

T.F. County Fair Will Open Gates For 4-Day Run

FILER, Sept. 1.—Preparations were going ahead full blast Tuesday at the Twin Falls county fairgrounds here for the opening of the four-day county fair Wednesday. Judging began Tuesday in the antique and needlework department. Displays were entered today in the produce business, where fruit, flowers and produce are shown. Fair officials said judging also is under way in the juvenile department and judging of live stock will begin Wednesday morning. All livestock will be entered by tonight. Despite damp weather the fairgrounds were a beehive of activity as merchants readied last details on their booths in the merchants building and hundreds of 4-H and FFA youths were bringing their livestock projects to be judged.

A rodeo will be presented each of the four nights of the fair, through Saturday night, by Earl Hutchinson, Gannett.

Riding clubs from throughout Magic Valley will perform each night at the rodeo, with the Bull and Twin Falls Junior riding clubs Wednesday; Twin Falls County sheriff's mounted posse, Thursday; Filer Wranglers, Friday, and the Jerome county mounted sheriff's posse Saturday.

Several new facilities have been constructed this year, including new barns, and parking facilities also have been enlarged.

An increased number of 4-H entries and FFA livestock entries are expected this year, according to Donald York, county agent.

Donna York, county agent, said the fair will be held at the rodeo arena Saturday afternoon.

Negroes Held For Slaying Of Patrolman

RAEFORD, N.C., Sept. 1 (UPI)—Two Negroes were charged Tuesday with slaying a North Carolina highway patrolman who attempted to arrest one of them late yesterday.

Thompson W. T. Herbin's body was found in a cornfield off U.S. 40 near his patrol car. He had been shot three times in the forehead, with bullets fired from his own revolver.

Rae Ford Police Officer L. W. Stanton said Willie Smith, Jr., about 35, confessed to the slaying. Smith and Herbin were hitch-hiking on the highway when Stanton stopped them. Smith and Herbin were taken to nearby Moore county.

All were held without bond pending a hearing in Rae Ford on Sept. 2.

It was believed the trooper had stopped Smith's car for a routine investigation. Stanton said Herbin apparently tried to arrest Smith after finding him intoxicated.

Stanton said Smith told officers the trooper stopped their car about 13 miles north of Rae Ford. Herbin, 32, tried to argue, Smith, who had been drinking, said, "I have come to the conclusion that an agreed solution, at least for the moment, is out of the question."

Kennedy Is "Adopted" by N.Y. Demos

NEW YORK, Sept. 1 (UPI)—Atty. Gen. Rockefeller said today that he was "adopted" by the New York Democratic state organization, paying the way for his nomination for the U.S. senate.

The state committee overwhelmingly gave its legal approval to Kennedy so that he can become the party's senatorial nominee. The nomination will be made later today at the state convention.

The committee vote was 232 to 49, with nine members absent and not voting.

Rep. Samuel S. Stratton, D., N.Y., the attorney general's only rival for the Democratic nomination, opposed the committee action on grounds Kennedy is an outsider who will be unable to vote.

Stratton told the committee it was establishing a dangerous precedent and violating the intent of the U.S. Constitution. He said it would open the way for other non-residents to "run in any of our 50 states."

Commandos Raze Cuban Radar Station

PANAMA, Sept. 1 (UPI)—Nine anti-Castro commandos have destroyed a Soviet-directed radar station on Cuba's southwestern coast, a Cuban exile leader said last night.

Manuel Artiles announced his raiders struck from two torpedo boats and that all got away safely.

He said he didn't know whether the station or Cuban soldiers were killed during the raid early Sunday morning.

But, he declared, "we have known since we can pull the tail of the Russian radar station was defended by a garrison of 150 Cuban soldiers and three Soviet officers. The station was selected, he said, because it was used to detect Cuban fleeing ships coming by boat, especially those coming from Oriente and Camaguey provinces.

Artiles asserted that once the radar was spotted, speedy Soviet-built patrol boats were sent to attack it. He said the boats usually were commanded by a Russian and the refugees were always shot to death while crouching in their boats.

He said the radar station was located on a small island off the coast of Cabo Cruz, at the western tip of the southern coast of Oriente province.

Artiles spoke at the home of a Cuban friend here in Panama, where he was leaving Panama for his headquarters in the Caribbean, but declined to say where it is.

Artiles, 35, was a leader of the abortive Bay of Pigs invasion of 1961.

Marine Advisers Will Be Sent to South Viet Nam

CAMP PENDLETON, Calif., Sept. 1 (UPI)—An unspecified number of U.S. marine advisers will be sent to South Viet Nam to help with the conflict with the communists, according to Gen. Wallace M. Green, Jr., marine corps commander.

In a news conference yesterday, Gen. Green announced the marines would be sent to help U.S. forces in the fight. He did not say how many or when.

Thant Sees No Hope for Cyprus Crisis Solution

GENEVA, Sept. 1 (UPI)—U.S. Secretary General Thant said today he saw no hope for a solution of the Cyprus crisis in the near future.

Leaving for New York, Thant said he had met with representatives of the power in the crisis. "I have come to the conclusion that an agreed solution, at least for the moment, is out of the question," he said.

Thant said he felt U.S. forces should remain in the area for at least three months after their present commitment ends on Sept. 26. He said the government of North Vietnam wants it, and the United Nations obtains the necessary funds.

Corral Blaze Fatal To Gooding Farmer

GOODING, Sept. 1.—Francis Earl Strickland, 49, died about 4 p.m. Monday at his farm southwest of Gooding of asphyxiation and a possible heart attack, according to Sheriff Verne Royce. Mr. Strickland was burning stubble and weeds on his place when the wind blew the flames into a haystack and corral. He had driven his tractor close to the blaze to spray the flames when he apparently was overcome by the fumes. Dr. B. A. Bodmer, Gooding county coroner, was called to the scene with Sheriff Royce and reported there will be no inquest. The fire department was called and the fire was extinguished with little damage reported.

2 Mercenaries Are Killed in Congo Fight

ELISABETHVILLE, The Congo, Sept. 1 (UPI)—Two white mercenaries were killed and one was seriously wounded in fighting with rebel forces around Albertville, according to reports reaching here today.

This amounted to a mercenary casualty rate of 25 per cent.

The three missing men were presumed drowned when their raft capsized on Lake Tanganyika.

The casualty report was received in Elisabethville by former British army Major Michael Moore, chief of the 30 mercenaries fighting alongside the Congolese army.

The army recaptured Albertville from the forces of Fekindé, a rebel leader, after a two-day battle over the weekend.

The two seriously wounded mercenaries were said to have been part of the army force which attacked the Albertville air strip.

Moore indicated that he had led 22 men in small rafts and dugout canoes in a landing on the Lake Tanganyika shoreline near Albertville. Seven other mercenaries were killed in the attack on the airstrip.

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Goldwater Settles Down To Politics

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 1 (UPI)—Sen. Barry Goldwater settled down today to the business of politics after a week's sun-and-sea vacation off the California coast.

The Republican presidential nominee flew by chartered helicopter from Newport Beach to Los Angeles to tape campaign television appearances.

Newsmen were not permitted to attend the actual taping session.

Goldwater, who said he wouldn't shave while at sea and didn't, did so before he arrived at the studio.

A heavy stubble of vacation beard on his face and a blue waxing comb in his hand, the Arizona senator cruised back to Newport Beach last night aboard the borrowed motor yacht Sundance.

"Abe Lincoln did all right in a beard," Goldwater told news photographers as he escorted his wife ashore at the Balboa Bay Club.

6 Are Killed Monday in Idaho Traffic

Idaho's mounting 1964 traffic death toll wound at 105 today with the deaths of a 25-year-old Idaho woman in a two-car accident near Boise and a 56-year-old Idaho man in a single car crash near Rigby.

Altogether six persons died in four Idaho accidents yesterday, making it one of the worst days of the year on the highways. The toll at this time a year ago was 127.

Cliff Bybee, 56, Menan, was thrown from his car after a collision with a truck. The driver, Clifford O. Roberts, also of Menan, when it hit a cement bridge and crossed a county road into a borrow pit near Rigby. He was found dead under the car.

The other accident was six miles east of Boise on U.S. highway 30.

Myrna J. Ries, 22, was killed in a shattering head-on collision between a 1962 Ford Mustang and a 1961 Chevrolet on U.S. highway 30.

William George Anderson, 23, Spokane, and William E. Sutton, 35, Orofino, died when their cars collided on U.S. highway 22, on a curve and rolled over 12 miles east of Arco.

John W. Arold, 76, Pocatello, died instantly, and Edwin Clifton McKenney, 51, Idaho Falls, died two hours after their cars collided at the junction of state highways 48 and 49 near Idaho Falls.

State police said Mike Ries was alone in her car when it collided with one driven by Buff Sgt. Haines, 34, Mountain Home, as the young woman was attempting to pass another vehicle.

Officers said Mike Ries was en route to Provo, Utah, with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Ries, Ephrata, Wash.

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Social Security's Health Care Plan Nears Senate Okay

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1 (UPI)—The emotion charged issue of health care for the aged, financed through social security, moved today toward a showdown in the senate. A compromise bill combining a version of President Johnson's long-stalled medicare program with a seven-dollar-a-month increase in cash social security benefits seemed assured of a vote this election year. The combination bill was worked out in behind-the-scenes leadership conferences late Monday and was specifically tailored to overcome house resistance.

Khanh Hopes to Take Up His Duties Soon

SAIGON, South Viet Nam, Sept. 1 (UPI)—Premier Nguyen Khanh said today he hopes to be ready to return to Saigon and take up his duties in about two weeks.

Khanh met with Western newsmen at the resort city of Da Nang where he has been convalescing in the wake of the riots and governmental upheaval which ended his one-man rule last week and left at least 31 persons dead. U.S. Ambassador Maxwell D. Taylor visited Khanh at Da Nang yesterday and later issued a statement saying the prime minister hoped to return to Saigon in "the next few days."

But Khanh told the newsmen he could be more like "two weeks" before he is ready to go back.

Khanh's statement came as Buddhist leaders in Saigon pledged a two-month ban on the rioting which has swept the country for more than two weeks.

Texans Wait For Help in Sickness War

HOUSTON, Sept. 1 (UPI)—Houston waited today for help from the federal government in its battle against an outbreak of deadly sleeping sickness.

So far, three deaths have been confirmed due to the disease. It is suspected that 10 other deaths and 430 suspected cases have been reported.

City Health Director Dr. C. A. Riggall said the disease, run by the U.S. public health service, should be available within the next few days, providing help in diagnosing cases and possibly in tracing the cause of the outbreak.

Student leaders made a similar two-month pledge yesterday. Since students and Buddhists were the chief rioters, South Viet Nam appeared to be assured of breathing space.

Civil peace was badly needed to restore the chain of command in the civil war against the communist Viet Cong guerrillas before the communists unroll an expected all-out offensive.

The immediate cause for the rioting was Khanh's assumption of emergency powers. Last week he stepped down, left the government in charge of Harvard.

Negro Cult Leader Jailed, Arms Seized

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 1 (UPI)—A slightly built Negro who bills himself as Shaykh Muhammad, leader of the "Black Nationalists," was arrested and held in \$10,000 bail last night as police delved into the causes of a three-day riot which devastated the "black belt" of North Philadelphia. Muhammad was identified by police as Abayssina Hayes, 33, who had been thrown out of the Black Muslims because he was "too militant."

Deputy Police Commissioner Frank Rizzo said Muhammad formed his own black supremacy group which he called "the only true freedom fighters."

The suspect who wears a turban and sports a goatee and thin mustache, was arrested in a police raid on his African-Asian cultural center in the heart of the riot-ravaged area where more than 2,000 Negroes gathered and vandalized during the week-end.

Rizzo said a steel billy club, a brick with a rope tied around it, a loaded .22-caliber automatic, a five-gallon drum of inflammable fluid and several empty bottles with ropes tied in the necks were confiscated. The deputy commissioner said the fluid and bottles were the ingredients of "Molotov cocktails."

Muhammad insisted that the fluid was a cleaning preparation he used in the "clearing" establishment he operated next door to his black national headquarters. Fire Capt. Joseph Doyle of the fire marshal's office testified it was highly inflammable. A chemical analysis of the fluid was ordered.

Mayor James H. Tate announced during the night that the area around the center was "extremely quiet" tonight with even less activity than normally occurs. But the mayor continued in force a 24-hour curfew in the area and said that it may extend through the Labor day week-end.

The 1,300-mm police riot force remained on duty in the area, and state liquid stores stayed closed by official decree. However, about 35 of the looted stores were reopened for business.

Dist. Atty. James C. Crumlish, Jr., said "organized outside agitators" had opened the rioting but he would not specify any groups. He promised prosecution of anyone accused of vandalism and looting.

White Jury to Hear Trial in Negro Death

DANIELSVILLE, Ga., Sept. 1 (UPI)—Attorneys selected a 12-man, all-white jury yesterday to hear two Ku Klux Klansmen tried on charges of murdering a Washington, D.C., Negro educator.

Cecil W. Williams, 25, and Joseph Howard Myers, 41, went on trial before Judge Carey Skelton for the July 13 night-ride slaying of "Emuel" Penn on a fog-shrouded highway in north-west Georgia.

Defense attorneys dismissed after brief questioning the only two Negroes on the prospective jury list of 90 persons. Both had been accepted by the prosecution for the death penalty case.

Most of the jurors the attorneys agreed on were middle-aged farmers, merchants and plant workers. Cooks and a half-hour and 72 prospective jurors, for a jury to be selected.

Judge Skelton severed the trial of Myers and Sims from the case against another Klansman, James B. Lackey, 30. All three are from Athens, Ga., and were arrested Aug. 6 along with Hubert, Guest of Athens, who is being held as an accessory after the fact.

An attorney for Lackey filed a motion in federal court yesterday to suppress alleged confessions and testimony given by Lackey to the FBI, implicating the others.

Teachers Believe Children Are More Unruly Than Ever

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1 (AP)—Increasingly difficult to maintain discipline included 62 per cent of those with 20 or more years experience, 44 per cent of those with 10-19 years, and only 2 per cent of those with five or less years in the classroom. That was indicated in the results of a poll of teachers conducted by the research division of the National Education Association. It was published yesterday in the NEA Journal.

Teachers were asked: "Based on your answer on your personal experience, do you believe that maintaining pupil discipline has become more difficult than when you first started teaching?"

Forty-five per cent said it was more difficult, 31 per cent said about the same, 20 per cent said less difficult, one per cent was undecided.

However, a different pattern emerged when the replies were broken down into years of experience. Those who said it had grown

more difficult in the five- to nine-year group. The NEA Journal said it may be that there is a significant change taking place in American children which the more experienced teachers have had more time to observe.

Or, it said, the figures may reflect a kind of nostalgia in which present problems tend to appear larger in the minds of

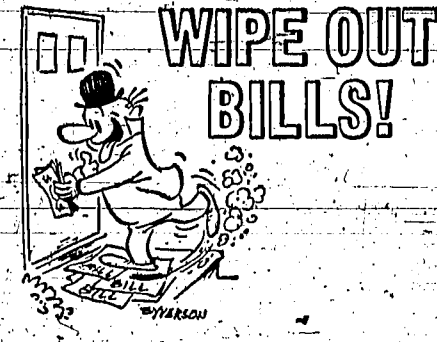

Streamliner Derailed in California

ROSEVILLE, Calif., Sept. 1 (AP) — An east-bound Southern Pacific streamliner, the City of San Francisco, was derailed last night just as it pulled out of the station at Roseville, Calif.

Eight cars of the 21-car train left the tracks. None of the cars tipped over but three injured persons were taken to the Roseville Community Hospital.

The train was derailed by a switch that failed to lock. The seven cars behind it also left the track in a snake-like fashion weaving back and forth across the tracks, witnesses reported.

Southern Pacific officials repaired the damage to the track by this morning.

It was the second derailment of a Southern Pacific train in two days in northern California. Today 15 cars of an SP freight train left the tracks in Red Bluff, Calif., and knocked over three others on a siding.

Worldwide Famine Near, Says Scientist

CHICAGO, Sept. 1 (AP) — A world famine "writing in the sky" could be a reality in a matter of months, a scientist said today.

"It will be the most colossal catastrophe in history," declared Dr. Raymond D. Ewell, vice president for research, State University of New York at Buffalo.

Such a famine in Asia, Africa and South America by the 1970's and later seems almost inevitable as expanding population and depletion of food resources threaten the American Chemical Society.

Dr. Ewell said the only immediate step open to avert it is for the United States and Europe to begin exporting food and fertilizer to millions of tons of fertilizers to increase local food yields.

The deadline even for success in this way is only a few years.

Birth control is the ultimate answer, Dr. Ewell said, but its effects on the food-population problem will be slow. Unless birth control is applied, however, the famine would still come regardless of boosts in food production, he said.

By present trends, "it seems likely that the famine will reach its peak in the 1970's in India, Pakistan and China in the early 1970's, followed by Indonesia, Iran, Turkey, Egypt and several other countries within a few years," he said.

Population in these areas will be about 2 billion by the year 20 years, but food output has not been increasing, he said.

British Actor Is Divorced

SANTA MONICA, Calif., Sept. 1 (AP) — The British actor, Sean Connery, was divorced yesterday by his wife, Pamela, after the couple agreed to a million-dollar property settlement.

The settlement, which was not made public, was reported to have given in excess of one million dollars in community property to each party.

Superior Judge Mervyn Agnew granted the divorce to the 45-year-old Mr. Connery, who had charged her actor husband with desertion and extreme mental cruelty. An earlier charge of adultery was dropped.

The couple were married 32 years ago and separated in 1962. Mr. Connery, 56, now lives in Switzerland.

Mrs. Connery was awarded custody of the couple's two children, 10 and 12, and Morgan.

Siren at Hansen Moved to Tower

HANSEN, Sept. 1 (AP) — The siren which is blown for curfew and to call together the volunteer fire department members has been moved from the top of the village office to the top of the water tower, where it can be heard more readily by more of the town residents, according to Leonard Drieel, chief of the volunteer fire department.

The switch for the alarm has been changed to the left side of the door of the fire-truck garage from the front of the village office where it had been for many years.

Hutcheson said the President had been "efficiently" reelected in the White House since the assassination of President John F. Kennedy.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1 (U.P.)—The FBI reports a 16 per cent increase in serious crime in the United States the first half of this year.
