

Thousands Flee Floods on Coast, Towns Evacuated

Thousands of persons fled some of the worst floods on record along the Pacific Coast today. Entire towns were evacuated. Gale-force winds whipped the flood waters sweeping into towns in northern California and Oregon. Mud slides demolished part of a passenger train at Hood River, Ore., and freight train cars near Eugene, Ore. The entire population of Fortuna, Calif., a town of 3,500, prepared to flee when a section of levee was breached. Residents of California's scenic Red River canyon said the deluge was worse than the disastrous Christmas floods of 1955, the area's worst in history.

3 Rescued From Cave in At Coal Mine

WILKES-BARRE, Pa., Dec. 22 (AP)—Three of four men survived a cave-in at a coal mine. The fourth buried under some 80 to 70 tons of coal more than 300 feet underground, was declared dead.

State mine officials said today workers would continue digging on a snow-swept mountain-side near this eastern Pennsylvania community for the body of Lawrence Malachuk, 37, Plymouth. They estimated the task would take several days. Malachuk was caught directly beneath yesterday's rock fall, mine officials explained. The three others were some feet away.

Two of the men had been dragged to safety an hour after the cave-in. The third was in good condition at Wilkes-Barre general hospital, with lacerations over most of his body. They were Albert Kotch, 47, Larksville, and Anthony Banta, 40, West Pittston.

The third man, Peter Byczkowski, 36, Plymouth, was pulled to safety around midnight. He had been trapped for about 10 hours in the underground chamber.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Dec. 22 (AP)—A pair of bumbling bank bandits accompanied by two little girls and a monkey led officers on a wild chase through two counties in three vehicles before coming to ground yesterday in a bus depot's maternity ward. Before the comedy of errors was over, the two had turned the hostages loose for fear of a kidnaping warrant.

K. C. Barlow, Cassia Longtime Solon, Dies

BURLEY, Dec. 22—K. C. Barlow, 72, longtime Cassia county state legislator and civic leader, died Tuesday morning at Cassia Memorial hospital of cancer. He was born Jan. 14, 1892, at Bountiful, Utah, and attended school there, being graduated from the University of Utah in 1912. Mr. Barlow taught for a brief time at the Bountiful elementary school and farmed for two years in southern Utah. For five years he was assistant cashier at the Bountiful State bank. He married Nellie Knighton Dec. 16, 1915, in the Salt Lake City temple. In the spring of 1916 he moved to Burley where he became a prominent rancher and stockman. He had lived in Burley since that time.

Christmas to 4 Yanks Will Be Same as Any Other Day

HONG KONG, Dec. 22 (AP)—Four Americans will spend Christmas day in their Chinese prison cells as they spend any other day. On Christmas night they will get their only reminder of the outside world in the form of letters. Their families were allowed by the Communist Chinese to include the puddings in regular monthly packages from home. The packages, shipped through the Red Cross, also include cigarettes, vitamin pills and letters. These Americans have been jailed on vague charges of espionage. Three of the four have been given the hope of seeing their families in their homes again.

Roads Flooded by Continued Rain in 3 Valley Counties

Wiley stated that Martens' release from the hospital may give county prosecuting attorney James J. May reason to hold the inquest next week, instead of in January.

Free Parking OK'd Until Christmas

The Twin Falls city commission Monday night, in the spirit of Christmas, voted to curtail the city's meter patrol until after Christmas only on city street meters. The motion was made by Commissioner John Angerhauser and passed unanimously. The ruling went into effect immediately on passage and meter patrol will resume the day after Christmas. City Manager H. L. Berwick said the procedure is not unusual, but urged Magic Valley shoppers to be considerate and not occupy the meters too long.

City Approval On Job Corps Camp Voted

Forest service staff officials told Lavin Monday night explained the proposed job corps camp program to the Twin Falls city commission, and after discussion the commission gave a stamp of approval on the project.

Lavin told the commission the proposed camp would be located on Buckhorn creek in Cassia county and would be about 30 miles from Twin Falls. Lavin said the forest service is sampling public opinion to see if there would be any objection to the camp and the corps. The forest service is not interested in the political ends of the program, he said.

In answer to many queries, Lavin explained that no minority group will constitute a majority at the camp. The camp will be designed to accommodate a 100-man crew.

No youths will be allowed in the camp with a serious delinquency record. The only job is for boys who, because of an accident or other circumstances, are unemployable. These boys often cannot read nor write, but have good basic intelligence and can get on their feet simply because they cannot fill out an employment form. The area will not be a reform school, he said.

There is enough work in the Sawtooth national forest to keep 100 boys busy for 10 years. This is in addition to the regular work planned by the service, and the establishment of the camp will not reduce the forest service staff.

Ambush Staged in Church; \$511,000 Taken as Truck Picks up Collections

PATERSON, N. J., Dec. 22 (UPI)—Three masked bandits set up an ambush in the rectory of a Roman Catholic church yesterday and staged a \$511,000 holdup of a bank armored truck that stopped to pick up Sunday church collections.

The bandits, who also stole \$1,100 from the church while they were waiting for the truck to arrive, had and staged four priests and a sexton. One of the priests tried to run, but was brought down by a flying tackle. Another priest on the ground floor of the rectory heard one of the bound victims trying to scream as tape was pasted over his mouth. But he ignored it, he said, because the priest screamed "always" in a loud voice.

The robbery, carried out with the precision of the fabulous Brink's haul of Jan. 17, 1959, when 11 men walked off with \$2,775,000, was one of the nation's largest. Holdup men escaped with 1 1/2 million dollars from a mail truck near Plymouth, Mass., in 1962.

Yesterday's bandits fled in a late model automobile, police said there was a possibility that three more men, who some witnesses said were waiting in the car, might be involved. One witness said the car had a New York license plate.

The truck belonged to the First National Bank of Paterson county. It carried an unusually large amount of money for delivery to three branch offices because of the Christmas season. The truck was just a few blocks from its first delivery

when it stopped at St. Anthony's church to pick up the Sunday collection for deposit.

Police said the robbery was carried out by "professionals—no fly-by-night." Detectives said the thieves apparently knew the truck, plain green with no distinctive markings, was carrying an unusually large amount of cash. The holdup took less than 20 minutes.

"The truck makes different runs at different times to avoid just something like this," a bank spokesman said. "But apparently somebody had been pretty damn smart in this thing."

At 8:45 a.m. EST the three bandits, Halloween masks over their faces, walked into the rectory. The Rev. Arthur Viallo was leading a group of about 100 men and snipped a piece of tape across his mouth.

Two other priests, the Rev. Philip Pasucci and the Rev. James De Vita, and the sexton, Matthew De Vita, the priest's 64-year-old father, heard scuffling and came to investigate. They also were bound.

Father De Vita tried to run back up the stairs to the second floor, but one of the bandits tackled him and sent him tumbling down the stairs. He suffered only a bruised ankle.

"I didn't see the pistol," Father De Vita said later. "I started to run away and grabbed my gun at my head."

A few minutes later, the Rev. Casalan Kirk arrived at the door of the rectory and was promptly bound, too.

"I thought he was fooling," Tobacco said. "He's always stringing out loud. I didn't realize what was going on."

Then later, I heard a lot of commotion—and when I came downstairs, I saw all those policemen."
