

## Johnson Outlines Plans for 3 New Weapon Systems

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18 (AP) — President Johnson told congress today the United States "is stronger militarily than at any other time in our peacetime history." Johnson, sending a 4,000 word special message to congress, disclosed that he expects to submit a budget calling for defense spending of 49 billion dollars, a drop of 300 million dollars from this year's level and 2.3 billion dollars less than last year. The president unveiled three major new weapons systems he is proposing to begin this year.

## T. F. Library Receives Top Cash Award

The Twin Falls Public Library has been selected as one of 10 winners in the United States of the 1965 Book-of-the-Month Club Small Town Library \$1,000 award. The award is given in memory of Dorothy Canfield Fisher, a member of the club's original board of judges. Henry Scherman, chairman of the club's board, noted that while these 10 libraries are widely scattered over the country, they are alike in being striking examples of wide-ranging service made possible by high professional competence, devoted leadership and intensive community support, though in all cases obviously their financial resources were limited. The Twin Falls library is the only one in the state to receive the award. Winners will receive the award at presentation ceremonies to be held April 25, the first Sunday of National Library week.

## Delay Said Started on Memorial

BOISE, Jan. 18 (AP) — Behind the scenes efforts to forestall prolonged debate on the merits of legislative reapportionment were reported underway today in the Idaho house of representatives. Proponents of reapportionment were said to be considering a move to block debate on a memorial designed to strip the courts of their authority in this field. The memorial, adopted last week by the senate, asks congress to call a convention to propose an amendment leaving to the states the right to apportion one house of their legislatures on a basis other than population. A group headed by Rep. Herman McDevitt, D. Bamuck, planned to move for the previous question when the memorial comes up for debate on the house floor. The motion, which requires a two-thirds majority for passage, would limit debate and force a vote.

## State Water Agency Bill Is Introduced

BOISE, Jan. 18 (AP) — A bill creating a state water resources agency was introduced in the Idaho senate today but its sponsor said it did not come from the governor's water study committee. Instead, said Sen. Herbert Whitworth, R. Caribou, chairman of the house irrigation and reclamation committee, which introduced it, the measure was proposed by a group of Western Idaho irrigation districts. He declined to identify them. Sen. Don Samuelson, R. Bonner, chairman of the public resources and public recreation committee, said he expects a bill to come from the committee which, at the request of Gov. Robert E. Smylie, drafted the constitutional amendment which was approved by voters last November. Samuelson said he expects his committee will study the bill introduced today, along with any others which may be offered.

## Report Says Expenditures for Idaho Schools Are Inadequate

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18 (UPI) — More money must be spent to build up all levels of education in Idaho, a special committee of educators reported today. The committee, composed of Western educators, was jointly sponsored by the Idaho Education association and the National Education association's national commission on professional rights and responsibilities. The report stated that Idaho has had the least increase of any state in the percentage of money spent per pupil over the past 10 years.

## Scrubbed

An unusual outbreak of the midge fly in the reservoir which handles water for Twin Falls has called for an all-out scrubbing and washing of the reservoir. According to Kenneth Lenzer, superintendent of the filter plant, the fly isn't usually active until late February and through the summer, but due to the warm rainy weather it has become bothersome. The clearing of the reservoir was begun Friday and it is expected that the work will be completed and the water replaced by Tuesday evening. The city has been on well water since the cleansing operation began.

## Churchill Continues His Battle to Live

LONDON, Jan. 18 (UPI) — Sir Winston Churchill lost more ground today and slipped peacefully near death. His valiant heart faltered but his will to live persevered. "Sir Winston had a restful night," a medical bulletin released at 11:50 a. m. (6:50 a. m. EST) said. "He is a little weaker but there is nothing further to report." A British Medical association spokesman, commenting on the report, said Churchill's illness "appears to be following the normal pattern."

## Free Parking Spaces Taken By Employes

A two-day study to determine how many persons would take advantage of free shopper's parking in Twin Falls indicated that employes of downtown businesses would take advantage of the service. The study was conducted by the police department during a three-day shopping promotion in the downtown area. The promotion was held Thursday through Saturday but the study was conducted during the last two days.

## Fire Destroys Grangeville Grade School

GRANGEVILLE, Jan. 18 (AP) — Fire destroyed the Grangeville elementary school early today, leaving some 800 children without classrooms. Police Chief Earl Huff said the blaze appeared to be the work of an arsonist. The alarm was sounded just before 5 a. m. by a restaurant owner on her way to open her establishment. Huff said the building, constructed in 1915, was insured for more than \$150,000, but its value was much more than that.

## Tanker Crash Probe Begun By Air Force

WICHITA, Kans., Jan. 18 (AP) — Air force accident investigators today began re-assembling, piece by piece, a KC135 jet tanker which crashed into a quiet neighborhood and killed 29 persons. Victims of Saturday's crash included 7 crewmen and 22 civilians, one of them a woman carrying an unborn child. Civilian aircraft industry specialists in all major systems of the Boeing Stratotanker joined the air force investigators in an effort to find out why the plane crashed.

## Many Residents Try to Beat License Deadline

People who put off today what they can do tomorrow, or the next day or next, might go Monday to the Twin Falls county courthouse and view the extremely long lines of residents waiting to purchase 1965 license plates. By midnight Monday all cars in the county must be licensed with the new green-backed white numbered plates. By noon the assessor's office at the courthouse reported it had sold 14,590 passenger and 316 truck plates.

## Prayer Bill

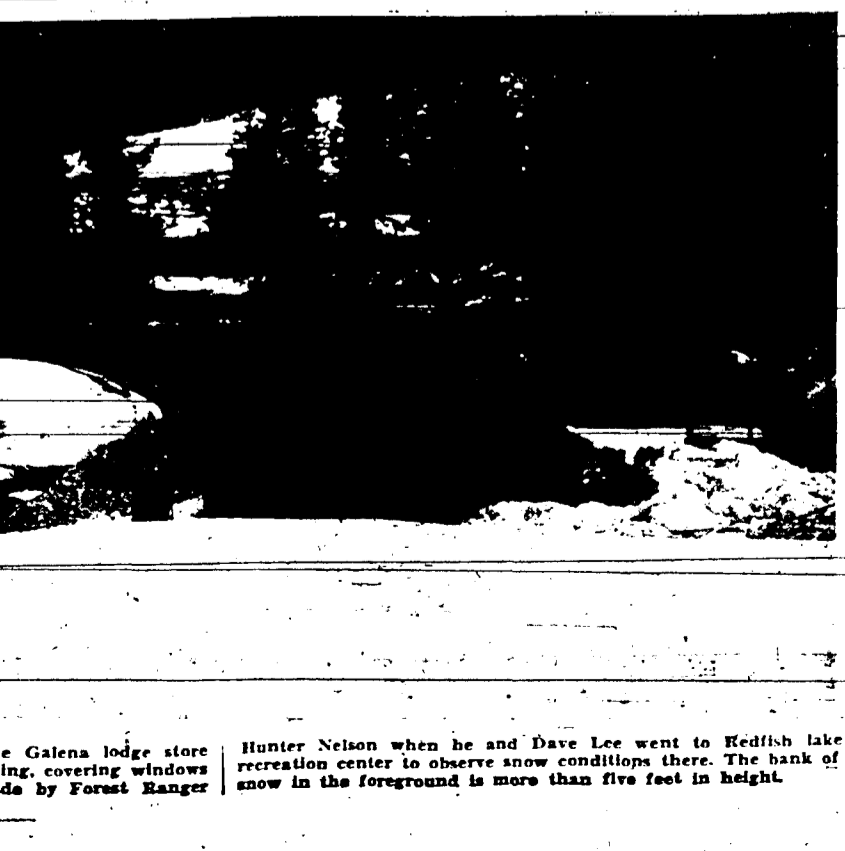

## Reception; Democratic Gala Officially Started Johnson's Inauguration Period

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18 (AP) — President Johnson and those here to greet him for his inauguration were both good and bad news from the weatherman today. Wednesday, inauguration day, will be cold, the forecasters said, in a special report but no snow of consequence is likely. Today marked the official start of what could be one of the liveliest inaugurations since Andrew Jackson's. Three days of parties and receptions began with a reception for distinguished ladies this afternoon followed by tonight's Democratic gala. This is a mammoth variety show, with an all-star cast of singers, dancers and comedians. Hostess Perle Mesta gave a big party last night at her penthouse apartment. But it was a private affair—not part of the official inauguration week activities. The 300 guests included Vice President Huber H. Humphrey, Lady John on singer actress Carol Channing, inaugural chairman Dale Miller and many members of congress. President Johnson returned last night from a week-end in Texas, ready to celebrate his sweeping victory over Republican Barry Goldwater.

## Reception; Democratic Gala Officially Started Johnson's Inauguration Period

Not until the five inaugural balls are over tonight Wednesday night, Johnson likely will have another quiet moment. He planned to get in some work today on his inaugural address. For all the accent on the gate, if you needed one word to describe official Washington today that word would have to be: apprehension. With snow on the ground, more snow in the forecast for tomorrow and temperatures huddling in the 20s, the climatic possibilities are sobering if not downright frightening. The forecast for Tuesday: fair and cold. Inauguration after inauguration, it's not so much what they say here, but the conditions under which they shiver and shake. On the eve of John F. Kennedy's inauguration in 1961 an eight-inch snow, swirling in gusts of up to 32 miles an hour, so tied up traffic you would have thought the capital was barricaded. Such recent nightmares, coupled with such uncertain forecasts, could hold down the crowds, even though Johnson throughout the campaign extended invitations lavishly. Last night, coming back from Texas, he brought along so many friends on the presidential plane his staff members were displaced and had to ride another aircraft.

### 25-Year Service Brings Honor to Two Rupert Men

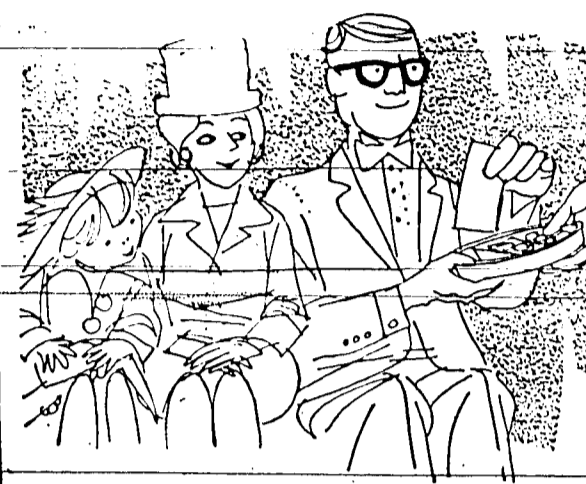

### Expenses of Volunteer Worker Are Deductible

If probably was an internal revenue auditor who first said there would be no mortgages outstanding on churches today if churches actually received all the money people claimed they contributed on their tax returns. Perhaps that is why so many church officials are being queried by tax auditors these days to confirm contributions being reported on tax returns. As in all other statements and deductions claimed on tax forms the burden of proof is on the taxpayer and it is a wise man who has a statement from his church or canceled checks to support his contributions. Furthermore, there is no "rule of thumb" or "average amount" to be listed as a contribution. List what you actually gave. That amount is your deduction. Of course, for the overly generous there are maximum limitations. Contributions are generally limited to 20 per cent of total income. An additional 10 per cent may be taken if the money went to religious, charitable, scientific, literary or educational organizations. This does not include tuition to a school or college but an outright gift. In addition to your contributions to church you may deduct all

the fair market value of the lunch is \$1.50 you have an \$8.50 charitable contribution. Should you give articles of clothing or household goods to a church or charitable agency then the fair market value of the items so given is deductible. Many housewives overlook another charitable deduction now available to them. If you are a volunteer worker at a hospital, a den mother to a Brownie or Cub Scout pack or the Boy Scouts or Girl Scouts you may have some deductible expenses which never occurred to you. As a volunteer worker, your cost of transportation to and from the hospital or welfare institution is deductible. If you used your own car the cost of gas and oil plus parking may be itemized. Or you may simply use a treasury-approved allowance of five cents a mile on the car. Cost of meals and lodging while performing your donated service are also deductible. Should you be required to wear a distinctive uniform which is not readily adaptable to general use its original cost and laundering expenses may also be included. Den mothers who take turns holding meetings for Scout groups may charge off the cost of snacks served at meetings as well as transportation expenses when taking such groups on field trips. Delegates to a church convention who are not compensated for their services or reimbursed for their expenses may deduct the transportation charges plus the cost of meals and lodging while attending to convention business. Under no circumstances may you charge off any value placed on your time or services while performing such volunteer work. Should you donate painting, a work of art, a bond, securities or anything of value to a religious or charitable institution, the fair market value of the item—it may be more or less than your original cost—is fully deductible.



REMEMBER the burden of proof is on even the cheerful giver. Contributions to non-profit schools and hospitals, Salvation Army, Red Cross, Community Chest, Camp Fire Girls, Boy Scouts, the various health funds and societies for the prevention of cruelty to children or animals. There are other items that are also properly considered as deductible charitable contributions. Say you go to a theater party where all the proceeds go to a recognized charity. If the cost of the ticket is \$50 and the usual charge for the entertainment or play is \$5, then the additional \$45 is treated as a contribution. Or you go to a church affair and bid \$10 for a box lunch. If

# Gurney Takes Fatality-Marred Motor Trend Road Race Win

RIVERSIDE, Calif., Jan. 18 (AP)—Dan Gurney of Costa Mesa, Calif., won the fatality-marred 500-mile, \$65,000 Motor Trend road race for late model stock cars Sunday before 61,474 fans at Riverside raceway. Three mishaps drew screams of horror from the crowd: A fork-lift truck plowed into spectators, killing a man and injuring four other persons. A car driven by A. J. Foyt of Houston, Tex., last year's

Indianapolis 500 champion, flipped off the track and overturned. Another, driven by Ned Jarrett, Camden, S. C., caught fire. Foyt escaped with chest injuries. Jarrett was not hurt.

Gurney, 33, driving a 1965 Ford, made the race in 5:41.42, averaging 87.708 miles per hour. Second was Junior Johnson of Ronda, N. C., in a 1965 Ford. He was 27 seconds back of the leader. Third was Marvin Panch of Daytona Beach, Fla., in a 1965 Ford, one lap back.

Foyt, 38, escaped with a cut hand when his 1965 Ford slid off the track then down an embankment at the raceway's ninth turn. His car flipped end over end a couple of times, coming to rest on its wheels. The mishap occurred on the 170th lap of the 185-lap race. Foyt was in fourth position at the time and had been leading the race earlier.

He complained of chest and neck pains and was taken to Riverside Community hospital. A 1965 Ford driven by Ned Jarrett, Camden, S. C., caught fire, apparently from a gasoline tank leak, while making a pit stop on lap 91. As flames leaped high and black smoke billowed into the air, NASCAR technical instructor Bill Gazzaway helped pull Jarrett out of the car. Jarrett was not injured. Gazzaway was treated at the scene for slight burns.

Car owner Bondy Long, crewman Tom Granger and an unidentified crewman were taken by ambulance to Riverside Community hospital with burns that didn't appear serious. The fire was extinguished in 20.4 seconds according to an observer's stopwatch—with a new dry powder sprayed under pressure and now in use at the Raceway.

Fourth in the race was Darel Dieringer of Charlotte, N. C., in a 1965 Ford, three laps back. Eight laps back in fifth place was the 1964 Mercury driven by Eddie Gray, Gardena, Calif., with relief driving by Bill Meyer, also of Gardena. Gene Davis of Santa Monica, Calif., was sixth in a 1964 Mercury, also eight laps back. In seventh place came Seattle Cain of Fresno, Calif., driving a 1964 Mercury, 12 laps back.

In eighth position was Sam Stanley of Newhall, Calif., in a 1964 Mercury, 13 laps back. W. S. (Buck) Baker, Charlotte, N. C., was ninth in a 1964 Dodge, 15 laps back. In 10th position was Jerry Grant of Kent, Wash., in a 1963 Ford, 17 laps back.
