## Iran Premier Shot While Leaving Car

TEHRAN, Iran, Jan. 21 (UPI) — Premier Hassan Ali Mansur, the pro-Western leader of Iran, was shot and wounded seriously today in an assassination attempt by a 19-year-old youth. The 41-year-old premier, shot in the jaw and pelvis, was rushed to a hospital where he was given a blood transfusion and pronounced out of danger.

A later medical bulletin said surgeons operated on Mansur's neck and stomach, repaired injuries to the small intestine and bladder, and stopped bleeding in his neck. It said doctors were keeping him under surveillance. The assassination attempt occurred as Mansur, who assumed office 10 months ago, was getting out of a car in front of the parliament building. Police captured the would-be assassin after a chase. He was believed to be a member of an extreme Moslem religious sect. It was learned the would-be assassin was a senior in a Tehran high school. Authorities said the youth fired a total of five shots at Mansur, but three went wild.

## Community Service Awards Presented

Dr. Harry Brumbach and Jack Shaw were named senior division winners Wednesday night of distinguished service awards given annually by the Twin Falls Junior Chamber of Commerce. Junior division winners are Mrs. Eugene Sturgill and Eldon Evans. Awards Chairman Grant Gillette told an estimated 100 persons attending the annual banquet, held at the American Legion hall, that the committee's recommendation was to name two winners in each division because of the "tremendous success" that the community has accomplished this year.

In addition, Hugh Phillips, owner of White mortuary, was named "Outstanding Boss" by the local organization. A new feature added to the program this year was selection of an "Outstanding Young Farmer." The winner was Lawrence Knigge, route 1, Filer. Knigge will compete in state competition and the state winner will compete nationally. This is the first entry from Twin Falls county in several years. He is a former vice chairman of the Twin Falls Sears, Roebuck and company store, was chairman of the Committee of 25 which put across the junior college proposition during the last general election. The 49-year-old businessman moved to Twin Falls in November of 1962. Born in Utah, he has been active in a number of community projects. **China Blasts New Soviet Leadership**  
TOKYO, Jan. 21 (UPI) — Communist China, speaking through its Albanian mouthpiece, today called the new leadership of the Soviet Union an "ulcer that must be removed and removed with a courageous operation by revolutionary communists." It was the first time since former Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev fell from power last October that Red China has backed a call for the removal of his successors. The new onslaught against the current Soviet leadership came in the broadcast by Peking's New China news agency of a 3,500-word editorial from Zeri I. Popullit, the official newspaper of the Albanian communist party. Albania is Red China's only European ally in the Sino-Soviet feud. In Moscow, the communist organ Pravda reaffirmed the Kremlin's faith in "peaceful co-existence." An article on the principles of Leninism said "it would be madness to consider that a new world war would speed up man's transition to socialism." The article did not refer specifically to Red China.

## Yearly Meet Proposal Is Introduced

BOISE, Jan. 21 (AP) — Annual sessions of the Idaho legislature would be held under provisions of a proposed constitutional amendment introduced today in the house of representatives. A joint resolution introduced by Reps. George Brocke, D., Ellah, and Orval Hansen, R., Bonneville, would strike from the Constitution the provision that the legislature meet biennially and provide for yearly meetings. If approved by two-thirds of the legislature, the amendment would be submitted to voters for ratification at the 1966 general election.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21 (UPI) — A beaming President Johnson was generating applause last night after whirling partner after partner around the dance floor at a series of inaugural balls. At one of the five jammed dances, the President spent for a while with a steady-eyed lady. ## Formula Bill Is Expected Next Week

BOISE, Jan. 21 (UPI) — Introduction by early next week of a school fund distribution formula bill was predicted today by Ben. Vincent Nally, R., Gem. Nally, chairman of the senate education committee, said members of his group and of the corresponding house committee, had reached agreement on virtually all aspects of the formula. Still to be decided, he said, is whether the equalization tax levy should be left at 22 mills, as at present, or reduced to 15 mills. He said members voted to eliminate from the formula the so-called classroom cost factor. "That factor gives extra financial aid to districts which employ better trained and more experienced teachers. It has been criticized on grounds it helped the rich districts and did not aid schools which are unable to pay salaries high enough to attract good teachers. Nally said the committee plans to have available for study by legislators, tables showing how much each school district would receive in state aid under provisions of the proposed formula. He said calculations will be made on the basis of state appropriations of 80 million dollars, 55 million dollars, 50 million dollars and maybe 45 million dollars. "The state appropriation for the current biennium was 40 million dollars and Gov. Robert E. Smylie recommended a 66.2 million dollar grant for the next two years. The state department of education asked 61 million dollars. Nally said the formula can be adjusted to work with any amount of state aid available. Agreement on a distribution formula often has been a stumbling block to completion of a legislative session's work. Often passage of the bill has come in the closing hours of a session.

## Johnson Has Aims Similar To Solomon

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21 (UPI) — As President Johnson assumed his new term of office, he set his hopes on the same qualities to which King Solomon aspired as he took the throne of ancient Israel. "For myself," the President said in concluding his inaugural address, "I ask only, in the words of an ancient leader: 'Give me now wisdom and knowledge that I may go out and come before this people; for who can judge this? Thy people, that is so great?'" The words are part of the prayer of King Solomon when he ascended the throne of Israel about 974 B.C. on the death of his father, King David, founder of the dynasty of ancient Israel and its great national hero. As recorded in 8th to 10th verses of the first chapter of the Book II of Chronicles in the King James version of the Bible, Solomon's prayer in its entirety goes: "Thou hast shewed great mercy unto David my father, and hast made me to reign in his stead. 'Now O Lord God, let Thy promise unto David my father be established; for Thou hast made me king over a people like the dust of the earth in multitude. 'Give me now wisdom and knowledge, that I may go out and come before this people; for who can judge this? Thy people, that is so great.'"

## Sen. George Blick Comments on Idaho's License Plate Controversy

BOISE, Jan. 21 (Special) — Sen. George Blick, R., Twin Falls, says that separate bill No. 29, on second reading in effect, eliminates everything from the license plate, except the name of the state and the number. The senator discussed the future of Idaho's license plate slogan, urban, in a news conference and the governor's water resources proposal. "I'm feeling," Senator Blick says, "is, after talking with the commissioner of law enforcement, that the slogan should stay on the license plates until the American Voters association (AVA) meets later this year." Senator Blick says he feels that the AVA will propose that all states eliminate the slogan from their license plates. "At that time," the Twin Falls senator says, "I would vote for entire elimination of slogans." Blick, himself a potato grower, reports that the American Voters association has already established a uniform size for license plates and is hoping to have states adopt not only the same size plate, but also the license bearing only the name of the state and the number. "I would think," the senator continues, "that until the AVA recommendation is made, senate bill No. 29 will be defeated." On the matter of the governor's water resources program, which received approval by the voters in the November election, Blick says that one bill has already been introduced, senate bill No. 34. The Most Rev. Sylvester W. Treinen, bishop of Boise, officiated at the colorful ceremonies in St. Edward's church, Twin Falls, Wednesday evening. After the investiture rite, Monsignor Cody offered his first pontifical mass. Protonotaries apostolic rank before all Catholic clerics, priests, and superiors of religious orders who do not have pontifical privileges. Monsignor Cody was elevated to the rank by Pope Paul VI in November.

## No Decision Is Reached On Inquest

JEROME, Jan. 21 — No decision has been made as to whether or not an inquest will be called into the traffic death of Mrs. Helen Pool, 60, in a two-vehicle collision about 11:30 a.m. Wednesday eight miles north of Eden, Dr. L. M. Neher, Jerome county coroner, said today. Mrs. Pool was killed instantly when the 1956 Chrysler she was driving collided head-on with a 1964 Pontiac station wagon operated by Dr. Robert Thackeray, 47, Jerome veterinarian. Mrs. Pool's mother, Mrs. Christine Davidson, 65, a passenger in her daughter's car, was reported in fair condition today at St. Benedict's hospital. Dr. Thackeray was not hospitalized and officers said he was wearing a seat belt, which they credited with saving him from serious injury. Mrs. Pool was driving south and Dr. Thackeray north when the vehicles collided. According to Neher, skid marks showed the station wagon's brakes had been applied for approximately 38 feet and the Chrysler's for 25 feet before the impact. The cars came to rest near the point of impact. Both cars were demolished. The body of Mrs. Pool is at Weaver mortuary, Wendell, pending funeral arrangements. Only known survivor of Mrs. Pool, besides her mother, who is unable to talk, is a sister who lives on route 1 from Jerome. Mrs. Pool's husband died several years ago and she had no children.

## Snow Falling Over Valley

Snow began falling throughout Magic Valley early Thursday morning and at noon was still falling in Hatley and Burley. Highways throughout the area were reported slick from the snowfall, which varied from a trace in Twin Falls to an unofficial half-inch at Burley. Richfield reported about one and one-half inches of new snow Thursday morning with heavier snowfall in the rural areas. It is the first snow that has fallen there since the rain before Christmas melted previous snow and caused excessive flooding snow. About half an inch of new snow was reported Thursday noon at Hatley and it still was snowing. Buhl, Castleford and Jerome all had traces of snow on the ground, according to the Twin Falls weather bureau.

She is asking \$634.23 funeral expense, \$400 auto damage, and \$100,000 punitive damages.

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

## Ex-Baseball Clown Nick

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21 (AP)—Nick Altrock, one of the great figures in baseball history, died Wednesday in Doctors hospital. He was 88.

Altrock had a stroke two years ago and had been in failing health for some months. As a left-handed pitcher, who won 63 games over the 1904-06 stretch, Altrock was one of a great staff which hurled Chicago's "Hitless Wonder" to the American league and world championship in 1906.

But to those fans who remember him now, he was best known as a clown-coach with the Washington Senators whose uniform he wore for 45 years.

His baseline antics and pantomime, first begun in 1912, caught the fancy of fans and went on for years with a succession of partners. First, there was Germany Schaefer, then Carl Sawyer and later, for many years, Al Schacht.

Burial will be in Cincinnati, but final arrangements will not be completed until Thursday. Altrock was probably the first man to make a career of baseball comedy. For many years Altrock teamed with Schacht in a clowning act when both were coaches on the Washington Senators.

They did their routine before regular season games and also appeared at every World Series from 1921 to 1933 — although from 1927 on they never spoke to each other.

## Orioles Say A's Spurned Better Offer

BALTIMORE, Jan. 21 (AP)—President Lee MacPhail of the Baltimore Orioles thinks the Kansas City Athletics could have done better in the trade they made Wednesday for slugging outfielder Rocky Colavito.

"Our offer for Colavito was better — definitely," said MacPhail, who made a pitch for Rocky during the winter meetings.

"Neither Landis nor Hershberger particularly helped the White Sox last year," MacPhail said, "and the pitcher in the deal can't be anybody important or he'd have been named right away."

## Colavito, Romano Key Figures In Three-Team, 8-Player Swap

CLEVELAND, Jan. 21 (AP)—Rocky Colavito, slugging outfielder whom Cleveland traded away in 1960, returned to the Indians Wednesday in a three-team, eight-player deal in the American league. The Indians gave up catcher John Romano, pitcher Tommy John and outfielder Tommie Agee to the Chicago White Sox. Chicago sent veteran outfielders Jim Landis and Mike Hershberger and a starting pitcher to be named later to the Kansas City Athletics and catcher Camilo Carrion to Cleveland.

General manager Pat Friday of the A's described the pitcher coming to his club from Chicago as a player of "tremendous potential with the ability to become an outstanding ball player."

It is believed he will be Johnny Buzard, who had a 10-8 record last season. Fred Talbot of Dave Deltachuckers.

Colavito, traded by the Indians to Detroit for Harvey Kuenn, had a greater personal following among Cleveland fans than any other player of the last decade. The muscle-flexing, handsome outfielder had fan clubs of clubs who protested vigorously when he was traded by Frank Lane, then Cleveland general manager.

"When you get a chance to get someone like Colavito, you don't miff it," said Gabe Paul, Cleveland's general manager, adding that he had been negotiating the deal for many months.

Paul said he figured the acquisition of Colavito would make the Indians, who finished sixth last year, a pennant contender next season. Colavito batted .311 with 27 home runs and 102 runs with a .274 average last season for the lastplace A's.

"We have been trying to get Romano for two years," White Sox manager Al Lopez reported from his home in Tampa, Fla. He said John, a southpaw, may help the pitching staff which was weakened after the departure of left-handers Don Mossi and Frank Baumann.

Carrion, 27, was one of three catchers used last season by the White Sox, who finished a game behind the New York Yankees. He was sidelined much of the season by injury.

Friday said the A's gave up Colavito "with a great deal of reluctance." But he said that last year, with Colavito and Jim Gentile in the line-up, "We didn't work out too well. We had one of our worst seasons."

He said since the fences in Kansas City have been moved back, the A's needed defensive ability and speed.

"It is wonderful news," Colavito said at his Reading, Pa. home. "I am very happy about the trade, and returning to Cleveland."

In nine seasons in the American league, Colavito has hit 302 home runs. His best production was 42 in 1959 when he shared the league home run title with Hank Killebrew. His power and popularity should stimulate shaky attendance.

Colavito played four years with Detroit before being traded to Kansas City.

## Denver Swaps Punter for Haynes

KANSAS CITY, Jan. 21 (AP)—Halback Abner Haynes, once the pride and joy of the Kansas City Chiefs, has been traded to Denver for linebacker Jim Fraser and an undisclosed amount of money.

The North Texas State star began his professional football career with the Dallas Texans and came to Kansas City when the Texans transferred the AFL franchise here two years ago.

Fraser has led the AFL with punting averages the last two seasons of 46.1, a league record, and 44.6. He also is considered a good linebacker.

Linebacking is an improvement the Chiefs can use. They went heavily for linebackers in the December talent draft.

Haynes was the AFL's comeback of the year last season in an Associated Press poll. After a bad season in 1963—the club's first year in Kansas City—he bounced back with 713 yards and a 5.2 average—one of the best in the AFL. He made several long runs and his total yardage was fifth best in the league.

A swift, shifty and unpredictable runner, Haynes was the AFL's first big name, and its top drawing card for some time.

His best season was 1962, when he gained 1,082 yards in leading the club to the AFL crown. Just a year later he hit the depths. He was dependent over the death of his friend, rookie Stone Johnson, and couldn't adjust to a series of injuries in the Kansas City offensive line. He dropped to a scant 352 yards rushing.

Last fall started badly for Abner when he was forced to play split end in place of injured Chris Burford. But Burford returned for the Oakland game Sept. 27 and Haynes came up with a 27-yard day, rushing and pass receiving.

FAIRFIELD, Jan. 21—One hundred and fifty-four head of elk were counted this week-end in a check of the Soldier Mountain game preserve, according to conservation officer Walter R. Browne. He states the elk seemed to be in good shape and that the rains opened the creek channels so that the game could travel to better feed areas.

Browne, accompanied by Rex O'Neil of the forest service; Jim Byce, Gooding; Bob and Vern Jackson; Burley; Steven and William Horrett; Filer, made the trip into the area with snow vehicles. They were able to go over Fieck summit and also down the south Boise river as far as Lightfoot bar where there was a bad washout. The road was badly washed at the mouth of Conant creek, too.

Browne states that they didn't observe any dead animals or predators on the trip. He says that the browse is showing above the snow and that it hasn't been overaten.

He states that the snow measured about six feet on Couch summit; 39 inches at Five points and 42 inches at the fish and game cabin at Bounds creek, on Big Smoky.

The group inspected the houses in the summer home area at the mouth of Salt creek and found them all in good shape. They shoveled some snow off roofs and cleaned the snow off the trailer house at the Big Smoky guard station.

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## Humphrey Takes Oath Of Office

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21 (AP)—Hubert H. Humphrey became the 41st vice president of the United States yesterday.

The self-styled "Happy Warrior" from Minnesota, son of a Minn. S.D. druggist, received the oath of office from Speaker John W. McCormack who has stood next in line to the presidency since the assassination of John F. Kennedy 14 months ago. For the 53-year-old Humphrey it was "a great honor and a sobering responsibility." For the 73-year-old McCormack it was a "high of relief."

The United States had been without a vice president since Kennedy's death. McCormack said that for the past 14 months he had tried to think "as little as possible" about the chance that he might be catapulted into the presidency.

"Just like when I am traveling in the air, I breathe a sigh of relief when I land on the ground at my destination," he said. "The pinnacle of a long career in public life for Humphrey was reached at 11:58 a.m. EST. He took the oath of office before thousands of spectators with his hand on an old family Bible held by Freddy Gates, a long-time friend from Minneapolis.

### "Personal" Bills Are Declining

BOISE, Jan. 21 (AP)—Introduction of "personal" bills which bear the individual name of a legislator appears to be on the decline in the 38th regular session of the Idaho legislature. Party leaders in both houses believe this portends better legislation and clears the way for more careful consideration of proposals which have merit. By the end of the 35th legislative day, the senate had received 41 bills and the house, 43. None of the senate proposals was a personal bill and only six of those introduced in the house bore individuals' names. House Majority Leader William J. Lantini, R., Twin Falls, believes the scarcity of "personal" bills at this session represents greater recognition of committee work in the legislative process. He said legislators attending a session of the North Idaho Chamber of Commerce after the election were advised to try out their pet projects on committees first. "If there's not enough support to get the committee to introduce it then the bill usually does not have a good chance of passing," he said. His counterpart in the senate, George Blick, R., Twin Falls, agreed. "I think historically it's been proven that bills which have sufficient merit for consideration are better than those that have not," he said. "I think (this session) the word 'perhaps' has gotten to the new members." Blick said he viewed "with a great deal of pleasure" the lack of a hefty file of personal legislation because he would "rather give more consideration to a few bills than hurried consideration to many." House Minority Leader Darrell Manning, D., Bannock, said he had urged his caucus to offer their personal bills first to committee for consideration, but he also saw another possible reason for the lack of individually-sponsored legislation: "I think the problems of the state are overshadowing those that might be of a personal nature and the people at home are withholding some of their proposals because they don't want to clutter up the machinery." In the senate, Minority Leader William J. Bee, D., Idaho, suggested the absence of such legislation in his chamber of the legislature reflected a differing attitude from that in the house. "We always are a lot shorter on personal bills in the senate than in the house," he said, but added that, "we have advised freshmen if possible to have their bills come out of committee. I feel that by letting the committee examine it first," Bee said, "we can weed out technical bugs."
