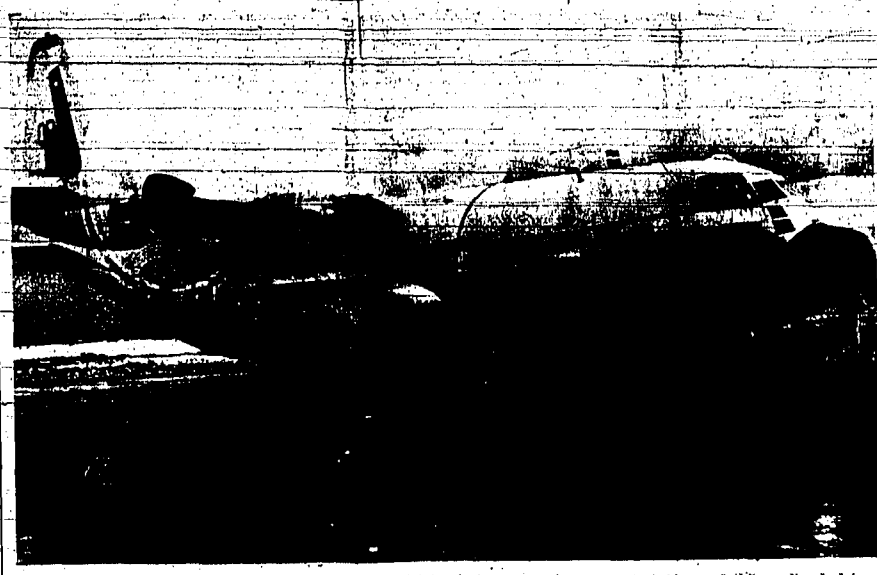


Pope Paul Visits India; Four-Day Tour Is Planned

BOMBAY, India, Dec. 2 (UPI)—Pope Paul VI arrived in India today as "a pilgrim for peace" and was the greatest reception anyone has ever received in this predominantly-Hindu land. Millions cheered him. A predominantly Hindu crowd of 100,000 greeted him warmly at Bombay's Santa Cruz airport. And police estimated that more than two million persons saw the pope on his drive into Bombay. Observers said the pope was by far the greatest ever given anyone here, including Britain's Queen Elizabeth II.

Goldwater Tells of Plans for GOP Summit Meeting

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2 (AP)—Barry Goldwater said today he plans to meet with Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower and Richard M. Nixon for a "general discussion" of the Republican party's future course.

The defeated presidential nominee said in a 15-minute interview on his return to Phoenix, Ariz., that he does not know where the summit conference discussion will lead. But he indicated he is willing to cooperate with the former president in any effort to bring peace among the warring factions of the Republican party.

Goldwater said the meeting originally had been scheduled for next Thursday at Eisenhower's office at Gettysburg, Pa., but had to be delayed because of Nixon's trip to Japan. He added, however, he hopes it can be fitted into the schedules of all three principals before his return to Arizona next week.

Goldwater made it clear he would encourage the formation of a kind of advisory council suggested by some GOP governors and other party leaders, to bring all factions into the formation of a new party-political action or "turnover party" election ticket to get Milton Eisenhower's group to continue its work," he said. "I thought they were making some headway."

Eisenhower, brother of the late Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, is chairman of the Republican Critical Issues council. The council is a panel of leading Republicans, focused on policy alternatives through special-task forces during the recent presidential campaign.

Goldwater remained adamant in his opposition to the replacement of Eisenhower as chairman of the Republican National Convention. He said he is not going to throw Birch out," he said. "They don't have the votes."

This opposition by the presidential nominee to any replacement of Eisenhower as chairman at this time was concurred in by congressional Republican leaders who think it is too early to take such drastic action.

Goldwater said he regards himself now as "a free man," able to speak out on issues of paramount interest to the nation. He indicated he no longer feels any of the restraints he implied had been placed on him as a presidential candidate in dealing with international issues.

Goldwater indicated his criticism may center on President Johnson's course in the Vietnam hostilities.

"We're in war there and it's time that the American people found out—just how deeply we are involved," he said. "I pointed that out in the campaign and I am going to speak out on it some more."

Asked when he intended to speak out, the Arizona senator replied he will do so when his newspaper column is resumed in January. He suspended publication of his column when it became his number one priority for the GOP presidential

nomination early this year. Goldwater, who has not met with reporters except for a brief news conference in Jamaica, said he is going over to the side of the writing men and does not intend to have additional news conferences or interviews.

The senator, bronzed from his Jamaica vacation and a subsequent rest at his Phoenix home, gave no indications that he was fazed by his landslide defeat by Johnson.

"They can't discount the fact that 27 million Americans voted for me," he said.

When his interviewer noted that other Republicans contended this did not represent wholly GOP conservative strength but included Republicans who did not necessarily agree with his views but opposed Johnson and his program, Goldwater replied cryptically.

"That's what they say. I think the conservatives are going to be heard from."

Republican governors, meeting in Denver this week-end may come up with some recommendations for reorganizing the party organization, Birch has called a 300, 21-22 meeting of the national committee in Chicago at which he plans to ask for a vote of confidence.

"The newest demand for placement of Birch came yesterday from Charles Percy, defeated in his race for governor of Illinois. Percy, the 1960 GOP convention platform chairman, said, "We must have a change in command at the national level."

Percy proposed setting up a national policy committee. He suggested that it be headed by Gov. Robert B. Byrd of Idaho, Ben. Thurlston B. Morton of Ken-

ucky or Rep. ROBERT J. DUFF, Jr. of Ohio.

Senate Republican leaders showed no enthusiasm for Percy's suggestions.

RENO, Dec. 2 (AP)—Reno's tax rate very likely will have to be raised before next July 1, City Manager Joe Lattimore said today.

He said the rate must go up because of the rapid growth of the city and the need for major improvements. He listed a possible \$500,000 item for city employees pay increases.

The current city tax rate is 4.14, the lowest since 1940. The higher rate, if approved by the city council, would go into effect at the start of the next fiscal year.

The current budget is 7.74 million dollars. Lattimore said it will be necessary to require to an increase would be required to meet the needs of the city, which has been growing at the rate of 10 per cent per year.

New Cigarette Is Made That Can Be Eaten, Smoked

OKLAHOMA CITY, Dec. 2 (AP)—A new tobacco cigarette that can be eaten as well as smoked and is "satisfying both to the taste and the family physician" will go into production soon, it was announced today.

The lettuce product will soon be marketed as "the cigarette you can live with," according to executives of the new cigarette manufacturing firm. They said the cigarette apparently has little or no effect on the circulatory system.

Perry Resnick, president of Guardian Smoking Products, Inc., said a pilot plant will be in operation in Oklahoma by March of next year.

Guardian cigarettes will be made of the outer wrapper of the lettuce leaf, which the lettuce industry now throws away, Resnick said.

The lettuce is dehydrated, cured and baked, Resnick said. The lettuce is taken from a field and processed into a cigarette in one week, compared with the two-year field-to-cigarette process necessary for tobacco, Resnick said.

Resnick, formerly of L. Resnick and Sons, a Philadelphia paper products and food packaging firm, said the cigarette would be marketed initially in only Oklahoma and Texas. He anticipated first-year sales of about two million dollars.

"The process of changing the lettuce to cigarettes, protected by seven international patents, permits an unlimited variety of aromas, tastes and flavors," Resnick said. "The cigarettes are mentholated and filtered."

Guardian cigarettes are not intended to be a complete replacement, but rather an improvement to give smokers a way to continue enjoying the smoking habit with improved tastes without the assault of nicotine on the body," Resnick said.

Resnick said Puzant C. Torigan, a native of Turkey and a

Columbia university pharmacy graduate, was responsible for the development of Guardian cigarettes.

No Taxes

MADISONVILLE, Ky., Dec. 2 (AP)—The Madisonville city council has announced that 1943 will be the 11th straight year without a property or poll tax in the city.

The council did, however, set a levy yesterday of 20 cents per \$100 fair cash value on shares in banks and trust companies. This revenue will go to operation of the city library.



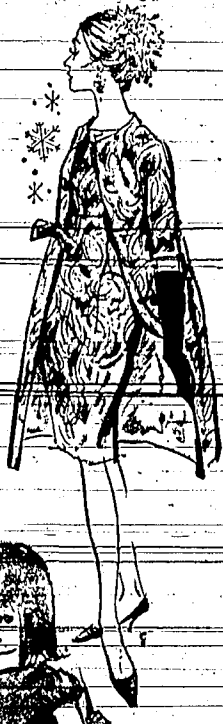



Services Set Thursday for Nampa Judge

NAMPA, Dec. 2 (U)—Services for the late Judge Edward J. Aschenbrenner, 48, who died Monday of an abdominal heart attack, will be held at 10 o'clock Thursday at the St. Paul's Roman Catholic church here for a seventh day of prayer. Judge Aschenbrenner was born Jan. 17, 1861, at Idaho Falls but had lived most of his life in Canyon county. He attended St. Paul's school in Nampa and was a graduate of Nampa high school. He received his bachelor of laws degree from the University of Idaho law school in 1901 and served as an assistant Idaho attorney general for several years before entering private practice in Nampa in 1959. In 1960 he was elected Canyon county probate judge and was re-elected in 1962. Judge Aschenbrenner was appointed by Gov. Robert E. Smylie to fill the third seat of the seventh district bench when it was created by the legislature in 1963. Surviving are his mother, Mrs. Mary Aschenbrenner Wagners, two sisters and nine brothers. His father, Joseph Aschenbrenner, died in 1946. R. C. Aschenbrenner, Twin Falls, a brother, is owner of Price Hardware.

Idahoan Is Arrested for N. C. Slaying

PAYETTEVILLE, N. C., Dec. 2 (U)—Payetteville police arrested Army Pfc. Richard Allen Davis, 20, Sandpoint, Idaho, today, and charged him with murder in the slaying of William Fredell Corbett, 48, former navy commander of Wilmington. Corbett was found dead in a Fayetteville motel room Monday. After a cursory examination, Corbett's death was ruled a homicide. Corbett died of natural causes. Fayetteville police noting Corbett's room key and automobile were missing, joined with the army's criminal investigation division at the scene. Davis was arrested and charged with slaying Corbett. Police Chief L. E. Worrell said Davis told him he had hitchhiked a ride late Saturday night with Corbett and went to the motel room for a drink. Worrell said Davis' statement charged Corbett was a homosexual and "I hate men like that." Worrell said Davis admitted putting his arms around Corbett's neck and twisting his throat and beating him until he turned blue.

Ernest Hagland, superintendent of schools, gave a brief talk to the council. Mrs. Robert Black talked about the modern mathematics workshop. She said the Pocatello school system had started a "modern mathematics" class in their school this year. "I'll study" today about the budget and finance workshop, stating that the PTA fund could be used for Lloyd Stoker reported on the special education workshop. The joint PTA meeting to be held in January was discussed. Next council meeting will be held Jan. 4.

BURLEY, Dec. 2 (U)—The Minnie Casella Duplicate Bridge club will hold a charity bridge party at 7 p.m. Tuesday in the Burley Elks hall. All proceeds will be donated to the Elks charity fund. Master points will be awarded to the winners and refreshments will be served. The public is invited.

BOISE, Dec. 2 (U)—Delegates to the second annual Idaho Indian conference have told that the bureau of Indian affairs is considering establishing in Idaho a job corps camp for Indian youth. William E. Wamsley, Washington, D. C., told delegates at the annual meeting yesterday that the bureau in some of five agencies authorized to establish job corps camps under the economic opportunity act. He said it has already set up two camps in Arizona and New Mexico. Wamsley also explained other sections of the economic opportunity act saying its main purpose is to upgrade Indian education—not to provide relief.

BOISE, Dec. 2 (U)—The Idaho fish and game department reports about one million salmon eggs planted in artificial hatching channels in the Selway river drainage are continuing their embryonic development. The eggs were planted in the hatching channels as part of the eight-year program intended to restore salmon spawning runs in the Clearwater-Selway river system.

SALMON, Dec. 2 (U)—The executive secretary of the Associated Trappers of Idaho predicted today that the Idaho legislature will approve a \$20 million dollar general fund budget for the 1965-67 biennium. In remarks at a meeting of the Salmon Chamber of Commerce, Max York said such a budget will require additional tax revenue of at least 75 million dollars. He said the state chamber of commerce suggested a retail sales tax as a major source of new revenue. He said such a tax is needed to supplement the present revenue structure in order to provide a solid base for financing Idaho government.

WARWICK LAKE, Dec. 2 (U)—A 35-year-old Caldwell hunter who had been the object of an intensive search since last Sunday was found yesterday in the Warm Lake area in Valley county. Sheriff's deputies, who worked their way into the snowbound area with a snow-traveling vehicle, said William Van Natta was found in a cabin near the lake. Van Natta, told officers he made his way to the cabin after a heavy snowfall forced him to make his way in the back woods. He said he had both food and fuel during his stay in the cabin. Van Natta left his home in Caldwell a week ago for a hunting trip, telling his wife he would be home by Thanksgiving day.

BOISE, Dec. 2 (U)—An increase in the employment security agency's trust fund "to provide a cushion in the event of economic recession" has been recommended by the executive Director H. Barrett. Barrett told the agency's advisory council at a meeting in Boise yesterday that an "altered tax base" is needed to establish greater stability in the fund which is used for payment of unemployment benefits. He said a boost in employer rates authorized by the 1963 legislature had saved the trust fund but that additional funds are still needed. "A recession would cut into the fund," he said, "and force increases in the employer contribution rates at a time when they could least afford them," Barrett said.

MOSCOW, Dec. 2 (U)—The body of a 37-year-old Washington State university student missing since Nov. 20 was found yesterday in an isolated farm shed 17 miles south of Moscow, Latah county sheriff A. O. Lucas said today. He said the body was apparently a suicide victim. He said a garden hose had been run from the fireplace of his small foreign car to the interior of the vehicle. Rugs were scattered in circles in the shed. The body was apparently that of the student he was reported missing. There were no notes, but the sheriff said he reportedly had been dependent.

BOISE, Dec. 2 (U)—The Idaho supreme court will consider today the case of a Missouri man who has waged a lengthy legal battle in an effort to escape extradition to his home state to face a murder charge. Charles Smith, who is charged with the slaying of his wife, whose body was found in a barrel at the bottom of a lake in Adair county, Mo., filed an affidavit in district court denying his guilt and his flight from a district court. In the writ, filed following issuance of an extradition warrant by Gov. Robert E. Smylie, Smith denied he was in Missouri when his wife was allegedly murdered and challenged the validity of the writs issued by the Adair county prosecuting attorney. Smith was arrested in Boise in March, 1963.

LEWISTON, Dec. 2 (U)—Two Lewiston brothers have been bound over to district court to face first degree burglary charges, filed in connection with the theft Monday of a tavern and containing an estimated \$5,000 in cash and checks, Dennis R. Wilson, 29, and Robert D. Wilson, 18, were arrested in Astin, Wash., just across the Snake river from Lewiston early yesterday and agreed to return to Idaho, officers said. The brothers waived preliminary hearings. Police Lt. L. C. Lucas said a considerable amount of the loot was recovered at a Lewiston residence. The 400-pound safe was found Monday afternoon in a gully near the Lewiston grade.

BOISE, Dec. 2 (U)—State vocational education director Ray Glenn reports that Idaho's plan for an expanded vocational training program in the schools has been received favorably by federal officials. He said that means the state annual funding which expires in 1965 for the federal fund will be eligible for \$350,000 in the current fiscal year, ending next June 30, with the provision that every federal dollar received must be matched from state or local funds. Glenn said he expects most of the money used in the state under the new program in the current school year will go for equipment to "beef up" courses for about 100 high schools and at Idaho state university, Boise Junior college and North Idaho Junior college.

POCATELLO, Dec. 2 (U)—An 18-year-old Highland high school student who braved six days' and nights of cold weather in the owner today of Bannock county's license plate No. 1. Joe Barber had bought the license plate from the county office in Pocatello for \$50 today in order to be the first in line when license plate sales began yesterday. His companion during the long vigil, Richard Moore, got license plate No. 2. Barber showed up at the courthouse with an electric blanket but it was of no use after the county commissioners ordered electricity to outside plugs shut off. They contended the cost of the electricity could have been greater than the profit from the sale of the first plate.

POCATELLO, Dec. 2 (U)—The task of selecting a jury to hear the first degree murder trial of John Dee Larsen, accused in the knife slaying of 16-year-old Vicki Jo Quinn in 1963, continued today in fifth district court here. Work on the jury selection began yesterday but was slowed down by painstaking questioning of prospective jurors by Bannock county Prosecutor Hugh Maguire and defense Attorney John R. Black. Two persons were excused by Judge Arthur P. Oliver when they said they were opposed to capital punishment. Six were excused for having opinions which they said would take precedence over evidence. Five others were released for assorted other reasons. The Quinn girl's body was found April 21, 1963, in a grave on the Fort Hall Indian reservation but the case remained unsolved until earlier this year when Richard Henry Durt implicated Larsen in a statement given to police.

BURLEY, Dec. 2 (U)—Delbert Downing, west Texan, will be the guest dinner speaker at 7 p.m. Tuesday at the Burley-Rupert Knife and Fork club at the Ponderosa Inn. Downing is a husky farm boy who played football at Rice Institute, later served as field director over the entire European sector of the Red Cross, managed a large hotel successfully, then completely served as manager of the Chamber of Commerce, Midland, Tex., before resigning to devote more time to speaking. RUPERT, Dec. 2—The Idaho Potato Growers and Marketing Association district six, will hold its annual meeting at 8 p. m. Friday at the courthouse in Rupert.

Philip Bare, chairman of the group, reports new directors will be elected for the coming year and many problems concerning potatoes will be discussed.

Bare said because of the short supply of potatoes this year and a favorable price being received by growers, there will never be a better opportunity to negotiate a fair and equitable contract for growers. As operating capital becomes harder to obtain and cost of production continually increases, it becomes necessary for growers to maintain a fair, steady income for his crop, he stressed.

A goal that would guarantee production plus reasonable profit to the growers is the aim of the association, Bare emphasized. It would be beneficial not only to the growers but to the processor as well.

However, there is only one way the association can negotiate such a contract and that is through strength of its membership.

Therefore it is to the interest of every grower to be at the meeting to voice his opinion, Bare stated.

Last year the association rejected the contract offered by the P. Simpson company because an agreement could not be reached on contract terms, Bare said. Discussion also is planned on other items such as seed prices, availability of dockside inspection, advertising tax and possible new state legislation.
