

Khanh Says U.S. Proves It Will Fight Asian Reds

SAIGON, South Viet. Nam, June 24 (AP) — Premier Nguyen Khanh told his people today: "The free world countries are right at our side and if necessary will tackle the problem of communism right at its roots." His statement coincided with a declaration from Peking that "the situation in Indochina has become increasingly grave in the past few days." Japanese papers were expressing concern over U. S. policy. Khanh said appointment of Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor as the new U. S. ambassador to Saigon "is proof of the U. S. administration's determination to continue exterminating communism to preserve freedom."

3 Yanks Dead

SAIGON, South Viet. Nam, June 24 (AP)—Captured Viet Cong guerrillas have told interrogators that a U.S. special forces officer and another man missing since their unit was ambushed last Friday are dead. The body of a third American caught in the Viet Cong ambush five miles from this forward special forces camp was found near the battle scene Monday. All three Americans were on patrol with a Montagnard strike force of 100 men, testing Viet Cong strength in the area after arriving to establish a base at Huoi Da.

Agents Still Seek Missing Rights Men

PHILADELPHIA, Miss., June 24 (AP)—Federal agents resumed an intensified door-to-door and gully-to-gully search at a subway here today for three missing civil rights workers. A posse of lawmen combed the city area in this east Mississippi section. Allen W. Dulles, former chief of the central intelligence agency, expects to leave for Washington this afternoon on a White House mission to look into the mysterious disappearance of the young trio. The charred bulk of the station wagon used by the three was found by FBI agents late Tuesday at the edge of a swamp off a lonely road northeast of this central Mississippi town. Philadelphia is the seat of justice for Philadelphia county, called "Bloody Newbury" by Minutemen plans for its history of settling debts by gunfire. "Two smaller windows and two door windows were shot with BB guns as were three large windows in the Lynwood office," Police Chief M. Frank Barnett said Wednesday there is a city ordinance prohibiting the use of firearms, BB guns included, bows and arrows, or even slingshots in the city. Persons caught using these weapons in the city will have them confiscated by police, Barnett stated.

Nobody Need Have Heart Attack, for Nature Gives Clear Danger Warning

SAN FRANCISCO, June 24 (AP) — Nobody need have a heart attack because nature gives a clear and definite warning a year in advance. And the potential victim can avoid it by taking simple and easy steps. "The described startling assertion were made today at the 119th convention of the American Medical Association by Dr. Robert S. Green, director of the Heart Research Foundation of Cincinnati, O. He described what he called the pre-heart attack syndrome. This is "being more tired out than you should be for what you have done."

Cypriot Units Battle Over Key Village

NICOSIA, Cyprus, June 24 (AP)—Greeks and Turks armed with automatic weapons and hand grenades battled early today for control of a key village west of Nicosia. A U. N. spokesman said Greek Cypriots drove the Turks off a ridge overlooking the Turkish Cypriot enclave of Amalokou and then opened fire on the village. A Turkish counter-attack regained the ridge. "There were no reports of casualties," Amalokou is one of the key villages guarding the route to the Turkish Cypriot stronghold of Lefka, 20 miles west of here. Swedish U. N. troops moved in to patrol the area and attempt to arrange a cease-fire. Elsewhere in Cyprus, a Danish U. N. armored car was fired on but escaped unharmed. A Cypriot village of Methoni, 10 miles west of Nicosia, but no one was hit.

Russ Believes Battleships Outmoded

GOTTBORG, Sweden, June 24 (AP)—Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev said today Russia has given "biting battleships" because they have been "outmoded by nuclear weapons." Khrushchev spoke at a ship launching ceremony after being flown here under the midnight security umbrella ever given a Soviet leader. He was on his third day of a tour of Sweden. "I am not revealing any big military secret when I say that we have freed our shipyards from having to build large military vessels," he said. "The cruiser, as such ships do not constitute any particular military power in the event that a nuclear war should be waged by the premier," he said. "The premier seemed unbothered by the massive security arrangements around him. He chatted with Soviet officials and reporters during the 300-mile, 40-minute flight was not disclosed, but the number was said to be unprecedented."

Volcano Dust Will Sharpen Moon Eclipse

NEW YORK, June 24 (AP)—The moon will be eclipsed tonight in what is expected to be a rare example of "vanishing eclipse" caused by ashes from the Mount Agung explosion in Bali last year. Scientists anticipate the heavenly glow, visible throughout the world, will be brighter because the volcanic ash probably will make the eclipse as sharp and dark as any ever recorded. The ash will reduce the faint reddish glow which surrounds the earth's shadow as it blots out the moon.

Final arrangements have been made for the merger of Security Seed and Supply company with the Twin Falls Feed and Ice company, Jorje Cover, owner of Security Seed, announced Wednesday. The merger becomes effective Tuesday and the company, which is managed by Cover, will operate in the Twin Falls Feed and Ice company building under that name. Moving of inventory and records from the Security Seed company has begun and extensive remodeling is under way in the Twin Falls Feed and Ice building. There will be increased grain storage capacity, new seed cleaning equipment is to be installed and a retail home and garden store is to be built. Security Seed and Supply company operated for eight years and was purchased originally by Cover from Dingel and Smith Seed company.

FTC Plans Cigarette Warn Rules

WASHINGTON, June 24 (AP)—The federal trade commission is planning to issue a rule requiring that by next year all cigarette labels and advertising inform the public "that cigarette smoking is dangerous to health and may cause death from cancer and other diseases." The commission rule says that it is an unfair or deceptive practice for a manufacturer "to fail to disclose, clearly and prominently, in all advertising and on every pack, box, carton or other container in which cigarettes are sold" that smoking is a health hazard. The commission ruled that the cigarette package labels should include this warning by Jan. 1, 1965, and that advertising should include the warning by July 1, 1965. "The commission, however, did not state the exact language that the cigarette manufacturers should have to use in their advertising and labeling warnings. In a 163-page statement that accompanied the ruling, the commission said it was leaving the individual cigarette companies and advertisers "free to formulate the required disclosure in any manner that, intelligently conveys the sense of the required warning in a fully conspicuous fashion."

Hoffa Cool About Rebellious East Coast Teamsters

CHICAGO, June 24 (AP) — Teamster Union President James R. Hoffa denied yesterday that there was anything rebellious about the refusal of five East Coast Teamster locals to accept Hoffa's nationwide truckers contract. "It's a simple matter of inability to reach a satisfactory contract," Hoffa said. "Twenty of the five locals posted pickets outside trucking firms after rejecting new contracts for the second time. Hoffa, in Chicago for his trial on charges of conspiracy and mail fraud, is in contact with the union pension funds, said he talked to the locals involved Tuesday. "They know my position," he said. "I don't think it's a strike as you know it."

McDevitt Won't Block '64 Election

The author of the successful supreme court challenge of Idaho's legislative apportionment laws said today he will not attempt to block this year's election of lawmakers if he is assured the 1965 state legislature will make a "good faith reapportionment" of both the house and senate. But State Rep. Herman McDevitt, D., Bannock, Pocatello attorney, added that if the legislature fails to follow through he will again take the case to the United States supreme court. McDevitt said he believes the legislature, and not a court, should make the first attempt to reapportion the legislature along the lines laid down by the supreme court. "The study committee's proposed amendment would provide for creation of a state water resources board empowered to plan and build water projects with ten-year bonds. It explained that the composition and selection of agency membership would be left to legislative decision, but that the amendment would spell out its specific powers. "The agency," he said, "would be granted the specific power to issue revenue bonds and in this way supersede and amend by implication all of the provisions of the constitution which would apply to power. Johnson Idea For Health Care Dropped

WASHINGTON, June 24 (AP)—President Johnson's proposal for health care of the aged was dropped today by the house ways and means committee, which thus dealt a heavy blow at any chance of enactment this year. The committee went on to try to fashion a bill to increase the cash payments to persons retired under social security, but deadlocked. More sessions were scheduled later today. Proponents of the health care measure themselves moved to drop it from committee consideration, thus avoiding a certain vote against it. The motion by Rep. Cecil R. King, D., Calif., co-author of the bill to provide health care under social security, also ruled out consideration of any alternate plan or any improvements to the existing system of state-federal health care for the indigent. The committee adopted it by voice vote, it was reported. The effect was to narrow committee consideration to changes in the retirement system.

Gov. Scranton's Decision to Run Is Explained

WASHINGTON, June 24 (AP)—Gov. Scranton's decision to run for his husband's decision to seek the Republican presidential nomination was influenced mostly by "his feeling of discouragement that the moderate wing of the party has been run up." "Neither Bill nor I wanted to get involved in this," she said. "We have four children, a very tightly knit family and not as much time to spend with them as we like." WASHINGTON, June 24 (AP)—President Johnson's 500-million-dollar mass transit bill was called up by house leaders today with prospects of a lively debate and a hard fight before enactment.

Rep. Albert Rains, D. Ala., the bill's floor manager, said he was braced "for a hard battle," but was hopeful of house approval of the measure, which has been stalled for nearly a year.

The transit bill had been given up for dead this year after lying inactive in the rules committee for 11 months. But it was brought to life by the intervention of Johnson and the majority work of municipal and railroad lobbies.

He said the agency would also be empowered to appropriate unappropriated waters of the state, thus overcoming a constitutional barrier to generating the right to "at the same time, however," he said, "the water agency would not be granted powers beyond what will be necessary to carry out its purposes."

He pointed out that the proposal would require that revenue bonds be issued "without state obligation" and that it act only as trustee for appropriated water. Smythe said provisions of the amendment touching on the agency's authority to "generate and wholesale hydroelectric power" are "by no means an entirely new concept."

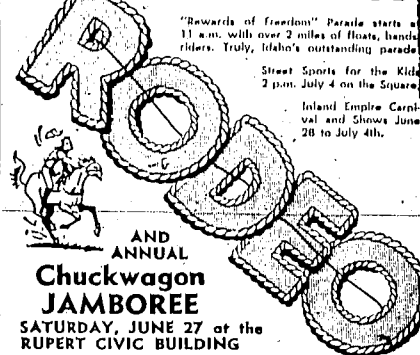

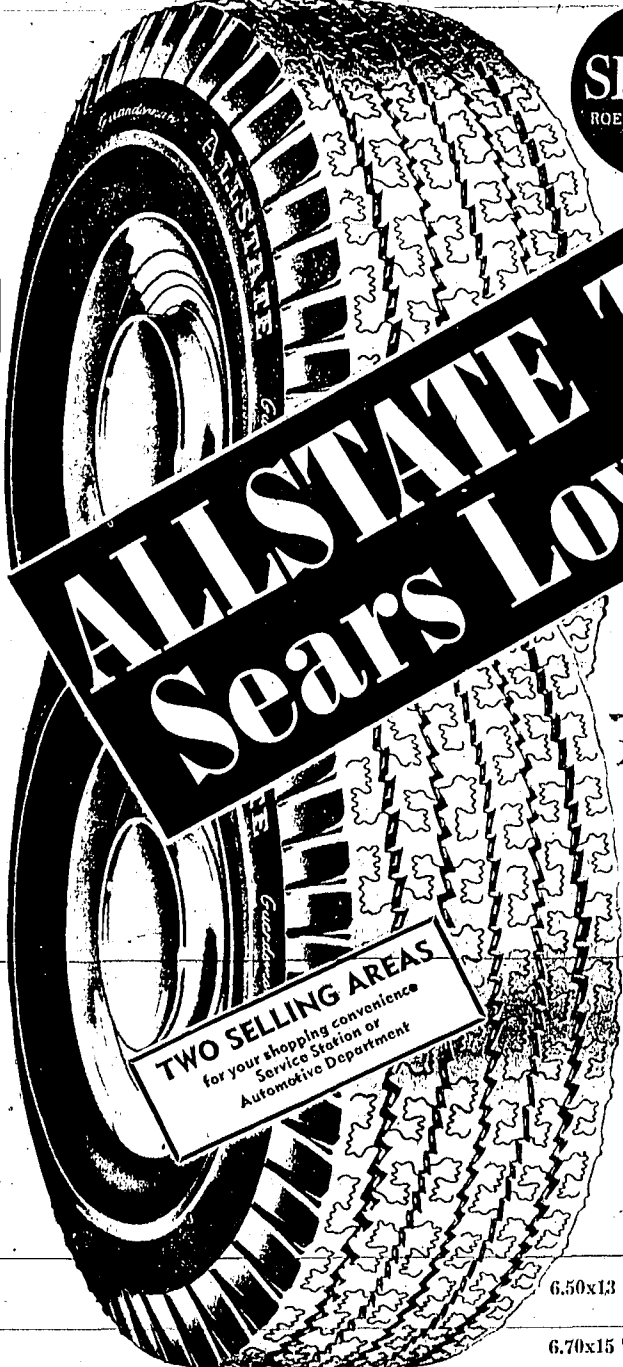

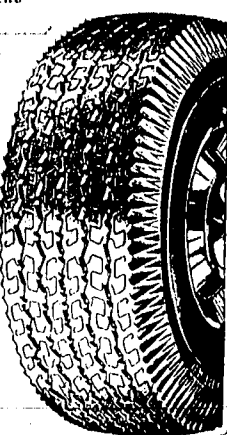

R. Kennedy Won't Seek Post In Senate, Heads for Berlin

WASHINGTON, June 24 (AP)—Sen. Robert F. Kennedy will not seek the Democratic nomination in the senate race ahead of further light on his future.

But it left open the door to any invitation from President Johnson to join him as vice-presidential nominee on the Democratic ticket.

This ended long weeks of speculation whether Kennedy would accede to the urgings of New York friends and Democratic leaders, move to the Empire state and seek the nomination to run against Republican Sen. Kenneth B. Keating.

"I deeply appreciate the loyalty and friendship of those who have urged me to run and who believe I could perform a service for the people of New York," Kennedy said in a statement handed out at the justice department.

"However, in fairness to them and to end speculation, I wish to state that I will not be a candidate for United States senator from New York," he said.

There was little elaboration on Kennedy's statement from the justice department. But two key factors emerged as most influential.

One is the civil rights picture. Final passage of the rights bill, with all of its enforcement provisions, is imminent. The beginnings of the "long, hot summer" in race relations already are evident.

The second factor is his brother, Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., whose back was broken in a plane crash last week.

Yesterday's decision threw into sharper focus Robert Kennedy's role as head of the Kennedy family since the assassination of his brother, President John F. Kennedy.

But it left open the door to any invitation from President Johnson to join him as vice-presidential nominee on the Democratic ticket.

This ended long weeks of speculation whether Kennedy would accede to the urgings of New York friends and Democratic leaders, move to the Empire state and seek the nomination to run against Republican Sen. Kenneth B. Keating.

"I deeply appreciate the loyalty and friendship of those who have urged me to run and who believe I could perform a service for the people of New York," Kennedy said in a statement handed out at the justice department.

"However, in fairness to them and to end speculation, I wish to state that I will not be a candidate for United States senator from New York," he said.

There was little elaboration on Kennedy's statement from the justice department. But two key factors emerged as most influential.

One is the civil rights picture. Final passage of the rights bill, with all of its enforcement provisions, is imminent. The beginnings of the "long, hot summer" in race relations already are evident.

The second factor is his brother, Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., whose back was broken in a plane crash last week.

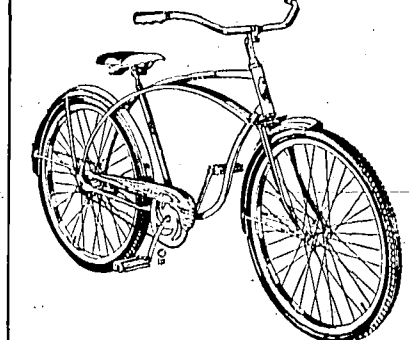

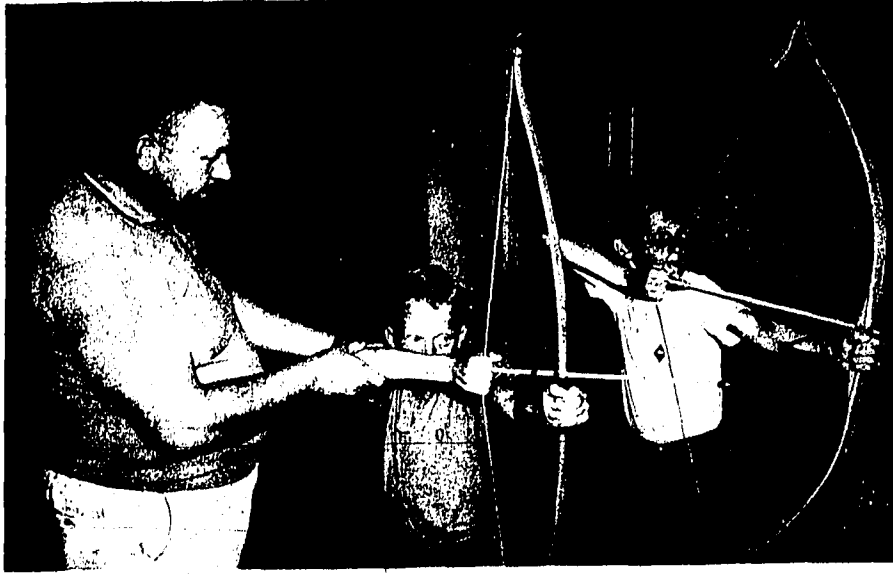

World's Supply of Fresh Water Rapidly Diminishing

WASHINGTON, June 24 (AP)—The world is running out of fresh water at an alarming rate.
An average American family of four now uses 550 gallons a day for all household purposes—and the figure is rising steadily. With an explosively expanding population the world over—and newer manufacturing techniques using more and more water—the trend is the same throughout the planet.
The problem would vanish if, somehow, the vast oceans of the Earth could be made drinkable—and the United States and Russia are now going to cooperate to seek the way.
President Johnson announced at his news conference yesterday that American and Soviet scientists will meet in Washington July 14 and 15 to explore jointly the possibilities of tapping Davy Jones' 230 million cubic mile realm—possibly using nuclear power to turn salty brine into fresh, pure water.
"It can do more to raise men and women from lives of poverty and desperation than any other scientific advance," President Kennedy said three years ago when the United States opened its first desalination plant at Freeport, Tex.
At the two-day meeting in Washington next month, the Russian and American scientists will report to their countries on how to proceed in their quest.
Dr. Donald F. Horning, scientific adviser to the President, will head the U. S. delegation.

Mississippi Officials Develop New Laws to Cope With Race Violence

(Editor's note—Hit by violent racial outbreaks last summer, Mississippi officials have developed new techniques to meet a summer invasion of nearly 1,000 civil rights workers now under way. Here's a look at the changes which the state hopes will avert violence.)
JACKSON, Miss., June 24 (AP)—While white citizens wait nervously for an increase in civil rights activity this summer, Mississippi officials have armed themselves with new laws and techniques aimed at averting violence.
Up until a few months ago, demonstrators usually were arrested the minute they appeared on the streets. In Jackson alone last summer more than 1,000 arrests were made.
But a new approach appeared this winter, inaugurated in Hattiesburg—let the demonstrators have policed freedom of movement.
The lack of attention, police theorized, would wear thin the ranks of the participants.
In Hattiesburg, Canton, Greenwood and Clarkdale this plan was followed. Now only a few persons are still demonstrating in any form.
The state legislature, however, has added new laws, for use if needed.
And since it was called back into special session June 23 to deal with state-aided private schools, new laws could be added if trouble appears likely.
The biggest legal change, sought by Gov. Paul Johnson, added 200 men to the Mississippi highway patrol and gave the former traffic control agency police powers to be used only by proclamation in the event of racial disorders.
Another new statute, now facing a court test, prohibits picketing near entrances to government buildings. Several demonstrators were arrested under this law in Hattiesburg during a recent "Freedom day" mass voter registration drive.
Johnson signed a law permitting cities to enter into mutual assistance pacts in times of racial duress in order for law enforcement agencies to marshal forces.
Some cities have entered into such pacts with Jackson because of its big police force and riot control techniques and equipment.
Other new laws permit cities to restrict the movements of groups, set up curfews, ban the circulation or boycott literature and increase penalties for violating city ordinances to a maximum of 90 days in jail and \$300 fines.
The state penitentiary can now be used by cities and counties when local jails prove inadequate for large numbers.
Another side of the resistance coin is the secretive Ku Klux Klan.
Week-end cross burnings have dotted the state for the past few weeks—apparently showing a highly organized segregationist group. Thus far, however, there have been no incidents or violence involving the Klan and Negroes, or civil rights workers.
Mississippi officials have been asking militant white groups to let authorities handle race relation problems, an appeal which has drawn newspaper editorial support.

"The senator has been harshly criticized by fellow Republicans for his negative attitude toward the U. N. and it may be that his thinking is undergoing still another transformation," the Idaho Democrat said.
Church called on Goldwater to clarify his position on the U. N.

1 cup mashed potatoes
2 eggs, well beaten
2 teaspoons salt
1/2 tablespoon grated orange rind
1 cup orange juice
1/2 cup melted shortening
7/8 cup flour
Put potatoes through sieve and measure one cup. Add potatoes to scalded milk. When lukewarm, add dissolved yeast, one teaspoon salt, one-fourth cup sugar and about four cups of flour. Beat thoroughly, cover and let rise until double in bulk. Add combined eggs, remaining salt and sugar, orange rind and juice and flour as needed. (Keep to a soft dough) Turn out on floured board and knead until smooth.
Place dough in greased bowl, cover and let rise until double in bulk. Shape into any desired roll, cinnamon roll or pecan roll, cut one and one-half inches thick. Bake for about 20 minutes at 375-400 degrees. Yield—3-4 dozen.

Lodge Return May Offer GOP Choice, but He Will Avoid Party Draft

By JACK BELL
 WASHINGTON, June 24 (AP)—Cabot Lodge's return from the Viet Nam might offer Republicans a choice of candidates opposite Sen. Harry Goldwater in the GOP presidential nomination.
 Lodge announced in Saigon Monday he was quitting his ambassadorial post and coming home because he felt it was his duty to do everything that he can to help Governor Scranton to be re-elected.
 Later, he said "there are no hidden meanings" in his decision to return to the United States and he is "not a candidate at all." He added, "I am not going back at all in order to campaign for anything for myself. I cannot be drafted."
 Lodge's decision to jump into presidential politics was widely credited by the backers of Pennsylvania Gov. William V. Scranton as a major development in the effort to win delegates away from Goldwater.
 Scranton said he was delighted by Lodge's decision to return and added, "This is another big boost for this rapidly expanding campaign." He said he hoped the Lodge "go around and tell the people why they should be for me."
 Supporters of Goldwater, who have more than enough publicity from the convention, are expected to pin the nomination if his delegates stand pat, generally discounting Lodge's move.
 Goldwater, in a statement issued Tuesday, avoided any reference to Lodge's declaration

that he would campaign for Scranton.
 Instead, the Arizona said, "Ambassador Lodge is to be congratulated for bearing up this long under such adverse conditions." The Johnson-McNamara program of integration and vaccination has made it impossible for him to carry out his ambassadorial functions properly and undoubtedly motivated his resignation.
 Lodge gave no hint of such a factor in his letter of resignation. While nobody questioned the sincerity of Lodge's commitment to back Scranton, some party strategists noted there were elements present that could lead to unpredictable developments.
 This would be true particularly, they said, if there was a resurgence of Lodge's popularity in the national polls. These listed per cent of the vote. His manager total there and his low rating in the national polls were viewed by his friends as the natural result of his position then that he was not a candidate and that he would only accept a nomination tendered him as the result of a genuine draft he did not think would come about.

State Road Board Needs Repair Funds

BOISE, June 24 (AP)—The Idaho highway board was advised yesterday that the state highway department is requesting \$670,000 in emergency federal funds to finance repair of highways damaged by floods in northern Idaho.
 Norman McCrea, state highway engineer, told the board at the second day of its four-day session that the heaviest damage is on the Lewis and Clark highway near Kootenai.
 The Leaning river took out part of the road in that area and cost of repairs was estimated at \$240,000.
 Another section of the same highway between Orofino and Spalding will cost \$180,000 to repair, McCrea said, and work on state highway 14, the route to Elk City, will cost \$100,000.
 McCrea said there also was some damage to the Idaho road in Blaine county, with repair costs estimated at \$20,000. He said state funds were being used for that job.
 The board asked the highway department to study the possibility of relocating a bridge across the Clearwater river at Orofino. The present location requires a sharp turn, the department said, and a one-half mile downstream might be usable.

Billie Sol Estes to Sell Souvenirs

EL PASO, June 24 (AP)—Billie Sol Estes will open "within a few days" a souvenir shop on the banks of the Rio Grande while awaiting appeal of 23 years of prison sentences.
 The opening is waiting on completion of a three-foot neon likeness of Estes that will glow down from a high sign atop the shop, in his business district.
 The huge neon sign above the shop, located only a few feet from the international bridge linking El Paso with Ciudad Juarez, Mexico, says "Billie Sol Estes—Importer and exporter of fine products."
 The sign is 24 feet long and 18-inch letters.
 The \$150-million-dollar farm empire collapsed March 26, 1962, since then he has been convicted on state and federal charges of fraud and swindling.
 Estes is under a 15-year sentence of a federal charge of fraud and eight years on a state charge of swindling. He is free on \$140,000 bond while the sentences are on appeal.

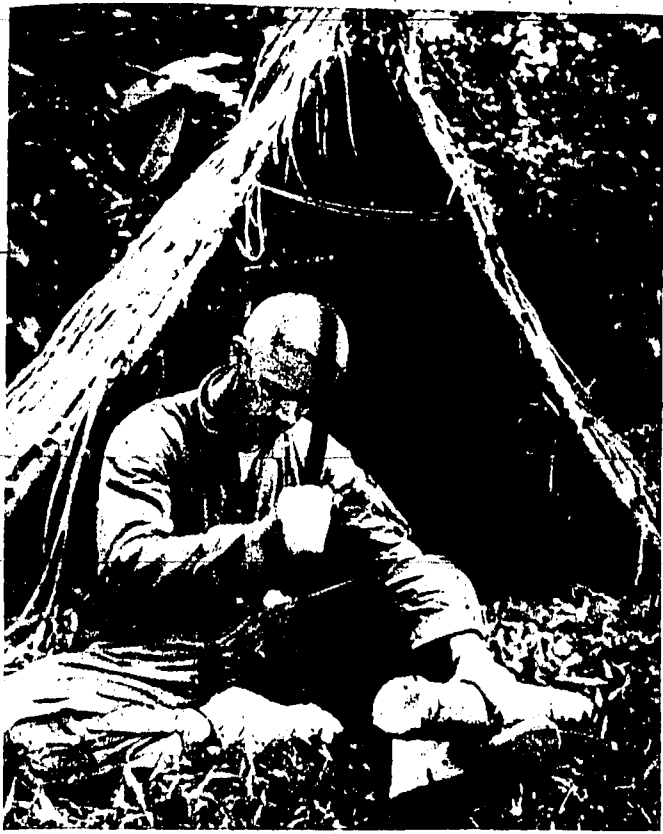

VI. SARAJEVO: Death Takes Command

Six automobiles were moving east on the Appel Quay alongside the river on their way from the railroad station to the City Hall. In the second one, an open touring car with its canvas roof folded back, were the Archduke Franz Ferdinand, heir to the Austrian throne, and his beloved morganatic wife Sophie. They bowed and smiled at the rather unresponsive people lining the sidewalk. The sun was shining; the weather was warm; the time was shortly after 10 a.m. on Sunday, June 28, 1914. Seven young Serbian would-be assassins were deployed along the route. When the royal car passed the first one, he lost his nerve and did not reach for the small bomb hidden in his coat. The second man was not so timid. He took out the effective, government-made device, knocked off its protective top, and threw the bomb at the Archduke. The driver heard the sound of the cap being knocked off and turned around in time to see an object

coming toward the car. He pushed on the gas, and the heavy vehicle moved forward just enough to spoil the assassin's aim. The bomb landed on the folded canvas top, bounced off and exploded in the street, wounding many people and wrecking the next car.

That was Attempt No. 1—unsuccessful. The Archduke was unhurt, although his car had been hit by several bomb fragments, one of which had scratched his wife's face.

The Archduke did not like being a target and was rather nasty about it when the Mayor received him at City Hall. "Outrageous!" he muttered about the bomb-throwing incident. The ceremony was necessarily brief, and the royal car started back again, this time to visit the hospital where an officer wounded by the bomb had been taken. The shortest way was to retrace the route. A nobleman insisted on

standing on the left-hand running board to protect the royal couple from that side.

The chauffeur followed the Mayor's car, but the driver of that vehicle had not been told that the route was to be the same as before. When he came to a turn-off which was not to be used, there was a mix-up, and both cars had to stop and back up. By some strange coincidence, one of the conspirators, a youth named Gavrillo Princip, happened to be standing there. He pulled out his revolver, advanced toward the car, and fired two shots.

One struck the Archduke in the neck; the other penetrated his wife's abdomen. They were conscious long enough for him to cry: "Sophie, don't die! Stay alive for our children's sake."

But both were dead within the hour, and with them died the Europe of emperors and kings.

Mad Survives 50-Foot Fall From Cliff

BALT LAKE CITY, June 24 (AP)—A 13-year-old Salt Lake City boy is in good condition in Tri-City Children's hospital recovering from injuries he received in a 50-foot fall off a cliff.

Kerry Lee Anderson, son of Mrs. June Anderson, was climbing a rock near Richfield on a ledge Monday when the accident occurred. He was in Richfield to visit relatives.

His left leg and both arms were broken as he fell 50 feet from a rock, known as Bull's head, on a ledge below.

His friends ran for help and a rescue team of eight men, including three county jail prisoners, climbed the hill to where the boy had fallen.

Three years ago, young Anderson broke an arm in Richfield when he fell off a fence while visiting the same relatives.

Girl Is Shot From Ambush In New York

NEW YORK, June 24 (AP)—A blonde teen-aged girl was fatally shot from ambush near Times Square yesterday as she walked home from a parochial school graduation party with her younger sister.

Witnesses said they heard two shots fired before Joan Wilson, 18, slumped on the pavement on a parking lot on 42nd street, two blocks from Broadway. The girl apparently was turned down without reason. No one saw the killer.

Detective Inspector Leo Murphy said a small caliber bullet struck the girl on the top of her head and emerged from the back of her neck. He speculated it may have been fired from the roof of a one-story section of the Holland hotel, which overlooks the parking lot.

Margaret Wilson, 13, who was walking beside her slain sister, was not injured.

Police said the young girls probably talked inadvertently into the gunman's slugs, by heeding the advice of their mother, who was concerned for their safety.

The Wilson sisters had attended a party at a teen-age club on 43rd street, near Holy Cross grammar school from which Margaret had just been graduated. Before going home, Joan telephoned her mother to ask if it was all right for her and Margaret to stop at a Times Square area restaurant for a snack.

The mother said yes, but cautioned the girls to walk on brightly lit 42nd street, rather than any of the dim commercial streets on Manhattan's West Side. The sisters were taking a short-cut across the parking lot to 42nd street when the

UAW, Ford Snarl Before Wage Talks

DETROIT, June 24 (AP)—Hard bargaining between Ford Motor company and the United Auto Workers in their impending new contract talks appeared likely today in the wake of "chilling" preliminary talks by both sides.

The union charged that Henry Ford II could not understand the worker's position. This was the UAW's reaction to Ford's speech Monday in Colorado, Calif., in which he said willingness to accept a strike was a part of "free and responsible collective bargaining."

Ford, board chairman of the firm, said that union demands could endanger the national economy.

"From his lofty position, it is understandable Mr. Ford can't make out the American scene below of workers producing more than ever yet being shorted in their share of the prosperity they are creating," said Ken Hammon, director of the union's Ford department.

The UAW issued Hammon's statement late in the day, presumably after the union had taken time to study the automaker's remarks.

Negotiations between Ford and the UAW formally open July 1, simultaneously with General Motors and Chrysler new contract talks. The present three-year contracts between the union and the big three automakers all expire Aug. 31.

The UAW has not announced its specific demands through UAW President Walter P. Reuther has indicated them in broad terms.

Ford, in his speech, said that from "what we read" it appeared that management is to face union demands that are "out of touch with reality."

Reuther has set a 4.0 per cent annual increase as a minimum economic goal for his union, but has not broken this down. The union has called for more liberal pension, shorter work week and higher wages.

U.S. Astronauts Brave Panama Jungle

BALBOA, C.Z., June 24 (AP)—Five American astronauts yesterday visited a tribe of Chirico Indians on the Chirico River, a preview of their three-day stay in the jungle with bare survival gear.

The astronauts, 24 of whom just joined the tiny group of U.S. spacemen last Feb. 3, came to the Central American country for jungle survival training.

If they are ever forced to land in the jungle while on a manned orbital flight, they supposedly will know how to "stay alive" with a minimum of gear and live off the land.

America's orbital flights cross the Earth's tropical regions.

After the visit to the Indian village, the 15 will go into the jungle and stay there until Friday.

They will brave the jungle rainy season, now heading into full swing; deadly for-de-lance snakes, and the countless nighttime din of jungle sounds.

SAN DIEGO, June 24 (AP)—An earthquake shook San Diego Monday night for the third time in two days.

Chandeliers swung, windows rattled and several burglar alarms started clanging when the quake hit at 9:50 p.m.

Dr. Charles Richter of the California Institute of Technology, 130 miles to the north, said the quake probably was centered close to San Diego.

The city had a sharp quake Sunday morning and a series of light tremors just after noon Monday.

Marshall said some names of interest in his investigation have turned up in the files.

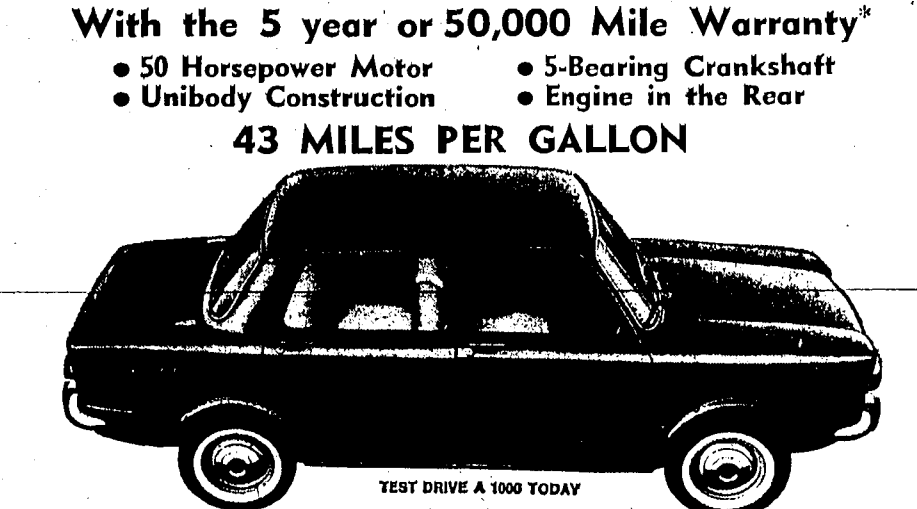

Virginia's County to Integrate

ARMVILLE, Va., June 24 (AP)—The Prince Edward county board of supervisors yesterday appropriated money to operate public schools which had been closed since 1959 to avoid integration.

The governing body in the rural tobacco growing community made the decision two days before a deadline handed them last week by a federal judge ordering the county to integrate.

The appropriation was \$100,000.

After the U.S. supreme court's May 25 decision to require the county to resume public education, Judge Owen J. Lewis on June 17 instructed the supervisors of the county to "exercise the power" that is theirs to levy taxes to raise funds adequate to open, operate, and maintain public schools without racial discrimination.

The board members faced fines up to \$10,000 a day and all if they refused to comply with the judge's orders.

In South Carolina, approval was announced yesterday on transfer requests by 77 Negroes seeking admission to predominantly white schools in the city of Charleston.

The four Charleston schools involved all were desegregated under court order last fall by 11 Negroes, two of whom later transferred back to Negro schools.

Goldwater Hits Lodge's Resignation

WASHINGTON, June 24 (AP)—Sen. Barry Goldwater said yesterday that Henry Cabot Lodge's resignation as U.S. ambassador in Saigon was "undoubtedly motivated" by the Johnson-McNamara program of indecision and vacillation towards South Viet Nam.

The Arizona conservative, in a statement issued by his national presidential campaign office, said:

"The ambassador is to be congratulated for bearing up this long under such adverse conditions.

"The Johnson-McNamara program of indecision and vacillation has made it impossible for him to carry out his ambassadorial functions properly and undoubtedly motivated his resignation.

"I am sure all Americans understand and appreciate his position and pray for a return to an affirmative and decisive policy before all Southeast Asian falls to our enemies."

No Clues Yet on Missing Boy, 12

CODY, Wyo., June 24 (AP)—A boatload of searchers floated slowly down the North fork of the Shoshone river yesterday in the search for a missing Salt Lake City boy and men hunted the forest, but no clue was found.

Tim Quinn, 12, son of Mr. and Mrs. Tim Quinn, was fishing with his father on the river near Blackwater lodge Monday. They separated and the boy has not been seen since.

Park county sheriff's officers and volunteers began the search in the Shoshone national forest Monday, about 35 miles west of Cody. Under sheriff Leonard Whitney said "probably 25 or 30 men" hunted the countryside for the boy yesterday.

Whitney said one plane helped in the search Monday, but the hunt was restricted to the ground crew and the boat Tuesday.

The boat was launched near the lodge. Whitney said the men would find the approximate 35 miles to the Buffalo Bill reservoir.

It seemed clear that he was speaking of contraceptive pills, although he did not mention them specifically.

The Roman Catholic pontiff discussed birth control in a general speech on church and world affairs to a group of cardinals.

His words came amid growing discussion among Roman Catholics about the use of contraceptive pills. There have been suggestions that they might be used to regulate the menstrual cycle so the rhythm method could be used with greater precision. The church rejects contraceptive devices but permits the rhythm system.

Bad Music

GENEVA, June 24 (AP)—Switzerland's French-speaking people are getting fed up with Arab music. A Swiss firm recently sold a transmitter to Radio Baghdad in Iraq, and it's so powerful that it drowns out Radio Sottens, the main Swiss French-language station on the same wavelength. Protesters have been made in vain.

Silver Okayed

WASHINGTON, June 24 (AP)—The senate unanimously passed a treasury appropriations bill yesterday containing funds to mint 45 million silver dollars.

Sen. Mike Mansfield, D., Mont., said the bill now goes to a conference with the house, which refused to appropriate money to mint new "cartwheels."

President Says War Is Obsolete

WASHINGTON, June 24 (AP)—President Johnson said yesterday "war is obsolete because there can be no winner." He said

the question is not whether the world can eliminate war but it will have "the courage and good sense to do so."

Addressing the President's conference on occupational safety, Johnson said the day when war is eliminated "will not come quickly."

But he said America possesses the qualities of patience, equanimity and perseverance needed to bring this about.

The President told 3,000 delegates to the safety conference that he hoped they would return home with the conviction, whatever their politics, that their

government and those in it are determined that peace and freedom shall prevail in the world.

He said he believed the American people wanted their president to work for peace and to keep the United States safe until war was renounced by all nations.
