# Thousands Flee Floods on Coast, Towns Evacuated

Thousands of persons fled some of the worst floods on record along the Pacific Coast today. Entire towns were evacuated. Gale-force winds whipped the flood waters swooping into towns in northern California and Oregon. Mud slides derailed part of a passenger train at Hood River, Ore., and freight train cars near Eugene, Ore. The entire population of 3,500, prepared to flee when a section of levee was breached. Residents of California's scenic Eel river canyon said the deluge was worse than the disastrous Christmas-floods of 1955, the area's worst in history.

Three towns in the valley, with populations totaling 2,000, were evacuated. One was under five feet of water.

Hundreds fled their homes before floodwaters and gale winds in western Oregon where rain poured down, streams overflowed their banks, and melting snow added to the cascade.

A mid-mile strike the Union Pacific's Portland Rose passenger train as it pulled out of Hood River, Ore., knocking the locomotive off the track. No one was hurt. Another passenger train was held at The Dalles, Ore.

A rock and mud slide touched off by heavy rains knocked seven freight cars off a track east of Eugene, Ore., and blocked the Southern Pacific's main Oregon-California line. No one was hurt.

Sprinkling rain melted deep snow in western and southern Montana, triggering dangerous avalanches, snowdrifts, and ice generally blocked many roads.

Yakima, Wash., reported 10 inches of snow which closed airports and kept Interstate 80 open.

## 3 Rescued From Cavein At Coal Mine

WILKES-BARRE, Pa., Dec. 22.—Three of four men survived a cave-in at a coal mine in the fourth, buried under some 60 to 70 tons of coal more than 300 feet underground, was declared dead.

State mine officials said today workers would continue digging in a snow-covered mountain-side near this eastern Pennsylvania community for the body of Lawrence Malachefski, 37, Plymouth. They estimated the task would take several days.

Malachefski was caught directly beneath yesterday's rock fall, mine officials explained. The three others were some feet away.

Two of the men had been dragged to safety an hour after the cave-in and were reported in good condition at Wilkes-Barre general hospital, with lacerations over most of their bodies.

They were Albert Kotol, 44, Larwill, and Anthony Battal, 50, West Pittston.

## Bumbling Bank Bandits Lead Officers On Wild Chase in Comedy of Errors

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Dec. 22.—Stolen \$1,000 from the New for fear of kidnapping warrant.

A pair of bumbling bank bandits, accompanied by two little girls and a monkey led authorities on a wild chase through two counties in three vehicles before coming to ground yesterday in a bus depot and a state patrolmen on an interstate highway.

Before the comedy of errors was over, the two had turned the hostage loose

Ditched the getaway car, alighted hid some money at a church and called a taxi, which took them to the maternity ward of Milwaukee hospital, where police captured one of the men.

The other was arrested two hours later in Milwaukee's downtown Greyhound bus terminal.

Harry Shinn, 31, Costa Mesa, Calif., and Frank Michel, 21, Orange county, Calif., were charged in federal warrants with bank robbery. Both were at \$10,000 for Michel and \$5,000 for

The monkey was held in a cell block of the Wauwatosa police station.

The men were at the hospital to see a woman Shinn said was his wife. She was registered as Mrs. Vindt. Authorities said the little girls were born. The children were identified as Michael Salatino, 6, and her sister Cynthia, 8.

The woman had given birth prematurely to a five-pound girl two days ago.

The little girls were taken from the hospital waiting room to the police bureau building across the street from the children's home.

Shinn entered the bank about 11:30 a.m. CST, pushed a brown cardboard portfolio at Miss Joan McConahey, 24, Wauwatosa, and said, "Give me everything."

She did, and as Shinn left she called out, "I've been robbed."

David Reddemann, 36, cashier at the bank, raced outside, saw a red, panel truck driving off at high speed, and pursued in his

Two blocks away the truck pulled behind a parked car and the man, identified as Shinn, climbed into an older model car, which sped away.

Reddemann followed the car to the freeway system leading to Milwaukee and when he saw a state patrol officer, pulled in

## K. C. Barlow, Cassia Longtime Solon, Dies

BURLEY, Dec. 22.—K. C. Barlow, 72, longtime Cassia county state legislator and civic leader, died Tuesday morning at Cassia Memorial hospital of cancer. He was born Jan. 14, 1892, at Bountiful, Utah, and attended school there, being graduated from the University of Utah in 1912. Mr. Barlow taught for a brief time at the Bountiful elementary school and farmed for two years in southern Utah. For five years he was assistant cashier at the Bountiful

State bank. He married Nellie Knighton Dec. 18, 1915, in the Salt Lake City temple. In the spring of 1916 moved to Burley where he became a prominent banker and stockman. He had lived in Burley since that time.

Active in the LDS church, Mr. Barlow served in the bishopric in the first ward for 10 years. He was a member of the high council of the Burley stake.

He served as mayor of Burley for three terms and in the state legislature for 10 terms, under six governors.

Mr. Barlow belonged to the Burley Rotary club, the Elks

## Gov. Smylie Blasts Newly Formed Unit

BOISE, Dec. 23 (UPI)—Gov. Robert E. Smylie remained in the middle of the dispute over control of the Republican party today, after unleashing a verbal blast at a new conservative organization headed by Rep. Donald G. Bruce, R. Ind.

Lenders of the group formed over the week-end contend it is in "no sense an arm of the Republican party," but "hopes to mobilize resources of responsible conservative thought . . . and further the general cause of conservatism."

Smylie said, however, that the organization could have a "splitting effect on Democratic and Republican organizations and could well mark the beginning of the end of the two-party system in the United States."

"If this were to be the result,

then the conservative movement would have dealt a deadly blow to individual liberty and our institutions of freedom," said Smylie, a leader of the moderate element of the Republican party.

He predicted, however, that the movement will fall "because Americans are normally not indifferent in significant numbers from the public institutions which have attracted their historical loyalty."

Smylie said he sees no connection between creation of the organization and offer by National Chairman Dean Birch to re-take control of the Republican party machinery. But he restated his demand that party leaders abandon what he calls a policy of exclusion and adopt a policy of inclusion.

# Roads Flooded by Continued Rain in 3 Valley Counties

Unseasonable rain was continuing Tuesday across Magic Valley, causing snowdrifts in the Ketchum area and stopping skiing, while roads in the Rupert, Richfield-Shoshone and Gooding areas were flooded. School was closed for the second day in Hailey because of difficult travel conditions and at Rupert, buses were to leave Tuesday noon in an effort to get students from the Minidoka North Side homestead project safely home before dark. Some students were brought by tractor or truck to the hard-surfaced road in the Minidoka project Tuesday morning and parents were being contacted by school officials to meet the school bus on its return.

Claude Wiley, Twin Falls county coroner, said that Kenneth Martens, driver of a 1963 Chevrolet which was in a collision with a 1957 Ford driven by Marcia Hackney, 16, was released from Magic Valley Memorial hospital Tuesday morning. Mrs. Walker was thrown from the vehicle. The McDermund vehicle then struck a utility pole on an island in the center of the road.

## Christmas to 4 Yanks Will Be Same as Any Other Day

HONG KONG, Dec. 22 (UPI)—Four Americans will spend Christmas day in their Chinese prison cells as they spend any other day. On Christmas night, they will get their only reminder of the Yule tide—small Christmas puddings.

Their families were allowed by the Communist Chinese to include the puddings in regular monthly packages from home. The packages, shipped through the Red Cross, also include cigarettes, vitamin pills and letters.

These Americans have been jailed on vague charges of espionage. Three of the four have been given little hope of ever spending Christmas in their homes again.

## Ambush Staged in Church; \$511,000 Taken as Truck Picks up Collections

PATERSON, N. J., Dec. 22 (UPI)—Three masked bandits set up an ambush in the rectory of a Roman Catholic church yesterday and staged a \$511,000 holdup of a bank armored truck that stopped to pick up Sunday church collections.

The bandits, who also stole \$1,000 from the church while they were waiting for the truck to arrive, tied and gagged four priests and a sexton. One of the priests tried to run but was brought down by a flying kick.

"The truck makes different runs at different times to avoid something like this," a bank spokesman said. "But apparently somebody had been pretty damn smart in this thing."

At 8:45 a.m. EST the three bandits, Halloween masks over their faces, walked into the rectory. The Rev. Attimo Giovannini was inside. Quickly, they bound him and slapped a piece of tape across his mouth.

The robbery, carried out with the precision of the fabulous Brink's haul of Jan. 17, 1959, when 11 men walked off with \$2,775,000, was one of the nation's largest holdup men escaped with 1.6 million dollars from a mail truck near Plymouth, Mass., in 1962.

Yesterday's bandits fled in a late model automobile. Police said they were responsible—but that more men, who some witnesses said were waiting in the car, might be involved. One witness said the car had a New York license plate.

The truck belonged to the First National Bank of Passaic county. It carried an unusually large amount of money for delivery to three branch offices because of the Christmas season. The truck was just a few blocks from its final delivery point.

"The frequent mass," he said. "I rang the bell. The door was slightly ajar. I hesitated, then pushed it a little."

A hand popped up and then this fact. It was like coming out of the world of reality into a world of make-believe.

"I couldn't believe that the mask and the gun in my hands were real . . . something like you'd see on television. He told me to drop my bag and go into the other room. He was very polite. He even called us 'father' a few times."

"Then I was handcuffed with

the other priest."

"All the while I just kept praying, asked God to be merciful. I thought we're no good for the church—such a tough place to make a living. I prayed."

The bandits warned the priests to stay quiet. While they waited for the trick, they forced one of them to open the church safe and take out the Sunday receipts.

At 9:13 a.m., the two armored truck guards, John Godfrey and

Matthew De Vito, heard scuffling

across the stairs to investigate. They ran across the room.

Father De Vito tried to run back up the stairs to the second floor, but one of the bandits tackled him and sent him tumbling down the stairs. He suffered a bruised ankle.

"I didn't see the pistol," Father De Vito said later. "I started to run away, he grabbed me by my foot. Then he put the gun at my head."

A few minutes later, the Rev. Casiano Kirk arrived at the door of the rectory and was promptly bound, too.

"I got to the rectory about 10

minutes to nine to prepare for a

mass at 10:15 a.m."

Police and the robbery was carried out by "professionals" no fly-by-nights," Detectives said.

### Smylie Starts Agency for Poverty Plan

BOISE, Dec. 22 (UPI)—Fred Garrett, director of the Idaho employment security agency, has been appointed to head the Idaho office of economic opportunity created yesterday by Gov. Robert E. Buhl.

The new office will operate within the executive department to implement the federal anti-poverty program in Idaho.

In addition to its liaison duties, the new agency will supply technical assistance to communities and other public and private groups seeking to sponsor programs under the federal job.

Smylie's executive order crea-

tting the office also provided for setting up of an advisory council comprised of the heads of several state departments.

Already approved for Idaho are youth camps in Idaho county and near Mountain Home and an adult education program.

**ZIP Code Is  
Santa Claus**

**This Year**

CHICAGO, Dec. 22 (UPI) — ZIP code is playing Santa Claus this year.

The post office innovation is helping to speed delivery of Christmas packages throughout the country.

Last year some gifts didn't arrive until the third week in January because of a monumental jam in Chicago, which processes most of the parcel post going from coast to coast. The Chicago office, largest in the nation, handled 47 million pieces of mail during last year's rush.

"We were really in a bind," Clairborne Bolton, assistant director of operations, recalled today.

"At this time last year we had nearly 100,000 sacks of Christmas packages unprocessed. Some of it was stored in a garage."

"We had mail piled up all over the place. But this year everything's up to snuff — we don't have one sack of mail lying around."

"Oh, man, after last year, I thought they would roll some heads," said Raymond P. Cummings, day parcel post supervisor. "We were still working on mail three weeks after Christmas."

Last year, Cummings said, a late surge of parcel post flooded post offices throughout the country.

"They did what they could with it but in the end, they threw it to Chicago and we were stuck with it," he said.

The postmaster inspection service was called in to study service procedures.

The inspection service recommended establishment of sectional center distribution points, or ZIP codes, for parcel post.

"That was the real key to this whole thing," Cummings said.

"Fine distribution of mail — spreading it out across the country and keeping it away from the center."

Thanks to ZIP code, agreed Postmaster Harry Semipow, Chicago now handles 17 per cent less parcel post.

"The mail is going to get this gift on time this year," he said.

"We're just as clean and current now as in the middle of June."

Chemicals were higher as a group, and the trend was irregularly to the upside among drugs, rubbers and metal order-retails.

Generally lower were motors, steels, rails, nonferrous metals, farm implements, airships, falls and electronics.

Losses of around a point were taken by General Motors, Itepub Steel, Anaconda, Zenith, Douglas Aircraft and Baltimore and Ohio.

There was also speculation Taylor would name Baugh his backfield assistant and Lou Rymkus his offensive line assistant.

Rymkus coached the Oilers to the American Football League's first championship but Oiler owner K. S. (Bud) Adams, Jr., fired him after his 1961 team got off to a slow start.

Wally Lamm, who succeeded Rymkus, led the Oilers to 10 straight victories to retain the championship.

Lamm replaced Frank (Pop) Toy in 1962 with the St. Louis Cardinals and Ivy moved to Houston for two years.
