Negroes and Whites Clash On East Coast

A three-hour clash broke out between about 100 Negroes and whites in Blackburg, B.C., during the week-end and civil rights leaders reported an arsonist set fire to their headquarters in Tupelo, Miss.

The Blackburg racial rioting was the first experienced by the small Piedmont town. Authorities said groups of Negroes and whites roamed the streets hurling rocks and bottles. Several shots were fired, but there were no injuries reported and no arrests made.

Police said the fighting began Saturday night after three Negro couples ordered hamburgers at a white teen-aged restaurant.

A gang of whites followed the couples back to a Negro beer parlor and a shot was fired. Both sides gathered reinforcements and running battles continued until dawn.

Several residents reported their houses were showered with missiles. Highway patrolmen and Cherokee county officers moved in to help restore order.

FBI agents in Mississippi confirmed they were checking a report that a frame building housing office of the Council of Federated Organizations (COFO) was set afire.

Officials Give Up Search for Girls' Bodies

HAYDEN LAKE, Aug. 24 (AP) — Unsuccessful dragging operations for the bodies of two Washington teen-agers who drowned last week in a boat collision on the northern Idaho lake Aug. 15.

The girls, Barbara Horne and Carol Thornton, College Place, Wash., both 16, disappeared in a 10 p.m. boat collision on the lake.

Their outboard boat was slashed almost in two by a 175-horsepower jet-powered boat that disintegrated in the accident.

Parents of the two girls agreed with Kootenai Sheriff John Bender that the search for the bodies should end when no trace of them could be found by the week-end.

Valley Reservists Train

FT. LEWIS, Wash., Aug. 24—Training, ranging from basic re-

pair and baking to map reading and use of gas masks, kept members of army reserve quartermaster units from southern Idaho busy here during the first of two weeks of annual active duty summer training.

Some 200 enlisted men and officers of the headquarters and two companies of the 372nd quartermaster battalion, with headquarters in Pocatello and training centers in five southern Idaho cities, are participating in the summer encampment.

Most of the men are involved in a variety of on-the-job training and classes in maintenance, supply, petroleum storage and distribution, baking, graves registration, laundry-bath facilities for troops in the field and administration.

The battalion maintenance sections are learning about and clothing repair, utilizing mobilized equipment and machines which can be moved into the field rapidly. Training during the first week was conducted inside a warehouse at this army base's North fort, where the reservists are billeted.

In an adjacent warehouse, bakery section personnel learned bread baking methods, including how to determine ingredient percentages, proper temperatures, types of flour and yeast and, to conclude the course, actually mixing up a batch of fresh bread.

The petroleum storage and up mobile laundry equipment and field bathing facilities in a motor pool parking lot, also located on the North fort. Washers and dryers, powered by portable generators and mounted on trailers for swift movement to the field, are used in the training.

The laundry-bath section also is responsible for furnishing shower facilities for troops in the field. Water for the showers is taken from a large vat (similar to a small, above-the-ground plastic-lined swimming pool) which can be dismantled and moved about. Water from the vat is piped through hoses to a portable gas-fired heater and then to showers, mounted on sections of wooden grates.

For the most part, section training is being conducted by army reserve officers in the battalion, under supervision of regular army personnel stationed at Ft. Lewis. Support is provided by a sister battalion of the active army—the 268th quartermaster battalion (direct support).

Administrative and supply personnel in the battalion are not involved in any particular classwork but are performing their regular company and battalion-level duties. Administration section clerks are occupied the first week with assembling the payroll for the two-week camp, submitting morning reports (daily report which keeps tabs on the number of reservists in each unit) and other paperwork.

Besides the regular training for reservists in the battalion's various sections, several men have been selected to attend special schools, including the non-commissioned officer (NCO) academy, an equipment records system course, several motor maintenance and communications courses, and a two-week course on chemical-biological (CIB) warfare.

The CIB training is a comprehensive course involving tactical use of chemical ammunition, a study of different types of gases and chemicals and methods of protection. The CIB course includes both classroom sessions and training at the gas chamber. Those from Magic Valley attending special schools are Sgt. George R. Stocker, route 3, and Pvt. John T. Kinney, 305 Locust street, north, both Twin Falls; Sps. 4/c Robert R. Johnson, route 1, Kimberly, and Sps. 4/c Byron G. Hardy and Pfc. Richard G. Williams, both Oakley, all attending the NCO academy; S/sgt. Graydon P. McAllister, Rtp. port, enrolled in the equipment records system course, and S/sgt. Albert L. Hoover, 334 Gardner street, Twin Falls, and Sps. 4/c Willard D. Cranney, Oakley, both taking the CIB training.

All reservists here with the 6th infantry division participated in a parade Thursday evening. The first week of training ended Friday evening with a full field inspection. During the second week, the troops will move out into the field for training in a forest-covered highway area several miles from the main post.

The reservists arrived here by plane, landing at Seattle-Tacoma International airport and traveling by bus to Ft. Lewis, a few miles south of Tacoma. Cook in the battalion came three days earlier to attend a pre-camp mess school.

Commander of the 372nd quartermaster battalion is Lieut. Col. Eugene F. Berry, Blackfoot.

Company A, which has training centers in Idaho Falls, Pocatello and Montpelier, is commanded by First Lieut. Corwin N. Lott, Idaho Falls. Platoons in company A include laundry, bath, graves-registration and company headquarters, in Idaho Falls; supply platoon, Pocatello, and maintenance, Montpelier.

Company B, which trains in

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Twin Falls and Burley, is commanded by Capt. Thane Johnson, 1761 Conant avenue, Burley. Platoons in company B are supply and laundry-bath, both in Twin Falls, and graves-registration and maintenance, both in Burley.

MEER, Colo., Aug. 24 (AP)—Twenty-two sticks of dynamite exploded while four men worked on a failed truck preparing it for use in casing a northwestern Colorado oil well.

The blast "blew the men to pieces," undersheriff Bob Kracht said.

An oil company representative discovered the bodies yesterday. Kracht said the tragedy may have occurred either Friday or Saturday.

Strung along the bank of Piceance creek, 50 miles southwest of Meeker, were the 22 dynamite sticks.

The men, all from Vernal, Utah, were Charles McConkin, 33, Duane McConkin, 16, Robert Ring, 27, and Houtz Ross, 44.

Police Seek Clues to Gem State Slaying

COEUR D'ALENE, Aug. 24 (AP)—Authorities looked for clothing belonging to slain Susan Stewart, 17, Coeur d'Alene, today in hopes they could find clues leading to her killer.

At the same time, they awaited a pathological report on the autopsy of the girl's body, found floating face down in shallow waters of Lake Coeur d'Alene Saturday morning.

Fire Chief Joe Turk found the nude body of the girl while taking his family on a Saturday picnic to the rocky point jutting out into the scenic northern Idaho lake.

Searchers yesterday found some of the girl's clothing in a day-long search.

Mrs. Stewart had moved here from Pacific, Mo., only two months ago.

Authorities released a 25-year-old friend of the girl yesterday morning after questioning him Saturday night and administering a lie detector test.

BLM Crews Fight Idaho Range Fire

MOUNTAIN HOME, Aug. 24 (AP)—Fire fighters last night brought under control a desert range fire 15 miles northwest of here that burned 2,000 acres since its start about 2:30 p.m.

Bureau of land management officials said the 65-man crew managed to ring most of the fire burning in cheatgrass and sagebrush and finally forced it under control.

Strong winds which had fanned the flames out of control through the parched grass finally died down, allowing fire fighters to close in.

Cause of the blaze was not known. A lookout who spotted the fire said it appeared to spring up in the wasteland near the railroad tracks.

The fire spread from a small grass fire to more than 200 acres in less than an hour, then raced across the flat and grassy lands until it left a 2,000-acre charred mess by 9 p.m.

Mansfield Will Not Be Candidate

ATLANTIC CITY, Aug. 24 (AP)—Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana said today he is not a vice presidential candidate.

The Montana senator said in an interview at a hotel in Atlantic City, "from all indications Hubert Humphrey is in the lead, and I would certainly not count out Eugene McCarthy."

Mansfield said he would not be a candidate for vice president under any circumstances.

Q. I own a considerable number of series K, U. S. savings bonds. I am approaching retirement age and would like to exchange those bonds for series H, U. S. savings bonds. It was through your column that I learned that it is possible to make such an exchange and postpone any federal income tax "bite" on the interest that has built up on any E bonds.

A. However, I wish you would clarify the rate of interest paid on H bonds. You wrote that H bonds pay interest "at the annual rate of 3 1/2 percent if held to maturity." What is considered maturity?

A. Series H, U. S. savings bonds, mature 10 years after their issue date. So if you buy a series H bond, it matures 10 years later.

Series H bonds are "current income bonds." When you own one, you receive interest every six months—in a check which comes to you through the mail from the U. S. treasury department.

That's where they differ from series E bonds—on which the interest builds up and which you don't collect until you cash your E bonds.

On series H bonds, the interest payments start low and then build up.

For instance, if you buy a series H bond, the interest will be 3 1/2 percent for the first year. Utilizing scenic attractions of the area will not only attract travelers but will draw tourists here, Bowler believes.

Woman Has Still-Born Septuplets

UPPALA, Sweden, Aug. 24 (AP)—A 30-year-old woman recently gave birth to still-born septuplets, Uppala university hospital said today.

A hospital spokesman said the woman had been treated with hormones to correct an inability to become pregnant.

The report of the septuplets was first made in London, yesterday by Prof. Carl A. Gemzell, who developed the hormone treatment. He gave no exact date of the miscarriage and declined to reveal the name of the mother.

Gemzell said all seven were properly developed, though they were very small. He said he had found one similar case in medical literature dating back to 1894. In that case, all seven babies were born alive but all died within a few hours, he said.
