Propels Scranton Into Race

WASHINGTON, June 16 (AP)—Pennsylvania's First Lady propelled the final push that propelled Gov. William Scranton into the Republican presidential race, it was reported today.

Mary Scranton, who had publicly opposed the idea of her husband seeking the GOP nomination, changed her mind on Tuesday, June 9, according to Rep. James O. Fulton, R. Pa.

"That was the turning point," Fulton told a reporter.

An "I" announcement of his candidacy on Friday in Baltimore, Md. He informed Pennsylvania Republican leaders of his intention after a dinner at the executive mansion at Indian town Gap, Pa., on Thursday night. The developments came after what appeared to be a week of wavering and indecision.

According to Fulton—a longtime supporter of Scranton—the Pennsylvania governor began seriously thinking of making the plunge on Monday. This was one day after the now famous call to Scranton from former President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

### U. S. Helps Save Viet Nam Area With Flare Drop

SAIGON, June 16 (AP)—An all-night bombing and strafing attack by Vietnamese anti-aircraft fighters-bombers saved a district capital 80 miles southwest of Saigon from capture by the communist Viet Cong, U. S. military sources said today.

A large, well-armed force of communist guerrillas attacked Lap Vo shortly before midnight Saturday and threatened to overrun the defense post manned by 30 provincial militiamen, a spokesman said.

A distress call brought a U. S. B-57D bomber to the scene. The plane dropped 70 parachute flares to light the way for the attacks by fighter-bombers. Another transport plane came in later and dropped 100 flares. A third dropped eight more.

### Johnson Hails Steel Agreement

WASHINGTON, June 16 (AP)—President Johnson praised eleven major steel companies and the United Steelworkers AFI-CIO yesterday for signing a joint pledge to encourage "non-discriminatory attitudes" in employment policies.

White House Press Secretary George E. Reedy told newsmen Johnson had complimented steelworkers president David McDonald by telephone Saturday, prior to the actual signing of the pact. And Reedy said Johnson also wanted to "publicly congratulate officials of the steel companies."

### Rich, Poor Country Gap Discussed

GENEVA, June 16 (AP)—The United Nations Trade and Development conference ended after three months yesterday with a compromise that apparently satisfied nobody but at least kept the lines of communication open.

Designed eventually to narrow the gap between rich countries and poor countries, the 110-nation conference set up a 55-member U. N. trade and development board to continue the conference work.

Insistent demands by the underdeveloped countries for sweeping tariff reductions by the industrialized nations and trade preferences were referred to a committee to be named by U. S. Secretary-General Thant.

Neither the world trade board's decisions nor the study committee's findings will be binding.

The consensus of delegates when the conference ended was "It could have been better, it could have been worse."

### Place to Run

NEW YORK, June 16 (AP)—Negro comedian Dick Gregory, a veteran civil rights protester, flew yesterday to Europe to join a group of Negroes and Hiroshima atomic survivors who will make public appearances from Paris to Moscow on behalf of peace.

"Listen, baby, did you ever see a fallout shelter in a Negro neighborhood?" Gregory asked a reporter who wondered if Gregory was abandoning his integration efforts here. "We've got to have peace because we've got no place to run."

**KHANG KHAY, Laos, June 15**—Prince Bounphavongvong claimed today that an American pilot whose reconnaissance plane was shot down by the communists June 6 was captured by the Pathet Lao.

The pilot was identified in Washington as navy Lieut. Charles F. Kilham, 29, from Orange, Calif. His plane was reported shot down over the Han Han area, which is 15 miles northeast of this Pathet Lao headquarters.

The Pathet Lao chief of state reported that Kilham told reporters who visited Khang Khay he received a radio report saying that the pilot was captured by Pathet Lao troops in the Han Han area. He said the news is waiting for further details.

Kilham is the second American to be in Pathet Lao captivity. Last September a commercial airplane, Eastern Airlines, from Kalamazoo, Mich., was captured by the Pathet Lao.

# Khrushchev Seems Weary Of Soviet-Chinese Trouble

Nikita Khrushchev seems about ready to admit that the Soviet-Chinese split is unbridgeable in the foreseeable future, and that a splintered communist world is inevitable.

Khrushchev concedes there is an engagement not only between the Chinese and Soviet communist parties, but also between the Peking and Moscow governments.

Khrushchev leaves it up to the Chinese whether there will be a move toward reconciliation. Displaying little hope that there will be, he virtually apologizes to the rest of the communist world for the current state of affairs.

Khrushchev's remarks, interpolated in last Friday's speech at the East German-Soviet friendship treaty, indicated a profound weariness with the whole Chinese affair. They seemed the words of a man caught in an impossible squeeze between the pressures in the Soviet Union for economic advancement and the pressures of world communism for more aggressive expansion.

If there is no reconciliation, Khrushchev seems to say, it will not be his fault but Peking's.

"One should not," says Khrushchev, "allow the spread of ideological differences to intergovernmental relations, since this ultimately weakens the position of world socialism and plays into the hands of imperialism."

"We believe that even today the road is not closed for the normalization of Soviet-Chinese relations, including government-to-government relations. All that is required is good will and a willingness of one's supreme duty to one's people, to the entire revolutionary movement. Our party will constantly guide itself by this principle."

The Red Chinese accuse Khrushchev of being capitalist, of entering into a Russian middle class which thinks of comfort and individual happiness before world revolution.

Khrushchev insists he is just as ardently for world revolution as the Chinese. But he reflects the Soviet people's own aspirations when he says people around the world would hardly follow a communist government "whose people have no trousers." That's the problem, it's trousers or world revolution.





The local congregation plans to attend a four-day district convention in Pocatello during July.

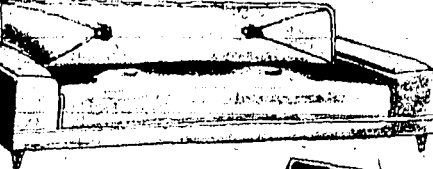
