### Jury Finds Pair Guilty Of Spying

NEWARK, N. J., Dec. 3 (AP)—An American engineer and a Russian national were found guilty last night of spying for the Soviet Union.

The two men—electronics engineer John Butenko, 39, Orange, N. J., and Igor Ivanov, 34, an employee of the Soviet trade agency—faced a possible death penalty.

They were convicted of passing top secret plans for the strategic air command's (SAC) world-wide alert system to Russian agents.

U. S. district court Judge Anthony T. Augusti, who presided in the case and who will determine their fate, did not immediately set a date for sentencing.

A jury of eight women and four men found Butenko guilty on three counts of espionage, and Ivanov on two counts after about 10 hours of deliberation.

Ivanov was sentenced to 100,000 bail which was paid immediately by the Soviet government. Butenko went back to Hudson county jail where he has been held without bail since his arrest on Oct. 20, 1963.

The defendants were charged with turning over secrets on SAC communications system for missiles and bombers to three members of the Russian U. N. delegation. The diplomats were deported to Russia last year.

### Canadian Complaints Explained

OTTAWA, Dec. 3 (AP)—Canadian complaints are from the United States.

One of the common complaints of Canadians is that Americans own so much of their country that Canada is no longer master of its own house.

There have been efforts by both main political parties to discourage foreign investments, but the pressure of provincial governments and of business was so great that the proposed measures were dropped.

At present, U.S. investments are increasing.

Non-Canadians—mostly Americans—control 70 per cent of the investments in Canadian petroleum and natural gas, 60 per cent in mining and smelting and 60 per cent in manufacturing. This means that major decisions often are made by people who live outside Canada. It also means that huge sums of money flow abroad in interest and dividends.

Foreign control of Canadian economy worries Canadians and hurts their pride.

They are afraid, for example, that in the event of a business slump, U.S. owners might close their Canadian subsidiaries and cause large-scale unemployment, while keeping their U.S. plants in operation. They also resent the application of U.S. laws, such as those restricting exports to Cuba and Red China, to Canadian subsidiaries.

Trade Minister Mitchell Sharp has said Canada is not worried that the United States will be unfriendly but that it may "neglect to trace our legitimate interests into account."

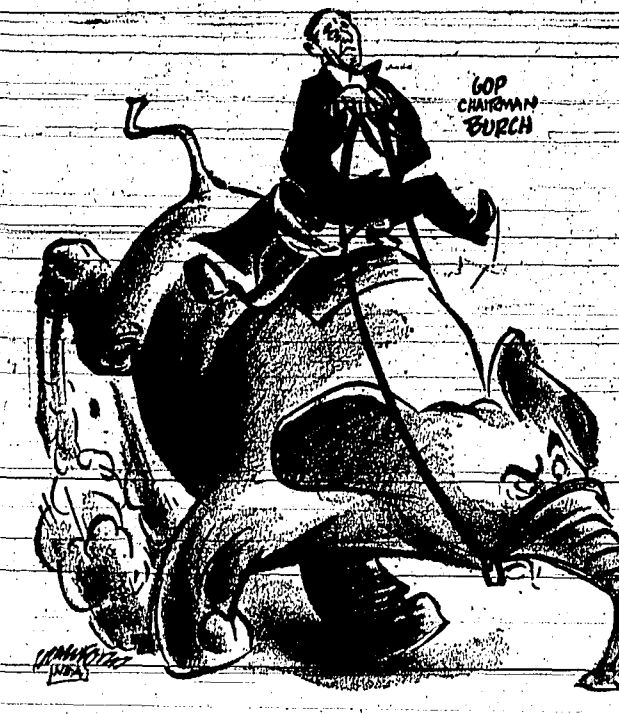

### Ex-Dictator Sent Back To Madrid

SEVILLA, Spain, Dec. 3 (AP)—Juan D. Peron returned today after a brief and unsuccessful attempt to re-establish himself in South America for return to Argentina, the nation that cast off his dictatorship in 1955.

Brazil blocked Peron's plan and shipped him back on the same ship DCS jet airliner that carried him from Madrid to Rio de Janeiro yesterday.

The reaction of the Spanish government was unclear. Peron's return could be interpreted as a violation of one of the terms of his asylum, a pledge to avoid political activity, but officials in Madrid said they understood he would be allowed to remain temporarily, until a definite decision is reached.

Whatever the outcome, Spanish authorities seemed to be shielding Peron from public attention.

The airliner that carried Peron back across the Atlantic, scheduled for Madrid, was diverted en route to Sevilla, 250 miles southwest of the capital.

An informed source said the Spanish government ordered the diversion to keep Peron away from more than 100 lawmakers—Spanish and foreign—waiting for him at the Madrid airport.

Peron, 60, got off in Sevilla and drove in a black limousine to a hotel, the Andaluca. The city's police chief was reported to have accompanied Peron as he came from the hotel.

### Idaho Has 2 Of Nation's Best Aquifers

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3 (AP)—Idaho has two of the nation's greatest aquifers, or underground water carriers, a report of the U.S. Geological survey requested by Sen. Frank Church, D, Idaho, shows.

A report compiled by the survey in cooperation with the Idaho department of reclamation and Idaho bureau of mines and geology listed the two great aquifers as the Snake river plain and of Bliss and the gravel beneath Rathdrum prairie in northern Idaho.

Present and potential development from the Snake river plain aquifer was described by the report as "very large."

The report said additional large scale developments probably will involve water exchange operations. These operations, it said, will result in transportation of water chiefly to tributary valleys such as Raft river, Goose creek and Salmon Falls creek.

### Khiem Tells of Red Infiltration

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3 (AP)—North Viet Nam sent 30,000 to 40,000 infiltrators into South Viet Nam during the past three years and the flow continues at a stepped-up pace, Ambassador Tran Thien Khiem said today.

The newly arrived South Vietnamese envoy said in an exclusive interview that the Ho Chi Minh trail, passing from North Viet Nam through Laos, serves as the main road of infiltration.

Khiem, bespectacled 30-year-old soldier trained by the French and Americans, is a lieutenant general who has served as commander-in-chief of the South Vietnamese armed forces and as his country's minister of defense.

He was one of the triumvirate along with Gen. Nguyen Khanh and Gen. Duong Van Minh which ruled South Viet Nam last summer before the formation of the present civilian government.

How to stop the infiltration has been a perpetual worry of the Viet Cong and of North Vietnamese forces in, and passing through, the territory of Laos in violation of the Geneva accords of 1953.

The state department said yesterday that the evidence of North Vietnamese support and infiltration into South Viet Nam is "extensive and complex" but no figures were given.

Khiem said that 60 per cent of the infiltrators have been military cadres and 40 per cent are civilians who are trained at organizing Communist cells at the village and provincial levels.

According to captured documents and word from prisoners of war, the infiltration increased over a three year period of 1961-1963, Khiem said. "According to the figures we got we understand North Viet Nam sent between 30,000 and 40,000 people hard to control."

Asked if stopping the infiltration would be decisive in turning the tide of battle in South Viet Nam, Khiem replied: "We do think that if we can succeed in stopping the infiltration it will have a very large impact."

"The problem of infiltration was studied by a White House statement Tuesday which followed a White House meeting between President Johnson and U. S. Ambassador Maxwell D. Taylor. It said there was accumulating evidence of continuing and increased North Vietnamese support of the Viet Cong and of North Vietnamese forces in, and passing through, the territory of Laos in violation of the Geneva

## Man Goes on No-Food Diet For 120 Days

**OKLAHOMA CITY, Dec. 3 (AP)**—McKenna, who crunched his weight from 300 to 275 pounds on a 120-day starvation diet, said yesterday he would do it again if necessary.

McKenna, 60, said he was waiting about 10 to 15 inches and said he would repeat the performance despite the hunger he never lost and the desperate craving for salt he developed.

He admitted he had on his diet Thanksgiving day but explained, "I didn't put any weight on me, so now I'm 265."

The Oklahoma City newspaper man lost the pounds under supervision of doctors at the Oklahoma medical research foundation from May 3 to Aug. 31. He ate no food during the four-month period.

After his release, he went on a "suggested diet," prepared by medical researchers and is still sticking to it. During confinement he ate only vitamins, coffee and sugar-free soft drinks.

The four-man medical team that supervised McKenna said he was overweight just because he ate too much.

## Hoffa's Aides Acquitted in San Francisco

**SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 3 (AP)**—A U. S. federal court jury last night acquitted two business associates of Teamster boss Jimmy Hoffa of extortion charges.

They were Paul Dorfmann, 63, and his associate, Al Dorfmann, 41, Chicago insurance brokers. The Dorfmanns wrote insurance for the properties of Teamsters health and welfare funds, worth more than one billion dollars.

Defense Attorney Harvey Silas, Chicago, suggested to the jury that the trial was an attempt to punish Hoffa by prosecuting his friends.

Another defense counsel, James Martin (Mac) Innis, San Francisco, asked the jury where Hoffa's friends are, and where they are prosecuted by the department of justice—the prosecutions would stop.

Paul Dorfmann, an ex-prize fighter, is a Chicago multi-millionaire. He has been acquitted last March in Chicago on charges in the case trial in which Hoffa and three others were convicted.

A few weeks later the justice department brought its extortion indictment against the Dorfmanns, who have been business associates of Hoffa for many years.

Key witness who testified Hoffa, an international insurance operator who has made and lost fortunes, Hoffa is due to begin service of an 18-month sentence for mail fraud in a few weeks. He also faces indictments in New York for federal income tax evasion.

Hoffa claimed during his 11-day trial that Alan Dorfmann stole the money and deposited it in Hoffa's insurance firm in the Bahamas. The defense maintained that the money had been stolen in effect and Hoffa's many corporate operations.

It also was asserted by the defense that Hoffa perjured himself in his income tax case and, perhaps, would see a reduction in his mail fraud sentence.

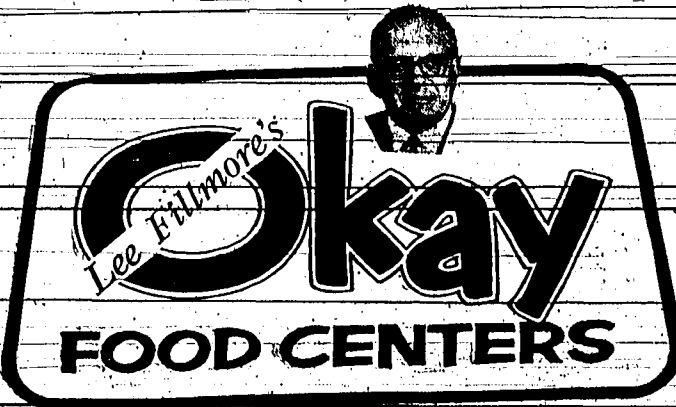

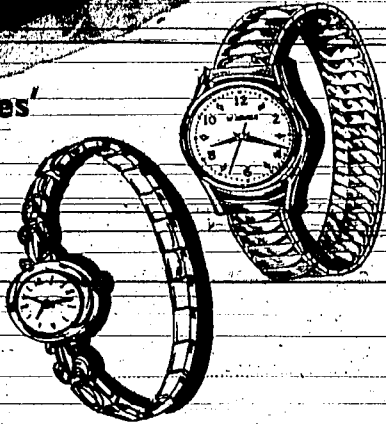

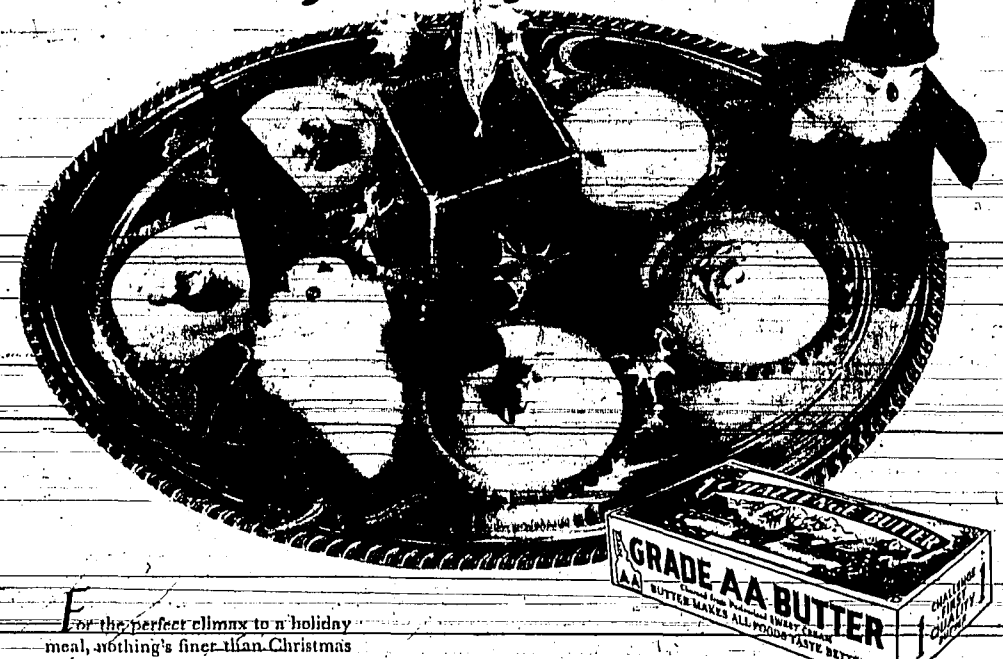

### Report Given On Alaska At Richfield

RICHFIELD, Dec. 3—A report on Alaskan conditions since the earthquake, experiences of a Lincoln County man in Alaska and plans for the Dec. 18 ladies night dinner honoring the district Lions club governor, highlighted the Tuesday night dinner meeting of the Richfield Lions club.

John Kearny, Anchorage, Alaska, property owner, related his experiences in the earthquake and stated one-half of the total value of property had been wiped out by the earthquake in the Anchorage area.

Government aid has been very slow and of little value to Alaskans thus far as Alaska does not have matching funds for rebuilding as required to get assistance, he stated. He quoted statistics with Alaska receiving \$5 million dollars in aid as compared to 176 million dollars and 800 million dollars to other countries in earthquake aid in recent years and without requiring matching funds, or a high rate of interest.

W. F. Mathison, Rhinohorn, told of his work and life in Arabia as an electrician.

It is a poor land for farming, he said, with constant winds which also blow much of the soil into the Persian Gulf. The winds also revealed rich mineral deposits for the oil rich land.

**\$863,000 to Be Saved by Site Closure**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3 (AP)—The Army today says the closing of the Cottonwood radar station in northern Idaho will save \$863,000 a year without "significant impact" on air defense capabilities.

### Delaware Prepares Lawsuit Contesting Selection of Presidential Electors

By RICHARD CHARNOCK

NOISE, Dec. 3 (AP)—A lawsuit challenging selection of presidential electors by statewide ballot is being prepared for submission to the U.S. supreme court by the state of Delaware.

An outgrowth of the "one man, one vote" theory, the suit would challenge the apportionment of congressional districts throughout the nation, the suit is expected to be filed shortly after the first of the year.

Suits for the suit were planted in Delaware by Sen. Donald P. Buckner several months ago by prominent citizens throughout his state who contend the present method of choosing such electors is unfair to small states.

Since then, according to Buckner's chief deputy, Thomas Herlihy III, a number of citizens have petitioned the attorney general and special committees have been formed in Dover, Wilmington and other cities.

Herlihy told UP "the suit will not challenge the electoral college which meets this month to formally elect Lyndon Johnson, but that it will be aimed at changing the system for future elections."

To that end, Buckner has written attorneys general for the other 49 states including Idaho, Alan D. Shepard, informing them of the plan and seeking their support. Herlihy said a number have offered to join the suit and even the attorney general of New York is showing interest.

Basically, the suit will contend that voters in thinly populated states should be able to pick the same number of presidential electors as those in the more-populous ones.

"At present, a state has as many presidential electors as it has U.S. senators and congressmen. Under that plan, Delaware has three presidential electors and one district presidential elector," Buckner wrote his fellow attorneys general. "Every citizen of the United States would be at par in presidential elections."

"But the general ticket system for the popular election of presidential electors who correspond to representatives, operates to maximize the political party power of the larger states in presidential elections and to minimize the political party power of the smaller states."

"This is why the political parties nominate candidates for president from the larger states," Buckner said. "It is the use of the general ticket system that effectively eliminates the interest of the smaller states from any consideration as presidential electors."

### Nevadan Gets Second Term After Recount

LAS VEGAS, Dec. 3 (AP)—Sen. Howard W. Cannon slipped victory late yesterday in his bid for a second term, almost a month to a day after the Nov. 3 election.

But Lieut. Gov. Paul Laxalt, the Republican challenger, said he was considering going to the state supreme court to protest Cannon's win.

The final 65-paper ballots were recounted yesterday, giving Cannon an apparent final lead of 84 votes.

The final statewide vote was Cannon 66,007 to 66,823.

The last senate race to be decided in the United States has been a tie-splitter affair since the election night when at one point only 10 votes separated the two candidates.

A canvass of the votes by county clerks last week gave Cannon the victory by a razor-thin margin of 48 votes—66,229 to 66,228. Laxalt demanded a recount and in doing so, lost ground.
