

Charge Is Filed Against Driver in 4-Fatality Crash

A negligent homicide charge was filed Thursday against Kenneth Martens, 428 Second avenue north, driver of a 1963 Chevrolet which slammed broadside into another car killing three high school girls and fatally injuring his wife. The charges came a day after a six-man coroner's jury ruled that Martens was "negligent in his driving, without due regard for others," at the end of an all-day coroner's inquest into the Dec. 19 traffic deaths. Prosecuting Attorney James J. May filed Thursday that Martens' attorney, Thomas Church, Burley, would be contacted and Church would see that Martens is placed in custody.

Guard Units Hold Practice Alert Here

Members of two Twin Falls national guard units, headquarters and troop L of the 116th armored cavalry, were called out Wednesday night to participate in a practice alert.

The alert was first of several phases of exercise Angry Arm, an exercise designed to determine how well troops in the sixth U.S. Army can move into mobilization should the occasion actually arise. Other phases in the exercise are scheduled between now and May 1.

It was reported that Col. Edward Elliott, Burley, commander of the 116th armored cavalry, started the local alert after receiving word through Maj. Gen. George E. Bennett, Idaho adjutant general, from the sixth U.S. Army corps, president of Sun Francisco, that the first phase was under way.

The alert also is designed to test and evaluate mobilization plans and to coordinate and coordinate mobilization procedures. National guard units in 15 Idaho communities tested mobilization plans by notifying members and instructing them to report to their national guard assembly areas.

Colonel Elliott said Wednesday night that the operation "had its problems, but it was considered a success. Several Twin Falls residents called the Times-News Wednesday night inquiring about the alert. They said they were unaware the alert was a practice exercise. Bliss Russell, a warrant officer in the local national guard, said radio and television stations which announced the alert apparently had not been notified that it was only a practice alert and not an actual mobilization.

Patrolman Darryl Cameron was recalled to the stand and skid marks were measured. Vernon Long, service manager for a local garage, testified that he had worked on Martens' car, which had a 400 cubic inch engine capable of developing 340 horsepower.

Long noted that the engine was optional and had to be purchased by special order. It was, however, not "hopped up," he added.

Twin Falls Police Chief M. Frank Barnett testified that, by using measurements and skid marks and computing them on a slide rule, it was his opinion that Martens was traveling at least 60 miles per hour when he applied his brakes.

Appeal Set For Burley Co-Op Case

BOISE, Jan. 7 (UP)—The Idaho supreme court will hear oral arguments on 10 appeals Jan. 12-15, including one by a Burley area electric cooperative that charges that city with "pirating."

In another case, the court will hear an appeal from James D. Grady who charged his two-year sentence to the state prison for selling liquor without a permit was "cruel, unusual and excessive punishment."

The Rural Electric company, a non-profit cooperative, brought suit in 11th district court charging the city of Burley with "pirating" two prospective customers closer to its own power lines than the city's.

The lower court had ruled against the cooperative.

Thunder, Lightning Hit Northern Areas

Out-of-season weather was reported Thursday across the northern portion of Magic Valley, with a severe thunder and lightning storm awakening residents from Richfield to Gooding. Unseasonable rains at Christmas time melted all the snow at Richfield, which usually has heavy snow at this time of year. There were widespread reports that the electrical storm awakened residents throughout the Richfield area. The thunder also was heard at Gooding and at Hailey and was accompanied by light snow. At Burley the electrical power was off from 40 to 25 minutes early Thursday morning after an automatic switch kicked off at the Heyburn substation.

Arabs Offer Building for Memorial

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7 (UP)—The United Arab Republic has offered a building to house the John F. Kennedy Memorial library in Cairo, burned by anti-American demonstrators Nov. 26.

The United States accepted the offer. Officials, in reporting this, said the building on the bank of the Nile river is adequate and should be used until a decision is made to build a cultural center in Cairo.

President Gamal Abdel Nasser also offered to contribute 1,000 volumes to the library, which once had 27,000 books. Out of the 27,000, about 4,000 were on loan when the library was burned. But there is little hope that they will be returned, because the library's records were destroyed in the fire.

Belgium strike ends
ANTWERP, Belgium, Jan. 7 (UP)—A seven-day strike ended today in Antwerp harbor, one of Europe's largest. It had tied-up more than 200 ships.

Sales Tax Clears Initial Hurdle in Idaho Legislature

BOISE, Jan. 7 (UPI)—Sales tax proponents cleared their first hurdle today when the house revenue and taxation committee agreed to develop and introduce a proposal for such a tax as soon as possible. "The majority favored developing and presenting a sales tax bill at the earliest possible time," said Chairman Arvil Millar, R., Bingham, after the initial committee meeting. Twelve of the committee's 11 members were present, he said. Only Reps. Carl R. Burt and Charles McDevitt, both D., Ada, were absent.

Johnson Outlines Health Care Plan

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7 (UPI)—President Johnson asked congress today to approve a multi-billion-dollar war against disease and the problems of old age in order to provide "the best health care for all Americans." Johnson placed top priority on legislation to provide hospital care for the elderly financed through social security taxes levied on workers and their employers. He called this a matter of "utmost urgency."

But he also proposed a series of other steps to improve the nation's health, including a new federal-state program to pay medical and dental bills for children in needy families and government aid in meeting the basic operating costs of medical and dental schools.

Administration officials said Johnson's proposals would cost 202 million dollars in the year starting next July and more than 800 million dollars in the following 12 months.

State agencies have asked for 153 million dollars from the general fund—education taking the giant slice at 67 million dollars for aid to the public schools.

But he also proposed a series of other steps to improve the nation's health, including a new federal-state program to pay medical and dental bills for children in needy families and government aid in meeting the basic operating costs of medical and dental schools.

Millar said the committee discussed a number of possibilities, among them a sales tax, alteration of the present tax structure, consideration of repeal or modification of the inventory tax and "modernizing our statutes to give local government more flexibility in their taxing authority."

BURLEY, Jan. 7 — Dale Diefel, 37, Overland Trailer court, Burley, was reported in serious condition today from injuries received when he became caught in the revolving mechanism of a head pipe machine he was operating at the Valley Concrete company.

Company spokesman said Diefel was operating the packer-lifter machine which lifts heavy concrete pipes. His clothing somehow became caught in the revolving mechanism. His arms reportedly were injured the most severely.

Without employees stopped the machine and called an ambulance. Deputy Sheriff Wes Woodall investigated.

The concrete firm is located one mile west of Burley on highway 30.

Three Named To House Committee

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7 (UP)—House Democrats picked three new members today for one of the most important committees of congress ways and means.

By prior agreement, the unanimous choices for the jobs were Reps. Phil M. Landrum of Georgia, Richard Fulton of Tennessee and Charles A. Vanik of Ohio. There was no contest for the openings, as there was on a previous occasion when Landrum just out, even though he had the backing of house Democratic leaders.

All three are backers of the kind of health care for the aged President Johnson wants.

Today's action was important for two reasons: 1. The three new members should give the administration the edge it needs to move promptly out of the committee a bill providing health care for the aged under social security. This is a keystone of President Johnson's legislative arch for the coming year.

2. The Democratic members of the ways and means committee also choose the assignments of party members to other house committees. There is always brisk competition for coveted spots on the major committees, so this 17-member group of Democrats has double significance for fellow party members in the House.

The importance of the ways and means committee lies in the fact that it originates all tax legislation. Its actions can have a big effect on the nation's economy.

Jordan were sponsors. The bill is similar to one on which hearings were held last year both here and in Lewiston. Church said the bill was designed to preserve and interpret a series of invaluable historical sites in the Nez Perce Indian country of north-central Idaho—

an area deeply interwoven in the exploration and settlement of the west.

Church told the senate yesterday that the bill had been cleared by the bureau of the budget, and recommended by both the department of agriculture and the department of the interior. 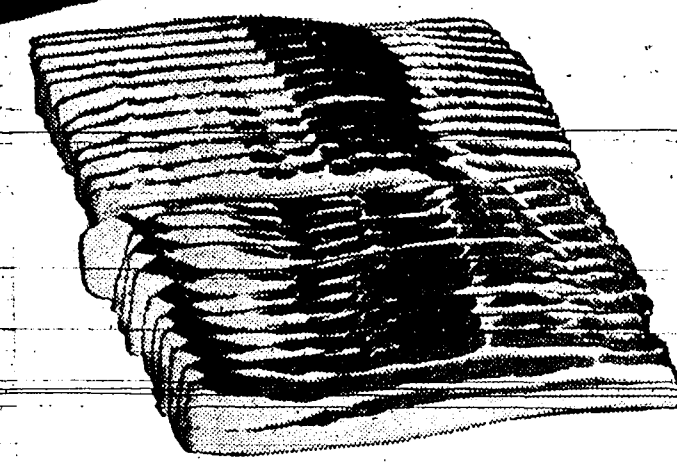

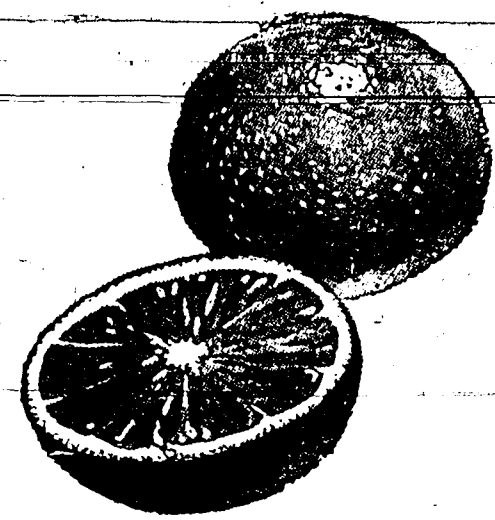

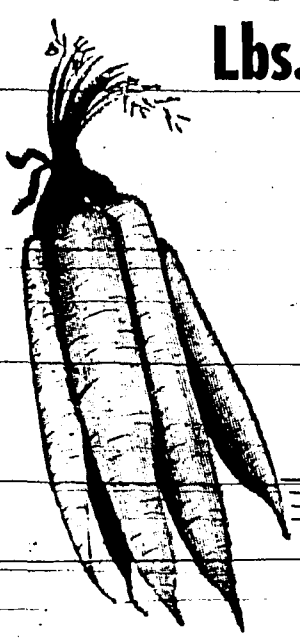

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7 (AP)—Freshman members of the house who would like to become at least sophomores, have been given a lot of advice on how to do it.

A group of old hands gave the newcomers the benefit of their wisdom this week and it all added up to one thing: Never forget that another election is coming along.

Among the things the freshmen were advised to do were: Get a good staff, get on friendly terms with their committee chairmen, learn the house rules and read a book about congress.

There were also a lot of 'don't's' such as, don't wear hats or sports coats on the floor, don't do any-

thing on the floor you wouldn't want a constituent to see, and don't make any speeches until you know what you're talking about.

Dispensing the wisdom were speaker John W. McCormack and members of both parties recruited for the occasion by Reps. Morris K. Udall, D., Ariz., and John F. Baldwin, Jr., R., Calif., who ran a similar school for freshmen at the start of the last congress.

HALFWAY, Ore., Jan. 7 (AP)—Searchers directed by a helicopter recovered the bodies yesterday of two men drowned in the Snake river when the barge on which they were riding was swamped.

Officers of Peter Kiewit and Sons company said Don Griffith, about 48, Emmett and Fred Markinson, 21, Halfway, were swept into the river about 12:30 a.m. when the barge swamped while taking a dozen workers from the Oregon to the Idaho side of the river.

The men had just completed a shift working on the diversion tunnel Kiewit company is building to prepare the way for construction of Idaho Power company's Hells canyon dam.

Griffith was a Kiewit employee while Markinson worked as an Idaho power inspector.

The other men on the barge managed to get to shore safely.

Idaho Ends Year With Fund Deficit

BOISE, Jan. 7 (AP)—A joint report issued by State Auditor Joe Williams and Treasurer Marjorie Ruth Moon shows Idaho ended 1964 with a general fund deficit of \$4,134,246.

This compares with a cash balance of \$332,433 reported on Dec. 31, 1963.

Miss Moon said, however, that tax anticipation notes outstanding at the beginning of 1965 totaled 12.5 million dollars, compared with \$17,250,000 on Jan. 1, 1964.

This means, she said, that the state is \$283,320 better off than it was at the start of 1964.

Tax anticipation notes are issued during periods of light revenue returns and are redeemed when income tax returns begin to come into the tax collectors office. They are issued against idle state funds, thus no interest is charged.

Chicago Cardinal Enters Hospital

CHICAGO, Jan. 7 (AP)—Albert Cardinal Meyer, archbishop of the Chicago archdiocese of the Roman Catholic church, was stricken yesterday with an apparent gall bladder illness.

His doctors said they expected he would be confined in Mercy hospital for a week. He was reported in good condition and feeling comfortably late yesterday.

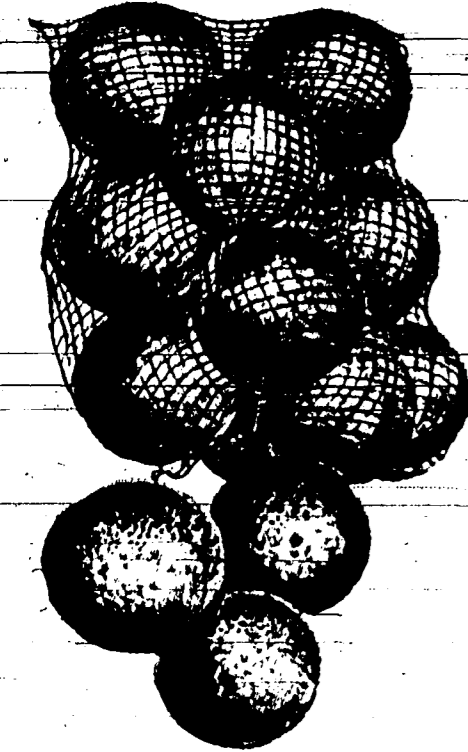

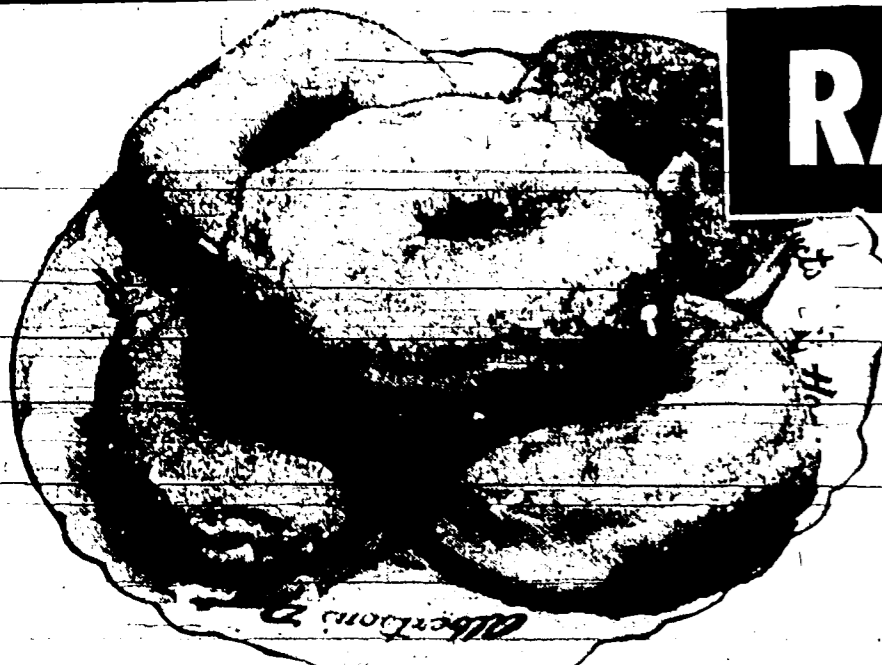

A large hand-knit yarn producer (Bernat) has imported the original Irish Blarney yarn—that's Gaelic for white. Over here it is called Blarney yarn and we have more to choose from than the colleens ever had.

The famous yarn has been teamed up with a wide range of bright, new fashion colors.

The fibers are rugged and the yarn has been specially treated for water repellency.

Fisherman's knit sweaters traditionally are richly patterned and cabled. The bold Irish designs have been translated into styles that suit fashionable knitters on this side of the Atlantic. Bulky, V-neck pullovers and turtle neck sweaters in both colors and patterns are this year's favorites.

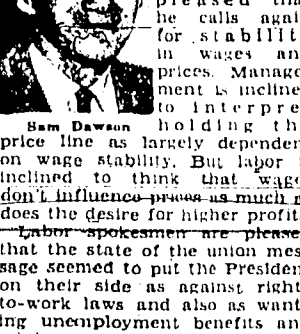

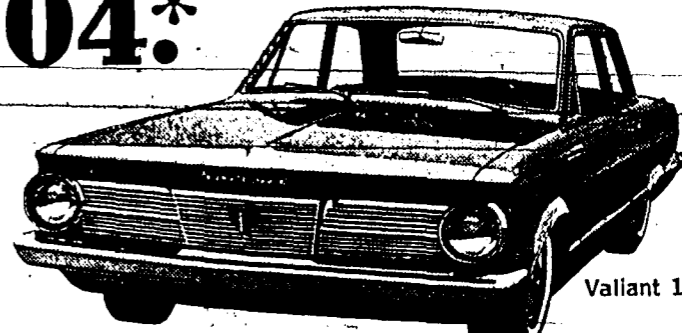
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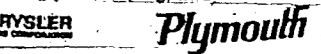

"The IAAF, however, only recognizes its duly elected member from such country."
