





## Enrollment In Minidoka Totals 4,768

RUPERT, Sept. 3—Schools in Minidoka county opened Monday with a record enrollment, according to school officials.

Total enrollment in the county is 4,768, with enrollment at Minidoka high school, 457; last year's figures show a total of 4,032 students enrolled at the beginning of the school year.

Acacia elementary school, grades one through six, has an enrollment total of 209; Mayburn enrollment grades one through eight, is 677; Lincoln school, grades four through six, with an additional special education class enrolling 12, is 310; Memorial elementary school, grades one through three, has 310 students enrolled.



2. The same exercises would be valuable in rehabilitation of patients hospitalized for long periods by injury or disease.

When Steve Ellerson, 19, ended four weeks of supervised bed rest in a campus residence, he admitted he had "one real craving."



## Idaho's Fire Control Costs Were Cut in Half This Year

BOISE, Sept. 2—State and federal fire control officers felt a bit of autumn air yesterday as the lookouts were being hauled away from mountain tops and the fire prevention crews were cut-in-half this year.

In late spring, rains, heavy snows, mud slides and possible early fires were blamed for the fire fighters this season. But this year, the lookouts are still crossed. An outstanding example of a light fire season are some figures from state forester Roger Chernesky. His department spent \$40,000 less this year in suppression against only \$5,000 this year.

Only the bureau of land management, responsible for the backcountry, has fire lookouts still posted. The state and the U. S. forestry service have pulled all their lookouts off and have temporarily closed the 1,004 fire stations. The BLM will keep lookouts posted on the low dry lands for another month.

The fire season ordinarily lasts through October.

"It's been a cool and wet summer all the way through," said Chernesky. "We had a late spring, grass and shrubbery never did dry out. These rains seem fall-like and way ahead of schedule."

Robert Baker, Boise national forest fire dispatcher, said there is a chance of a late Indian summer and he's looking for a

fire in state and private lands numbered only 228 this year compared to 503 last year. The U. S. forestry service in Boise national forest for example, suffered 146 fires this year compared to 224 last year. About 40 acres have burned compared to 1,500 acres last year.

The BLM reported only 80 fires in southern Idaho this year compared to a yearly average from 180-200. The Boise district of the BLM lost 10,000 acres to fire this year, against 10,000 acres last year," according to BLM fire control officer Bud Holbrook.

"It's quite possible there will be a let-up," Holbrook said. "Our strength is being reduced considerably, but we stay prepared anyway, even though it's been a mild fire season."



## News Around Idaho

### Horse Racing Schedule Set For Rupert

RUPERT, Sept. 2—Plans have been completed for the horse racing program at the Minidoka County fair Thursday through Saturday, according to Marvin Steinlech, chairman of the county fair board.

A horse racing program has been set up for Labor day at the fairgrounds.

Nine races are expected to be run each day of the meet on the new race track which was built this year and patterned after the one in Pomona, Los Angeles county, Calif.

The race will include at least one "Appaloosa" race, each day with the remaining races devoted to quarter horses and thoroughbreds.

The races will run throughout according to Steinlech, with quarter horses running in terms of yards while thoroughbreds will run in furlongs or one and one-half miles.

According to Steinlech some 200 horses are expected coming from Montana, Colorado, Oregon, Washington, California and well as Idaho.

The commercial building located on the fairgrounds has been remodeled to provide for betting at the track. Races will get under way at 2 p.m. daily so that the races will not interfere with the morning judging of livestock and exhibits at the fair.

### Baltimore May Be Next Riot Target

BALTIMORE, Sept. 2 (UPI)—Gov. J. Millard Tawes and Mayor Theodore R. McKeldin said yesterday they may move in to make Baltimore the next target of racial rioting, looting and violence.

They released the joint statement at a news conference called late in the afternoon. The Baltimore mayor said he and the governor got their information from a reliable source whom they declined to identify.

Rioting and looting by Negroes in recent weeks have caused millions of dollars worth of damage to businesses and have driven hundreds of people in New York City, Rochester, N. Y., Chicago, and over the past week end in Philadelphia.

MOSCOW, Sept. 2 (UPI)—A series of civil defense courses and conferences taught through the University of Idaho civil defense program will begin Tuesday. The first class will be a shelter managers course for persons who will later be teachers of shelter managers. Warren W. Ilanian, coordinator for the civil defense program at the university, said classes will be conducted in the evening hours. He also said 23 civil defense conferences for local leaders and interested citizens have been scheduled throughout the state. Present plans call for the first one to be held in Wallace Sept. 15.

BOCATELLO, Sept. 2 (UPI)—Fifth district court considered yesterday a request that a grand jury murder indictment against Art DeGrazia be dropped. The defense attorney for four men charged in the July 16 slaying of James E. Dwyer, maintained, in court which returned the indictment, that it was merely for the H. A. McAvitt, said the grand jury, was a select group especially chosen instead of being drawn at random. The defendants, Eugene Kennedy, 44; Harvey W. Fulver, 22; Edward A. King, 24, are being held without bond. The two women are represented by Ben Peterson. All six were captured in the hills near Lake Hot Springs in southeastern Idaho after a widespread manhunt.

BOISE, Sept. 2 (UPI)—The number of visitors to Yellowstone park, considered a good barometer for Idaho, is running 75,000 ahead of a year ago. Louise Shadduck, head of the department of commerce and development, said the figure is up five per cent over a year ago and 12,000 ahead of the record year, 1962.

BOISE, Sept. 2 (UPI)—The department of commerce and development started a request yesterday for managers of ski areas in Idaho to provide up-to-date information on their facilities. Louis Shadlock, head of the department, said the information is needed for a new folder that is being prepared to meet the demand for information on Idaho ski areas. She noted that Argosy, one of the nation's largest selling magazines for men, and Glamour, a national magazine appealing to young women, have asked the department for information to be used in articles on Idaho skiing that will appear in fall and winter issues. Miss Shadlock also noted yesterday that 30 Idaho events will be spotlighted in the national listing of events in the September issue of Amusement Business, whose business internationally circulated trade magazine. She said Idaho events are regularly listed in the department's detailed Idaho calendar of events.

BOISE, Sept. 2 (UPI)—Boise Cascade corporation has announced its entry into new packaging field with the purchase of Thermoplastic Industries, Inc., a producer of thermoplastic products, plastic film products, machinery and instrumentation used in complex packaging. Don J. Black, director of development for Boise Cascade, said yesterday terms of the purchase would not be disclosed. The plastic film production of packaging will be in addition to Boise Cascade's 17 corrugated shipping container plants and multiwall paper bag operations and a folding carton plant. Cascade also produces lumber, plywood and paper and distributes building materials.

Then matching funds of \$225,000 in U.S. Burton federal funds were to be sought, for a total of \$1,550,000 to build the new hospital. The 45-year-old structure is operating under a provisional certificate granted by the board of health.



## Results of Autopsy in Slaying Noted

## Goldwater Raps Johnson On Viet Nam

PHOENIX, Ariz., Sept. 2 (UPI)—Republican presidential candidate Barry Goldwater last night sharply criticized President Johnson on Viet Nam and in domestic affairs, saying it was time for the Republicans to "pore along and pull the country out" of problems created by the Democrats.

"I don't declare the Democratic party a party of war, but by coincidence it's doing along and pull the country out," Goldwater told an enthusiastic crowd of 1,000 persons at Sky Harbor airport last night. "And that's what we want to do now."

En route to Washington to speak on Senate slowdown against President Johnson's medicare program, Goldwater's brief stop here was intended only to formally accept delivery of a Boeing 727 campaign plane. But he took advantage—48 hours in advance of his first official campaign address—of the opportunity to take on President Johnson on Viet Nam, the Bobby Baker case and Billy Sol Estes, among others.

President Johnson is worried about Viet Nam and would like to sweep it under the rug, the senator said in the presence of his 90-year-old mother, Mrs. Vail Fannin and other dignitaries. "But he can't because Bobby Baker and the hi fi set are already there."

Goldwater said he intended to raise the administration's foreign policy, the Billy Sol Estes scandal, and the Bobby Baker case as issues in the campaign.

"Do you want the continuation of this administration? Do you want to be only member tucked away in a government office? Do you want a constitutional government or a constitutional republic, as envisioned by our forefathers?"

Goldwater made his decision to go East to vote on medicare earlier in Los Angeles, where he spent the day filming spot television segments for use later in the campaign.
