

## Warren Report, Negro Blasted by J. Edgar Hoover

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19 (UPI)—FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover has blasted the Warren commission as "unfair and unjust" and called Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., "the most notorious liar in the country." Hoover balled over on these and other matters, including lenient "bleeding heart judges," in a lengthy interview yesterday with a group of women reporters. He angrily charged the Warren commission with "a classic example of Monday morning quarterbacking." In discussing its report on the assassination of President John F. Kennedy.

The commission, headed by Chief Justice Earl Warren, has said the FBI failed to notify the secret service that the assassin, Lee Harvey Oswald, was in Dallas last Nov. 22, the day Kennedy was slain.

In New York City alone, Hoover complained, 7,000 persons would have to be taken out of circulation every time a president makes a public appearance if it were deemed necessary to remove "every individual who might threaten the safety of the president."

However, the FBI director said, his office is turning over to the secret service the names of "thousands of beatniks, crackpots and kooks."

Hoover appeared before the commission last May 14 and told the newspaper after testifying that King was "the most notorious liar in the country." The FBI director said this was true because King had said FBI agents in Albany, Ga., failed to act on Negro complaints because the agents were southerners.

In his telegram to Hoover, King denied he had attributed what he termed "very effective" efforts to the direction of Howard Johnson, superintendent of city parks and recreation department. "I cannot conceive of Mr. Hoover making a statement like this without being under extreme pressure," he said. "He has apparently suffered under the awesome burdens, complexities and responsibilities of his office. Therefore, I cannot engage in a public debate with him."

"I have nothing but sympathy for this man who has served his country so well."

McNamara Reveals Details of Plans To Close Bases

Washington, Nov. 19 (UPI)—Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara today ordered the shutdown of two naval shipyards, six bomber bases and the removal of 150 older intercontinental ballistic missiles which he said "have served their purpose." The actions were among 95 consolidations, reductions, and discontinuances of military bases which he discussed in broad outline yesterday.

Fourteen Atlas and Titan missile bases are among the 95 military installations to be closed by the Pentagon.

They involve at least 150 mis-

ses located both above and be-

low ground.

McNamara estimated the total annual savings in the shut-

down on the missile complexe-

s at 117 million dollars and a sav-

ing in manpower of 12,500 mili-

tary personnel.

Most of the actions will be com-

pleted by mid-1965, and all

but one by 1970.

When finished, McNamara

said, the actions will produce

474 million dollars in savings

and 63,400 "without in any way re-

ducing military effectiveness."

Until today, McNamara kept the 1st secret. In announcing

plans for the cutback yesterday,

he said it included facilities of al-

types—"air bases, air depots,

army arsenals, army terminals,

shipyards, etc."

McNamara said two years ago

there would be no shipyards

other than he has listed.

### SYNOPSIS AND AGRICULTURAL SUMMARY

High pressure at the surface covered the western states this morning with a surface low center in southern Canada which is forecast to move into the Great Plains states and upper Mississippi valley today and Friday. As a result of the continued high pressure, temperatures fall in these valleys were again mostly in the teens and low 20s.

The low pressure system at the surface east of the Continental divide will bring some light snow to the eastern slopes of the Rockies and into the northern Great Plains. In south-central valleys, the night and morning fog will give way to fair skies at times in the afternoon today and Friday. Daytime temperatures will be influenced by clouds cover and will range from the mid 20s in foggy areas to the mid 30s into the 40s in areas where morning fog and low clouds give way to sunny afternoons. Nighttime temperatures will range mostly in the teens to low 30s again, except in Camas prairie where zero or below temperatures are occurring.

### Works Sold

### At N. Y. Sale

**NEW YORK**, Nov. 10 (UPI) — George Washington's personal copy of the first edition of his acts of congress was sold here at auction yesterday to a Philadelphia book dealer for \$27,000.

This dealer, George Beasley, was a major buyer at the sale of 157 documents and books from the collection of the heretage foundation of Duffield, Akron. The auction at Park-Bernet Galleries produced \$16,440 for the operation of 20 historic properties open to the public at Deerfield village.

The acts of congress contained Washington's signature on the title page, his engraved portrait and penciled notes in his handwriting on four pages. His signature on the constitution of the United States with a penciled correction was sold to John W. Flaming, New York, for \$3,400.

The five major Washington items in the sale brought a total of \$51,800. James P. Drake, a New York dealer, paid \$15,000 for a Washington letter stating the general's reasons for not invading Canada during the revolution.



## NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

**WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.**—Anybody around here want to join me in pleading guilty to being "gullible" and "uncomprehending" when it comes to getting your money's worth at the local grocer?

Rep. Roman Hruska, R., Neb., claims the public is neither of those things because he is opposed to something good called the "truth-in-packaging" bill which seeks to protect consumers from deceptive marketing practices. The bill, says Hruska, is "derived from a stylizing Andrew Tully proposition—that our ordinary citizen is 'gullible, incompetent, uncomprehending and irresponsible.'

**REVIEWER OF PUZZLES**—Well, Mrs. Balderdash, I am all these things when somebody sits me down and tries to explain the molecular system, and those boxes of cereal and what-all sitting on grocery shelves are just as mysterious. What I want to know is when I look myself up and down the aisle of a supermarket is how much food is in those boxes and how the price of one product compares with that of another. For example, I do not know what constitutes a "giant half quart." Is this a half quart with more cereal in it than a mere non-giant half quart? Is it a "king-sized" package a good buy or should I flip it up in favor of an "emperor" size or "shah of shahs" size job? Who benefits from that "economy" size package, the grocer or me?

**MYSTERY OF MERCHANTISING**—As a pretty fair trencherman with a limited purse, I am tired of trying to solve the mystery of a label which proclaims the product is being practically given away at X cents off the regular price. No clerk of my ken has ever revealed the amount of that "regular price" or the "divided" amount of that "regular price" which is divided between two packages of equal size. I have discovered that buying my favorite popkull by the quart instead of the fifth saves no money.

Any time a consumer can lay his hands on a microscope it would profit him to read the fine print on some of those packages. Although the label shrieks a come-or-worth-of-a-shellgame skill, the fine print often contradicts the label's promises of more for your money. And if the stuff is in a particularly elegant container it usually costs more than the same product in a plain box.

**NEW CONGRESS MAY ACT**—There is just a chance that something will be done in the next session of Congress about these messy merchandisers. A Democratic majority in the Senate antitrust subcommittee concerned has called for enactment of a bill which would give federal agencies power to establish standards for packaging and labeling. It is this bill which Hruska strongly finds insulting to the public.

These results aren't achieved by coddling drivers; they aren't achieved by easing requirements for a driver's license; they aren't achieved by tapping drivers on the wrist for violation of traffic laws. And such results definitely aren't achieved by permitting children of 14 and 15 years old to drive autos on the state's streets and highways. It's puzzling why Idaho continues to condone the law permitting children to drive cars while the law (the statutes are on the books, anyway) forbids those same children to purchase or consume beer or cigarettes until they're 18. In many cases, the auto has proved far more deadly.

Safety Director Alters might have some thoughts about Idaho's system of "violation points." So far as the law and courts are concerned, a driver is forgiven any violation more than a year old. He can accumulate three or four serious moving violations each and every year without anyone ever challenging his qualifications as a driver. Director Alters is strangely silent on such a ridiculous law. He also has nothing to say about a driver's test so simple that a child can pass with flying colors.

Perhaps the most ridiculous part of Idaho law concerning traffic violators is the provision that permits a court or the department of law enforcement to grant a "temporary" license to those who may have lost their driver's license for a violation. The provision makes a farce of the whole law! Many drivers just go blithely on their way driving wherever and whenever they please by virtue of the "temporary" license. The idea is to avoid working a "hardship" on the violator. It's all wrong. The violator should have to live with any and all hardships resulting from his violation of the law. Obviously, revocation of the driver's license is not sufficient. The law should provide for impounding the car involved in any serious violation.

When Idaho and Idahoans reach the point in their thinking where they really want to improve traffic safety, they'll scream for such stringent measures. And traffic safety will improve almost immediately. In the meantime, Safety Director Alters might find he won't add much with his paper war.

### NOW IT'S OFFICIAL

In the wake of the National Reclamation Association's annual meeting in California, there's no longer any doubt about designs on Columbia river water. It was one of the prime topics of conversation. Significantly, Reclamation Commissioner Floyd E. Dominy declined to discuss the subject but those attending the meeting had no doubts where he stands. He believes Columbia river water is the only answer to the problem of providing water to California and Arizona.

The bureau of reclamation is looking for something like 10 million acre feet of water annually. The first step is a deal made in January when Arizona's Son, Carl Hayden will reintroduce legislation to authorize the Central Arizona project. Offhand, there doesn't appear to be any special move toward the Columbia, but his bill will contain a directive to start a study of the Pacific Northwest. The object is to find supplemental water to divert to the Colorado river watershed.

It's patently obvious that the simplest diversion is from Snake river. Naturally, Idaho will oppose such plans. But one wonders how effective opposition can be in the face of overwhelming numbers in congress. There's also a question of Idaho's effectiveness in fighting off the Federal Bureau of Reclamation. It remains to be seen what can be done by its defeat politically.

The stream of visitors can now be looked upon unpredicably as what it is: a successful attempt at breaking through the wall of partition.



**FILIPPIQUE, Czechoslovakia, Nov.** 19.—Within the walls of Prague's ancient castle lies the street of the alchemists to which 400 years ago Emperor Rudolph II summoned scientists to turn base metals into gold.

Today, within the same walls, a communist leader also seeks an economic miracle.

The miracle is necessary because after years of boom the Czech economy

actually has turned downward.

And just as Rudolph's attempt

violated certain immutable laws

of physics, so the Czechoslovakian communist plan violated dogma of communism. It draws upon capitalism, calling for strict cost accounting, incentive pay and production according to demand.

The freedoms slowly inching

their way into the nations of the communist East European bloc

have been slow to reach Czechoslovakia whose regime only two years ago demolished the granite statue of Stalin which towered 100 feet high over Prague, overshadowing as a landmark the ancient castle and St. Vitus cathedral.

## MARQUIS CHILDS WRITES ON WASHINGTON

**ROME, Nov. 19.**—The communists-dominated Railway Workers union has come up with a new kind of strike. The stop-and-start, or "hiccup," strike has thrown the state-owned rail system into chaos with three out of four trains brought to a stop.

The hiccup strike works this way: Twice a day, for a week, workers are pulled off the trains for a 30-minute period. While a previous general strike failed with the workers outside the communist-led General Confederation refusing to come out, the stop-and-start system completely disrupted schedules. One train was stalled almost another so that the time tables were meaningless.

This comes just before the all-important nationwide municipal elections with the question of communist gains uppermost. Rome's mayor is a communist and center-right candidates also face a test of strength.

The plight of the Czech economy, which last year actually saw a decline of more than one per cent in both industrial production and in the national income, generally is blamed upon rigid centralized planning and, according to the government newspaper *Rude Pravo*, "stale ideas and prejudices surviving from the period of the personality cult."

In simpler language, the planners ignored the need to replace worn-out or aging equipment and invest in goods which could compete on the world market.

A new system will be introduced gradually beginning in 1965.

In particular, success depends upon the ability of the new economists to overcome the strong opposition of provincial party leaders and plant managers who seek their own jobs threatened.

Q—I had thrombophilias in my left leg eight years ago. Now my left is waterlogged. My heart and kidney tests were normal.

Will you take a water pill for the rest of my life?

A—If you are overweight, losing weight will be definitive. If you are thin, you should elevate your feet on a low stool. Don't sit for more than 45 minutes without getting up.

Ask your doctor whether you should be taking an anti-coagulant. Custom-fitted elastic stockings which you should put on in the morning before getting out of bed should be of great benefit.

You should also elevate the foot of your bed with blocks six to eight inches high.

The best exercise you can take is swimming or wading in deep

water. Potassium para-aminobenzoate (Potab) is safe enough

water. Don't take the water pills any longer than your doctor thinks you need them.

Q—I am 60 and am taking potassium chloride. Metabolism and digitals. What are they for?

Will they cause any bad effects if I take them for a long time?

Potassium chloride is a mild diuretic or water pill. Metabolism is also given to reduce waterlogging. Digitals strengthen your heart beat. This combination is usually given for a lonely heart valve with decompen-

sation.

Anyone who needs these drugs should take them indefinitely unless the cause is removed by an open operation on the heart.

Your doctor will determine what is the smallest dose you need to keep you comfortable.

## Paper Firm Cuts Price Of Newsprint

BOISE, Nov. 19 (UPI)—A major Canadian paper producer yesterday cut the basic price of newsprint by \$10 a ton, stunning American publishers.

A spokesman for the American Newspaper Publishers Association (ANPA) said the price reduction was the first "I have ever heard of" and a spokesman for the Canadian newspaper industry said it was the first since 1954.

The announcement was made by MacMillan, Bloedel and Powell River, Ltd., of Vancouver, B.C., fourth largest producer of newsprint in North America. The firm has a capacity of 917,000 tons of newsprint a year, a capacity equal to about 9.9 per cent of combined U.S. and Canadian production for 1963.

"Are you kidding?" asked a spokesman for one eastern Canadian company when informed of the MacMillan, Bloedel announcement.

"There is no economic justification for a price reduction in newsprint at this time," said Robert G. Rogers, president of Crown Zellerbach's Canadian headquarters. He said Crown Zellerbach was studying the cut and had not decided whether to match it.

The new price of MacMillan, Bloedel newsprint is \$124 a ton delivered, down from \$134, on the West Coast. The basic U.S. price is \$135. The last significant change was hike of \$1 in 1961.

Ammon Brooks, head of MacMillan, Bloedel's U.S. division in Seattle, said in Los Angeles he did not know whether his company would enough weight to compel competitors to cut their prices, too. O. T. Hicks, president of Bowater, company, Atlanta, Ga., which operates mills in Canada and the South, said he doubled the lower newsprint prices would spread east of the Rockies. But he said Bowater would meet competition wherever it arises.

The Canadian pulp and paper association—or which MacMillan, Bloedel is a member—said it did not have any warning of the price cut.

## News Around Idaho

BOISE, Nov. 19 (UPI)—Air force authorities outlined yesterday regulations governing the news coverage of crashes involving military aircraft. Lt. Col. Frank Justo, information officer at Mountain Home air force base, reviewed the rules at a meeting of newsmen and photographers at Gowen field in Boise.

BLACKFOOT, Nov. 19 (UPI)—Authorities say they have exhausted all leads in the search for 16-year-old Susan Hansen who disappeared three weeks ago today. They are still awaiting reports from the FBI laboratory in Washington on several items from the family car found parked the night of Oct. 28 several hours after she was last seen. She had left in the car to get groceries. A plane flies daily over the Snake river from Shelley south to American Falls reservoir. So far the clear water has yielded no trace of the girl's body.

POCATELLO, Nov. 19 (UPI)—The Bannock county hospital board plans \$40,000 addition to the 17-bed March Valley hospital in Downey to bring it up to standards set by the state board of health. The additional 1,100 square feet would provide for separate surgery and emergency rooms, permit storage on the main floor and make the basement one-hour fireproof.

BOISE, Nov. 19 (UPI)—The state highway board was told yesterday that unless the federal government steps up its allocation of funds, Idaho's portion of the Interstate network won't be completed on schedule by 1972. Ellis Matthes, state highway engineer, said there was a backlog of money in the five years since that construction is catching up with available funds. "There is a possibility we will be waiting for federal funds in 1965," he said. "We are ahead in miles, not in money." Idaho has 612 miles of Interstate on the nationwide network.

BOISE, Nov. 19 (UPI)—The internal revenue service collected \$200,000 in Idaho during the fiscal year that ended June 30. That was part of a national total of 1,123 billion dollars, up 8.3 percent from the year before. Idaho's contributions included \$168,000,000 in personal income taxes and \$20,238,000 in corporate income taxes, a total of more than 100 million dollars. Also included were \$2,424,000 in estate taxes, \$141,000 in gift taxes and \$85,000 in tobacco taxes. Other excise taxes accounted for \$5,000,000.

GRANGEVILLE, Nov. 19 (UPI)—A coroner and a pathologist testified in 16th district court here yesterday that in their opinion William Mendenhall was shot from behind in August of 1963. Herbert Beeson, an 81-year-old Kamiah area pensioner, is charged with first degree murder in the fatal shooting of the 49-year-old Mendenhall, a neighbor of Beeson. Idaho county Coroners William Morrison and Dr. Kenneth Drouard, a pathologist from Nampa, both testified they noticed the wound in Mendenhall's back was smaller than one in his chest. Beeson maintains he shot Mendenhall in self defense during an argument in the pensioner's cabin.

BOISE, Nov. 19 (UPI)—Gov. Robert E. Smylie has appointed employment security agency director H. Fred Garrett as a special assistant to work with the federal government on programs in Idaho under the anti-poverty act. Smylie advised director George Shriver of the office of economic opportunity that Garrett or his designee will attend a Dec. 1-2 meeting in Denver on provisions of the act concerning migrant and seasonal farm workers. Smylie said Garrett's additional duties will be without compensation.

BOISE, Nov. 19 (UPI)—The director of the Idaho teachers retirement system is asking the legislature to remove conflicting provisions in the law and to help the system boost a declining membership. H. F. Willmorth, director of the system for a \$405,000 overpayment to the system from Idaho's 44 counties in the past four years, told the legislature's budget committee that a one-mill levy required by law from the counties to support the system would not be enough to pay off the debt. Willmorth said the system lost 2,480 members shortly after teachers were brought under social security in 1950, and "the membership now is about 3,400." Willmorth said about 1,000 of those are close to retirement age.

IDAHO FALLS, Nov. 19 (UPI)—Snow began piling up on the Snake river watershed this week with 10 inches reported at Island Park, four inches at Moran, Wyo., and eight inches at Hagerman, Idaho divide, Henry's Eagle, Snake river district 38 watermaster, reported yesterday.

Precipitation measured .96 of an inch at Island Park, .44 of an inch at Moran, .56 of an inch at Palisades, and .52 of an inch at Ashton.

# Strong Named to All-SIC Grid Team; Smith, Lynch Placed on Second Squad

Twin Falls tailback Scott Strong, the only man in the Southern Idaho conference to gain more than 1,000 yards rushing, was the Bruins' only representative in the all-conference football team selected by sportswriters and sportscasters in member cities. But drawing the top honors were a pair of Boise men: Kent Scott, a 215-pound end whose kicking too earned him the league scoring honors, was named "player of the year" in a tight vote over Caldwell's Roger Cantlon, and Boise monitor Ed Knobell, who saw his Braves beat Borah for the first-time-in-history and grab the league title was honored as "coach of the year."

Borah placed five men on the first unit while Boise had three. Caldwell two and Twin Falls one. So highly regarded were the runner-up boys by the voters, they failed to have representatives only at end and halfback positions.

Voting for ends appeared the easiest job with Bentz and Caldwell, the boys leading their respective straight years running off from the other. Bentz led all vote-givers with 18 while Cantlon, only one behind Bentz in "player of the year" race, had 15.

Guards for the team are Deb Burgess, Boise, and Vic Carlson, Borah, while Borah's two starting tackles, Kirk Charlton and Gary Bills, held those positions. Jim Cafferty, Borah, was named the starting center.

The backfield boast a pair of quarterbacks and two halfbacks. Caldwell's tailback Steve Clarnian, who won his second straight total offense and passing titles this year, and Borah, with 1,024 yards rushing, were the leaders in total offense, topped balancing with 18 votes each. Borah signal caller Steve Preese gained 14 and Bob Shewell, Boise, held the other spot with nine.

The second unit backfield has Tom Lynch, Twin Falls; Wayne Darling, Borah fullback; Ray Millward, Highland fullback, and Ken Baranac, Caldwell. Roger Bentz, Rocatello fullback, who won the conference rushing title in his last game, mustered one less vote than Baranac.

In the second unit line were Tom Bentz, Twin Falls; George Bentz, Boise; Mike Bills, guards, Paul Jorgenson, Caldwell, and Bill Miller, Borah; tackles, Louis Grant, Caldwell, and Jean Cruse, Nampa. The second unit center was a tribute to a noise maker who saw little action in the conference, having been hurt early in the year. But Ken Krist took the second spot with one vote over Twin Falls' Paul Stover.

The starting interior line averages 100-pound-plus line-backer field is 175 pounds.

**Hagerman to Be Rugged If Height Comes Through**

**HAGERMAN**, Nov. 19 — With his two scorers and a third from last season's 16-5 team, Hagerman's players-needed-only-height-to-face-a-20-game schedule with confidence this year. And if a pair of tall-timers come through, the Pirates will have the full complement and will rate the fifth in the North Idaho conference. If not, the Pirates should have the best record in Canyon County and for a second crown. Coach Al Olander has a pair of juniors in 6-foot, 5-inch Sam Johnson, who comes from New Plymouth, and 6-foot, 1-inch Hob Gould, who moved here from Tulsa.

But the proven men are Terry Boyer, Dave Mauner and Terry White, all of whom started on last year's district championship club-and-almost-upset eventual state champion, Genesee, in the opening round of the state tournament.

Boyer, a left hander, is not too impressive in stature at 5 feet, 10 inches but his 300 points and career record impress many.

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# Robinson Named Most Valuable Player in AL

BOSTON, Nov. 10 (AP) — Baltimore third baseman Brooks Robinson, main driving force behind an Orioles pennant bid which just missed, was named Wednesday the 1964 American league most valuable player by an overwhelming margin. The man with the golden glove and 118 runs batted in was the lone player to be named on all 20 ballots cast by the special committee of the Baseball Writers Association of America, BBWAA. Secretary Myrtle Hurwitz announced the results.

On the basis of 14 points for first, 8 for second, 8 for third, etc., Robinson drew 260 for possible 280 points, with 19 first-place ballots.

Mickey Mantle, who sparked the New York Yankees' surge to another title on aching legs, received the other two first-place votes and 171 points.

Yankee catcher Elston Howard, last year's winner, was third with 134 points, followed by rookie Tony Oliva of Minnesota, the league batting champion, with 99 and Dean Chance of Los Angeles, the Cy Young award winner in the major top pitcher, with 97.

Mantle and Howard each were left off one ballot as Robinson broke a four-year Yankee monopoly on the award.

"I'm very happy," said Robinson, "but I was only the second third baseman ever so honored. Al Rosen of Cleveland was a unanimous selection in 1953."

"I feel that I had a pretty good chance but I never thought I'd win," Robinson said from his suburban Baltimore home. "This is an award every player would like to win but few ever do."

Robinson topped an American league third baseman in fielding for the fifth straight year. The quiet, hard-working 27-year-old who twice in his career was sent down to the minors for weak hitting, batted .300 with a .317 average, only six points back of Oliva.

The performance followed a 251 average in '63.

Robinson was only one of three major league leaders Ken Boyer of the St. Louis Cardinals. He also was runner-up in the AL in hits with 104 and third in doubles with 36 in addition to contributing 28 homers while playing in all his club's 162 games.

"The fact that the Orioles made a good run for the pennant and that the rest of the players had a good year made it possible for me to get the award," said Robinson, who has just started a radio show of his own. "I feel that if your club didn't finish one or two or three, you didn't have a chance."
