


Pope Calls For Unity In India

BOMBAY, India, Dec. 3 (UPI)—After a dramatic clearing of hands with some of the spiritual leaders of India's non-Christian millions, Pope Paul VI today called for inter-faith cooperation "to build the common future of the human race."
The pope came closer together with our hearts in mutual understanding, esteem and love, the pontiff told a colorful audience of Hindus, Moslems and Parsis.
"This mutual understanding and friendship, in this sacred communion, we must also begin to work together to build the common future of the human race."
The statement and the symbolic touching of hands occurred on the second day of the pope's triumphal visit to this teeming city on the shores of the Arabian sea.
"It was a spectacular manifestation of the spirit of the Ecumenical council for closer contacts between Roman Catholics and non-Christians."
The pope stressed the same theme again today in a separate audience for non-Catholic Christians.
"My dear friends in Christ," he said, "we rejoice in the fact that our pilgrimage to Bombay has made it possible to greet the representatives of so many Christian churches and communities of India."
The divisions which exist among Christians are a cause of pain to all who serve the Lord faithfully.
The Catholic church also is giving its own proper initiative towards the reconciliation of all Christians in the unity of the one and only Church of Christ."

Janss Official Tells Of Sun Valley Plans

Joseph Leggett, vice president, Janss corporation, recent purchaser of Sun Valley, told members of the Twin Falls Rotary club Wednesday noon, that "leisure will become one of our fastest growing industries."
Well over 200 Rotarians and guests attended the meeting, held at the American Legion hall, which afforded many Twin Falls businessmen an opportunity to see and hear about some of the proposed changes the Los Angeles-based corporation is contemplating. Program chairman for the meeting was L. James Koutnik, who introduced Leggett to the Rotarians.
Leggett said that the company could spend upwards of three-quarters of a million dollars and a year's time just studying the possibilities Sun Valley offers.
"I don't mean to be critical of Union Pacific," said Leggett, "but operating a resort is different than operating a railroad."
The railroad demonstrated great foresight in selecting the area and developing it, and in rail operation one cannot argue with 100 years of success. But we are going to make some immediate changes.
He said small operational changes would be made, such as dismissal of ski school classes at varied hours to relieve lift congestion. Snow cats might be used to supplement the lifts on certain runs and additional lifts might be constructed in the Warm Springs area, to mention a few of the changes.
He noted that considerable work already has been done in the lobby of the lodge, pointing out that this is the first lobby change in many years. The company is planning a new club in the lodge, which could be housed in the basement, with the idea that this would be a jumping-off spot for new talent.
Leggett said the ultimate development of the area would not clutter up the valley.
"We believe in the picture area," he said. He noted that in one company development the company has sold 150 acres in the area.

Troops Gain Ground From Congo Rebels

LEOPOLDVILLE, The Congo, Dec. 3 (UPI)—The government is winning back control of the deserted former rebel capital of Stanleyville with rocket attacks on rebel troops and a roundup of 10,000 Africans there in a security check, it was reported yesterday. A Canadian embassy official who returned from the looted, fighter-bombed city said Cuban exiles flying T28 fighter-bombers had weakened the rebel position with repeated rocket attacks on the left bank and the surrounding area. Government troops said Congo rebels were attacking 170 suspected insurgents along the 10,000 check. These rebels were found in the African quarter where sniper fire had held the population in terror.
The government yesterday flew in 100 crack Katanga paratroopers to aid the hard-pressed government troops and said the government's position was more secure since white mercenaries first marched into the city eight days ago after Belgian paratroopers rescued white hostages.
In London, Belgian Foreign Minister Paul-Henri Spaak said Belgian leaders yesterday said the chances for a negotiated release of the estimated 400 to 700 white hostages in rebel hands was virtually nil. He believed the best chance for their rescue was to speed up advance of central government forces now moving through the north. One force rescued 40 whites yesterday.

Hearings on Baker Case Erupt Into Shouting Match

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3 (AP)—The Hobby Baker hearings erupted into a shouting match today with special rules committee counsel Lennox P. McLendon calling Sen. John J. Williams, R., Del., a liar. "You are absolutely, unambiguously untrue in that statement," yelled McLendon, a white-haired 74-year-old attorney. Williams had said that he had told McLendon he had additional information about government contracts handled by the McCloskey Construction company, but he said, McLendon was not interested in pursuing the matter and other figures in the current hearing.
"That's which the explosion came."
"Just a minute," shouted Sen. Curtis, R., Neb. "This is an impertinence such as I have never before seen. This is the first time an employee of the senate has called a senator a liar."
"He has disqualified himself," Williams interjected that he did not, make such a statement on last Friday.
"I deny emphatically any word that McLendon said. There is not an ounce, not an element of truth in it."
Curtis continued to demand that McLendon remove himself from his post as special counsel. "The government is not going to sit here and be publicly misrepresented."
Williams sat quietly while Curtis and McLendon exchanged sharp comments. Curtis then commented that McLendon had a perfect right to state his understanding of the conversation.
Williams, who furnished much of the information for the hearing, said he had no objection to the rules committee might find it "very interesting" if it did look into various government construction projects handled by the McCloskey company.
The hearing took place when William K. Stewart, Republican vice president of McCloskey company was testifying about procedures in signing insurance premium rates.

Instructions Given for Tree Cutting

BOISE, Dec. 3 (AP)—Instructions for Magic Valley residents in cutting their own family Christmas trees Saturday and Sunday south of Almo were stressed today by Robert Brock, district forester for the bureau of land management.
Permits must be purchased for \$1 each from BLM employees at the site, Brock said. Five hundred permits will be issued, one to a family, and an adult must be present to sign for the permit. Trees are not to be resold.
Persons coming to Almo will find signs directing them to the tree-cutting area south of town. Families must purchase their own trees before they cut a tree, Brock emphasized.
Almo is located about 60 miles south of Burley on the Albion highway and the cutting area is about one mile south of Almo. Tree cutters are asked to leave no stump or branch on the ground and not to cross either a fence or a road.
The BLM official also pointed out trees should not be cut on either side of a road, and that trees should be selected where the growth is thick and in need of thinning.

Smylie Asks GOP to Reject Central Plan

BOISE, Dec. 3 (UPI)—Idaho Gov. Robert E. Smylie urged the Republican party today to "reject any proposal which suggests that all power in the making of party policy should rest in Washington." Preparing to leave by commercial airliner for Denver where he will preside as chairman over the Republican Governors' conference, Smylie said to do otherwise "is the very opposite of all we have fought for, Centralization of power is the great enemy of freedom and we should guard against it inside the party as well as in the government," he said. "I am confident most thinking people in the party agree with this point of view."
He pointed out that the government would work with the congressional and senatorial leadership, as well as the many local and legislative leaders of the party in what he called "this work of repair and reconstruction."
"We will work with caution with unity of purpose and with the hope that the steps we can take now will bring us some extension of power that comes as a consequence of defeat, and a commence building now the framework which will power a substantial comeback for the party in 1964."
He said the GOP governors were meeting in Denver in hopes they could begin a "united effort" that includes all willing elements of the Republican party in plans for local and state victories in 1964 and national victories in 1968.
Earlier, Michigan Gov. George Romney warned that no one should expect the conference to be a panacea to the party's problems.
"I wouldn't have any disagreement with Governor Romney's view that no one should expect this damage in one sitting," he said. "But he added that there was 'no individual or personal power struggle involved' in the Republican governors' plan to begin the road to the party and the nation we seek."

Cable Railway Car Jumps Track

BOLZANO, Italy, Dec. 3 (AP)—A cable railway car crowded with 100 computers and a student is jammed the track today, "barren down" a steep mountain slope and crashed into a wire fence. Three hours after the accident, the casualty toll was given as three dead and 50 injured. Four of them seriously. Of the injured, 30 were hospitalized and the others were given first aid treatment and released.

Snow, Rain, Cold Strike Parts of U.S.

Most of the nation had snow or rain today.
Snow fell from New England through the Plains to the Rockies. The heaviest snow belt, with no accumulation of three to six inches, extended from New York State through the Texas and Oklahoma panhandle into northern New Mexico. Texas Panhandle was quilted with a layer up to five inches and continued snowfall atop freezing rain with temperatures in the teens made highways hazardous.
As much as six inches fell around Jamestown, N.Y. Much of Oklahoma had a seven-inch snow. Chicago received one to two inches. In northern Mexico, there was a 12-inch snow fall at San Juan Creek east of Albuquerque, although none in the city.
South of the snow band, freezing rain caused driving peril. Rainfall in northern Kentucky included readings of 33 below zero at Tiffin River Falls and 23 below at International Falls. At Houghton, Mich., snow cover measured 21 inches.
Rain fell across much of the south. Memphis had one and three-quarters inches in six hours early in the day.

Withdrawal Of Land Is Requested

BOISE, Dec. 3 (AP)—Land withdrawal for possible water resource development, affecting a number of small islands in the Snake river between Hammett and King Hill, was requested by the bureau of land management.
The withdrawal was asked by the U.S. Geological Survey, which said the action is intended to protect potential reservoir sites which might be developed for conservation of water and for development of hydroelectric power. The area includes 127.55 acres and the withdrawal is from all forms of appropriation under the public land laws, except mining locations, mineral leasing and material sales.
Orval G. Hadley, manager of the bureau of land management, said the withdrawal can be filed in his office during the next 30 days.

Scientists to Alter Course Of Mars Shot

PASADENA, Calif., Dec. 3 (AP)—Scientists are planning a delicate maneuver Friday morning designed to alter Mariner 4's course so it will pass within 1,000 miles of Mars next July.
If it's successful, the July fly-by will be advanced three days. The midcourse maneuver will be accomplished by igniting a small rocket briefly aboard the probe.
"Hopefully, the burst of speed this will produce will alter the angle of firing will change the direction of the trajectory to a distance of about 100 miles from the surface. As things now stand, the Mariner will miss Mars by 180,000 miles."

BOISE, Dec. 3 (AP)—Past legislators have failed to cope with the problem of the difference in population between Idaho's two congressional districts, but lawmakers are prepared to do it in the 1962 session.
The question this time is not whether it will be done, but how the 150,000-vote difference can be eliminated.
Nearly half the lawmakers responding to an Associated Press questionnaire said they favor shifting Ada county, which has 65,000 people, into the first district.
Many also suggested moving Lemhi and Ouster counties, or Lonihi alone, into the second district.

Salon's Supporters Stand on Sidelines As GOP Governors Gather for Meeting

DENVER, Dec. 3 (AP)—Sen. Bartley Crum's supporters stood on the sidelines today as Republican governors gathered here for a searching look at the future of their badly divided party.
About the only representative of the Crum cause was a viewpoint scheduled to be on hand in this extraordinary session of state GOP executives in Denver.
A supporter of Crum, Goldwater, Burch will risk his \$20,000-a-year job on a confidence vote in national committee session Jan. 22-23 in Chicago.
Gov. Paul Panning of Arizona, elected to the senate to fill the seat that Goldwater will vacate, said he could not be on hand for the meeting here.
P. Clifton White, regarded as the "real pro" of the Goldwater cause, said he had one reservation, indicating he had reservations about the party's future.

Russ Denounces Congo Airlift

MOSCOW, Dec. 3 (AP)—Leonid Brezhnev, the Soviet communist party chairman, denounced today the Western paratroop landing in the Congo and also said the Soviet Union is ready to help North Viet Nam.
But in retaliation stands already taken by the Kremlin, Brezhnev withheld any specific pledge of direct Soviet intervention in either area.
He said the paratroop landing by the Congo "surprising and example of imperialist piracy" and said Western nations were doomed to failure.

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

Man Goes on No-Food Diet For 120 Days

OKLAHOMA CITY, Dec. 3 (AP)—McKenna, who crunched his weight from 300 to 275 pounds on a 120-day starvation diet, said yesterday he would do it again if necessary.

McKenna, 60, said he was waiting about 10 to 15 inches and said he would repeat the performance despite the hunger he never lost and the desperate craving for salt he developed.

He admitted he had on his diet Thanksgiving day but explained, "I didn't put any weight on me, so now I'm 265."

The Oklahoma City newspaper man lost the pounds under supervision of doctors at the Oklahoma medical research foundation from May 3 to Aug. 31. He ate no food during the four-month period.

After his release, he went on a "suggested diet," prepared by medical researchers and is still sticking to it. During confinement he ate only vitamins, coffee and sugar-free soft drinks.

The four-man medical team that supervised McKenna said he was overweight just because he ate too much.

Hoffa's Aides Acquitted in San Francisco

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 3 (AP)—A U. S. federal court jury last night acquitted two business associates of Teamster boss Jimmy Hoffa of extortion charges.

They were Paul Dorfmann, 63, and his associate, Al Dorfmann, 41, Chicago insurance brokers. The Dorfmanns wrote insurance for the properties of Teamsters health and welfare funds, worth more than one billion dollars.

Defense Attorney Harvey Silas, Chicago, suggested to the jury that the trial was an attempt to punish Hoffa by prosecuting his friends.

Another defense counsel, James Martin (Mac) Innis, San Francisco, asked the jury where Hoffa's friends were when Hoffa was in the federal trial in which Hoffa and three others were convicted.

A few weeks later the justice department brought its extortion indictment against the Dorfmanns, who have been business associates of Hoffa for many years.

Key witness who testified Hoffa, an international insurance operator who has made and lost fortunes, Hoffa is due to begin service of an 18-month sentence for mail fraud in a few weeks. He also faces indictments in New York for federal income tax evasion.

Hoffa claimed during his 11-day trial that Al Dorfmann stole the money and deposited it in Hoffa's insurance firm in the Bahamas. The defense maintained that the money had been stolen in effect and Hoffa's "many corporate operations."

It also was asserted by the defense that Hoffa perjured himself and that the government would take it easy upon him in his income-tax case and, perhaps, would to a reduction in his mail fraud sentence.

Some are scheduled for completion before the end of the year, others in 1965 and 1966.

BOISE, Dec. 3—Commercial slaughter plants in Idaho produced an estimated 15,501,000 pounds of red meat during October, the U. S. department of agriculture reported today. That was down one per cent from September output but was up nearly 15 per cent from production in October last year.

POCATELLO, Dec. 3—Since four meter maids began patrolling Pocatello streets a month ago, collections have risen about \$100 from parking meters, the hike in earnings came after motorists were caught in a deluge of parking tickets after the girls started their daily rounds Oct. 27. The only problem now, says Police Chief John Perkins, is a clerical one—looking up the owners of the tickled cars to send warrants if they don't pay.

POCATELLO, Dec. 3—About 50 legislators from throughout southern Idaho are expected here Saturday for legislative day sponsored jointly by the Idaho State university annual association and the Idaho state Chamber of Commerce. The lawmakers will be informed on problems and interests of ISU as well as those of communities throughout the Pocatello-Idaho Falls area. The day's activities will include a Saturday night dinner at Hotel Bannock featuring an address by William L. Glinka, manager of the atomic energy commission. Idaho speakers office at Pocatello will be in charge. Idaho State university will feature a brief talk by Dr. Laurence E. Gale, dean of ISU, and representatives of five area chambers.

BOISE, Dec. 3

The fish and game department reports that more than \$250,000 has been spent in Idaho in the past 18 months to develop trails and road access to major waterways. The state agency said \$183,359 was provided by the federal government and the state put up \$127,099. The funds financed 17 projects in six counties: Benewah, Bonner, Bounding, Kootenai, Shoshone and Teton.

POCATELLO, Dec. 3—Idaho State university has received a grant of \$60,530 to continue its series of National Science Foundation summer institutes for secondary school teachers of science and mathematics. The award by the NSF is for a "bright spot" institute next summer. It will be the third NSF institute at ISU and the second in development of the state's leading participation in the area of teacher education in physical science. Dr. John Hillman, associate professor of mathematics and the institute director, said that 45 secondary school teachers will attend the 1964 institute with all expenses paid through the NSF.

They will be selected from the 98 men and women who participated in ISU's 1963 and 1964 institutes. Each participant will take three classes from a list that includes courses in chemistry, geology, mathematics and physics. He also will have opportunities for seminars, reviews and conferences with both the institute faculty and distinguished visiting scientists.

BOISE, Dec. 3

The 21st annual Idaho-Indian conference opened yesterday after announcement that next year's will probably be held in Lewiston with the Nez Perce tribe as host. Angus A. Wilson, Lewiston, is to serve as chairman. Dr. T. O. Carver, state health administrator, a panelist, said his department is interested in setting up clinics on reservations as a means of averting potential epidemics. Dr. Clayton Jeppesen said new legislation gives Indian authorities concurrent jurisdiction with federal officers in many cases. He said he hopes tribal officers will take full advantage of the law.

BOISE, Dec. 3—The annual meeting of the Idaho Conservation Council closed today after consideration of resolutions and election of officers. Delegates were told yesterday that the 35-hour work week is "as phony as a three dollar bill." Lee E. Knack, labor relations director for Morrison-Knudsen company, Inc., said it supposedly intended to reduce unemployment, but he said the 35-hour week will be a goal of organized labor in the next congress. He said there will be amendment of the Fair Labor Act to bar states from enacting "right to work" laws, a \$2 an hour minimum wage, boosting overtime pay to double time, federalization of the unemployment compensation program and a "massive increase" in social security taxes.





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

Report Given On Alaska At Richfield

RICHFIELD, Dec. 3—A report on Alaskan conditions since the earthquake, experiences of a Lincoln County man in Alaska and plans for the Dec. 18 ladies night dinner honoring the district Lions club governor, highlighted the Tuesday night dinner meeting of the Richfield Lions club.

John Kearny, Anchorage, Alaska, property owner, related his experiences in the earthquake and stated one-half of the total value of property had been wiped out by the earthquake in the Anchorage area.

Government aid has been very slow and of little value to Alaskans thus far as Alaska does not have matching funds for rebuilding as required to get assistance, he stated. He quoted statistics with Alaska receiving \$5 million dollars in aid as compared to 176 million dollars and 800 million dollars to other countries in earthquake aid in recent years and without requiring matching funds, or a high rate of interest.

W. F. Mathison, Rhinohorn, told of his work and life in Arabia as an electrician.

It is a poor land for farming, he said, with constant winds which also blow much of the soil into the Persian Gulf. The winds also revealed rich mineral deposits for the oil rich land.

He told of polygamy in Arabia with a man permitted four wives by the law. At his death he inherited the wives. A low crime rate is attributed by Mathison to the severe penalties imposed. For the first offense of stealing, a person's hand is cut off, and for the second the other hand is cut off, and for the third time the person's head.

\$863,000 to Be Saved by Site Closure

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3 (AP)—The Army today says the closing of the Cottonwood radar station in northern Idaho will save \$863,000 a year without "significant impact" on air defense capabilities.

In response to a request by Sen. Frank Church, D., Idaho, to justify the closure, the Air Force said the need for low altitude radar coverage in the Cottonwood area has been considerably reduced.

The station is one of 16 long-range radar facilities in the United States. The Air Force told both Church and Sen. J. William Jordan, D., Idaho, that the station would be closed by next June 30, with five men remaining after that until all forces properly are disposed of.

Jordan said he has asked the area redevelopment administration to expedite a feasibility study on application of the Federal Water Company for a loan to establish a service board plant in Idaho county.

Ground Broken For Kennedy Fine Arts Center

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3 (AP)—President Johnson yesterday turned the first shovel of earth for the national cultural center, dedicating it to the memory of John F. Kennedy and the "common awareness of all men."

Johnson, minus a topcoat in the near freezing weather, used a gold-plated spade to start the project. The center, which will cost \$31 million, will be built on the site of the Kennedy Center for the performing arts.

Congress appropriated \$5 million dollars for the center to be matched by public contributions.

When completed, the center will include a 2,700-seat theater seating 1,150, a hall for opera, ballet and musical plays seating 2,200, and a small studio for experimental plays and dances.

Delaware Prepares Lawsuit Contesting Selection of Presidential Electors

By RICHARD CHARNOCK
NOISE, Dec. 3 (AP)—A lawsuit challenging selection of presidential electors by statewide ballot is being prepared for submission to the U.S. supreme court by the state of Delaware.

An outgrowth of the "one man, one vote" theory, the suit would challenge the constitutionality of congressional districting throughout the nation, the suit is expected to be filed shortly after the first of the year.

Suits for the suit were planted in Delaware by Sen. Donald P. Buckson several months ago by prominent citizens throughout his state who contend the present method of choosing such electors is unfair to small states.

Since then, according to Buckson's chief deputy, Thomas Herlihy III, a number of citizens have petitioned the attorney general and special committees have been formed in Dover, Wilmington and other cities.

Herlihy told UP "the suit will not challenge the electoral college which meets this month to formally elect Lyndon Johnson, but that it will be aimed at changing the system for future elections."

To that end, Buckson has written attorneys general for the other 49 states including Idaho, Alan D. Shepard, informing them of the plan and seeking their support. Herlihy said a number have offered to join the suit and even the attorney general of New York is showing interest.

Basically, the suit will contend that voters in thinly populated states should be able to pick the same number of presidential electors as those in the more-populous ones.

"At present, a state has as many presidential electors as it has U.S. senators and congressmen. Under that plan, Delaware has three presidential electors and one district presidential elector," Buckson wrote his fellow attorneys general. "Every citizen of the United States would be at par in presidential elections."

"But the general ticket system for the popular election of presidential electors who correspond to representatives, operates to maximize the political party power of the larger states in presidential elections and to minimize the political party power of the smaller states."

"This is why the political parties nominate candidates for president from the larger states," Buckson said. "It is the use of the general ticket system that effectively eliminates the interest of the smaller states from any consideration as presidential electors."

Nevadan Gets Second Term After Recount

LAS VEGAS, Dec. 3 (AP)—Sen. Howard W. Cannon slipped victory late yesterday in his bid for a second term, almost a month to a day after the Nov. 3 election.

But Lieut. Gov. Paul Laxalt, the Republican challenger, said he was considering going to the state supreme court to protest Cannon's win.

The final 65-paper ballots were recounted yesterday, giving Cannon an apparent final lead of 84 votes.

The final statewide vote was Cannon 66,007 to 66,823.

The last senate race to be decided in the United States has been a tie-splitter affair since the election night when at one point only 10 votes separated the two candidates.

A canvass of the votes by county clerks last week gave Cannon the victory by a razor-thin margin of 48 votes—66,239 to 66,228. Laxalt demanded a recount and in doing so, lost ground.

Merchant Police Plan Studied

BUHL, Dec. 3—A plan for a merchant police program will completely control all of our legislative action, he declared. The smaller communities and minority groups will have no representation under the new ruling, he said.

Samuelson pointed out the system calls for inspection of shops, buildings, locks, checks made three or four times a night and a time clock punched to show the time of visitation and inspection. He noted the cost for each merchant for this protection would be \$7-per-month with some 60 to 70 businesses participating.

Samuelson noted his qualifications included four and one-half years of experience in security post of U.S. military service.

The nominating committee submitted a slate of nominees from which three directors will be elected. Nominees include Kenneth Curtis, Jerry Castleton, Dr. Darth Atwood, Marvin Carl Spradling.

It was reported ballots will be mailed to chamber members to vote for the directors.

Ozell Colwater, Buhl farmer, spoke to the group on the re-apportionment issue. He noted the supreme court has ruled a six to three decision that representation shall be on a population basis for both the house and senate.

He noted the constitution of the United States specifies representation shall be the basis of each state of the union subject to review of congress and not the U.S. supreme court. Under the new representation law 40 of the state might have given one of its four electoral votes to Sen. Harry Goldwater instead of all four to Johnson.

And while the outcome of the election would have been the same, Colwater might have cut into the electoral college landslide won by Johnson across the nation.

Buckson said his suit will be brought against the state of New York and other states similarly situated, to prevent their further use of the statewide general ticket system in the appointment of members of the house of representatives.

Herlihy, who said the case "very definitely" was stimulated by the reapportionment and redistricting amendments being considered in his state. He said a "lot of work is being done on it."

Shepard hasn't taken sides in the matter as yet but he said the proposed suit seems "a logical extension of the 'one man, one vote' theory used in the reapportionment and redistricting cases."

He said it will pose a "very interesting constitutional problem."

The suit also could have more than a little effect on the outcome of the next presidential election. For instance, had Buckson's theory been law this year Idaho might have given one of its four electoral votes to Sen. Harry Goldwater instead of all four to Johnson.

Inevitably the professional football teams have revealed and sought some draftable talent in college eligible grid talent and the college coaches are screaming.

While the injured college coaches deserve sympathy, their thinking is bound to be a little prejudiced. In fact, it isn't very logical.

That certainly can't be true as the pros are expected to keep their ranks filled. And they most certainly care about the boys—if not the name at least the talent.

Sympathy for one coach is hard to come by. It is "redistributing" one of the boys to the pros. That means the boy was deliberately withheld from action for one season to allow him to gain maturity and experience ready for a career in the pros through graduation.

The pros have an agreement whereby they will not sign any boy until his college class has graduated—four years after the boy would be eligible for individual class status at that time.

From the coaches' angle and the professional angle one can find fault with the pros' viewpoint. Ignoring the pros may be his best deal.

If the Arizona State halfback, who probably was offered a package running around \$100,000 a year, had wanted to play college ball for another year, then assume on the second day of practice he sustained an injury that would end his college career. He would be out the \$200,000 and any future remuneration his athletic talent might have earned him.

Even if the boy was unable to complete college at any time, the \$200,000 would more than pay for another year if he desired to earn his degree later in life.

Athletic ability is something over the great ones have for only a relative few. Time. They're not to cash in on it at the time it is the greatest. An injury can kill a career momentarily.

UCLA Risks Win Streak Against Illini

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 3 (AP)—UCLA's undefeated football team will put their 30-straight victory streak on the line Friday night when they invade Big Ten country to meet Illinois in their season opener.


