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## Mac Arthur's Tomb Visited By President

NORFOLK, Va., Oct. 5 (AP)—Philipine President Diosdado Macapagal, an ex-guerrilla fighter, stood at the tomb of Gen Douglas MacArthur yesterday in solemn tribute to the old soldier on behalf of all Philipines.

The president placed a wreath of yellow and orange chrysanthemums on the tomb of the hero of the Philippines.

Macapagal then stepped back from the railing that circles the tomb and stood silently with his eyes lowered, while a bugle played taps.

A pace or two behind him stood the first lady and their daughter, Gloria.

Thus, the president began his first official visit to the eastern seaboard after a smooth flight from San Francisco, Va. to spend Sunday night before flying to Washington this morning to talk with President Johnson.

## Osborn Youth, 17, Is Killed In Auto Mishap

## TV Companies Set Record

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5 (AP)—A television trade publication reported yesterday that the three major television networks and the stations they own earned record 156.3 million dollars before taxes in 1963.

The publication, which is the Columbia Broadcasting System (CBS), earned 73 million dollars, the National Broadcasting company (NBC) 61.8 million dollars, and American Broadcasting company (ABC) 11.5 million dollars.

Over-all, the Digest said, the three networks earned 223 per cent more last year than they did in 1962.

It said the profit figures were obtained "from very reliable New York sources."

**WEATHER SYNOPSIS**  
On the latest weather map, only areas of some high thin clouds are occurring in the Intermountain region as a large area of high pressure at the surface covers the western two-thirds of the nation. Slightest pressure covers the central United States but this high extends westward covering most of the western states.

Warm days and cool nights are resulting from this weather pattern as shown by 70 degree daytime readings and upper 20's to low 30 degree readings in cooler spots at night over the valley.

Minimum temperatures tonight ranged from a low of 22 at Fairfield to 42 degree reading at Buhl.

Well established high pressure in the upper levels over the western United States will continue to give fair skies to the valleys of southern Idaho for the next few days. Storms will be held out of the valley and temperatures will be in the 50's.

Maximum temperatures in the mid 70's into the 80's are forecast for today and Tuesday. Minimum temperatures tonight will be mostly in the 30's in southeastern and southcentral valleys and in the upper 30's to mid 40's in southwestern valleys. Freezing temperatures in changes partly in cooler spots of southwestern valleys with frost in colder spots in Magic Valley are expected tonight.

**FIVE-DAY FORECAST**  
High pressure built at the surface and aloft is expected to be the dominant weather feature over the western two-thirds of the nation through Saturday. High pressure at the surface will be weakening into the end of the week.

Temperatures over these valleys, as a result of high pressure and large amounts of sunshine will average from 4 to 8 degrees above normal through Saturday. Daytime temperatures will show greater departure above normal. Nighttime temperatures will moderate slowly but will continue to be into the end of the week.

A warming trend the first of the week will slow down and remain little changed during mid week with slight cooling into the weekend. Normal temperatures for this period are in the 50's to 60's. High temperatures in the mid 70's into the 80's are forecast for today and Tuesday. Minimum temperatures tonight will be mostly in the 30's in southeastern and southcentral valleys and in the upper 30's to mid 40's in southwestern valleys. Freezing temperatures in changes partly in cooler spots of southwestern valleys with frost in colder spots in Magic Valley are expected tonight.

Farm activities will be much favored weatherwise through the week with warm days and large amounts of sunshine. Harvesting of most crops can be accomplished with success during this time. Final irrigation of sugar beets and other crops in progress will be done under favorable conditions. The dry weather pattern continues to be a problem in dry land areas where soil moisture supplies are short. However, most fall seedlings appear to be germinating well.

at Ford and Chrysler in September.

These called for higher pensions as an earlier retirement incentive, longer vacations, added holidays and other fringes.

From Ford and GM the union gained what UAW President Walter P. Reuther referred to as "floating" on the Chrysler cake in the form of a Christmas bonus tied to the level of the company's supplemental unemployment benefit fund.

Both local and national issues had stymied settlement. Reuther told newsmen the tentative agreement included a 7 million dollar-a-year provision for equalization of wages on various job classifications. He said some 2,400 local grievances automatically would move up to the national level for bargaining because they involve wage inequity demands.

Reuther said whether the few locals which have solved their demands would return to work immediately, Reuther said there were hardly enough local settlements at this point to make any difference in the strike picture.

Latest reports showed only 12 of the 160 bargaining units have resolved their problems.

## Super Highway Is Inaugurated by Italy Premier

FLORENCE, Italy, Oct. 5 (AP)—Premier Aldo Moro yesterday inaugurated Italy's 400-mile "Autostrada del Sole" (Superhighway of the Sun) linking Milan and Naples.

The superhighway cost 270 billion lire (435.2 million dollars) and took some eight years to complete.

The inauguration marked the opening of the final 41-kilometer (25-mile) Chiasso-Oriente stretch and completion of the entire 755-kilometer project.

Moro, in an inaugural address, expressed the hope that the "Autostrada del Sole" would play a major role in the "economic-unification" of the nation.

## Two Injured In Collision West of Buhl

BURL, Oct. 5—Two Washington residents were hospitalized when their car was demolished in an accident at 7:05 p.m. Sunday on highway 30.

Being treated in Magic Valley Memorial hospital are Dennis B. Pauley, 31, Seattle, severe head lacerations and chest injuries, and Ethel Pennington, 20, Seattle, back and chest injuries. The hospital reported the condition of both was satisfactory Monday morning.

The accident occurred when Pauley, driving a 1964 Ford and traveling east, collided head-on with a 1955 two-ton Chevrolet truck owned by Carson Jones, traveling west. The truck was operated by Charles J. Janoson, 42, Twin Falls.

Investigating officers said the wrecker had pulled across the road facing eastbound traffic and stopped to hop onto a stalled 1958 Ford owned by Deane Dietrich of Twin Falls. The wrecker reportedly was partly on the roadway, but its red lights were flashing.

Officers were unable to determine why Pauley failed to see the flashing lights of the wrecker.

## Knudson Wins Fresno Open Playoff

FRESNO, Calif., Oct. 5 (AP)—Randy Canadian PGA champion George Knudson shot five-under-par 67 in his final round to overtake Al Balding on the 72nd hole in the \$25,000 Fresno Open.

Knudson, who had led the tournament Sunday and, in a sudden death playoff, dropped a birdie putt on the second playoff hole to beat out his fellow countryman for \$5,000 first prize money.

Coming up to the 72nd hole, a 160-yard par 5, the 34-year-old Torontonian chipped his third shot six feet from the pin. Balding failed to get under his 16-foot putt and Knudson sank for a birdie to even the match.

On the first extra hole of the playoff they tied in par four. One the second, a par four 415 yards, Balding pulled his tee shot into the rough to the left. Knudson, in good position down the middle, dropped his second eight-foot putt from the pin and took a birdie three for victory as Balding had to settle for par. Balding is from Markland Wood, a suburb of Toronto.

Knudson, who won the Canadian PGA championship year and already had banked \$700 in official tour winnings before taking first money here, steadily crept up on the 40-year-old Balding, who was unable to do better than par 72 Sunday.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 5 (AP)—Billy Pierce, San Francisco's long-time and successful pitcher, is hanging up his baseball uniform after 17 consecutive major league seasons.

Pierce, 37, said Saturday he has decided to retire from baseball and enter an automobile dealership in Illinois and Wisconsin.

"I've reached my goals," Pierce said. "I leave without a regret and with only fond memories."

Pierce came from the Chicago White Sox to the Yankees, then a pennant in 1962. His season record is 3-0 and his lifetime record is 211-152.

A lower federal court in Birmingham held the public accommodations section unconstitutional applied to Ollie's Barbecue. In the Atlanta motel case the lower court found the section did not violate the Constitution.

The section states that "all persons shall be entitled to full and equal enjoyment of goods, services, facilities, privileges, advantages and accommodations of any place of public accommodation, as defined in their section, without discrimination or segregation on the ground of race, color, religion or national origin."

The two appeals present the question how far the section reaches under the authority of congress to regulate interstate commerce. The interstate commerce power was the main legal basis behind congressional adoption of the section.

## Royal Family Has Trouble From Queen

ATHENS, Oct. 5 (AP) — Prince Peter of Greece said yesterday that Queen Mother Frederika has been causing trouble in the royal

family for the past 17 years. The 55-year-old prince made the statement at a rare news conference. He said he was forced "to air the family's dirty linen in public" by Frederika's recent actions. The queen mother is often at loggerheads with the Greek government, although Greek Premier George Papandreu rushed to her defense last week when some Athens newspapers called

her "a busybody." Frederika denied publicly that she planned to go into politics or would accept a sizable pension from the government as the widow of King Paul. Peter is a cousin of the late king and second cousin to Paul's son, the reigning King Constantine. His father was the late Prince George.

Shortly after Peter's talk with newsmen, Constantine and his bride returned to Athens from their honeymoon. The young king immediately called Papandreu into conference. "There are some difficulties with the Queen Mother dating back over the last 17 years and which have not ended," Peter told newsmen. "But now we have a new king and queen and I hope the matter will be settled."

## Grim U. N. Food Picture Given

ROME, Oct. 5 (AP) — Skyrocketing population has outstripped the increase in world food production in the past 13 months. Man-kind had less per person to eat, and almost everywhere food costs more. This was the grim picture painted today by the U.N. food and agriculture organization (FAO) in its 1964 annual report. It came against a background of recent food riots in tremulous India and the lengthening shadow of hunger over much of the rest of the world.

The actual over-all balance between population gain and food production increase may even be darker than FAO described. Its report contained no figures for Communist China, which has almost a fourth of the world's population.

The report said it appeared there were some increases in food production in mainland China during 1963-64, but it was unlikely the increases had kept abreast of China's population gain of 15 million a year.

Soviet Russia, with its massive population, had actual food production decreases in the past year. The FAO report for the year ended July 15, 1964, said world population had increased two per cent but food production had gone up slightly less than that. "After more significant than the single-year comparison was the fact that 'for five years now there has been no increase in world agricultural production per capita,'" the report added.

The past year, however, was the first time FAO has reported production gains actually below population increases. The increase in production were mostly in North America, four per cent, and Oceania, three per cent, both regions already

cutting well. In developing regions where malnutrition is wider spread, the gains were described as "very slight"—only one per cent in Latin America and two per cent in the Far East, excluding China.

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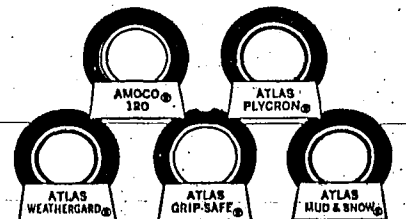
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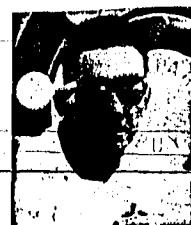
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## National Flower Show, Judging School Held

1 teaspoon vanilla

Combine sugar, milk, shortening, cocoa and salt in saucepan and bring to a boil slowly, stirring to dissolve sugar. Add mixture of quick-cooking oatmeal, coconut, nut meats and vanilla. Remove quickly and stir until thick enough to drop by teaspoon.

Drop by teaspoon onto waxed paper. Makes approximately 50 pieces.
