

Senator Barry Goldwater Is Nominated, Chooses Miller as Running Mate

SAN FRANCISCO, July 16 (AP)—Triumphant Sen. Barry Goldwater picked Rep. William F. Miller as his running mate today and moved to rally Republican forces for the autumn battle against President Johnson's Democrats. The Arizona conservative quickly began drafting battle plans with GOP leaders after sweeping to the Republican presidential nomination last night.

His swift, massive hand-wagon rolled over Gov. William W. Scrantom of Pennsylvania and other "Stop-Goldwater" forces in a roof-raising, fire-bolting victory in the convention.

About all that was left after that was for the senator to disclose who he wanted to run with him, and word came this morning.

Goldwater let it be known that Miller, a New York congressman and retiring GOP national chairman, was his man and that California GOP leader William F. Knowland would announce the decision at the Republican state chairman's meeting.

Caucus Held by Idaho Delegation

SAN FRANCISCO, July 16 (Special)—Idaho's delegation at the Republican national convention held a short caucus this morning and adjourned with an agreement to meet later at the Cow Palace when the vice presidential situation becomes clear. However, minutes later word came that Sen. Barry Goldwater has expressed preference for Rep. William Miller, N. Y., as a teammate. The Idaho delegation is expected to support his selection unanimously.

At other business at the caucus, delegates learned their banner in the Goldwater-Miller campaign. Wednesday night was prominent on television screens across the nation. They gave a hand to Ray Robinson, Idaho Falls, who was in charge of obtaining banners.

Delegates who participated in the demonstration said the crowded floor was brutal. Before hand, Governor Smylie had advised those who were pleased to remove them if they could see without them.

After adjournment John McMurray, Boise, was observed looking around the delegation hall. He was not present at the caucus this morning and it was reported he had lost his billfold and a considerable amount of travelers checks. He was attempting to redeem the checks this morning. He planned to leave for Hawaii after the caucus.

Delegate John Ohliger, Bonanza Ferry, stated at the caucus "just for the record" he had not received a telegram advising him of the June 30 meeting of the delegation at which Governor Smylie was given permission to see CAUCUS, Page 2, Column 1.

The Cow Palace audience was estimated at 18,000 persons. Mrs. Scott will leave here Saturday for Hawaii to visit a son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Lowell Wine, former Twin Falls residents.

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The Greek Cypriots captured new additions to the Turkish island of Cyprus. It was reported that Greek Cypriots were using heavy machine guns.

Nine hundred men were reported to have landed and one estimate of total manpower sent from Greece—including Greeks and Greek Cypriots—was at least 4,500.

THANT ON TOUR
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New Attacks Are Launched By Cypriots

NICOSIA, Cyprus, July 16 (AP)—Warring Greek and Turkish Cypriots defied the United Nations and launched new attacks yesterday against each other, positions in the Kyrenia mountains on the northern coast of Cyprus.

There were fears that the fighting could trigger full-scale war between the rival communities and possibly an invasion by Turkish military forces.

Fighting in the Kyrenia has been going on since Monday. There were no immediate reports of casualties in the clashes during the day.

A U.S. spokesman said "the situation there is deteriorating. Western diplomats said the fighting was a dangerous threat to the shaky peace on the island. They spoke openly of a possible imminent Turkish invasion."

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Downey Marshal Is Shot, Search Starts

POCATELLO, July 16 (UPI)—A small town marshal was shot to death early today while apparently attempting to stop six suspects from burglarizing the Downey Grain Growers association office. Marshal Dee Woodland, about 30, was found dead in a Downey street around 1 a.m., surrounded by seven expended pistol shells. He had been shot only once. Police, conducting one of the biggest manhunts in recent Idaho history, credited Woodland with putting a shot of his own in the gasoline tank of the fleeing suspects' car which was found abandoned at nearby Lava Hot Springs. A shell similar to the one on the street was found inside the car.

The search for the suspects, spread throughout southeastern Idaho as law enforcement officers from Idaho, Utah and Wyoming chased the suspects through the corners of the three states. Five cars were believed stolen by the suspects and the search moved from Sage Junction, Wyo., to Paris, all roads crossing the southern Idaho borders were blocked.

Idaho and Utah law officers dispatched aircraft to search along the border for the suspects. Another car was stolen and a police barricade at Montpelier was centered on the suspects fled into Wyoming. The search centered later at Paris, where six abandoned stolen cars were found and another car reported stolen.

Police said they considered the suspects dangerous and heavily armed with pistols and probably one shotgun. From six to eight boxes of .22-caliber-long shells and 22-magnum shells were stolen.

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Jury Finds Attorney Innocent

NEW YORK, July 16 (AP)—A federal court jury today acquitted Roy M. Cohn on charges of perjury and obstruction of justice. The case was a re-trial of the one-time aide to the late Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy, Jr. A mistrial had been declared on the same charges April 19.

The jury of 11 men and a woman also acquitted Murray E. Gottsman, a co-defendant charged with perjury.

Chief of jury arose from the defense table when Claude C. Applegate, jury foreman, announced:

"We have found unanimously the defendants are not guilty."

The defendants were accused of lying to a 1959 grand jury investigating a 1959 stock fraud indictment.

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Filer Businessman Dies of Long Illness

FILER, July 16—Robert S. Blastock, ar., 79, died Thursday morning at Magic Valley Memorial hospital of a long illness. He was born July 12, 1885, at Leicester, England, and at the age of 21 he traveled around the world by himself. He came to the United States in 1912 from England. In 1917 he came to Idaho where he was a sheepman, stockman and rancher. Mr. Blastock was chairman of the board of the Twin Falls Bank and Trust company at the time of his death and had been president of the bank for 27 years. He married Lucy Irons Loefer, July 3, 1918, at Lexington, Ky. He was a member of the First Presbyterian church.

Surviving, besides his widow, are two sons, Robert Blastock, Jr., Filer, and Norman Blastock, Hagerman; three daughters, Mrs. Lucy (Marjorie) Hall, Madrid, Spoke, Mrs. Marjorie Dennis, Riverside, Calif., and Mrs. Donald (Barbara) Hartwick, Twin Falls; two brothers, Norman Blastock, Sankatone, Sankatone, Canada, and Lance Blastock, Melbourne, Australia; two sisters, Mrs. Marion Hoop and Mrs. May Shupard, both England, and 10 grandchildren.

Glynn Smith; Retired Mail Carrier; Dies

Glynn E. Smith, 75, retired mail carrier who had lived in Twin Falls the past 44 years, died Thursday morning at the Twin Falls Clinic hospital of an extended illness.

Mr. Smith was born in Dickey, N. D., he attended schools there and married Sigmund Marie Fogelburg in Pergus Falls, Minn., March 28, 1912. They celebrated their golden wedding anniversary in 1962.

Mr. Smith began working for the postoffice department in Fargo, N.D. in 1911, transferring to Twin Falls in 1920. He served as city carrier until retiring in 1949 after 38 years of service.

He was elected to the Twin Falls school board in 1940 and served for several terms. He also was a member of the Twin Falls county board of education until it was dissolved. He was appointed to the Twin Falls selective service board, resigning in 1943 because of ill health.

Mr. Smith was active in the Twin Falls lodge, having been a member for 33 years. He served as noble grand and held all lodge offices. He also belonged to the Methodist church, and the National Association of Retired Civil Employees of which he was president. He was a former member of the National Association of Letter Carriers.

Soldier Goes Berserk, Kills One

SEOUL, Korea, July 16 (AP)—An American soldier went on a frenzied shooting spree with an M-16 rifle today, killing one man from his company and wounding three others before he fell and died from return fire.

The soldier, from the 1st U.S. Infantry division stationed at Camp Casey 30 miles north of here, was first reported "armed and acting strangely" near the camp field house.

The army said military police had been summoned to deal with the soldier's "disorderly conduct."

His name and that of the other dead man and the wounded were not released.

Miner, 43, Is Trapped Inside Uranium Mine

MARYSVILLE, Utah, July 16 (AP)—A 43-year-old miner was trapped deep inside the Deer Trail uranium mine 700 feet below ground today when a rock fall blocked his way out.

The miner, identified as Gerald Allen, Kingston, was reported in "good" condition today in a Panguitch hospital. He suffered a twisted ankle, cuts and bruises when partially buried by the cave-in.

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Air Service Cut Eyed for Area Towns

WASHINGTON, July 16 (AP)—The civil aeronautics board Wednesday said 78 of 557 communities receiving local airline service fell short of providing necessary air traffic to keep the service.

The CAB's quarterly report for the year ending March 31 was sent to the mayor of each city. The report noted an improvement in generation of service compared with the same period a year ago. The required traffic under the "use it or lose it" policy in five passengers daily.

Idaho cities facing the "lose it" policy were Burley, Pocatello, Coeur d'Alene, Payette, Sun Valley, Hatfield and Ketchum, all served by West Coast Airlines.

Fire Breaks Out in Cow Palace

COW PALACE, San Francisco, July 16.—Fire broke out on a ramp leading to the Cow Palace last night.
The fire erupted on a ramp near the communications trailer of Pennsylvania Gov. William W. Scranton shortly after the candidate had arrived there to confer with his top strategists.
After several minutes the flames appeared to have been extinguished on the ramp, though choking smoke emerged from the ramp, a main entrance to the rear of the GOP convention hall.
A Daily City fire truck pulled up to the ramp to aid workers naming big portable fire extinguishers.
The fire was first noticed below a wooden ramp leading from the rear of the Cow Palace.
The flames shot quickly through the boardwalk and the fire was pulled out of the back of the hall.
The fire was noticed just as Mrs. Mary Scranton walked down the ramp with two aides, presumably to meet her husband in the trailer below.
The cause of the fire was not immediately known.
The ramp was badly charred. One spectator said it appeared that some kind of television equipment near the ramp burst into flames which at one time shot about 15 feet into the air.

USSR Gives Plan On Disarmament

GENEVA, July 16.—The Soviet Union proposed today that the United States and the Soviet Union agree in principle to the phased destruction of all their bombers as a step toward disarmament.
Soviet negotiator Gennady K. Narapkin told the 17-nation United Nations bureau to the press that the Soviet government is ready to discuss such details as the types of aircraft, the phases, the over-all time limit and international verification procedures.

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Sen. Goldwater Has Own Ideas

SAN FRANCISCO, July 16.—Barry Morris Goldwater has his own ideas about presidential campaigning—and almost everything he says is in his own words.
"I'm not one of those blabbing, hand-shaking, blintzing candidates," he said once. "I don't like to insult the American intelligence by thinking that sleeping people on the back is going to get you votes."
When a crowd chanted, "We Want Barry" for 10 minutes at a Madison Square garden rally in New York, Goldwater finally shouted impatiently, "You'll get him if you'll just be quiet." It was not the usual response of a politician to a cheering throng.
By his own account, Goldwater is bucking the trend of history, seeking the White House as a outsider from the small-population western state of Arizona.
He goes where he wants when he wants, sometimes ignoring what his political advisers regard as pressing local campaign chores.
More than a year ago he said, "I've never done anything to get the nomination, and yet all of a sudden everyone wants to thrust it on me. It's used to talk of 'the president thing' as though he couldn't quite believe it."
But last Jan. 3, Goldwater, 55, announced he was going after the top job. Now he says, "I wouldn't have got into this if I didn't really want it."
But an aide said, "However he has no overwhelming desire to be President. If he thought there was another conservative who could do the job he'd be glad to have him do it."
Goldwater is no spellbinder on the platform. He delivers some of his toughest campaign attacks in a near-monotone. But sometimes he is eloquent.
"I want to help my country," he told one crowd. "I want to work for it. I want to pay my rent for a Polish grandfather who came to this country through England. I just want to help."
Without a text, Goldwater's words sometimes run away with him. In a Reno television interview, he was asked if he had said something attributed to him, "Not in my most lucid moments," he replied.
He was once quoted as saying he wasn't sure he had "the brains to be the president." Asked about it at Minneapolis, he said, "I've done all right in my life. I don't have a Phil Delta Kappa key, but I have them." He had a year at the University of Arizona, but quit to join the family department store in Phoenix.
In his hilltop home outside Phoenix he maintains an elaborate ham radio setup. He's just plain Barry to fellow radio hams. If he gets to the White House, he says, he'll take the transmitter with him. "I'll never know" will still be Barry.

Smith Says Idaho Must Keep Water

MONTPELIER, July 16 (AP)—Congressional candidate Dick Smith said yesterday Idaho must develop its water resources or outsiders will take the water.

The Rexburg, Republican told a Rotary club luncheon Idaho is one of the few states in the nation with enough water within its borders for its agricultural and industrial needs of the future.

"Our neighboring states, particularly California, are not so fortunate," Smith said. "They are looking for water and will take it any place they can find it."

He said the Bear and the Snake rivers are two likely places. Smith said Idaho must take steps to protect its water rights.

"Water that is rightfully ours must not be pirated over the state line," Smith said. "If it is we will never get it back. Idaho must act now to protect what is rightfully ours and to guarantee we will have our water for future use."

Gov. Robert E. Smylie has been pushing a state water plan that he wants the legislature to advance at a July 30 special session.

Grizzlies are a wilder, fiercer and larger species of bear, seldom seen by tourists.

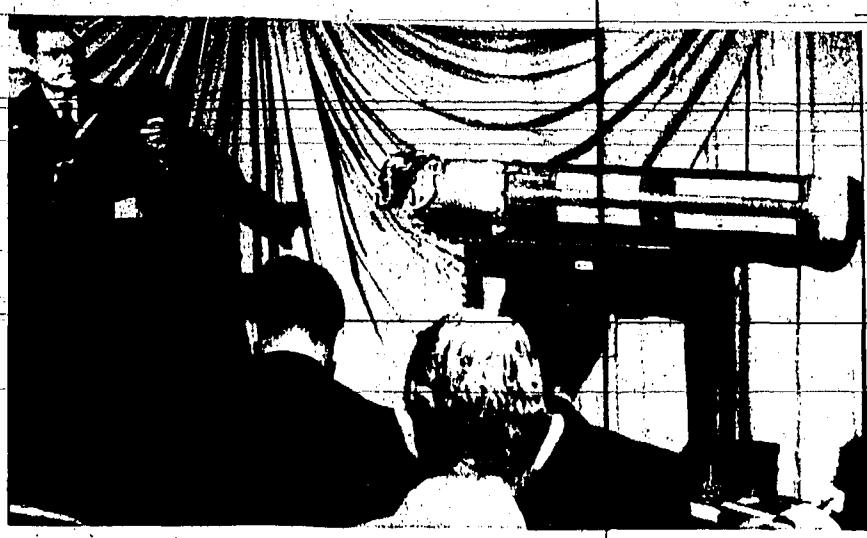

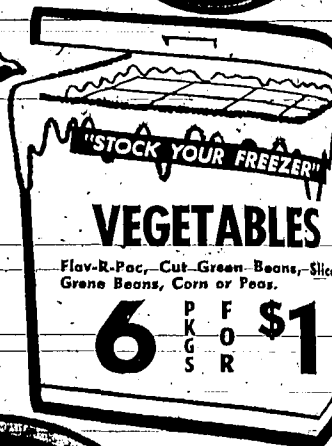

Idaho Crops Spurred by Weather

BOISE, July 16 (AP)—Warm, dry weather spurred growth of Idaho crops during the past week, the department of agriculture's statistical reporting service reported today.

It said the green pea harvest in north Idaho gained momentum and was more than half finished as the week ended.

Harvesting of first crop alfalfa hay was nearly complete over the state, and the second crop was developing fast.

Winter grains were turning color while the bulk of the spring grains reached the heading stage.

The agency said fruit crops continued about two weeks later than usual. The sweet cherry harvest was about half complete in southwest Idaho with less progress in sour cherries.

The potato crop was in bloom in southcentral Idaho but hadn't reached that stage in the eastern part of the state.

Cracking conditions were reported good in all areas.

15 Battles Take Place In Two Days

BAIGON, Viet Nam, July 16 (AP)—Communist Viet Cong guerrillas clashed with government soldiers in 15 new battles in South Vietnam in the past two days, official Vietnamese military spokesmen said today.

Red attacks throughout the country kept government soldiers on the move so much, American military spokesmen said, that American air force planes shelled a near record 1,034 combat troops yesterday alone.

The Viet Cong was especially active in normally peaceful Phu Yen Province on the central coast, 225 miles northeast of Saigon.

The communists poured 81 mm. and 60 mm. mortar fire into the district headquarters of Tuy An yesterday and captured two militiamen in raids on three neighboring hamlets.

Government forces struck by air and ground on the same day, killing 20 in air strikes eight miles southeast of Phu Yen's capital of Tuy Hoa.

In other battles in the coastal province yesterday, government forces killed five communist guerrillas and captured two rifles on a road patrol seven miles southeast of the provincial capital.

During the demonstration that followed placement of Goldwater's name in the nomination race, he largest Goldwater signs on the floor—white satin banners linking Idaho and Goldwater with the "O's" in each word and wearing like senatorial caricature.

Only Smylie and delegates George Knowles of Boise made all around the floor after Idaho followed Arizona, seated in front of the Gen state representatives in convention hall, into a make dance through the aisles.

"I think Goldwater will give us a fighting campaign," Smylie said afterwards, his white shirt soaked with perspiration in the steaming Cow Palace.

"I think he'll carry Idaho," Sen. H. Jordan agreed. He was with the show from the gallery with Attorney General Allan G. Shepard, former congressman John Sunburn, Hagerman, and national committeeman Harley Markham, Pocatello.

Jordan brushed aside talk that party differences engendered by the bitter fight for the nomination.

Goldwater Will Withdraw From Senate Race

SAN FRANCISCO, July 16 (AP)—Sen. Barry Goldwater declared after winning the Republican presidential nomination that he will not run for reelection to the senate.

"I would not run for both offices," the senator told reporters.

Goldwater said he will write the Arizona secretary of state asking that his name be withdrawn from the race for reelection to a third Senate term.

Arizona Gov. Paul Fannin is seeking the Republican nomination for the seat Goldwater now holds.

Schools Give Plans to Desegregate

JACKSON, Miss., July 15 (AP)—Two school boards have submitted plans to a federal judge to desegregate first grade classrooms in the fall, signaling the end of Mississippi's holdout as the last state without school integration below the college level.

A third board was expected to join the school systems of Jackson and Biloxi today in telling U. S. district Judge Sidney Mize how it would obey his desegregation order.

One plan in hand, said John T. Logan, Jr., superintendent of rural Leake county, "We are all set."

Leake county is the birthplace of former Gov. Ross B. Barnett, who twice physically blocked Negro James H. Meredith from enrolling at the University of Mississippi in 1962.

When Meredith finally arrived on the Ole Miss campus at Oxford to register, a turmoil erupted. Two persons were killed and several hundred were injured.

Judge Mize, 75, a native Mississippian, had given the school boards of Jackson, Biloxi and Leake county until today to submit plans for desegregation.

The Jackson and Biloxi boards filed their plans a day early. They were identical.

Another Mississippi city, Clarkdale, in the heavily Negro populated delta region, is under federal court order to submit a desegregation plan within 15 days.

USSR Wants Showdown With Red Parties

MOSCOW, July 15 (AP)—The Soviet Union has told Communist China that it wants a showdown meeting of the world's communist parties on the Moscow-Peking split "without delay," it was announced today.

The Russians called upon Peking leaders to agree in principle "in the immediate future" that a meeting must be convened and that it should not be put off for long.

The demand was made in a letter to Peking dated June 15. The letter was published in the Soviet party theoretical organ "Communist" and summarized by the news agency Tass.

The letter was a reply to a Chinese letter of May 7 which rejected a Soviet call for an early world conference.

No Injuries Are Listed in Crash

Approximately \$300 damage to the Buick and \$100 to the Ford was estimated by Deputy Sheriff Bill Bunn, Wendell, who investigated. No citations were issued.

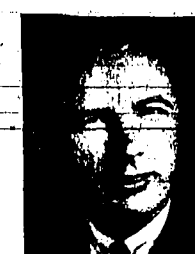

This information came to light as the state department officially acknowledged that North Viet Nam was continuing to send military personnel into South Viet Nam "individually and in small groups."

It also was learned that two enlisted men of the regular North Vietnamese army recently Nam. But American intelligence has not yet established to what extent, if any, organized units of the Red North Viet Nam army have crossed the 17th parallel and joined the Viet Cong guerrillas in the South Viet Nam fighting.
