

Hurricane Zeroes on Carolinas

MIAMI, Oct. 15 (UPI)—Hurricane Ibbell, the season's most fierce storm, changed its course today and zeroed in on the Carolinas coast with 100-mile-an-hour winds. Hurricane warnings were hoisted at points in advance of crashing waves and heavy winds. Two years ago today Hurricane Hazel smashed into the North Carolina coast, killing 100 persons, injuring 300 and causing \$100 million dollars in property damage.

Nikita Khrushchev Reportedly Quits As Soviet Leader

MOSCOW, Oct. 15 (AP)—Usually reliable sources said today Premier Khrushchev has resigned. Leonid I. Brezhnev has taken over as first secretary of the communist party, the key job in this country, and Alexei Kosygin has become premier, the sources said. There was no official confirmation. Khrushchev's name was omitted tonight from an official list of Soviet leaders. The unexpected exit of Khrushchev from the dominant position in the Soviet Union which he has held for almost a decade was decided upon at a meeting of the party's central committee beginning Monday, the informants said. It was not clear just when the meeting ended and the decision came. The informants said Mikhail Suslov, a top aide of Joseph Stalin and the Kremlin's chief spokesman in its dispute with communist China, delivered the key report to the central committee.

The purpose of the visit by the astronaut is to speak to members of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce and citizens of Magic Valley at the annual Chamber of Commerce luncheon at 7:30 p.m. Friday in the Twin Falls high school cafeteria.

Contract Is Awarded for Meat Plant

GOODING, Oct. 15 — The Reynolds construction company, Twin Falls, has been awarded the contract for construction of the main building of the Stockmen's Meat Packing plant, Arnold, Idaho. The plant, which will be used for a cattle and sheep killing plant which will employ about 45 persons here. The \$200,000 plant will be operated by Stockmen's Meat Packing corporation on a leasehold basis. The plant is being built by Reynolds Industrial Development company.

Britain Votes for New Parliament

LONDON, Oct. 15 (AP)—Britain voted today for a new house of commons after the rowdiest campaign of modern times. The outcome, like the weather, was uncertain. Final public opinion polls yesterday promised the closest fight since 1950, when the Labor party won a six-seat majority in the house of commons. Leaders of both the Conservative and Labor parties made the usual predictions of victory, but all conceded the finish would be close. There was a possibility that the Liberal party, which had only seven members in the last parliament, would emerge with the balance of power.

Sawyer Says West Needs Rep. Harding

Nevada Gov. Grant B. Sawyer Wednesday night predicted that Nevada would deliver a lop-sided vote in favor of President Lyndon B. Johnson and called upon Democrats in his "home state" of Idaho to join the swelling tide. The former Twin Falls resident told a turnaway crowd at the American Legion hall that reelection of Congressman Ralph Harding was essential to the West, noting that Harding was the only Intermountain representative on the powerful house agriculture committee. The Nevada governor was keynote speaker at a banquet honoring Harding.

Demos Plan Mass Rally In Seattle

Washington's Democrats plan a mass rally in Seattle Sunday at which Franklin D. Roosevelt, Jr., under secretary of commerce, is expected to blast extremism.

The state's top Democrats, Governor Rosellini and Sens. Henry M. Jackson and Warren G. Magnuson, are scheduled to appear with Roosevelt and to discuss the same subject.

Meanwhile, Rosellini and Jackson trotted along the campaign trail. The governor, concentrated on the heavy Republican attack in the South and was to take part Wednesday afternoon in a door bell ringing campaign in Mountlake Terrace. Jackson, who visited the first and second congressional districts Tuesday, moved into southwest Washington Wednesday to end the day at a Jefferson-Jackson day dinner in Vancouver with Interior Secretary Stewart Udall.

Udall arrived in the state Tuesday predicting President Johnson would carry the entire West, including Sen. Barry Goldwater's home state of Arizona. Udall praised Jackson and Magnuson for their efforts in the field of conservation. Republicans were no less busy. Dan Evans, Republican candidate for governor, reiterated his charges that the state's economic health is poor. Campaigning in King county, Evans said "the regulatory roadblocks, tax increases and administrative hindrances to business that have been erected in the past eight years" should be relaxed.

He said the U.S. department of labor report of August showed Washington has made smaller gains in job-increases than 14 other coastal states. Evans also charged bankruptcies had increased 20 per cent in Washington in five years.

Republican Reps. Catherine May and Thomas Pelly stepped up their campaigns. Mrs. May told fourth district voters at Moses Lake "backlogs, job-hists, and failure by the secretary of agriculture to fulfill his responsibility to act in the best interest of the American farmer" were reasons the administration failed to enact legislation to help sugar beet farmers.

50 Missiles To Be Built In Montana

GREAT FALLS, Oct. 15 (AP)—Construction on the 60 million dollar project to place 50 additional Minuteman missiles in central Montana was scheduled to start in February.

Col. Rex Dowlin, commander of the 341st strategic missile wing, at Malmstrom air force base, revealed yesterday the corps of engineers was to start work digging the 50 silos north of Great Falls this month. He said work on the project would continue for three years.

Col. George F. Budway, base commander, said about 1,000 persons would be employed in putting the missiles into the ground. After they were installed, he said the military population at Malmstrom would be more than 6,000 persons.

Dowlin confirmed that the new squadron will be located on both sides of U.S. 91, with the center at Conrad.

The new missile complex, Dowlin said, assured Malmstrom of a more permanent status, at least to the early 1970's. He explained that the base has only a temporary status as an air force station and has undergone changes in classification.

The stability provided by the new squadron, he said, will allow the base to begin a \$500,000 program to improve facilities.

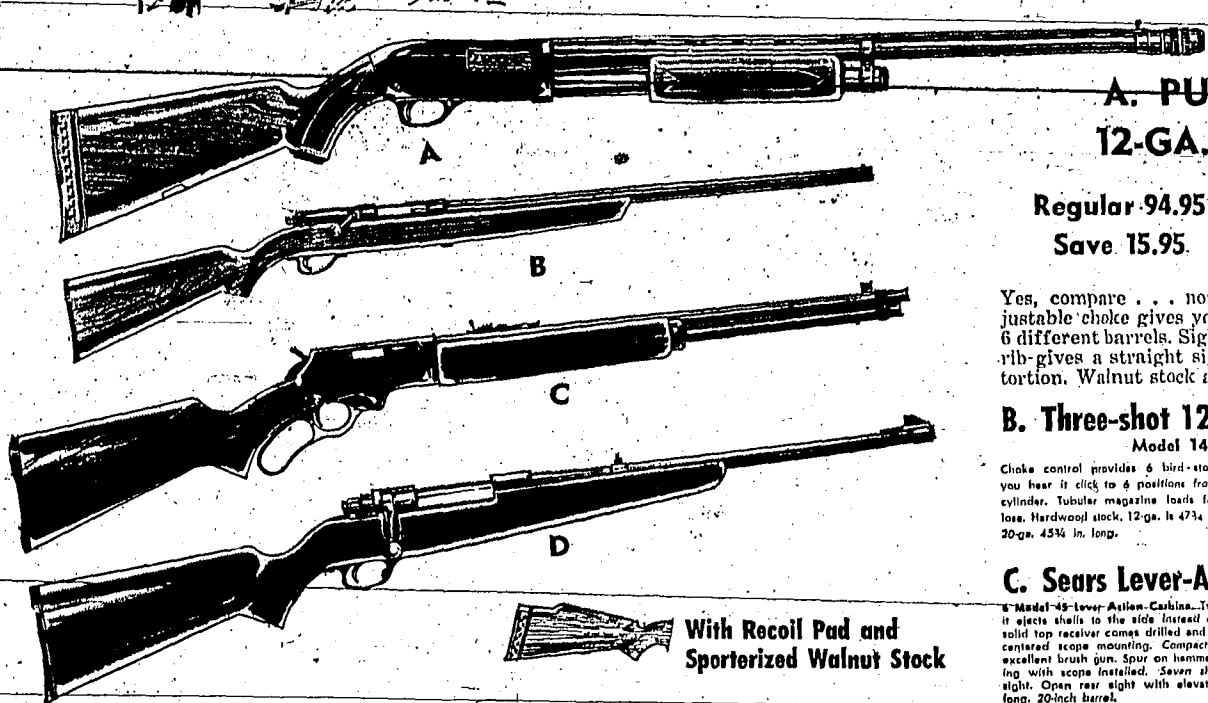

BOISE, Oct. 15 (AP)—The first spadeful of dirt was turned yesterday marking the beginning of construction of a new headquarters building for the Idaho fish and game department. Department offices now are housed in rented quarters in a number of buildings in Boise, with the headquarters at Fifth and Front streets, about six blocks from the capitol in downtown Boise. HINSDALE, Ill., Oct. 15 (AP)—About a similar system in Jacksonville, Fla. Officials of Hinsdale, a community of 16,000 west of Chicago, agreed to give it a try.

Sergeant Neukema decides which cases should go before the youth jury after analyzing the past record of the offender and holding a long interview with his parents.

The jury is basically self-rule. The youngsters learn to be more alert at accepting their own and more adept at accepting punishment from their own, Brown explained.

The jury does not rule on guilt or innocence. It passes sentences in cases presented to it. The fines are \$10. The fines are increased or tempered by Brown.

Republicans Work at Grassroots in South as Never Before, Survey Shows

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15 — Republicans are working at the grassroots level in the South as never before, an Associated Press survey shows.

But the same survey shows mixed effort by GOP workers elsewhere—warm support for the national ticket in some places, cool in others.

Democrats have been slow in reacting to the Republican challenge in the South. Elsewhere they are concentrating on registering friendly voters and, in some areas, trying to battle overconfidence.

These views stemmed from interviews with party leaders and precinct workers in more than 40 states. They are summed up best, perhaps, by the Arizona precinct worker who quipped, "It's a really funny year."

It's a year in which Republicans appear to have far and away the most active precinct organization in Georgia, a state which has never deserted the Democratic party.

It's a year in which a GOP precinct worker in always Republican Vermont says he doesn't know of a single town committee in his county working for the presidential nominee, Sen. Barry Goldwater.

And it's a year in which precinct activity in most states is reported at its highest level ever by one or both parties—against a background of reported voters apathy in some states.

Leaders in both parties say precinct activity, the efforts of grassroots party workers, is what spells victory or defeat in an election. They add this is especially true if the reports of voter apathy are translated into a light turnout on election day.

The tactics of precinct work are much the same regardless of party or state. Identify the voter. Get him registered. Work on the undecideds. And, come election day, get your man's supporters to the polls.

To find out how these efforts are going, Associated Press newsmen talked with scores of state, county and precinct leaders of both parties in more than 40 states.

The consensus: —In the South, particularly in the big cities, Republicans are organized as never before down

to the grassroots level. Democrats, long accustomed to clearing shop after their spring primaries, are slow in reacting.

Elsewhere across the country, Republican activity is closely tied to feelings about Goldwater. Party leaders in some areas report a dedicated zeal. In other areas leaders frankly admit they have lost party workers and are down-playing the nominee.

Democrats for the most part are concentrating on registering voters and taking advantage of their edge in registrations. But some openly express fears of overconfidence among their troops.

In historical terms, the Republican party's increased activity in the South may be the most important. For years the GOP structure was more name than fact. Now thousands of precinct workers are bent on the bushes, carrying the gospel of a two-party system.

Even Democrats say it's so.

An Arkansas Republican estimates 5,000 volunteers in the field working for Goldwater. Another group, working for gubernatorial candidate Winthrop Rockefeller, is reported to be even farther ahead in organization.

The GOP, always strong in the eastern third of Tennessee, has been lining up potential voters in Memphis and Nashville for months. Willard Yarbrough, a Democratic candidate for congress in the normally Republican Knoxville area, said "the Goldwater people are working their heads off."

In some parts of the South, Democratic organizations, rusty with disuse are slowly grinding into action. Florida Democrats say the party is working harder there for Johnson than it did for the late President John F. Kennedy in 1960.

In Georgia, which never has gone Republican, the GOP activity has spurred Democrats to form committees in all 159 counties.

Bond Issue Set for Minidoka County Jail

RUPERT, Oct. 15 — Minidoka county commissioners have announced the date for a public meeting to discuss the proposed construction of a courthouse building in Rupert. County voters will have the chance to decide the status of the building at the Nov. 3 election, when a bond issue will be placed on the ballot.

The meeting has been tentatively set for 8 p.m. Oct. 22 at the Rupert courthouse. Architects, Dropping and Kelly, 2555 E. 10th, have drawn up plans and specifications for the proposed building and commissioners will ask \$100,000 to defray expenses of erecting and furnishing a courthouse for Minidoka.

A representative from the civil defense regional office will answer questions on a proposed fallout shelter, which is included in the proposed plan. Edgar T. Peterson, Norland, presented a petition asking for per-

mission to sell beer on Sunday at the commission meeting this week. The petition stated the beer would be sold on Sunday afternoon and would be consumed on the premises.

Commissioners tabled the issue for further study.

Dennis Morrison, county weed supervisor, presented two small claims for damages resulting from weed killing done in the county. The commissioners suggested Morrison check with the insurance company concerning the claims.

The commissioners also agreed to meet with members of the Hayburn and Paul cemetery board after Robert Walk, county coroner, reported difficulty concerning the burial of some indigent cases in the county recently.

Lloyd Knodel met with commissioners concerning the overflow of water from the hospital property onto the Christian church. This has caused much inconvenience. Knodel said the solution in the problem would be to raise the curb and the commissioners agreed to discuss the matter at the budget meeting.

Land Claim Suit Filed in District Court

Vernon L. Herzinger filed a \$21,885 suit Tuesday in Eleventh district court against Magic Water company for damages he claims he incurred after filing for a desert land claim.

Herzinger alleged in the suit that he filed for the desert land entry with the United States department of interior on March 4, 1963, and the Magic Water company contested the claim April 2, stating the land was the company's initial project and that Balmion Falls creek would not provide sufficient water for the company.

After the protest was filed the bureau of land management examined the land and later approved Herzinger's application under the desert-land act.

Herzinger alleged that because of the protest he was required to prolong planting and lost \$11,885 in crop damages last year. He also asked for \$10,000 punitive damages.

Walk said Rupert has a plot set aside in the Rupert cemetery for indigent cases but Paul and Hayburn do not, and cases from those areas were taken to the Rupert cemetery from time to time. However, some friction concerning this practice has been experienced, Walk reported. The commissioners agreed that the three cemetery boards and the commissioners should meet to study the issue further.

Mayor Wendell Johnson met with the commissioners to discuss the cost of the 24-hour radio service provided at the police station. He pointed out because of the cost of the upkeep for personnel and a support should come from county funds for this service.

The commissioners agreed to consider the cost at their budget meeting.

Speed Reading Practice Can Boost Grade Average

Time your reading of this column and compare your speed with that indicated at the end. The expected speed assumes a daily five per cent improvement.

Have you met the fellow who loathes social science because his text is too heavy? You eventually will. And the cute eed who just can't stand geometry because of the terrible pastel color of the book's cover? She's ground too.

Oh, you're not that way? You just love all kinds of books and reading and have no problems at all with them?

Well then, we haven't met you yet. In fact, we have never heard of you.

Learning to read more of his material, just why should a high school or college student ever read 20 articles about reading in his native language? There's a very simple reason: to read faster and better. It's the same reason that has brought a lot of professional people and business executives to the Reading Laboratory program—after they've become successful. You can get a jump on them.

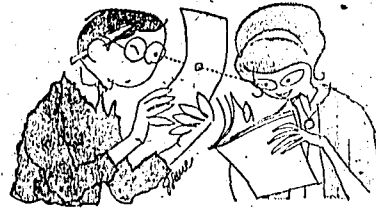
But we'd better get straight on what's in this for you right now. Will you settle for understanding instead of negrivation in your assigned reading? Will you take speed instead of plodding mis-

ery? Well, that's what's in this for you, and we'll do it this way. We'll take your reading in the subjects for which you can spare little affection. Follow along with us and you'll get through your work twice as fast and with far better understanding.

See that circle right above this line? Poke a hole through it. Ask one of your buddies or one of the family to read the next paragraph while you observe his eyes through the hole. You have to look very closely. Here's what you see. The eyes stop . . . go . . . stop . . . go. They move across the lines in jerks (fixations is a nicer word). The eyes can work no other way, so we have no plane of changing that. What we will do is cut to an absolute minimum the number of eye fixations required in reading. In that way we add speed.

Now, let your friend look at your eyes through the hole as you read the next paragraph. Tell him to count the number of eye fixations it takes you to read the next paragraph. There will be no . . . you will require 66 fixations, you're a word-by-word reader. And that's not good.

It's a safe bet that you have many times found yourself staring at a word, line or paragraph, yet read nothing. Your eyes are on page 14; your mind is off in Cloud Nine with a girl or a guy. Unless both the eyes and the mind work together, there's no reading; no understanding. That's just something we have to live with—the eye-mind relationship.



The final point we have to agree on before we outline our program in the next article is that you must have clear purposes in reading. And the purposes must be yours, not your dad's, not your teacher's—yours.

Some people can be motivated by what's ahead for them 10 years from now and they'll get plenty from their reading. But that's not generally true—most people want to know what they will get for themselves here and now. We'll show you how to read with just such purpose in mind and get more than you ever get from, say, world history. And you'll save plenty of time in the process.

AP Correspondents Answer Questions On Background of Viet Nam Crisis

Editor's note—This is the second of two installments of questions and answers on the background of the Viet Nam crisis. Answers are based on available information gathered by William L. Ryan, AP special correspondent, and Malcolm W. Browne, chief AP correspondent at Saigon.

By the Associated Press

Q. Is the attempt to hold back the communists in South Viet Nam being stepped up?

A. The number of U. S. advisers is increasing. Special Forces throughout South Viet Nam have been beefed up 50 per cent. About 1,000 of these tough Americans in about 50 teams are on the job. Civilian economic advisers are being increased.

More support goes to the "pacification" program, an attempt to win rural people by bringing economic, technical, educational and other aid to gain their confidence.

Q. What about the hamlet program?

A. These were called "strategic hamlets" by the Diem regime, which started them. Now they are "new life hamlets."

Often they are fortified with bamboo-spike fences, behind which are armed local militia. The system under Diem aroused rural resentment.

Government troops—often forced villagers from their homes burned villages, made people live in the fenced-in compounds. Force is no longer used, and other aspects are changed, but there is still little indication of over-all improvement in the hamlet effort.

Q. Why does the Saigon government have so much political trouble?

A. A variety of reasons. Diem's government was widely criticized as having a dictatorial attitude. The army was full of rivalries

and corruption, lacked initiative. Troops and officers often showed little will to fight or to face the enemy. Unrest in the cities was widespread.

Q. Doesn't South Viet Nam claim to stand for democracy?

A. Yes, but it's a distant goal. A military coup overthrew the Diem regime last November.

A government under Maj. Gen. Duong Van Minh flourished and in turn was overthrown by Maj. Gen. Nguyen Khanh. This remained essentially a military dictatorship.

Khanh called himself president, later adopted the title of premier. Minh now is titular chief of state.

The only political party of any significance, the Dai Viet, with an anticommunist, anti-communist background, plays little part in today's government.

Q. Did the coups help matters?

A. At first, Buddhist resistance to Diem helped produce his downfall. This same volatile factor threatens Khanh although he is Buddhist.

Q. From all this, it seems the United States has a tiger by the tail. What are the alternatives?

A. None are pleasant.

1. The United States could consider Red China and North Viet Nam the root of the trouble and extend the war in an effort to end outside Viet Cong support. This might cause general war in Asia.

2. The United States could agree to neutralization of South Viet Nam. This would be viewed by many as a step toward communist control.

3. The United States can continue as it is, looking forward to a long, hard struggle.

Q. Is the United States getting help from its allies?

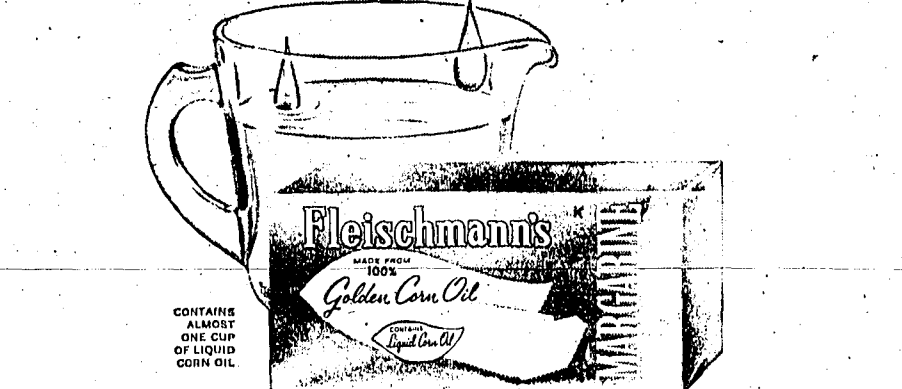
A. Washington asked 25 nations to help. About 10 help with small training missions or economic aid, but the United States carries practically all the burden.

Q. What does it cost?

A. At the rate of about 500 mil-

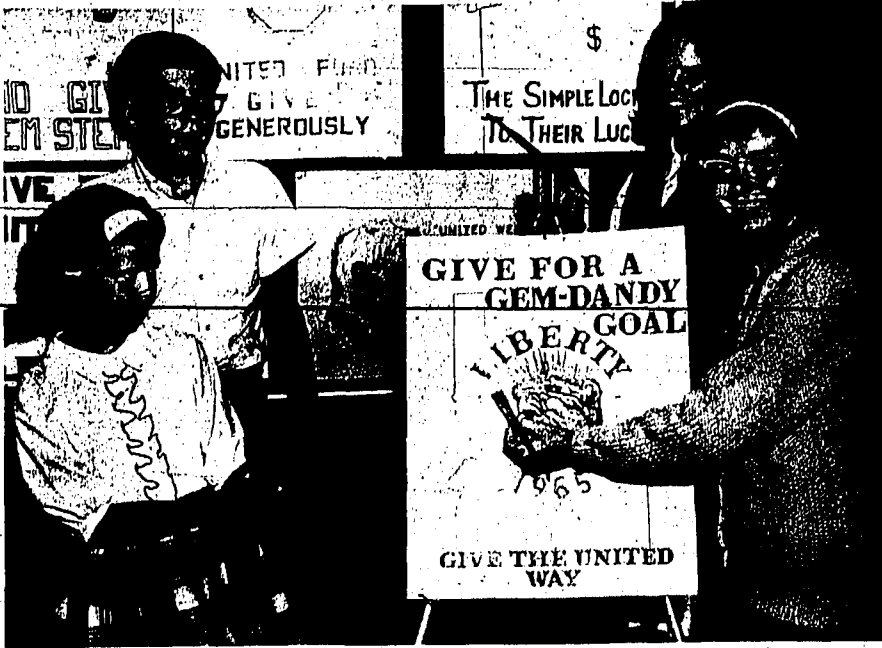

Three Amendments to Come Before Voters Nov. 3

Idaho voters will be asked to consider three amendments to the state constitution when they go to the polls Nov. 3. One of the proposals may have far-reaching effects on the state's economy and its structure; another could result in improved prosperity for the entire state while actually affecting only one small segment; the third amends specifically to the length of the term of office of the state's county sheriffs.

Amendment No. 1 provides for the formation of a state Water Resources agency which would have considerable power with regard to planning and construction of water resources projects, issuing bonds to pay for them, and

collecting revenues to retire the bonds.

The agency would be given the power to adopt and put into effect a water plan for the state and to develop water resources in the public interest, to generate and sell hydroelectric power, to appropriate water and control land.

Section 1 of article VIII of the Idaho constitution requires the approval of the state's voters to permit the state to incur indebtedness in excess of two million dollars. The water resources amendment would authorize the proposed agency to incur debts in excess of that minimum without a vote of the people through the issuance of revenue bonds.

The bonds would be paid for out of revenues obtained from water projects under the supervision of the agency.

Section 2 of the same article prohibits the state from loaning or pledging its credit. The Idaho supreme court holds that this provision does not allow the issuance of revenue bonds by a state board. The water resources amendment would authorize the agency to issue such bonds.

Section 3 of article VIII requires the approval of the voters to permit any subdivision of the state to incur any indebtedness which would exceed in any one year the income and revenue provided for that subdivision in that year. The amendment would

permit the water resources agency to contract such indebtedness without the approval of the voters in a bond election.

Finally, section 7 of article IX gives the state board of Land Commissioners authority to control state lands. Under the water resources amendment such control would permit the proposed agency to own and control lands and to have administrative control over such lands as it might use for its projects.

The attorney general of Idaho, in his statement of meaning of purpose of the amendment, is not certain that this amendment would supersede the conflicting provisions of other sections to the extent that the proposed

proposed water resources agency are involved. He says, however, that he "assumes" this would be the case.

This could mean that even if the amendment is approved its provisions could not be carried out due to conflicts with other provisions of the state constitution.

The second amendment pertains chiefly to the Lewiston port and provides for the establishment of a port district with powers to operate harbor facilities and issue revenue bonds without the approval of the voters.

The proposal would require that revenue bonds issued by the port district be paid solely from the revenues of the port district

and that no tax moneys be used to repay the revenue bonds. The bonds would not be a general obligation of the port district.

The third proposal simply amends section 6 of article XVIII to double the length of the term of Idaho county sheriffs. This would mean that instead of being elected for two years, as the present law provides, the county sheriff would be elected for a term of four years.

Twin Falls county incumbent Sheriff James Benham endorsed this amendment and noted that Idaho is the only remaining state of its surrounding neighbors which still has a two-year tenure of office for sheriffs.

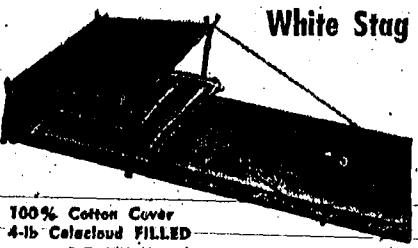

Shoshone, which lost in the last second to Valley, tries to rebound by invading Wendell, the homecoming hero, looking for their second win in six outings. A Saturday afternoon battle finds Kimberly at Halsey — a battle of winless clubs.

The Magic Valley conference sees the Mountain Red Devils to Hart River while Oatfield is at Rockland in a non-conference go.

In addition to the Camas County-Carey game, eight-man action finds the Dietrich Blue Devils traveling to Coeur d'Alene while Grand View provides competition for Richfield's last home game.



The army started developing and perfecting its new concept in February of last year on orders from Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara. A board of officers headed by Gen. Hamilton H. Howze had proposed the bold new look in ground warfare.
