WASHINGTON, Dec. 8 (AP)—Republican National Chairman Dean Burch, beset by critics within his party, plans to take his case to the GOP national committee with a letter spelling out his views on leadership and party issues.

Reds Attack Outpost, 3 Yanks Killed

SAIGON, Dec. 8 (AP)—Three American servicemen were killed today as communist Viet Cong guerrillas drove Vietnamese government forces from an outpost 15 miles southwest of Saigon.

2 Unmanned Space Shots Set for Firing

CAPE KENNEDY, Dec. 8 (AP)—Two unmanned spaceflights are at least six years ahead of time and the other two years behind, were poised today for flights 12 hours and 7,000 miles per hour apart.

The victims were two officers and an enlisted man—the only Americans at the post. Their rescue was withheld pending notification of next of kin. An American spokesman said a platoon of about 40 rebels attacked the post in pre-dawn darkness. They took over the post, killing nine government soldiers and wounding 27 others. At the same time, the spokesman disclosed that the communist had launched their first air-aid "offensive" attack in the area of the district capital of An Lao, 300 miles north of Saigon. The stage began yesterday. "A determined fight will continue this afternoon," the spokesman said. Reinforcements had not been able to reach the village. U. S. helicopter pilots were reported flying rescue missions in the area but one aircraft was shot down by the rebels in one mission.

Armored Cars Patrol Sudan Street Areas

KHARTOUM, Sudan, Dec. 8 (AP)—Armored cars and truckloads of police today patrolled the streets of Khartoum where the toll of two days of fighting has climbed to 38 dead and more than 800 injured.

Johnson, Briton Discuss Plan For Multi-Nation Nuclear Fleet

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8 (AP)—President Johnson and British Prime Minister Harold Wilson met for an hour and 40 minutes today, continuing their talks on the U. S.-proposed multi-nation nuclear fleet. The two leaders were to meet again later this afternoon when they will discuss the problem of the war in South Vietnam and other free world problems. Their two conferences yesterday apparently resulted in a check of the poll-mell American push to create a Multilateral Nuclear Force (MLF) with or without British participation.

Mrs. Irma Baxter Resigns Fair Post; Board to Employ Full-Time Manager

The Twin Falls county fair board yesterday accepted the resignation of Mrs. Irma M. Baxter, acting secretary-manager of the fair. The board was reconstituted that all of the Thomas Parks family cooperated and assisted for many years in putting on the fair. Mrs. Baxter said, "It has been a family operation with each of the members cooperating to make the Twin Falls county fair probably the largest and most successful fair in the entire state."

Beagle

SIDALIA, Mo., Dec. 8 (AP)—A female beagle has been sent to Washington as a gift for President Johnson. The 5-year-old beagle, named "Beagle," was presented to the president by the Rev. William Freeman, Baptist minister who raises beagles as a hobby. The dog was sent by the instructions of E. D. Hollister, a lawyer from Ruessville, Neb. The minister said the dog was shipped by air yesterday, along with a card carrying the compliments of Hollister's four daughters—May, Linda, Susan and Irene.

Wilson plans to hold a press conference early Wednesday before departing for New York and Canada. In this connection, it was considered likely that Wilson would make any initial approach to Moscow and report back to the United States and other Allies. The Anglo-American leaders held two long business discussions yesterday; then participated in a festive evening of dinner and dancing at the White House. At dinner Johnson and Wilson exchanged expressions of high confidence, with the British leader praising Johnson for his "generous attitude" on the "civil rights issue."

Mars Shot Has 2 Problems, Speck of Dust Causes One

PASADENA, Calif., Dec. 8 (AP)—Mars, the "red planet," is heading toward Earth for an historic picture-taking rendezvous next July, but is running into two unexpected problems. Scientists at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory (JPL) said that neither problem was at all surprising. The first is the "dust speck" that is causing one of the problems. The purpose of this part of the test is to measure and transmit to scientists here the density, velocities, temperatures and direction of low-energy protons and electrons from the sun—that emanate from the sun as "solar wind." Five other experiments were working and two others will be attempted when Mariner-4 is launched on one-half month-long, 160-million-mile trip to Mars about July 14 with a fly-by of Mars.

Lobbyist Mum to Senate Questions On Baker, Check

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8 (UPI)—A Washington lobbyist refused today to answer senate questions about an incident involving Bobby Baker and a \$5,000 check. Wayne Bromley, once a former page, boy with Baker who was called to the witness stand after the senate rules committee heard testimony that Baker had cashed the \$5,000 check at the senate disbursing office. Bromley, according to Maurice Hughett, Falls Church, Va., businessman, had been paid that amount for working on behalf of a federal charter for a California bank.

Idaho Leaders Tour Salmon Tract Area

EXISTING PROBLEMS and potential growth on the Salmon tract were pointed out Tuesday to Idaho Gov. Robert E. Smyther, Sen. Len Jordan and Rep. elect George Hansen as the trio of statemen were taken on a tour of the Salmon tract. An informal luncheon was held at the Hollister Grange hall, where members of the Salmon River Canal company board could inform the representatives of the soil conservation service. Les Jones, canal company board chairman, told the visiting group the Salmon tract has considerable potential as a top agriculture area and the canal company board has worked for several years trying to secure supplemental water from Snake river to irrigate the area. At the present time the only source of water comes from Salmon Falls creek and the source varies from year to year. Normally the company distributes 5 of an acre foot per share on the tract for an irrigation season.

United Fund Leaders Confident of Success

Twin Falls has caught the spirit of an "over-the-top" United Fund campaign before Christmas, according to Harold Cook, drive chairman. At a special cleanup-kickoff meeting Tuesday morning at the Rogerson hotel about 40 members of the Exchange, Lions, Rotary and Kiwanis clubs accepted all of the cards for business firms that needed to be called upon again. Firms will be encouraged to make contributions now or agree to future contributions through the pledge system. "Use in the cards to come within \$4,000 of our goal if everyone continues to give 20 cent more than they gave last year, and we continue to get 100 percent of our goal from those who did not give last year," Cook said. Contributions at 11 a. m. Tuesday totaled \$47,515.61, which is 70.9 percent of the goal.

Safe Cracked In Burglary At Jerome

JEROME, Dec. 8—Approximately \$400 worth of tools and \$100 in cash were stolen from the Volvo Builders store here sometime Monday night or early Tuesday morning, reports Leon Moreland, manager. He said the burglary appeared to be a professional job and the door of the safe was blown off. It was believed nitroglycerin was used and the safe was ruined. Tools taken included drills, power saw and steel punches. Moreland said \$100 in cash was taken from the safe and later this morning it was discovered a typewriter in the office, valued at about \$100, also was gone.

Pathologist Testifies at Murder Trial

POATELLO, Dec. 8 (AP)—A pathologist testified at the John Larson murder trial today that slain Viet J. Quinn had been knifed 31 times by her killer. This report and a hint of a confession by Larson highlighted the first-day murder trial in fifth district court. Larson, 22, is accused of killing the 36-year-old Poateello school teacher in April 1957, and then burying her body in a shallow grave on the nearby Fort Hall Indian reservation.

4 Die as Jet Bomber Crashes

NEWINGTON, N.H., Dec. 8 (AP)—A B47 jet bomber crashed and burned early today just after takeoff from Pease air force base, killing all four crew members. The bodies were recovered. The plane came down in snow-covered woods about a quarter of a mile from a runway, near this community just outside Portsmouth on New Hampshire's Atlantic coast. The plane was attached to the 351st bomb squadron of the 100th bomber wing. The plane had started on a routine radar training mission over the north-east United States.

### Navy Opens New Active Duty Program for Men

The navy announced Monday that it will open an "immediate active duty program" under which men aged 18 through 26, married or single, may join the naval reserve and immediately be placed on active duty for two years.

The obligation and options available are part of the universal military training and service act, as amended by congress in 1955.

Those selected for the program will be sent to nine weeks of navy recruit training and upon completion will take their places in the fleet or at one of the shore installations.

# WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—The time has come to feel a little sorry for J. Edgar Hoover, a good cop, whose job makes it almost impossible for him to please either side in the civil rights segregation battle. It is not surprising that the vigilantes are now after Hoover's head. That time was bound to come, and it is a tribute to Hoover's ability and efficiency that he will probably survive the crisis that he is currently facing.

NO POLITICIAN.—Basically, Hoover hasn't changed his attitude toward the role of the FBI in law enforcement. He may be a little more flexible when discussing his critics; a politician, for example, would have used more temperate language in any debate with the Rev. Martin Luther King. But he sticks by his conception of an FBI limited by law to the role of investigating and prosecuting crime that is a ruddy good thing for the country.

GET EVIDENCE.—WITHHELD.—For example, FBI agents gathered the evidence which led to the conviction of three men and a teenage boy for the burning of the Negro T Hope Baptist church near Dawson, Ga. There had been indications that the FBI was being asked to investigate Negroes who wanted to register to vote. But later the FBI concluded that the Negro-voter issue was not involved, withdrew from the case and turned over its evidence to local authorities.

DANNED BY BOTH SIDEN.—Recently, more newspapers have been given to blame for the fact that the FBI is not investigating civil rights violations. But during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1964, the FBI investigated 3,340 allegations of civil rights violations. A little more foot dragging on that scale and Hoover's men would have no time left to catch any bank robbers.

INTERESTINGLY ENOUGH, it developed that the city jail was by far the worst of the local facilities. It was explained conditions of the city jail don't reflect on city officials or police; the facilities are just old and virtually impossible to improve without almost complete rebuilding.

## Jails, Not Resorts

Recently, the Times-News assigned a reporter to take a candid, objective look at both the city and county jails. Separate stories on each jail started on the front page of the paper and dealt with jail facilities rather exhaustively. Observations and conclusions on both jails were interesting and revealing. The articles probably will provide the only contact and information on the two jails for most residents of Twin Falls. Although both are owned by the public, few citizens would have motivation, time or desire to inspect the facilities for themselves.

Objective stories covering both jails were indicated because of charges voiced about the county jail during the recent election campaign. It was insinuated the county jail was not fit as a place to incarcerate any human, that food was unsuitable and that management of the county jail was poor.

Inasmuch as no one bothered to refute the charges, perhaps under the theory that it was "just campaign talk" and not worthy of note, the Times-News believed the public was entitled to know jail conditions. The public is responsible collectively for providing jails that are suitable for the purpose.

Concerning the county jail, it was pointed out it is approved by the federal bureau of prisons for places to house federal prisoners temporarily when necessary. Federal standards are quite high. In fact, Idaho has few jails—something less than 10 that will meet federal standards. The federal bureau makes frequent inspections of jails where U.S. prisoners are housed. One such inspection at the Twin Falls county jail occurred only a few weeks before this year's election. After the inspection, federal approval was continued.

Jails are not resorts. They are intended as places to imprison those who have broken society's laws. Sanitary facilities should be adequate. Food should be wholesome and sufficient to sustain prisoners without trying to fatten them up. Few, if any, jails will be cheery; jails aren't like that. It's something to be kept in mind when irresponsible charges are made.

# Slave Trade Is Blamed as Basis of Trouble in Congo

By ANNETTE THORNTON

The basis of much of the hatred in the Congo today stems from the days of the Arab slave trade, said a Twin Falls minister who spent 17 years as a missionary in the Congo.

Pastor P. F. Lemon, Seventh-day Adventist church, said much of the trouble came from the different tribes helping the Arabs capture other tribes for the slave trade.

When more than 200 tribes in a country one-fourth the size of the United States, there was bound to be involved animosities when the slave traders worked one tribe against another. Other problems arose when the tribes battled for their leader to be king, he pointed out.

The size and the sparse 14,150,000 population of the Congo mark two strokes against it to start with, he declared. "Com-

used the centers of the palms for distilling a kind of whiskey.



### News Around Idaho

**BOISE, Dec. 8 (U.P.)**—Plans for a project designed to bring to the attention of the public the needs of Idaho schools have been formed up by the Idaho Education association's legislative action committee. The committee said speakers will travel throughout the state outlining goals for an "affordable" education council, including the sales tax, and \$450 per child per year support for the schools.



# China Attacks Japanese Chief

**TOKYO, Dec. 8**—Communist China has surprised the Japanese political world by mounting an angry propaganda attack against the new prime minister, Eisaku Sato.

The ostensible reason for the attack was Sato's refusal to allow an important Chinese communist to visit Tokyo for the convention of the Japan communist party.

The real reason may be that the Chinese fear that Sato will work closely with the United States to make Japan a more effective partner in the struggle against Asian communism.

On Nov. 21, less than two weeks since Sato took office, the Japanese government decided to refuse entry visa to 23 foreign communists bent on attending the Japanese communist convention.

The 23 applicants, included 11 from Red China, five from North Korea and four from North Viet Nam.

Among them was a Chinese leader named Peng Chen, who is mayor of Peking, and a member of the politburo of the Chinese communist party. Peng Chen had been allowed to come he would have been the highest ranking Chinese communist ever to set foot on Japanese soil.

On Nov. 23 Peoples Daily, the official newspaper of the Chinese communist party, called the rejection of the Chinese delegation "a serious move hostile to the Chinese people, and aimed at undermining Sino-Japanese friendship."

The paper also attacked Sato for permitting the visit of an American nuclear powered submarine to the Japanese port of Baseo, and Sato's protest against the Red Chinese nuclear test.

Similar attacks by Peking's propaganda machinery have been going on ever since.

Sato's older brother former Prime Minister Nobusuki Kishi, was an object of special hatred by the Chinese communists.

The sternly anti-communist Kishi openly favored the Chinese government on Formosa over Red China. He also ranned through the U.S.-Japan security treaty, in the face of left wing rioting which eventually drove him from office.

Enraged over Kishi's policies, the Peking Chinese in 1958 broke off virtually all trade between China and Japan, using as a pretext an anti-Chinese demonstration by an obscure group of Japanese Fascists.

The Peking Chinese have not forgotten that Kishi and Sato are brothers. They have different

names because Kishi was adopted by his wife's family, and are thought to be closely akin in their thinking.

Japanese trade with China revived rapidly after Kishi left office. Under Kishi's successor, recently retired Prime Minister Hayato Ikeda, it roared to a postwar high.

There has already been nervous wondering in Tokyo whether the Chinese would repeat their performance of the Kishi era, and break off the trade again.

When Sato was campaigning for the premiership he had to contend with the fact that much Japanese public opinion favors normalization of relations with the Chinese mainland.

Hence, for several months before he took office, Sato made a point of showing up at Chinese trade fairs, and holding friendly talks with visiting Chinese trade officials.

He promised to take a "forward looking" attitude towards Red China.

But there apparently are suspicions in Peking that he never really meant it.

## Wolverines Dominate Top Poll, Wichita Trails by 100 Points

Michigan's powerful, veteran Wolverines, who have romped through three games without major difficulty, dominated the Associated Press' first regular season basketball poll today and confirmed their pre-season selection as the nation's best collegiate crew. The Wolverines, who lost only one regular from the team that finished third in the nation last year, gained 32 of the 34 first-place votes cast and had a whopping 100-point margin over second-place Wichita.

Michigan, which already has survived two major tests, gained 327 points in the balloting on the basis of 10 points for first, 9 for second, 8 for third, etc. Wichita, winner of its only start this season, moved up from third in the pre-season poll to second with 236 points. A flood of upsets and surprises in the first week prompted a major shuffling of the first weekly ratings from the pre-season poll, with only top-ranked Michigan and 10th ranked St. Johns of New York holding on to the same spots.

Three of the pre-season elite, fourth-ranked Davidson, No. 7 Syracuse and No. 8 Kansas State, split their two first-week starts and dropped from the top 10. UCLA, the defending national champion and No. 2 in the pre-season picks, also split, and plummeted to No. 7 after an opening loss to Illinois, 110-83.

Minnesota, unranked nationally in the pre-season poll but regarded as Michigan's top challenger in the Big Ten, stormed over three opponents and took over the No. 6 spot. The only other first-place vote went to Miami, Fla., still unranked.

Duke, which finished second in the pre-season poll but lost a key 80-70 decision to Michigan last week, slipped to eighth with Kentucky moving into the No. 9 spot.

Coach Adolph Rupp's Wildcats could be in trouble, however, since they dropped an 82-67 decision to North Carolina Monday night after the voting had been completed.

Michigan, sparked by Cezar Russell, curly Bill Buntin and clever Oliver Harden, took Ball State 92-70 in its opener, won the important 86-79 affair over Duke and kept on going with 81-67 rout of highly-regarded Missouri Monday night.

The Wolverines also have Indiana State and Nebraska scheduled this week and are slated to take on Wichita in an important game Dec. 14.
