

Council Starts Reapportionment Study on July 6

BOISE, June 27 (AP)—The Idaho Legislative council will begin its study of the problem of legislative reapportionment July 6. The council was summoned yesterday by Chairman R. H. Young, Nampa, state senator, R. Canyon, after he conferred with council director, Myron Schlechte. Idaho's constitution presently requires that each county have one senator and at least one representative, regardless of population, but the United States supreme court has ruled that membership in both the house and senate must be based on population.



The proposed study was promoted by a request of Gov. Robert E. Smylie. The supreme court decision was the culmination of a lawsuit filed by State Rep. Herman McDewitt, D. Hamrock, a Pocatello attorney, on behalf of two Idaho citizens, Dr. Walter R. Hearne, Pocatello, and Stanley E. Whitman, Boise. McDewitt has proposed a conference of attorneys involved in discussing procedure in carrying out the court's order. But Blaine F. Evans, Boise attorney representing Gov. Smylie, said he would not take part in such a discussion. Instead he said he would ask the U.S. district court to conduct an immediate hearing to determine the effect of the supreme court's order and discuss remedies to be applied. Any meeting of attorneys should be under supervision of the court, Evans said.

Hamer Budge Appointed to Commission

WASHINGTON, June 27 (AP)—The senate yesterday approved the nomination of former Rep. Hamer Budge to the securities and exchange commission. During the debate Budge was described as "probably the worst appointment that could possibly be made." Approval of the 53-year-old former Republican congressman from Idaho, now a judge in his home state, came on a voice vote. Sen. Leo McCall, D. Mont., called Budge the worst possible choice for the job and said there were thousands of Republicans who were better suited for the job. McCall told the senate that it was difficult to vote against Budge with whom he served in the house. He called Budge "a man I respect as a man of character and integrity." But McCall said that Budge's voting record in the house showed that the former conservative congressman does not believe in government regulations. He said that Budge, on the basis of principle, could not go along with a revitalization of the regulatory agency which oversees stock market operations.

23 Refugees Are Retrieved From Gulf of Mexico

BROWNSVILLE, Tex., June 27 (AP)—Twenty-three refugees from Castro Cuba, smiling broadly and waving their hands, greeted Brownsville today on a Colombian freighter which picked them and their 40-foot motor sailboat out of the Gulf of Mexico. All but one, 20 and 200, the Cubans were dressed in army fatigues and all looked healthy. But if they had stayed longer in the Gulf in their boat, the Avenida Whitmore, their situation would have been desperate. After four hours of questioning, U.S. immigration officers granted the Cubans asylum in this country. All of them except Vidal Lopez, owner of the escape boat, said they were going to Miami.

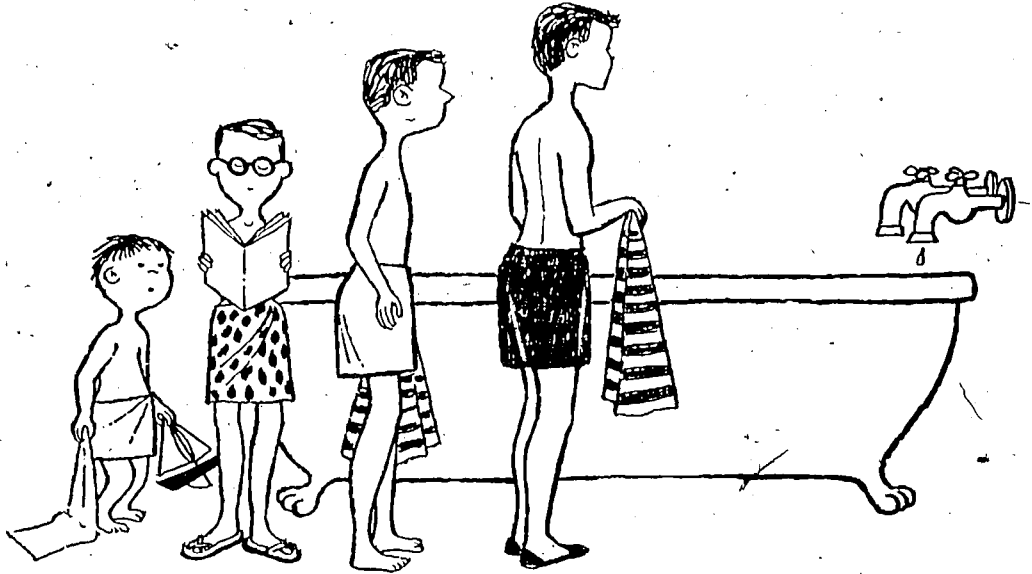

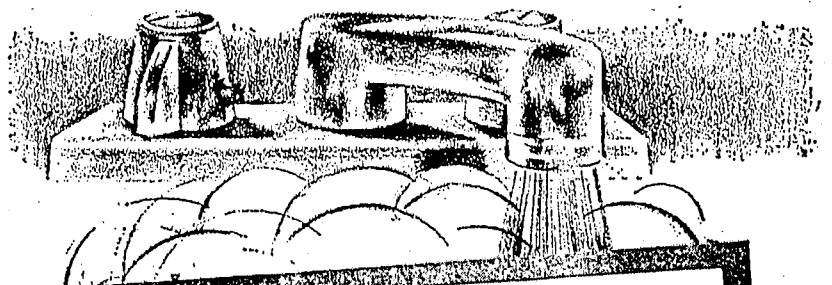

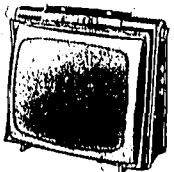

He said the nomination of Goldwater was "all but a certainty," but predicted President Johnson would win reelection this fall "in the greatest landslide since 1936."

The Idaho senator accused Goldwater of deserting "the historic position of the Republican party," and said his recent vote against the civil rights bill was enough to set Abraham Lincoln "stirring in his tomb."

Aerial Spray War Against Worms Ready

SALMON, June 27 (Special)—The Salmon forest spruce budworm aerial spray project is scheduled to begin Wednesday.

Clifford T. Solberg, project director, said weather could change the date.

Forest entomologists report the budworm is developing fast with the arrival of hot weather. Spray operations will begin with the use of helicopters along the main Salmon river below North Fork.

Solberg said that crews taking samples have found no evidence of winter mortality in the budworm population, nor has any evidence of an increase in natural predators been observed. Spray operations will be limited to control the outbreak on some 500,000 acres of forest lands. Six spray helicopters and 11 fixed-wing spray aircraft will be involved in the project. Each spray plane will be under constant observation of forest service personnel in observation aircraft, the project director said.

The constant observation is to insure controlled distribution and coverage of the infested areas by the spray aircraft.

Protection to the fishery resource is to be provided by leaving a no-spray strip averaging 300 feet adjacent to the downstream protection stream. Outside the 300-foot no-spray strip, helicopters will be used to spray the next 400-foot wide strip. Rate of application of the pesticide within this strip will be one-half pound DDT per acre.

Fixed-wing aircraft will be used outside the 400-foot strip to apply DDT at the rate of one pound per acre.

The Idaho state department of fish and game, U.S. fish and wildlife service, Idaho state department of aeronautics, U.S. weather bureau, U.S. agricultural service and the U.S. federal aviation agency are agencies cooperating in the monitoring program.

The control operation is being undertaken to prevent further loss and damage to young Douglas fir stands to assure local communities of a continuing supply of lumber, the forest service said.

Solberg reported the project will be completed in about 15 flying days.

Last year's program was a tremendous success. B. L. (Sonny) Ward, president of the club, said. He noted that several children learned to swim and any fear of the water they might have had was eliminated.

The goal of the program is to make it an annual affair for those children who need this type of program. To do this the program needs the participation of all parents of the children in the program.

The program will continue until the latter part of August and will be conducted at 10 a.m. every Monday and Wednesday.

A special area has been set aside for the program at the lake, assuring a better and safer program. There will be no charge for the children and their parents participating in the program.

Treasury Gives Analysis of Letters By Americans on Silver Dollar Crisis

WASHINGTON, June 27 (AP)—A great many Americans are still itching to get their hands on the last three million silver dollars left in the treasury's vaults.

It's certain that nothing is going to be done before the November elections, however. "You pick one solution and everyone else is mad at you," said one treasury official who estimated that between 20 million and 30 million Americans now collect coins as a hobby.

Advice about what to do with the cartwheels has been pouring into Washington since March 25, that was the day Treasury Secretary Douglas Dillon called a halt to the "great silver dollar run" by decreeing that if people wanted to exchange their silver certificates they would have to take a billion instead of silver dollars.

In the two weeks prior to Dillon's order thousands of people from all over the nation converged on Washington and begged off all the cartwheels they could carry or were allowed to buy.

The run began when word got out that the government's supply of silver dollars was dwindling fast and that most of the remaining coins were collectors' items which could bring as much as \$2 apiece, and possibly more.

The treasury today released an analysis of 500 of the letters it has received on its silver dollar hoards.

Only 13 of the 500 letters analyzed suggested that the dollars be melted down and the silver used to make halves, quarters and dimes. The other 487 had

various schemes for distributing them to the public.

The largest number, 174, urged that they be handed out the way the mint sells proof coin sets. These are complete sets of specially polished coins — one of each kind from both the Denver and the Philadelphia mints.

"The mint keeps a record of all people who have a standing order for the proof sets. Everyone on this list should be offered a silver dollar and the remainder should be sold—first come, first served—according to this batch of letters.

Almost as many letters, 170, suggested that the treasury simply start taking mail orders for the coins, much as it did before the run began. Again, these

would be filled on a first come, first served basis.

Some 38 letters called for a public auction. They pointed out that since many of the silver dollars have special numismatic value, the government stands to make a tidy profit by letting them go to the highest bidder.

Some said the money could be used to build a new mint and/or to mint more silver dollars.

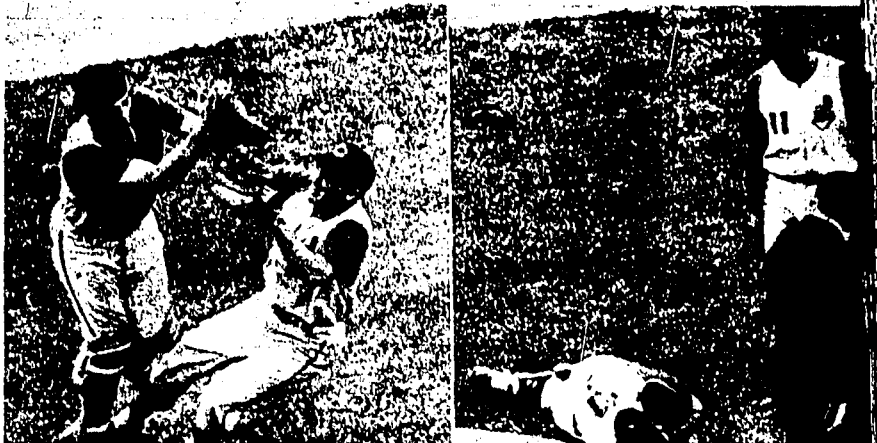

Businessman Might Trade Recently Repaired Heart for Artificial One

The heart Kenneth Webb has been with is now ticking along in a normal manner—thanks to modern day surgery.
But in the back of his mind the well-known local businessman has an idea brewing. Why not take all the trouble out of heart trouble and get an artificial heart, or a transplant, to do the job?

Sound strange? It really does, but the chance that the job can be done is just around the well-known medical corner. Webb hopes he can be one of the first to get one after the plan has proved successful. Some experts, including the doctors who completed his heart surgery, believe this will be within the next five years.

Meanwhile, Webb will hang onto the heart he has, although it has given him some trouble down through the years, starting when he was in the flying service during World War II.

But that was long ago. It is the present situation that is interesting to Webb, his friends and members of his family. The interesting fact is that he is still alive, but wouldn't have been had not surgery been performed on the heart that was acting up.

Once the operation was set for the first week in December, 1963. In November, 1963, it was decided his heart would not keep going too much longer—probably a year on the outside.

It was his heart, so he was touchy about it. He wanted the best chance possible to survive and he did an extensive study of just what chance he did have. His physical condition was good, that much was in his favor.

New Rocket Engine Is Tiny Thing

WASHINGTON, June 27 (AP)—In California the other day 36-year-old Steven J. Domokos showed some visitors a cylindrical gadget about the size of a six-cup coffee percolator.

He said it was a rocket engine. He seemed to be pretty proud of it.

The visitors were not impressed—not at first, anyway. They had recently seen a hybrid on another rocket, taller than a 12-story building and as big in diameter as many a highway tunnel.

This plant is the booster stage of the Saturn 5 which will hurl Apollo astronauts to the moon. Its five engines will gulp 2,200 tons of liquid oxygen and kerosene at a rate of 10 tons a second and generate a combined thrust of 7.5 million pounds.

This is enough propellant to fill 60 railway tank cars and enough power to lift a load of six million pounds from the earth and accelerate it close to orbital speed.

On top of the booster is a second stage rocket generating one million pounds of thrust, and on top of that is a third stage—the one that will fling the Apollo spaceship on its final lap to the moon—with 200,000 pounds of thrust.

Small In Comparison
By comparison with the Saturn 5 booster, Domokos's rocket is like a flea on an elephant's back. It gulps fuel, if "gulps" is the word for it, at the rate of one teaspoonful per fifth. Its thrust, Domokos said, is well, about the same as "a firm pat on the back." This borders on the feeble. But Domokos seemed to be every bit as proud of his nine-pound, toy-sized device as are the men who make the Saturn 5 booster engines of. Continued on Page 23

AS YOUR MINISTER SEES IT

Prayers in School

Many words have been written about the matter of the "prayer" issue in the courts. Many more words have been written about the principle of separation of church and state. Too often, our emotions rather than our judgment temper our feelings about these matters.

Generally speaking, most people believe in prayer and although many of them don't practice it, they feel that it would be a good thing to continue. Since so many families have ceased having family devotions or prayer at home, they feel that their consciences will be eased a little if they can delegate to the public schools, this function. How wrong can we be?

The function of prayer and religious devotion has never been changed in the public schools and although it may have been practiced there, it is, nevertheless, out of place there. The public school should never prescribe the requirement of prayer or devotion for its pupils. There are many different religions represented in public education. Even though the general orientation has been Protestant in America, this does not mean that a "Protestant" view is the only one which ought to be presented. Neither would it be more correct to represent religion in terms of LDS or Roman Catholic. In fact, the matter of religious freedom must never be dependent upon which majority religious body is in power at any one time.

I do not wish to have some one outside of my particular religious persuasion to try to perform my function as a parent in the training of my children. Therefore I want the same privi-

lege for every other youngster in religious training as a part of the curriculum, then he should send his children to the schools, and he should be willing to pay the entire bill for doing so. Public education is a privilege of children in America and should be completely separate from any religious dictation. And, by the same token, no public funds should ever be used for support of any parochial education, either directly or indirectly.

Therefore, the issue of requiring prayer in the public school, I hope will soon be resolved. So far as I can remember, prayer was never spoken in the classroom in my childhood and I have not suffered for that.

I do remember, however, that my mother and father never failed to take me to Sunday school and church and to take their rightful place in the support of that church. Any family that feels the importance of prayer in the public school or anywhere

for that matter must recognize that the only institution outside the home designed for that training is the church of his choice.

Rather than deny the judicial courts of one level or another, perhaps we need to re-evaluate our own practice of religious freedom which we have. Day in and day out, I am grateful for the fact that we have so many dedicated Christian educators who instill moral and ethical teaching in the classrooms without becoming sectarian in their approach.

I will continue to speak loudly in opposition to any attempt by any religious body to seek any special favors of public schools. Let there be no question of my support of the separation of church and state at every level of education. But at the same time, let me be sure I am doing everything in my power to bring sound religious training to my own child and to my own family.

New Rocket Engine Is Tiny But Packs Much Power

 their eight-ton monsters. In repeated tests, the little engine has performed almost perfectly, and this is good news for the Apollo astronauts. Their lives depend on it. They cannot return to earth alive if it fails. Hearing this, the visitors began to be impressed by Domokos' toy.

The engines for all three powerful stages of the Saturn 5 are being built by the Rocket-Dyne Division of North American Aviation, Inc., at Canoga Park, Calif. The tiny thrusters over which Domokos has jurisdiction are being perfected at Rocket-Dyne's plant in Van Nuys, Calif. They aren't designed to hurt anything anywhere. Their entire purpose is to keep the Apollo Command Module, which will house the three astronauts returning from the moon mission, from burning up when it plunges back into the Earth's atmosphere.

The Apollo ship has a heat shield to protect it from the 5,000-degree temperatures which will build up when it dives from space at 28,000 miles an hour into the Earth's blanket of air. If Apollo should tumble in this critical period, exposing its unprotected flanks to the heat of air friction, the astronauts would burn up.

Domokos' little "reaction control" rockets are designed to prevent this. The Apollo command module carries 12 of them strategically situated in two banks of six each. As the ship hits the atmosphere on its return from the moon, it will plunge to within 100,000 or 150,000 feet of the Earth and then skip out to about 300,000 feet before making its final dive.

Uncontrolled during this period, the Apollo would swing rapidly this way and that and, from moment to moment, would subject its most vulnerable areas to fatally high temperatures.

To keep this from happening, the reaction control rockets must be able to fire, stop, and fire again as often as necessary.

"This is what makes Domokos' little engine so special. The gigantic Saturn 5 booster can fire only once. Domokos' plating heater is capable of 750 starts and stops in the 30 minutes a normal Apollo reentry would last.

Simpson, chief of area management, and the number of anglers since World War II has doubled. By the end of this century, fishing pressure is expected to be nearly three times what it is now.

Jerome County Supervisor Calls it Quits After 24 Years of Employment

JEROME, June 27—Linus W. Hanberg, Jerome and Gooding county supervisor for the Farmers' Home administration, retired June 26 after 24 years of government service.

Hanberg, born July 4, 1899, at Garden City, Minn., came to Idaho with his parents in 1901, where they homesteaded at Deer Flat, south of Caldwell. They later moved to Caldwell where he attended grade and high school.

After being graduated from the university of Idaho with a bachelor of science degree in agriculture, he taught Smith-Hughes agriculture and other subjects at Oakley and Jerome high schools. He was basketball coach of teams with outstanding records in both places.

On April 26, 1924, Hanberg married Madeline Hanberg, who was teaching school in Oakley.

The Hanbergs have two children. Their son is James Hanberg, a graduate of the University of Idaho and sales manager of KTRP, radio station in Moscow.

Their daughter, Madelyn, also was graduated from the University of Idaho and is now Mrs. John Wagner, Grangeville. She also taught school.

In 1927, Hanberg went to work as fieldman for the Jerome Co-operative Creamery and later for Idaho Farms, Inc.

Hanberg served two terms as city councilman from Bishop precinct, as a volunteer fireman for many years and has served on and as chairman of Jerome County Executive Service board periodically since 1933.

He was vice president of the Jerome County fair board in 1941 and was appointed an advisor of the county civilian defense council by Gov. Chase A. Clark.

At present he is serving as vice chairman of the council and is chairman of the technical advisory panel which consists of the heads of the department of agriculture agencies in Jerome county.

In March, 1942, Hanberg assumed the duties of assistant supervisor of the Lincoln, Gooding, Blaine and Custer counties farm security administration.

In April he was appointed field representative of the civil control administration, Seattle, where he assisted the Japanese in transferring their farm lands to operators prior to their evacuation from that area to points inland.

At the completion of this work, Hanberg returned to Jerome and in June of that year received the appointment of supervisor of Idaho and Lewin counties with headquarters at Grangeville.

A 40-year member of the American Legion, he has been

the war boards of those counties. However, their hearts were still in Magic Valley and when the opportunity came to return to southern Idaho in 1944, the Hanberg family jumped at the chance. In addition to his duties at Jerome, since that time, he also served as supervisor of Twin Falls county from 1947 to 1957.

The Hunt project was in full swing in 1944, having been opened by the government for homestead farm units to veterans following the war, during which Japanese evacuees had been interned there.

Being in Hanberg's territory, he took over the problems of financing and advising these settlers. In a story, "Homesteaders, 1950," published October, 1950, in the Ladies Home Journal, he was noted as one of the two "Godfathers" of the Hunt project.

He has been a member of the

German Student Departs for Europe After Spending Year in Twin Falls

After a year at Twin Falls high school 10-year-old Mike Klatt has departed for home—Bonn, Germany. According to Klatt it was quite a year—one he will never forget.

"Twin Falls is my second home," he said while struggling with suitcases. "I hate to leave."

Klatt arrived in Twin Falls last August to spend a year in school. He applied in Bonn to attend school through the American field service and his application was accepted. He actually was put on the trail by a friend of his who attended school in this country.

Many foreign students attending school in the United States lose a year in their own school, but Klatt says he can salvage many of his credits.

"Like many visitors to the United States he landed in New York City."

"New York is great, but it isn't the United States. It kind of overwelms one," he said.

He had no pre-conceived ideas about Twin Falls. About the only two places he had ever given much thought were San Francisco and New York.

"A thousand things went through my mind en route from New York to Salt Lake City," he said.

While in Twin Falls, he resided with Mr. and Mrs. John C. Bishop, 1607 Eleventh avenue east.

"The Bishop family has been wonderful to me," said Klatt. "The school activities would make most American students envious. He participated in several school clubs like Theophians and was an honorary member of Key club, just to name a couple."

One of his proudest possessions is a letterman's sweater with the big block "T" on it. The letter was won in track.

"Athletic competition is rough. It was much rougher than I expected. But the team spirit and the competitive spirit that I learned I will never forget. More than anything else I just wanted to be one of the boys. Track gave me that chance," he said.

One of the things that first impressed the tall blond youth from Bonn was the open hospitality of the Americans. In a way he feels that the social lessons he learned this year equal or top the lessons learned in the classroom.

In a great many fields he feels that American and German students are similar.

"Students are students the world over, I believe. They get into trouble in Germany just as easily as they do in this country," he said.

Concerning his thoughts on the far sea, he had no immediate comment, but his big broad smile indicated that he very much approved of the American high school student.

Klatt believes much of his time will be occupied in keeping up his correspondence.

One of his main regrets about leaving is not having enough time to personally thank the many residents of Twin Falls for making this an outstanding year in his life.

And speaking about leaving, for a while it looked as if Klatt was going to run into some difficulty in departing. In the midst of packing he mislaid his passport.

"I was quite upset and had visions of miles and miles of red

Passengers in the Balderas car besides the driver and infant were the baby's mother, Mrs. Isabel Balderas and Mary C. Baron, 50, both Buhl.

The driver of the Ford, Mike Balderas, was cited for failure

to drive in a prudent manner and to keep her out of control. The accident was investigated by Frank Mogensen, Idaho state police, and Deputy Wayne Hankins, Twin Falls county sheriff's office, who estimated damage at \$200 for each vehicle.
